Randall County Quota of 18 Men to be Sent July 22

Supply.

On July 4, two men were sent to Camp Travis as a part of Randall county's quota. Six men were summoned, but only two were sent off. They were Carness Pierce, Commanche, Oklahoma, and H. O. Kirby of Morgan, Okla.

The Local Board is having some difficulty in supplying the required number of men on schedule time as Class One has been exhausted with the exception of farmer boys.

The Board has been authorized to go through the entire list of Class One and pick out such men as can be spared from farming conditions in the county and draft them into the service. All calls must be fulfilled on schedule time even though the farmers have to be taken.

Governor Hobby and this Department have made special efforts to have the farmers of Texas placed in deferred classification until crops can be harvested, but reports from Washington say that all calls must be filled on schedule time even tho the farmers are taken.

Are the Packers Profiteers?

Plain Facts About The Meat Business

The Federal Trades Commission in its recent report on war profits, stated that the five large meat packers have been profiteering and that they have a monopoly of the market.

These conclusions, if fair and just, are matters of serious concern not only to those engaged in the meat packing business but to every other citizen of our country.

The figures given on profits are misleading and the statement that the packers have a monopoly is unsupported by the facts.

The packers mentioned in the report stand ready to prove their . profits reasonable and necessary.

The meat business is one of the largest American industries. Any citizen who would familiarize himself with its details must be prepared for large totals.

The report states that the aggregate profits of four large packers were \$140,000,000 for the three war years.

This sum is compared with \$19,000,000 as the average annual profit for the three years before the war, making it appear that the war profit was \$121,000,000 greater than the pre-war profit.

This compares three-year profit with a one-year profit—a manifestly unfair method of comparison. It is not only misleading, but the Federal Trade Commission apparently has made a mistake in the figures themselves.

The aggregate three-year profit of \$140,000,000 was made on sales of over four and a half billion dollars. It means about three cents on each dollar of sales—or a mere fraction of a cent per pound of product.

Packers' profits are a negligible factor in prices of live stock and meats. No other large business is conducted upon such small margins of profit.

Furthermore—and this is very important—only a small portion of this profit has been paid in dividends. The balance has been put back into the business. It had to be, as you realize when you consider the problems the packers have had to solve---and solve quickly---during these war years.

To conduct this business in war times, with the necessity of paying two or three times the former prices for live stock, has required the use of two or three times the ordinary amount of working capital. The additional profit makes only a fair return on this, and

as has been stated, the larger portion of the profits earned has been used to finance huge stocks of goods and to provide additions and improvements made necessary by the great demands of our army and navy and the Allies.

If you are a business man you will appreciate the significance of these facts. If you are unacquainted with business, talk this matter over with some business acquaintance---with your banker, say-and ask him to compare profits of the packing industry with those of any other industry at the present time.

No evidence is offered by the Federal Trade Commission in support of the statement that the large packers have a monopoly. The Commissioner's own report shows the large number and importance of other packers.

The packers mentioned in the statement stand ready to prove to any fair minded person that they are in keen competition with each other, and that they have no power to manipulate prices.

If this were not true they would not dare to make this positive statement.

Furthermore, government figures show that the five large packers mentioned in the report account for only about one-third of the meat. business of the country.

They wish it were possible to interest you in the details of their business. Of how, for instance, they can sell dressed beef for less than the cost of the live animal, owing to utilization of by-products, and of the wonderful story of the methods of distribution throughout this broad land, as well as in other countries.

The five companies mentioned feel justified in co-operating with each other to the extent of together presenting this public statement.

They have been able to do a big job for your government in its time of need; they have met all war time demands promptly and completely and they are willing to trust their case to the fairmindedness of the American people with the facts before them.



Increase In Telephone Rates.

An increase in telephone rates, effective July 1, was announced today by Manager W. J. Stewart of the local exchange. After July 1, the business rate will be \$33 while the residence rate will be \$21 as against the former rate of \$18.

"Because of raising costs and fixed rates, we have been constantly confronted for the past few years with the necessity of obtaining additional revenue" said Manager Stewart.

"Public utilities, as you know, are by law, the only class of industry in the United States today being required to sell their products- which in our case is service on a pre-war price, notwithstanding the fact that they are being eaten alive by the extra-ordinary increase in the cost of material and labor. We have been paying from 40 to 200 per cent more for the material used in our plant, and we have been paying more for the monye used in extensions.

"I might say here that we do not make extensions to plants out of our revenue. If we add new poles or a new switchboard, we get the money for such extensions in the form of new capital, We have to bid for that new money and we are only able to get it only so far as we are able to show that the money already invested in our exchange is yielding a fair return. With fixed rates, our revenue has remained stationary while the expenses have been mounting higher and higher, each month.

"But there has been a nation-wide recognition of the need for protecting the credit of the public utilities. President Wilson has strongly urged that all utilities be maintained at maximum efficiency during the war. All Eggs Must Be Candled. The United States Food Administration has ruled that on and after June 1, 1918, all eggs must be candled by the buyer or seller, whether he be general merchant, egg dealer, or huckster. The purpose of this ruling is to stop traffic in eggs which are not fit for human food, to prevent their entering the channels of trade, and thereby preventing an enormous wastage.

Careful and conservative estimates show that for the past five years during the period from June 1st to October 1st, twenty-five percent of all eggs were a total loss and forty percent materially depreciated in value. In order to save as much as possible of this food during the great emer-




