BOY KILLED BY CAR IN SILVERTON

Gill Anderson Was Crushed to Death At Silverton Sunday

Gill Anderson, the 15-year old boy of Tom Anderson, county and district clerk of Briscoe county, was crushed to death by an auto in Silverton Sunday afternoon. The car was being driven by Naill Crawford, of same age a son of Minor Crawford, former sheriff of that county.

The boys were close friends and Anderson was waiting at a culvert for the Crawford boy to bring down the Big Hupmobile and they were going driving together. When close to Anderson the car began to zig-zag across the street and Anderson in trying to get out of the way was struck and the car passed over his body from the thigh upward. The accident occurred about 4 o'clock and he died twelve hours later.

The deceased was a model boy and a regular attendant at Sunday school. Both families are very prominent in that county, and the sad tragedy has cast gloom over the community.

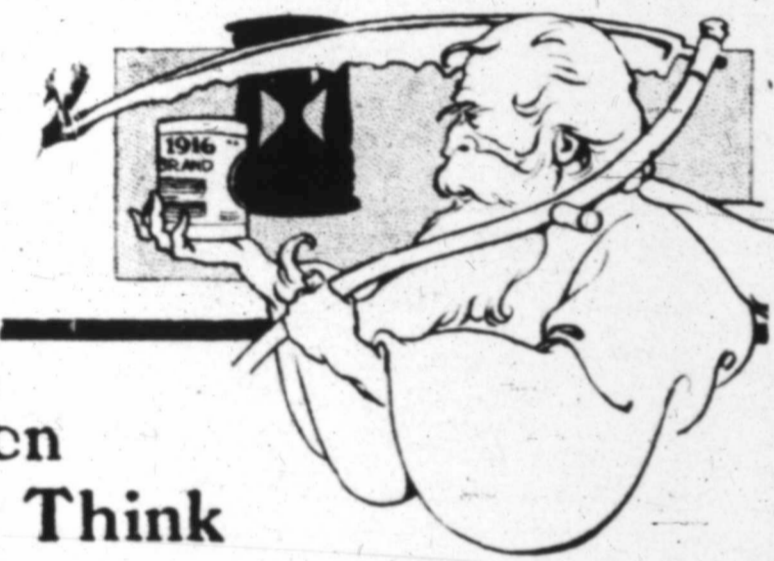


WHEN over the fair fame of

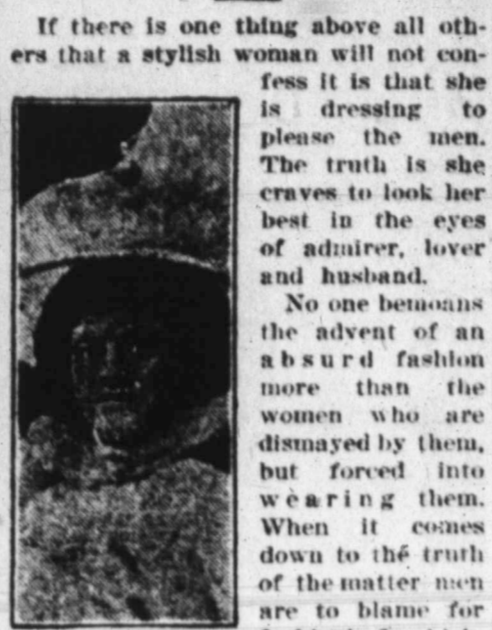

A Directoire Fur Set

Sets of fur and velvet are quite the thing. One very charming directoire set consists of a bonnet, waist-length cape, and a round barrel muff of medium size. The velvet cape is circular, dropping lower at the front and back, and edged with a five-inch band of kolinsky fur. It is shirred to shoulder depth in many encircling rows and has a little fur band collar. The poke bonnet has several encircling bands of narrow fur and a shoulder depth net veil, banded twice around the bottom with narrow fur bands. The muff is a fat little affair covered entirely with shirred velvet. The fur band is placed about the center of the muff.

