Y. M. C. A. GETS \$350.00

Randall county has raised about \$350.00 for the Y. M. C. A. according to reports so far made to C. R. Burrow, who is chairman for the county.

Randall county was assessed \$200 for this work. The great need of the organization and the wonderful good that the Y. M. C. A. is doing for our boys in the trenches and in the training camps so appealed to our people that they willingly gave more than was asked, and stand ready to give more when the next call is

made, which will be a little after the first of the year.

Sunday afternoon speakers went over the county in the interest of the great work, meetings being held in practically all of the school houses. In a few places the meetings had not been properly advertised and few people came to the schools.

At every school house there was an excellent response showing that the farmers of Randall county are thoroughly awake to the needs of the Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A. and want to join hands with the people of Canyon in meeting the demands of these organizations which are taking care of our boys in health and in sickness.

W. E. Bennett and E. E. Adams, Hereford breeders from the north part of the county, will enter bulls in the sale. Other prominent breeders are expected to put Herefords in the sale.

Opening New Store.

Dooley & York are opening a new furniture store on the south side of the square, and will handle both new and second hand furniture.

In connection with this business the gentlemen will have the best varnishing rooms in the Panhandle, for autos and furniture. Mr. York is an expert painter and will have charge of this department.

Extensive improvements are being made on the rooms this firm will occupy, and when the store is opened, it will add much to the business section of Canyon.

More Than \$100 for Book Fund.

President R. B. Cousins stated yesterday afternoon that about \$115 had been turned into him by the school boys and girls for the book fund for our soldiers. He stated that only one school in the county had reported. He expected the county to raise between \$125 and \$150 for this fund, hence was highly pleased with the sums that were collected. He will have a full report for next week.

Next Draft in February.

The President has designated that the next draft of men for the new army will be made about the middle of February. It has not been stated just how many men will go, but from indications there will be a large number of men in the draft.

TRADES DAY IN CANYON A GREAT DRAWING CARD

There was a large crowd in Canyon Monday for the Trades Day even though the day was threatening and looked like a storm would break at any time.

The people of Randall county have learned that when the business men announce special bargains, they mean just what they say.

The Canyon Band, or "Sammies" as they have named themselves played at 11 o'clock and at three thirty. The band, composed largely of young ladies, is directed by Miss Wiggins. The organization has been together but two months and many of the players and inexperienced, but on the whole the organization shows that it has the material to make an excellent band.

The auction sale was good, with a large number of horses and cows, together with farm machinery and merchandise.

The Business Men's Association wish us again to call the attention of the people to its published statements on several previous occasions that no by-bidding is allowed, and in case there is, those doing it must pay the auctioneer for his time, and they are barred from the sale in the future. The sale is free to all who wish to sell anything, but the Canyon Business Men's association has its reputation at stake and cannot afford to ruin the sale by allowing indiscriminate by-bidding.

The Trade Excursion Friday was one of the most enjoyable the business men have taken this year. The Park community was visited, and it was certainly a revelation to those who had not been there. The community is one of the best settled in the Panhandle and the farm homes are most excellent. The people are highly pleasing to meet and extended a cordial welcome to the visitors.

At four o'clock a number of races were pulled off on the south side of the square, which were very interesting for the big crowd. These were followed by an exhibition mule riding on the north side of the square. All together now for a big Trades Day in December!

ROSWELL BEATS NORMAL BY SCORE OF 99 TO 0

The Normal football team went to Roswell Saturday where they met the Military School, getting the little end of a 99 to 0 score.

The game was not so bad as the score would indicate. The Roswell team has beaten by a large score all comers this year. The team is heavy and fast, and has one man who made All-American tackle two years ago, in addition to a bunch of men who have had training in some of the big schools.

The Normal team put up a plucky fight and during the last quarter came very nearly scoring on two occasions. The Roswell team paid the Normal boys a great compliment by declaring that they were the only bunch which had fought them during the entire game this year. Clarendon College laid down after the first half and the Roswell bunch just fooled with them, running up a score of 66 to 0 without effort. With the Normal bunch, the Roswell team won all she made by a hard fight and put up her best fight in defending her goal during the final period of the game.

