

#### Quicklime Aided Wreckers.

The tremendous expansive force of quicklime was lately used effectively in breaking up brick masonry. It was necessary to remove three foundation piers, each 12 by 20 feet in area and 12 feet high, and similar piers supporting working engines on each side prevented blasting. Cutting and breaking ip by hand being too slow and expensive, the new method was tried. Vertical holes three inches across and three feet deep were bored three feet apart in both directions, and were filled to within six inches of the top with fresh-slacked lime. The holes over the wet lime being closed with well-tamped brick dust, cracks started Canyon, Texas in ten minutes, soon breaking the pier

Prepare a crust, consisting of one and one-half cupfuls of flour, one large teaspoonful of baking powder, one heaping tablespoonful of butter, and moisten with enough milk to roll out. Cut in squares for each dumpling and fill with the apples. Sprinkle' with sugar and cinnamon, wet the edges, pinch together, place in a baking pan, fill with boiling water seasoned with one cupful of sugar and a half cupful of butter. This makes the sauce. Bake until the apples are done.

#### Hot Corn Salad

Take a can of corn and stew it in s little milk, adding butter, pepper, salt and a dessert spoonful of sugar by way of seasoning. 