Poultry Pointers

Fowls kept in a clean henhouse are more likely to be free from disease.

A little practice will enable one to dry-pick chickens and fowls and those so picked will usually bring better prices.

As the chicks grow older and larger, be sure that they do not overcrowd their coops, for if they crowd at night they will not make the best use of their food and will not grow as they should. Grit and oyster shell should be included in the ration for both young and old. To neglect this would be poor economy.

To finish fattening turkeys give them all the whole or cracked corn they will eat two or three times a day.

Now that the poultry cannot obtain bugs and worms in the fields, the need of animal food must be supplied by beef scraps, fish meal or cut, fresh bone.

Spoiled grain and shrunken grain, although it can be bought cheaper than good grain, is usually more expensive to feed, because it has so little food value in it.

There is no advantage in keeping males in the flock of layers until the hens are mated for the breeding season next spring. In fact, they are usually a disturbing factor.

It is always better to pen pullets separately from hens and feed them separately because the pullets usually need more food to complete their development and start them laying.

Feed a variety of grain, including corn, a little wheat and some oats, if possible, and the feed will cost less in proportion to the eggs produced, for fowls cannot do well on one kind of food alone.

Donkeys in War

Donkeys of the small African kind have taken the place of mules for transport work in the French trenches. It is not the first time that donkeys have taken part in military operations. The Persians and Greeks made use of them in their convoys, and there is the instance of the donkeys which carried the members of the French institute on Bonaparte's Egyptian expedition. Whenever the column was attacked by the enemy, the soldiers formed a square and shouted "Donkeys in the center"; whereupon the academicians would seek the refuge thus proffered. Geoffroy Saint-Hilaire is responsible for the story.

Photographing on Skin

Recent experiments in photography have developed a means by which photographs may be printed on the human skin. A photographic film of special composition is fixed to the skin and exposed to the sun for printing. Some strong prints have been made this way. Similar films may be printed upon the green skin of an apple. The prints made upon human skin can serve somewhat the same purpose as tattoo marks, since they are practically indelible.

HORSE WILL GET A PENSION

"Daisy" Has Been the Heroine of More Than a Hundred Thrilling Shipwrecks.

Daisy, the heroine of more than one hundred thrilling shipwrecks in the past 21 years, has been added to the list of pensioned government employees. Daisy is the handsome dapple gray mare—the pride of the United States coast guard station at Peaked Hill Bars, Provincetown, on the tip end of Cape Cod.

Since November 15, 1895, when Daisy, as a chubby, playful colt, entered the service of Uncle Sam, she has faithfully performed those duties incumbent on her. According to the seven men who comprise the crew at the Peaked Hill Bars station, Daisy has been the real thing in successfully executing many brilliant rescues. Not only has she furnished the motive power in all kinds of storms over ice-bound shores of Cape Cod for the land journey of the lifeboat, but she has also aided the men in bringing safely to shore hundreds of half-frozen sailors in the breeches buoy.

Sectional Avoirdupois.

The average weight of men south of the Mason and Dixon line is from four to six pounds lighter than the average weight of men north of it, says United States marine recruiting officers operating there, in a report received at marine headquarters. These recruiting officers have asked that the minimum weight for recruits in the South be reduced from 124 to 120 pounds, stripped.

"The large raw-boned southerner" is seldom seen, the recruiting officers aver, and, while the men of the South are as sound and fit as the men of any other section, they are usually small-boned and light in weight. The officers point out in their recommendations that some of the best "hikers" and fighters in the marine corps are the lean, wiry men from the southland.

How Aviator Can Learn.

It is not necessary for the amateur aviator to have an aeroplane at his disposal continually. A machine has been invented which will enable him to learn the principles of aviation without ascending six feet from terra firma. The machine consists of two long steel arms which intersect each other at right angles. They are mounted upon a concrete pyramid at the intersection, so that they balance when at rest. The aviator's seat is over the intersection and the machine moves with the wind or by means of weights that can be shifted, giving the driver the same effort to maintain his equilibrium as if he were high in the air.