GET BEHIND THE GOOD ROADS BOND ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 24.

Bond Election Nov. 24.

Every voter in Randall County should keep in mind the fact that the special bond election will be held on November 24 to determine whether or not there shall be floated in this county bonds to the amount of \$50,000 for the purpose of good roads.

One or more points should be in the minds of the voters. First, there shall be constructed main roads running from Canyon north to Amarillo; west to the Deaf Smith county line; south to Happy. These roads are to be designated exclusively by the Commissioners Court. Every road leading to these main roads will be put in first class condition.

Second, if the county votes the bonds, the state will give the county at least \$20,000 for road work, which

means that the county will have \$70,000 to work with on the roads, thus making sufficient to put all of the roads in good condition and to keep them in good condition. If we do not vote the bonds, the county roads will remain in the same condition as they are now, and can never be placed in good condition, as the county does not have sufficient money to work all of the roads properly.

Third, the expense connected with the issuance of bonds will amount to practically nothing for each tax payer in comparison to the great good that will result to all of the citizens. The issuance of the bonds will add but 9 cents to the tax rate, which means but a few dollars to every man in the county.

Practically every county on the Plains has issued bonds for good roads.

Randall county's roads are in a very bad condition.

Good roads will easily save each and every farmer in the county more cash every year than he will pay in taxes, besides the pleasure of travelling under pleasant conditions.

Good roads will add materially to the land values of the county. Every man should make up his mind NOW to vote for good roads in the election on November 24.

LAST DAY FOR PACKAGES TO OUR BOYS IN FRANCE

Today is the last day upon which packages for Christmas addressed to our boys in France can be mailed with assurance that they will be delivered by Christmas time.

The second installment on the Liberty Bond subscriptions are due today and the banks expect all who owe on their subscriptions to call around.

REDCROSS URGENT CALL

The Local Red Cross Chapter has received the following letter of importance to all our people:

Latest advices from abroad emphasize the desperate need of immense quantities of Surgical Dressings and Hospital Supplies. Shipments are being made on every boat that sails, and have been for many months. Every inch of shipping capacity available is being utilized for this purpose.

Our own men are now in the casualty list, but apart from all this the Red Cross in France is supplying 3423 military hospitals. In addition, we must build up a large stock ahead for future emergencies. We cannot wait until our armies are actually in the

fighting, because then all the ships available could not keep up to the demand for Surgical Dressings.

Washington headquarters has asked the Southwestern Division what quantities we are prepared to supply. We must, therefore, ask you to fill out promptly to the best of our ability the form enclosed herewith. In estimating normal monthly production, use the figures representing what you are actually producing today; and for emergency production, your estimate of the maximum output in response to an urgent call. This is urgent and important.

Many wounded may die unless American women make whatever sacrifices are necessary to largely increase our production.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH UNDER CONSTRUCTION

A new church building for the Episcopalian congregation in Canyon was started this week on East Houston street, half a block east of the square.

The building will be a neat little brick, 20x40 feet and will be a typical Episcopalian church. It is planned to have the building ready for dedication about the first of the year.

David Thomas states that the new church is being erected principally by the missionary board on account of the students in this section who wish to come here for the Normal. His church does not encourage students going to towns where there is no Episcopal church.

Bishop Temple and Rector Seaman, both of Amarillo, are looking after the interests of the new church here.

FGOD COMMITTEE CONTINUED IN PERMANENT ORGANIZATION

D. A. Park, County Food Administrator of Randall County, has received instructions from Washington to make his county committee permanent in view of the work that is to follow for the food administrator. Mr. Park will ask all who have assisted in the Pledge Card Campaign to continue to give services to the government as the administration asks. All of the men and women will gladly do this.

Randall county made a great record in the pledge card campaign.

The government estimated that this county had 1,048 persons who should sign the cards. The solicitors turned over to Mr. Park 1,091 cards.

