

Believes In Deep Plowing.

Bush, at Amarillo, Mr. G T. Greeley, rancy and want.-Ingersell. of Souix City, who is very much interested in the Panhandle country, says among other things:

"I have watched with a great deal of interest the rainfall (in the Panhandle) and, of course, was much discouraged but now that August has had so much, and if people will only plow 12 to 16 inches deep and hold the moisture, next year ought to produce bumper crops.

I have a store tenant who has farmed most of his life in Hungary, (good land \$1,000 per acre.) He tells me they always plow 21 inches deep for sugar beets, the next year 8 inches for other crops, 8 or 10 inches the next year and then 14 inches deep until rotation brings the beet year round again, then 21 inches. They expect 40 bushels, always, of wheat; 22 tons of sugar beets per acre. They plow with two steam stationary engines and cable, the 21 inch plowing-after that oxen. They give as high as \$20 rent per acre, on the best land. This method they have followed for years. The climate and rainfall is about as it is here in South Dakota where they are still polwing 4 to 5

I saw several hundred feet of movie films of the plow and attachment (made by the Scientific Machinery Co.) and nothing I have seen approaches it. It is really quite wonderful. I am going, I think, to have one made to cut 12 inches deep, maybe 14. This "once over" plow as it is called is in great demand."



Spring Foods.

The importance of teaching children to eat and enjoy vegetable food is a most important one for all mothers to consider. Vegetables add bulk to the food, holding foods in such manner that the digestive juices have free access. Vegetables contain valuable mineral matters which are inestimably valuable to the growing child, in fact indispensable to a good body structure of bones and muscles. The mineral matter keeps the blood in good balance, supply elasticity to the blood vessels and do many other

Children as a rule cannot be forced into eating things that are objectionable, and they have a right to object if the head of the family does not eat them, for he is the pattern and example which all children love to follow. If daddy eats carrots and spinach it is comparatively easy to overcome any prejudice on the part of the children if they are taught early enough.

The early greens that come first in the spring are rich in iron and should be eaten frequently. Spinach should be cooked in as little water as possible, not to waste any of the precious

Preventing Staleness of Middle Age

By C. F. THWING, President of Western Reserve Univer

Every age of man has its peculiar temptations. The temptation of youth is, in the case of men, appetite; in the case of women, self-consciousness.

The temptation of both men and women of middle age is the temptation of staleness. This temptation belongs especially to college-bred men. The college man who has developed, in his four academic years, a vigorous body of large and hard muscles is peculiarly open to the danger of physical staleness.

The peril of staleness belongs also to the intellect and the imagination. The inspirations of the cloister, the visions of highest purposes, the atmosphere of idealism, the sense of yonder-mindedness, are in peril of fading away in the light of common day.

The defense, however, against such etaleness is not far to seek. The defense against physical staleness for the athlete is the continuance of his athletic sports. He is to keep up the fun of daily exercise in gymnasium, on the river, on the tennis court, on the links. If this be not easy, as it probably will not be, he must at least make it an actual endeavor.

The peril of intellectual staleness may be removed by great reading and noble thinking for at least a brief period every day. The imperativemess of immediate duty should yield to the more imperial imperativeness of the distant duty. Poetry, great prose, should be a daily portion. The portion may be small, brief in time, limited to paragraphs, yet, nevertheless, to it should be given heed.

"Give me a great thought, that I may lift myself with it," is the counsel of Jean Paul.

The danger, too, of moral and human staleness may be met by the inspiration of leadership. Every man should seek to be a leader. He may be in humanity's army simply a sergeant-let him lead his small squad. He may be a captain-let him lead his hundred. He may be a colonel-let him lead his regiment. But every man of educated power may, in the trying mid-period of his life, lift himself out of his moral temptations by feeling the duty and by appreciating the privilege of being an inspiring guide. The duties he owes others help him to perform the

The Panhandle country for the past few years has been undergoing a more or less varied experience in regard the rainfall, but through all of this time the farmers have learned the lesson of dry farming, and even though the dividends were cut short druing the first part of dry period by the lack of rainfall, the experience was profitable in that a great lesson in proper cultivation was taught.

The wheat acreage this year was the greatest in the history of the Panhandle. The high price of feed caused most of the farmers to put in large crops of wheat for grazing, which in the Panhandle is profitable even if the returns from the grain crop is light as the stock may live on the wheat through the winter and spring months. There was little rain during the winter, but the wheat made a wonderful growth and this spring with a few good rains made a yield said. The lesson of the drouth of 1909-10 was fresh in the minds of most of the Panhandle farmers and they had plowed the land for the wheat crop deep and were prepared for a drouth at any time. Many farmers claim that the wheat they planted last fall received but little rain during the growing period, many as little as two inches, but the wheat kept on growing and made a good yield. The experience of the past few years show that the Fanhandle will produce more crops urder most adverse conditions than any section of the United States.

Row Crops Good.