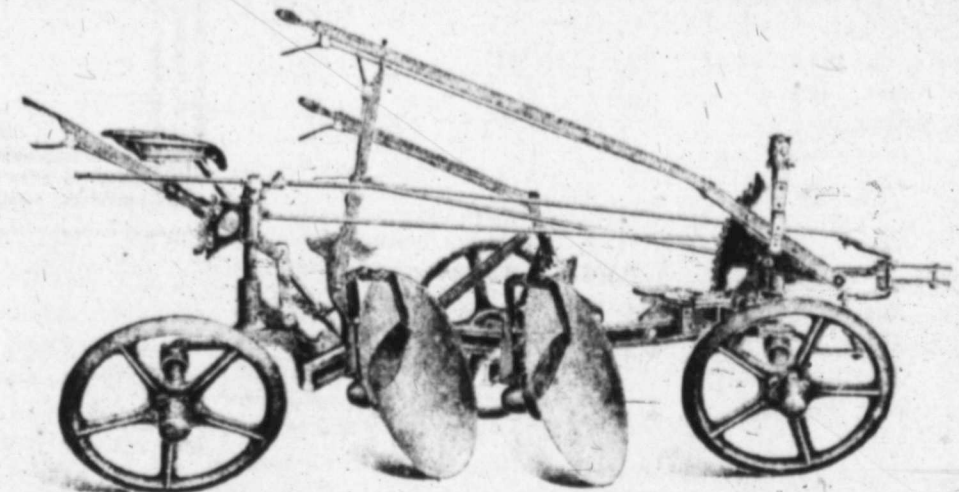

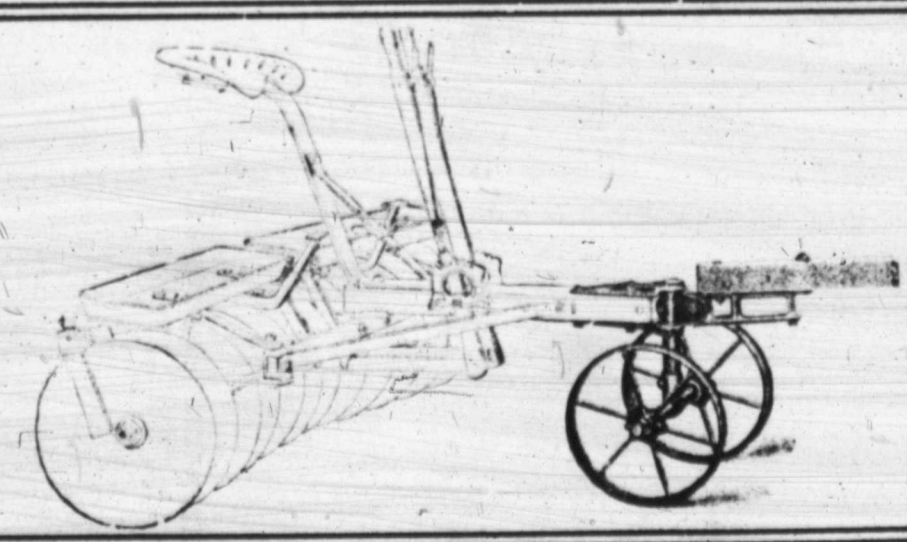

Investigations by the Forest Products Laboratory, at Madison Wisconsin, have resulted in the use of tanbark in the manufacture of asphalt shingles to the extent of 160 tons per week. The value of the bark has been thereby increased from 60 cents to \$2.50 per ton.