#### Letter from Noah Sharpe.

Noah Sharpe, formerly a student in the Normal, joined the navy last year. He was recently transferred to the Marines, and writes the following to Mr. and Mrs. T. V. Reeves:

Quantico, Va., Nov. 8.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Reeves:

You asked me something about saluting the flag. In the navy and army camps it is not required that men salute the flag when hoisted on a pole—only when it is passing, borne by a body of men in formation, and at colors. In the navy the new regulation—and it is the same in the marines, and I suppose in the army—to stand at attention—men in uniform—covered or uncovered, and salute holding the salute while colors is being played. Also when the National Anthem is being played whether for colors or not.

The marine band that plays here in the Y. M. C. A. at nights demands the undivided attention of several hundred of us just now by playing the Star Spangle Banner. We had a picture in three parts, sent out by the Department entitled "Star Spangle Banner." It consisted in converting an American born English boy into a loyal American. The purpose is to warn American soldiers, sailors and marines to lay aside prejudice toward England in this war.

The "chow" we have here is even better than we had at the Great Lakes. It is more homelike here. The food is not served on our plates, but in dishes that are replenished when they are emptied.

Because of some positive throat cultures found in our bunch, we were kept in quarantine for over a week, but that was lifted yesterday, and we entered upon the regular course of instruction here today. Our instruction consists in practical trench sanitation and protection, drilling and lectures. We spent the day out at the trenches making an incinerator, digging a trench and completing one of several underground celer-like first-aid stations.

This climate is so far ahead of Chicago's there is hardly a comparison. Quantico is about 35 or 40 miles south of Washington.

N. B. A Randall County News came today from which I learned that you have returned home. It was the best Randall County News I ever read.

There is more to this trench warfare than I had anticipated. We do not work much in training—as much or as little as we wish.

There is a certain period of adjustment following every change and it seems natural for a fellow during said adjustment, to feel as if he has everything to learn yet. It took some effort for me to learn to recognize a marine officer. The drills are slightly different and nearly all other regulations.

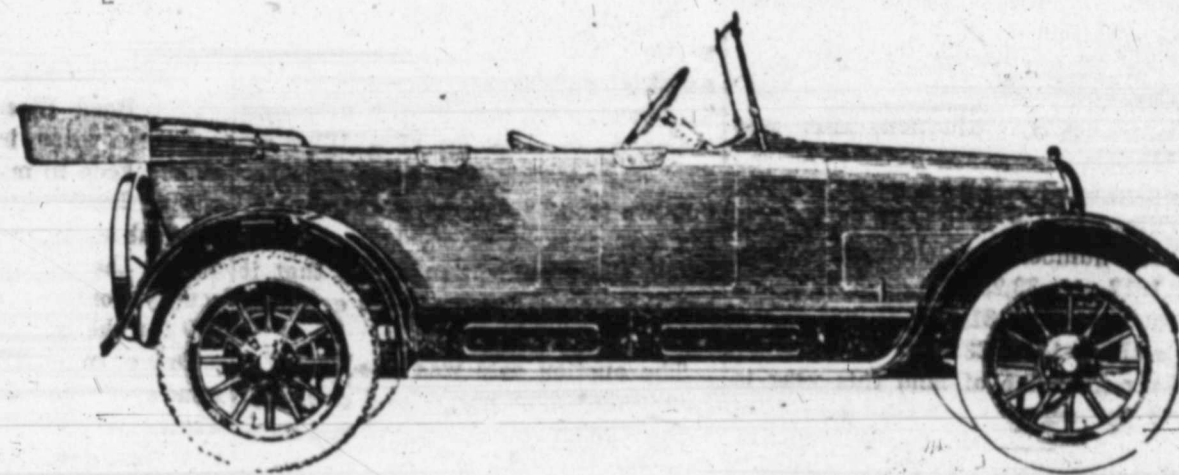

#### President's Proclamation for Thanksgiving Day.

Washington, November, 8.—President Wilson has issued his 1917 Thanksgiving proclamation, fixing Thursday, Nov. 29, as Thanksgiving Day. It follows:

"(Thanksgiving, 1917).

