The verdict of the jury in the case against Robert Hazlewood, tried here last week in the District Court, was a great surprise to those on the outside who heard the evidence. A conviction depended upon the identity of the defendant, as the party who made the assault; and if he were, then was his mental condition such as to make him responsible for his acts. -

unable to see how the jury reached the of Canyon readers: verdict they returned in the case. The proof showed that the defendant had been twice convicted of insanity within two years before the assault charged against him was committed. Hence it can not be justly charged that his plea of insanity was trumped up for the occasion. The facts surrounding the assault irresistably force one to the conclusion that it was the act of an insane person. No motive for the assault can be fairly deduced from the facts as we understand it, want of motive is the first and highest test of sanity in such cases.

A number of eminent physicians testified for the state and for the defendant, and they were substantially of but one opinion, that the defendant was insane, and had been for several years, and that he did not possess willpower sufficient to enable him to re- ics. frain from doing any act which might occur to him to do.

He was under sentence of conviction for insanity at the time of the assault and was admitted to the insane asylum, at Austin, about one month after the assault. The assistant superintendant of the asylum, who took personal charge of him, saw and treated him twice and sometimes three times a day, until in October, testified that defendant was insane when he was admitted; that he was insane when the sheriff of Potter county took him from the asylum to be tried for the offence for which he was convicted, and that he was then, at the time of the trial, insane to the extent that he was irresponsible for any act he might do. The testimony was corroborated. and in no way controverted, by every physician who testified in the case:

Three physicians, one summoned by the state and two by the defendant, testified that they had been the physician in the family of defendant for fendant for his malady almost constantly during that time and that he had been insane during that period. and that he was insane at this time.

One or two non-experts testified for the state that at certain periods of a month or more from the time of the assault when the defendant was not under the influence of opiates, that they regarded him as sane; but testified further that when he was under the influence of opiates or stimulents he was absolutely insane.

The Court charged the jury, that in view of the fact that defendant was under conviction of insanity at the time of the alleged assault that it devolved on the state to show by evidence, beyond reasonable doubt, that at the very time of the assault defendant was sane, and had the power and ability to refrain from the commission of the act, if he did it. It was shown, without controversy, that defendant was under the influence of cocaine late in the afternoon, prior to the night of the assault; that as late as 11:30 that night he was under the influence of this drug to such an extent that he scarcely knew where he was. 

Budding and Grafting Fruit Trees

From the Fansas Farmer-

Budding is usually used in the propagating of the stone fruits, such as the peach, cherry and plum. The seedlings grown and used for the stocks must be in active growth when the ed gossip. budding is done. The bark must peel readily, leaving the active inner cells due to age. of the cambium layer upon the young woody growth. The bud which is to produce the new plant of the desired variety, must come in contact with this gard for the rights of others. layer of active cells. In preparing the stock for the bud, two cuts are made any kind. through the bark in the form of a "T." The bark is then raised, being careful not to injure the inner layer. The bud which has been removed from the "bud stick" with a sharp, thin-bladed knife, help it. is slipped in under the opened bark of the stock. It is held in place by wrapping it with cord or narrow strips of cotton cloth. These must be cut a week or two after the work is done.

In budding peaches, care must be exercised to avoid using any fruit buds for propagation. The fruit buds of peaches are found on the new growth

Grafting is the method usually employed in propagating apple trees. The whip graft, such as is used in the nurseries, must be made in the winter time. The only method of grafting that is practical as the growing season begins, is cleft grafting. This is







When to Prune Ornamental Trees.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 29 .- A little early care given to the pruning of ornamental trees and shrubs during the early part of March will do much to control their growing and flowering habits, and enable the home owner to have well former plants and well trained hedges or boundry plantings. The purning of ornamental trees and shrubs is, in fact, one of the first duties that may profitably be performed in the home garden. The amateur, however, should not make a ruthless a trip to Dallas the past week for medi assault with shears or pruning knife upon everything in his yard. Flowering trees and shrubs that bloom in the spring or early summer receive radical pruning at this time, according to the garden specialists of the United States Department of Agrithe prompt action of the trained nurse culture. She is improving there are dead or weak branches, these should be taken out and any crossing limbs that are rubbing and seriously interfering with the growth of the bush should be removed. The tips of the limbs, however, should not be cut off nor should any young wood that does not interfere with the growth of the bush be removed. It must be borne in mind that the blossom buds for this year's flowering were formed last year, and every shoot removed takes off that much of the prospective

> Trees and shrubs that bear their flowers in midsummer and which were not pruned in the fall may be pruned at this time. Plants of this sort are the Rose of Sharon and the shrubby hydrangea. Where the largest possible mass effect is desired, these plants should be pruned but little. If the aim is to secure the largest possible trusses or blossom heads, last year's growth hould be pruned back to two or three eyes to a stem. Such severe pruning however, is not conducive to the most attractive development of shrubs.

Climbing roses should not be pruned at this time except for the removal of surplus or interfering branches. Every bit of wood removed now reduces the amount of bloom the plant will bear during the coming season. Roses used in border planting should be treated in exactly the same way as other shrubs, except that many of these species will be improved by hiving all their old wood cut away once in every five or six years. This would mean cutting all the old canes off within three or four inches of the ground and forcing the bush to throw up entirely new