Prairie Dog Poison

Prairie Dogs are a great nuisance
in the Panhandle of Texas and if it
was possible to estimate the loss of
grass alone from them it would run
into many sections of good grass.
Prairie Dogs can easily be destroyed
by poisoning but unless an entire
community band together and kill
all of them thru-out the whole section
it will be of little use for an individ-
ual farmer or ranchman to attempt
eradication, for tho he may kill all
the dogs on his land, in a year or two
he will have an many as before on ac-
count of their coming in from adjoining
lands.

In Texas there is a state law which
enables citizens of a county to call
election and if the majority of the vot-
ers in the county desire every one in
the county can be compelled to clean
out the dogs and in this way the dogs
completely eradicated from the coun-
ty.

Poisoning can be most successfully
done during the winter or early spring
or during a severe drouth and there
is no better time than now to begin
some of this work of eradicating our
section of the country of this pest.

A poison that the U. S. Department
of Agriculture has used successfully
and recommends is as follows:

Mix 1 ounce of powdered strychnine
in three-fourths of a pint of water
and heat to boiling point. Mix a
tablespoonful of gloss starch in one
eighth of a pint of cold water, add to
the strychnine solution, and boil un-
til clear paste is formed. Remove
from fire; add 1 ounce of powdered bi-
carbonate of soda, previously mixed
with one-eighth of a pint of cold water
and stir to smooth, creamy mass. Add
1 tablespoonful of heavy corn sirup
and one-eighth of an ounce of saccha-
rine, and stir. Pour over 13 quarts
of oats and mix thoroughly until the
grain is evenly coated. Allow to
stand several hours before distribut-
ing.

For mixing small quantities an or-

dinary galvanized iron washtub is con-
venient. For larger quantities a tight
smooth box may be used, and the mix-
ing may be done with a spade.

Each quart of the prepared grain
is sufficient for treating about 40
holes. This quantity should be scat-
tered lightly on clean, hard ground
near each prairie-dog hole. Do not
place the poison on loose earth or in
the hole.—With reasonable care in
scattering the baits cattle and sheep
on the open range will not be endang-
ered.

Come to Canyon to live.

Glass that is transparent, yet un-
breakable is the most recent inven-
tion of interest to the householder. A

ball that is thrown against one of
these new window panes bounces back
as it would from a stone wall; a brick
cannot shatter it. Any heavy weight
thrown full force against it rebounds,
with no flying glass as a result. This
break-proof glass is made of a sheet

of white transparent celluloid, 21-1000
of an inch thick, placed between two
pieces of glass. The glass and the
celluloid are welded together under
high temperature and tremendous
pressure, and the result is a solid

sheet possessing all the transparency
of the best plate glass, combined with
the strength of a sheet of metal.