"By the President of the United States of America:

"A proclamation. "It has long been the honored custom of our people to turn in the fruitful autumn of the year in praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God for His many blessings and mercies to us as a nation. That custom we can follow now, even in the midst of tragedy of a war shaken world and immeasurable disaster, in the midst of sorrow and great peril, because even amidst the darkness that has gathered above us we can see the great blessings God has bestowed upon us, blessings that are better than mere peace of mind and prosperity of enterprise.

"We have been given the opportunity to serve mankind as we once served ourselves in the great day of our declaration of independence by taking up arms against a tyranny that threatened to master and debase men everywhere and joining with other free people in demanding for all the nations of the world what we then demanded and obtained for ourselves. In this day of the revelation of our duty not only to defend our own rights as a nation, but to defend also the rights of free men throughout the world there has been vouchsafed us in full and inspiring measure the resolution and spirit of united action. We have been brought to one mind and purpose. A new vigor of common counsel and common action has been revealed in us. We should especially thank God that in such circumstances in the midst of the greatest enterprise the spirits of men ever have entered upon, we have, if we but observe a reasonable and practicable economy, abundance with which to supply the needs of those associated with us as well as our own. A new light shines above us. The great duties of a day awaken a new and greater national spirit in us. We shall never be divided or wonder what stuff we are made of.

"And while we render thanks for these things let us pray Almighty God that in all humbleness of spirit, we may look always to Him for guidance; that we may be kept constant in the spirit and purpose of service; that by

His grace our minds may be directed and our hands strengthened; and that in His good time liberty and security and peace and the comradeship of a common justice may be vouchsafed all the nations of the earth.

"Wherefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, the 29th day of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and prayer and invite the people throughout that day to refrain from their ordinary occupations and in their several homes and places of worship to render thanks to God, the Great Ruler of Nations. "In witness whereof, I hereto set my hand and cause the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done in the District of Columbia the seventh day of November in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and seventeen and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and forty-second.

"WOODROW WILSON, By the President, "ROBERT LANSING, Secretary of the State."

**Attaboy.**

There is one purely American cry which was heard on the battlefields of Europe before our first troops arrived there, some weeks ago. It is the baseball yell "Attaboy," which is the brief and sharp way of saying "That's the boy," an expression of approval and encouragement.

This word may become the battle shout, the rallying cry, the yell of the charge when our boys go into action. Certainly it has been frequently used along the Western Front from the channel to Switzerland, and also on the Italian front. Carried abroad by English, French and Italians who lived in the United States, but who returned when the war broke out, this distinctly baseball expression has often echoed in the trenches.

American newspaper correspondents visiting the front in Flanders and in the snow-buried Italian Alps have time and again been greeted by this word. It was like a message from home, and was intended to let the visitors know that some one from home was there doing his bit. It has been a cry of recognition and welcome.

All baseball fans are familiar with this word, made famous by Hugh Jennings, and doubtless a majority of them firmly believe he coined the expression. Perhaps he did, although it is stated on fairly good authority that it came into use in the days of "Pop" Anson. But it was Jennings who fastened it upon the public mind, and Jennings will be always associated with popularizing it.

"Attaboy" cannot but puzzle the soldiers on the other side. They won't know what it means, and explanations, especially to the French will be most difficult.—From Brooklyn Standard Union.

The people of this country had as well get ready for the great campaign of giving. There are three causes which will continually demand our attention—the Liberty Loan, the Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A. All of these institutions must be kept up and our people must support every call made by any of them. The men who refuse is a traitor to his country and should be handled as such. There are going to be a lot of misguided efforts made to help our boys at the front, which should be thoroughly investigated before any money is given to the cause. The people backing them are well-meaning, but they are attempting to do a work, in most cases, which is now carried on effectively by either the Red Cross or the Y. M. C. A. These two latter institutions cover practically the entire field of the soldier's life and the man who won't contribute to them should be forced to face the German trenches.