While the wheat has been making this good record the row crops have little rain during May and June or even July, the row crops waited during the dry time until the August rain, and then began to make a wonderful growth,

Kafir and Milo Maize never fail in Randall County. These crops will make good feed and grain crops, no matter if the rainfall is light or comes late. In other sections where Indian corn is raised, that crop would burn up and blow away if it had to undergo the sever tests that these grops are often put through. Yet during the most unfavorable conditions, if the farmer keeps his land clean and contirues to work it during the dry time, kafir and maize will always make a big yield.

Sorghum is another favorite crop in Randall county, a majority of the crop being sown broad-cast after the wheat has been cut, on the stubble land, and then cut for feed. Since the coming of the silo, sorgum has played a great part in the filling of these great conservators of food.

Feterita is another favorite row crop with Randall county farmers and is largely planted every year. It is of a quick growth and makes a very fine feed.

All of these row crops make excellent ensilage. It is a noteworthy fact that Randall County has more silos than any of its neighbors, and the ensilage has played an important part in bringing to Randall County on two different occasions a record to be proud of-the highest priced Texas market. 

WEST TEXAS STATE NORMAL

From an architectural standpoint the new building of the West Texas State Normal College is one of the most complete, if not the most complete in the state.

The building stands on a campus of forty acres.

The building is 208 feet east and west and 168 feet north and south, exclusive of the steps.

The style of the building is a com-Fination of Greecian and Roman.

It faces the south with the main entrance on the south, and east and west supplementary entrances.

The building has semi indirect electrie light, with local gas plant. No student or teacher will face the

light in the class rooms. The curtain walls are of brick, stone and terra cotta. The brick are of dark gray, with white stone and terra cotta are used.

It is estimated that the building will carry eight times the weight that would be upon it if every floor was filled with men standing as closely together as possible.

The building is constructed in a T shape, the auditorium, swimming pool and gymnasium occupying the stem pertion of the building.

The Basement.

The basement floor contains the swimming pool, gymnasium, boys and girls locker rooms, toilets, shower baths, office of Director of Physical Education, girls lunch room, manual training machinery shop, office of Director of Manual Training and bench woodwork room.

The swimming pool room is 40x100 feet. It is tiled floor. The 28x62 foot pool is tiled, and water stands from 31/2 to 81/2 feet deep when filled. It is the latest in style, with rings, spring boards and trapeze. Marble steps lead up to the landings. Water may be heated to any required degree.

The shower bath rooms are in marble with nickel plated fixtures, having both hot and cold water at the disposal of the students.

The toilet rooms are finished in

The locker rooms contain one thousand steel lockers, having independent locks for each.

lockers for the smaller apparatus. A corrective gymnasium 22x70 feet for the treatment of special cases amoung the students and for the use

of the training school. In the basement is also the fan room, containing two suction air cleaners for general use in the building, a large fan and heating apparatus for furnishing pure fresh air to all the class rooms and a smaller fan for a similar service for the auditorium. These fans are sufficiently large for changing the air throughout the

biulding in fifteen minutes. The electrical switch board room contains three large slate base switche boards from which are controlled all electrical current used in the building.







terers. The Swift Packing Company has published a statement that kafir corn excels all other grains in imparting superior quality to the finished product of the hog. Inasmuch as kafir corn contains approximately 93 per cent of the nutriments of Indian corn and the soil is peculiarly adapted to its generous production, the Panhandle as a hog-raising center is already well known.

The rainfall, even when diminished materially, has invariably been sufficient to produce good crops, even when other sections were being devastated by drouth. Mr. H. W. Campbell, the "father of dry farming," is quoted as declaring, after a careful study of the amount and distribution of the rainfall for the last fifteen years as reported by the United States Weather Bureau Station at Amarillo, and a thorough examination of the soil and other conditions bearing upon the subject, the Panhandle of Texas is destined to become one of the leading wheat-producing section's of the world. Professor Campbell states that with a system of culture that conserves the moisture, conditions are as perfect in the Panhandle for a profitable wheat yield as any ex-

> About a week ago in Summerfield Kansas, occured the distribution to heirs of the huge Bookwalter estate consisting of about 46,000 acres of rich land in the counties of Pawnee Gage, Thayer, Valley, Greeley and Washington. Among the legacies were ten quarter sections of land to each of nine children. The total valvation of the land given was more than \$1,000,000.

> Mr. Hungate who left. Summerfield to come to New Mexico a little over eight years ago, was well acquainted with a number of members of this family and farmed land beside the Bookwalter place. He states that the estate was purchased in the early seventies at prices ranging between \$2.50 and \$12.50 per acre. The usual hardship of pionees times were encountered and in time surmounted by the hard working ranchers. Corn sold in those days for eleven cents a bushel and was often used for fuel Mr. Mungate lived in the Summerfield community for fifteen years and saw a good part of the development of the huge estate which has just been di-

> Today the land is worth from \$100 to \$125 per acre at a conservative estimate, a striking increase, but one entirely proportional to the productiveness of the land and the work done upon it.

> The lesson to farmers of this new country in Curry county is one of extreme importance: Mr. Hungate has seen farmers take land here and give up a good thing after only half a trial. He tells this story as a good illustration of what may be done by "holding on" .- Clovis (N. M.) Jour.