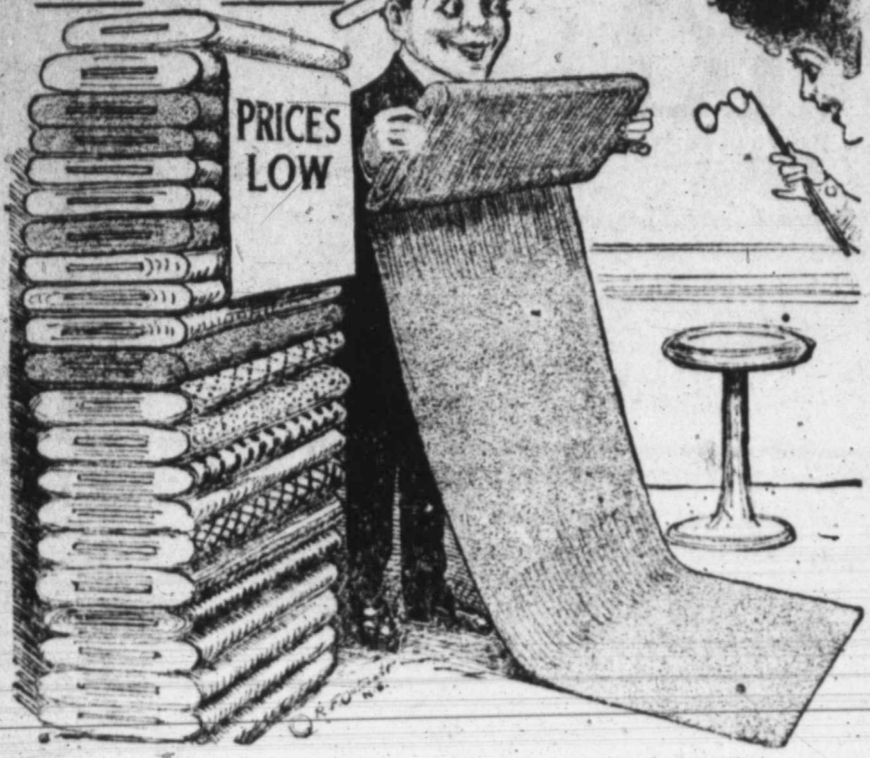

At the International Livestock Exposition held at Chicago, December 2nd to 9th, a packer gave the highest price ever paid for a carload of beef cattle in the United States. The cattle in question were he grand champion carload to fed by Ed. P. Hall of Mechanicsville, Illinois—15 head of Aberdeen Angus yearlings—of an average weight of 1145 pounds per head making a total weight to the carload of 17,200 pounds. The cattle were bid in an auction at 28 cents a pound—a price which broke all records—the previous high record being 17 cents per pound. The price for the cattle averaged \$321.08 a head and the total cost of the carload was \$4,816. At the 1913 show the record carload lot brought \$13.25 per hundred.

The People's Oil and Cotton Company plant at Wharton, Texas, has stored sothing like a hundred cars of peanuts, on which the mill will start to work as soon as the cotton seed run is finished. It is the intention of the management to make oil and stock feed of the nuts, and to do what it can to bring to the general public the knowledge of the value of a feed for stock and hogs. Recent tests by various feeding stations show that the meal or cake, after the oil is taken out, is a superior feed for hogs to corn, and that while the packing plants will not allow the average price for hogs fed on the raw peanut with the oil in it, owing to the fact that the meat of such animals is flabby, they will pay a premium for those fed the cake, as the meat is firm, and has an exceptional flavor.

The boy mentioned was converted at the mission station at Lirhandia and he makes it a point each day to visit the morning school at the station and then in the afternoon he goes into the bush and tells the other native children what he has heard in the morning.

The largest cotton buyers of Arkansas, through the Little Rock Cotton Exchange, have begun a movement to encourage the growing of long-staple and higher grades of cotton in the state next year. Because of the increasing demand for long-staple in the manufacture of automobile tires and fine cotton goods, dealers believe long-staple prices will be even higher next year than this. The exchange has secured an option on 400,000 pounds of seed from long-staple cotton growers on one of the state farms which brought the highest price here this season, and buyers are endeavoring to secure option on seed from all the best cotton bought. The seed will be furnished to planters in exchange for the seed they have saved for planting next spring.

Pelleagra and Poor Food

That there may be an increase in pellagra during the coming year on account of the rise in the cost of food-stuffs is the fear expressed in a statement by the Health Service to-day. As a result of government researches it was found that pellagra is produced by an insufficient, poorly-balanced diet and that it can both be prevented and cured by the use of food containing elements in the proportion required by the body. The application of this knowledge greatly reduced pellagra in 1916 as compared with previous years. This reduction is believed by experts of the Public Health Service to have been due to improved economic conditions which enabled wage earners to provide themselves with a better and more varied diet and to a wider dissemination of the knowledge of how the disease may be prevented. It is feared however, that pellagra may increase in 1917 by reason of an increase in food cost out of proportion to the prosperity now enjoyed by this country. The great rise in the cost of forage, particularly cotton seed meal and huls, is causing the people in many localities to sell their cows and thus there is danger that they will deprive themselves of milk, one of the most valuable pellagra preventing foods. The high cost of living has thus far served to bring about a reduction in many families in the amount of meat, eggs, beans and peas consumed, all of which are pellagra prophylactics. In effecting economies of this nature the general public should bear in mind the importance of a properly balanced diet and refrain from excluding, if possible such valuable disease preventing foods. It is believed that unless this is done there will be a greater incidence of pellagra next spring.