Only a few people of Canyon appreciate the magnitude of the work being done by the Canyon Red Cross Chapter. A large number of Canyon women are spending practically half or more of their time in this work. There are other women who have plenty of time, but who so far have not entered the services of their country. The Red Cross is appealing for more workers. The men and women behind the trenches are crying for more supplies. The women who are engaged in the work are doing a heroic work. Will not the remainder of the women of Canyon join in trying to save our boys who are falling by the German bullet?

Suffrage won in New York by a large majority—not on account of the antics of the women picketers at the White House—but in spite of it. This movement at the White House does not meet the approval of the real leaders in the suffrage cause and it is regrettable that even women will so often do as men in politics—make supreme fools of themselves in order to fool themselves thinking they are making progress in their cause. The jail is an excellent place for this bunch.

The bond election must be carried if Randall county is to have good roads.

Germany is making a tremendous effort to push Italy out of the war, and has won a notable victory through the Austrians. In the meanwhile the war is looking more and more serious for our American cause, with the possibility that it must be our boys who must whip the Kaiser to his knees.

Even Captain Hobson will now have to admit that his war scare of ten years ago was only a pipe dream. However, the preparation he preached in that days would have become useful in our present crisis, but what effect would radical preparation have had upon the Japan mind, which undoubtedly is always looking for something suggestive of war.

Electric advertising signs are prohibited except from 7:45 to 11 o'clock at night for the purpose of conserving the coal supply. In France and England the women gather in public buildings during the day, or in one home of a neighborhood in order to conserve the coal supply. The women of Canyon could well afford to gather at the Red Cross rooms, not only for the purpose of saving fuel at home, but also to assist in the great work of the Red Cross.

Russian affairs are again in a muddle, Kerensky having been deposed and fleeing for his life; later gaining an army and returning to Petrograd where he has defeated the Socialists. Kerensky is fighting for his life and his country, but against tremendous odds, in an infected country of sedition and German plots.

Meatless and wheatless days are now being observed in all of the big city hotels. Yet there are some folks who believe that the Food Administration is buncom!

While we are discussing Food Conservation, why not make a supreme effort to rid the country of the destructive rat and the worthless dog.

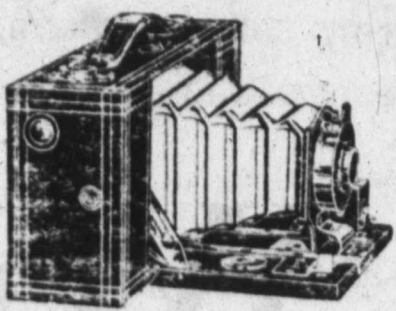

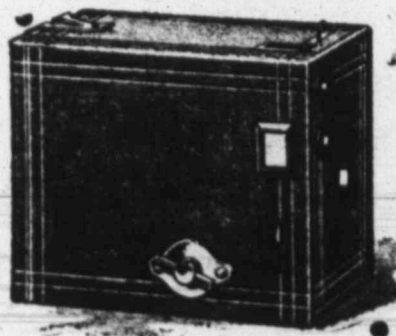

**In Regard to Proposed Road Bonds**

TO THE CITIZENS OF RANDALL COUNTY, TEXAS

Gentlemen:

The Commissioners Court of Randall County looking to the betterment of the County in general did on the 13th day of October call a special election to be held on the 24th day of November to determine whether or not the Commissioners Court of Randall County will be authorized to issue Bonds in the amount of \$50,000.00 for the purpose of building and improving the Public Roads of Randall County.

A report has been erroneously circulated throughout the County that if this bond issue carries all the money derived from the sale of the Bonds will be spent in and about Canyon and between Canyon and Amarillo. This is untrue. There will be a Cardinal-road built from Canyon to the Potter County line, and from Canyon to the Swisher County line, and another from Canyon to the Deaf Smith County line. After these roads are built according to the profile and specifications of The State Highway and Federal Government Engineers there will be sufficient funds left to place all the other Public Roads of Randall County in a First Class condition.

If this Bond issue Carries we have the promise of about \$20,000.00 from the State and Federal Governments to aid us in Road Building in this County. If the Bond issue fails we will not be able to put up our part to get this money, therefore we will receive nothing from the State and Federal Governments, for this County. It is up to the Citizens of this County to vote for Bonds or lose the \$20,000.00 from the State and Federal Governments.

The question has been asked, will the County receive value for the money spent? There will be a survey made by a competent engineer under the supervision of the State Highway Commission and the Federal Government Engineers. All contracts let must be approved by the Federal Government Engineer, and all work done will be supervised by an engineer satisfactory to the State Highway Commission and the Federal Engineer and the Commissioners Court of Randall County. With this kind of supervision you can rest assured that Randall County will receive the value of every dollar of their money spent.

Under the present law we are only permitted to assess 15 cents upon the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property in the County. This means that we are unable to maintain our present roads. The best we can do is to patch in a few places.

However the construction of the Cardinal roads from Canyon north to the County line; from Canyon west to the County line; and from Canyon South to the County line, does not mean that lesser traveled roads will be neglected. They will be helped according to amount of travel over them, or more according to necessity. This does not mean that Canyon will get all the road work. One commissioner lives 15 miles from Canyon, another 20 miles, another 9 miles, another one mile from the courthouse. We are for country roads as well as roads to town, but we are convinced that good roads are necessary.

We feel sure that good roads for Randall County means an increase sale value of every acre of land in Randall County. That larger loads with less horse power will more than repay each and every property owner in the County. We have studied and discussed good roads from every angle and are convinced that good roads more than pay their way.

**LORD NORTHCLIFFE'S PROPHECY ON THE WAR**

"Governor Capper, sitting here by my side, and I are about the same age," said Lord Northcliffe at the dinner given by I. D. Kirkwood, of the Kansas City Star, to 200 Kansas and Missouri newspaper men at Kansas City yesterday "I want to say in all honesty and all seriousness that it may be that neither he nor I may live to see the end of the present world war.

"Disabuse your minds of the false hope that this is to be a short war. It is likely, yes, more than likely to go on for a generation. We had better face the situation as it is than to deceive ourselves with a hope for which there is not the least foundation."

**Germans Can Cross.** I can see no reason why you should have any hope that we will have a short war. Of course we could have peace, but peace today would mean a much worse war tomorrow. You can rest assured Germany would not make the mistake she has made in this instance, of having so many people against her.

To suppose that people untrained and unprepared for war can conquer the Germans in a short time—that is the height of folly. I can assure you our farmers did not believe we were at war until they saw their ricks burning. Then they began to subscribe to the loans. What is to prevent the Germans from coming across the Atlantic? One mistake and they would be across. The democratic system of raising men for the war is the draft. We thought the only democratic system was to take those who by their enthusiasm volunteered and went to war. We found out our mistake. We found that the patriotic went to the war and the unpatriotic stayed behind and stole the other fellow's living.

We are up against a people who have been preparing in every possible direction for forty years. These people inherited the principle of thoroughness and they have left no details unattended. They are predominated by

a lust for property, which is a basic cause of this war.—From Lord Northcliffe's address at Kansas City to the editors from five states from Sunday's Beacon.

The Oklahoma penitentiary twine plant has begun operations for next season. Warden Samuel Morley expects to furnish 1,500,000 pounds of twine to the farmers of Oklahoma during the next harvest season from the plant. It is expected that the factory will operate four months this year and use 90 men. Penitentiary officials hope to supply the entire twine trade of Oklahoma. The manufacturing of twine is costing much more this year than last, according to Warden Morley. Hemp cost the state 10 cents last year. This season it is selling for 18 1/2 cents, an advance of almost 100 per cent. Twine will be sold to the farmers at 28 cents a pound, but no orders of less than 50 pounds will be filled.