ALL PRESIDENTS LIVED LONG

Except Three Who Were Assassinated, Each One of Them Attained Old Age.

An anonymous letter to the Lancet, discussing longevity among great men, recalls that the longevity of the presidents of the United States is remarkable. Their ages were as follows: Sixty-seven, ninety, eighty-three, eighty-five, seventy-three, eighty, seventy-eight, seventy-nine, sixty-eight, seventy-one, fifty-three, sixty-five, seventy-four, sixty-four, seventy-seven, fifty-six, sixty-six, sixty-three, seventy, forty-nine, fifty-six, seventy-one, sixty-seven, fifty-eight years. Those at fifty-six, forty-nine and fifty-eight were, respectively, Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley, who were assassinated. The ages of these 24 men totalize 1,033 years, or an average of sixty-nine years each, showing, as is believed, that the stress and responsibility of leadership seem to have no effect on longevity. The following causes of death are those popularly accepted: Washington, pneumonia (more correct accounts state edematous affection of the windpipe, or membranous croup); J. Adams, debility; Jefferson, chronic diarrhea; Madison, debility; Monroe, debility; J. Q. CHANGE IN TABLE MANNERS

Things Which Would Have Been Bad Form in Olden Times Are Now All Right.

Formerly it was forbidden to absorb gravy with bits of bread stuck upon one's fork, and so to wipe the platter clean. Good manners required that one should not take excessive pains to get this gravy, however fine it might be. One might, indeed, dip a piece of meat or potatoes in it. At an earlier period, in the times of our grandfathers, manners were even more strict. A good tone at table then demanded that one should always leave something on the plate. This stupid fashion had long disappeared even in times of peace, and it is now regarded as bad manners rather than good to leave anything on the plate. But in peace time one did leave the remains of the gravy. War time and the scarcity of fats has produced a change, and doubtless this is right.

The fate of other table customs has been similar. Gossiping at banquets, if it is not done in quite too ugly a fashion, will hardly provoke disgust today, and today it will be hardly possible to justify the leaving of pieces of bread, which formerly was in many places a rule. What eyes a hotelkeeper would have made two years ago if a guest had brought a piece of bread with him to dinner! Today thousands of people do it, and nobody minds.—Berlin Lokalanzeiger.

Through Sewer on a Bike.

Not since the fictional days of Jean Valjean has a trip through a sewer occupied so much space in print as the one made recently by the engineer of the newly constructed six and one-half miles of sewer at Pasadena, Cal.

The trip was an inspection tour and was made on a motorcycle. To have walked the full distance would have taken several hours. So the engineer conceived the plan of lowering a motorcycle into the pipe at the clean-out hole in the beginning of the main artery and making a trip de luxe.

He had never before ridden a motorcycle. Hence he chose one equipped with a tandem seat and selected an experienced driver.

A gas headlight on the motorcycle illuminated the passage. The distance was traversed in two hours, in spite of the numerous stops made to investigate walls and manholes.—Popular Science Monthly.

The "Great White Plague."

At the present time about one in ten, or 10 per cent, of all the deaths in England and Wales is due to some form of one disease—tuberculosis. About 40,000 die of consumption in England and Wales each year, and an additional 20,000 of tubercular disease of the bones, glands or some other part of the body other than the lungs. There is good reason to believe that there are a quarter of a million consumptives in our midst continually, and 150,000 persons suffering from some other form of tuberculosis. These are appalling figures, and they justify the name of the "Great White Plague" that has so aptly been given to tuberculosis.—London Tit-Bits.