## Winter Care of Sheep.

The lambs should begin to come about December 1, and from this time until they are weaned the mothers should receive from 1 to 2 pounds of grain mixture and all of the succulent food that they want. It should be remembered that the lamb receives its nourishment from the food of the mother and she should be fed accordingly. After the lamb gets large enough to eat, which will be only a few days, it should receive in addition to its milk, one-fourth to one-half pound of a mixture of 300 pounds of cracked corn, 100 pounds of wheat bran, and 50 pounds oil meal. This mixture should be fed in a creep so that the matured sheep cannot get to it. The lamb should always be kept growing from the day of his birth until it goes to the market. The lamb that is "set back" in its growth loses its "bloom" and is not wanted by the consumer.—J. H. Rogers, in Progressive Farmer.

## Special Bond Election.

Whereas, the Commissioners Court of Randall County, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of said County for the purposes hereafter stated:

H. E. Wesley, Precinct No. Four.

John Boulware, Precinct No. Five.

Andy Costley, Precinct No. Six.

A. P. Baird, Precinct No. Eight.

W. L. Deeke, Precinct No. Nine.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149 Act of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of 1899 and only qualified voters, who are tax payers of said County shall be allowed to vote and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have printed on their ballots the words "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS" and those opposed shall have printed on their ballots the words "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS". 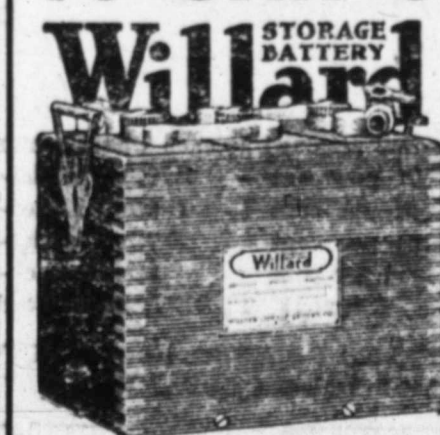

**Y. M. C. A. KEEPS THE HOME FIRES BURNING**

THIS COUNTY WILL TAKE PART IN STATE CAMPAIGN FOR \$400,000 WAR WORK FUND.

Texas War Work Council Organized. Will Send Executive Secretary Here for Campaign.

To keep the home fires burning in the hearts of the 100,000 American troops in France during the long, cold winter that faces them in the trenches and to preserve the high moral and social life of the 1,700,000 men under the colors at home, the Young Men's Christian Associations of America are raising a national war work fund of \$35,000,000.

This County to Aid.

Texas has agreed to give \$400,000 to this amount, and this county has been asked to do its part in the campaign.

At an organization meeting of the Texas War Work Council in Dallas recently, at which practically every county in the state was represented, the following men were named as members, with Rhodes S. Baker as chairman, and L. A. Coulter of Dallas, as state campaign director: M. H. Simmons, Hillsboro; R. E. Burt, Houston; E. R. Brown, Dallas; W. C. Paige, Houston; W. S. Mosher, Dallas; C. A. Nichols, Georgetown; James Kapp, San Antonio, and J. P. Milligan, Fort Worth.

A district executive secretary will be sent to this county in the interest of the campaign which will start Nov. 11 and continue through Nov. 15.

Keep Home Fires Burning.

\$35,000,000 Apportioned.

It is proposed to distribute the \$35,000,000 to be raised as follows: for work with U. S. army and navy men in this country, \$11,120,000; for work with U. S. army and navy men overseas, \$11,994,000; for Y. M. C. A. work in the Russian army, \$3,205,000; for Y. M. C. A. work in the French army, \$2,649,000; for Y. M. C. A. work in the Italian army, \$1,000,000; for work among prisoners of war, \$1,000,000; for extension work, \$3,932,000.

TRAINING FARM HELP.

There is no problem facing the farmer that is more serious than the help problem, with the large numbers of young men that actual war service has taken out of the country and the increased opportunities in the factories and other mercantile establishments in the cities that are drawing the young men away from the farms. As time goes on this problem is going to increase instead of diminish, until the harvesting of 1918 crops present serious difficulties.

Many solutions are offered, and most of them are impractical. Some say the farmers should be exempted from the draft. Saying what ought to be done will not help matters any. What is, is what counts. And even if this were done, there would still be a great shortage due to voluntary enlistment and the high wages paid in town, and this situation must be met.

Last summer many boys from the high schools and grade schools of our cities were anxious to help their country. They were too young to enlist and so they wanted to go out on the farms and help. They were decidedly "green." Most of them didn't know which "end to" the harness goes on a horse, but they were willing. Naturally, the farmer, with a lot of rush work staring him in the face, didn't want to bother with these boys, and a large proportion of them were unable to find work on the farms to do.

Next year there will be a greater shortage of help than there was last summer, and a lot of farmers will have to accept this kind of green help or go without. If more of these young men had been taken on the farms last year and taught something about farm work they would be fairly competent help this summer, for boys of this age, if given patient and intelligent instructions, learn very quickly.

Much money is being spent by the government training green young men into soldiers. It is remarkable how quickly they learn. Get the boy early next spring, as soon as school is out, and instruct him as much as possible before the heavy work begins, and you will be surprised how much help he will be to you. A boy is like any other animal—treat him well and be kind and patient with him and you can get a lot of work out of him.

By doing this you will benefit yourself, the boy and your country, for America needs young men who understand something about the greatest of our industries—agriculture—and it is surprising the amount of ignorance that exists in our cities in this respect. You can do your part in educating the city people this summer. — Twentieth Century Farmer.

I have still got the chocolate cake and half of the white one. Some of the boys are going to buy ice cream tomorrow and believe me we are going to feast.

I weighed yesterday and weighed 142 pounds, which is twelve pounds more than I weighed when I joined, and I think I am about one inch taller.

I went to the Dallas Fair yesterday and I sure had a big time. I saw Mr. Bell and had quite a chat with him. Believe me I sure took in things and had a big time. It was the last day and I got all the apples that he had on exhibit and brought them back with me.

Airships are getting as common down here as automobiles. There are two or three flying around over the camp every day and two landed right out here the other day and one, one lands every day or so. I am learning lots every day. We took a twelve mile hike this morning and it was cold. We had a fire in the regiment last night and burned up Co. L. and Co. M mess shacks and a lot of clothes and things, but it didn't bother us only we had to crawl out at 2 o'clock in the cold and believe me I like to have froze.

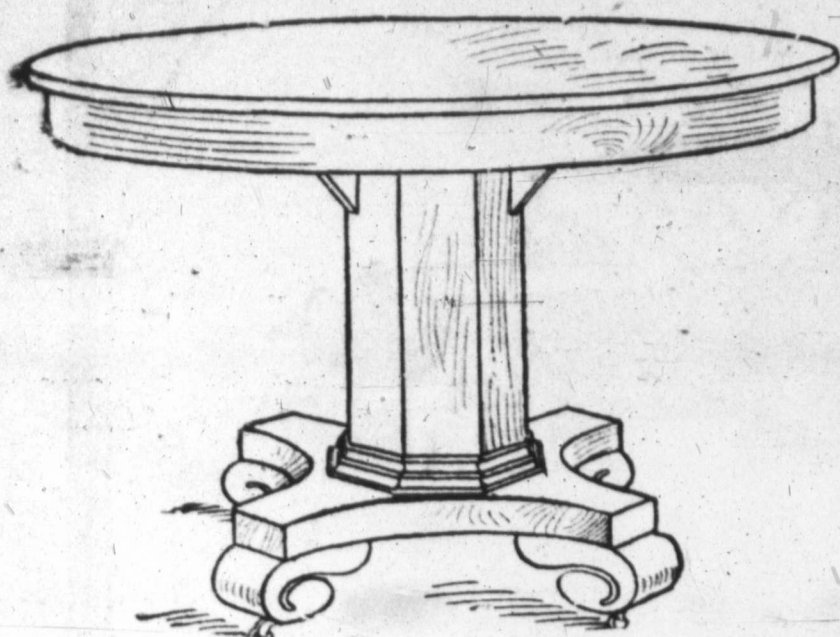
