

PRESENT PRICES WILL NOT REGEDE?

GOVERNORS AND MAYORS GET BEHIND CAMPAIGN TO STIMULATE BUSINESS

The Governors and Mayors in attendance on the recent Washington conference appear to have been convinced, pretty generally, of two things: There is to be no immediate or marked reduction in the price of building materials and labor wages and an immediate resumption of building and construction activities throughout the country, more than any other one thing, is essential if business is to get back to the "as usual" basis of peace, or the "better than usual" possibilities of the present and future.

Some went to the conference believing materially lower prices might be had if the Federal Government would "just do something." Others were convinced, that the situation would take care of itself if the Government would do nothing but keep its hands off business and let the law of supply and demand run its course. These latter were disposed to believe prices in the building and construction industries were too high.

For this reason a statement by Prof. Irving Fisher of Yale University, an acknowledged authority on price and market conditions, in which he says the United States has reached a new price level and it is doubtful if prices ever again will go back to the pre-war level, was read with interest. Prof. Fisher says that one certain way to bring about business stagnation is for everybody to wait for business to get better. Prof. Fisher states it this way:

"The fundamental practical question confronting business men is whether the general level of prices is going to fall. In my opinion, it is not going to fall much if at all. We are on a permanently higher price level and the sooner the business men of the country take this view and adjust themselves to it, the sooner will they save themselves and the nation from the misfortune which will come, if we persist in our present false hope."

This international authority on prices shows there have been times in history when new price levels were established. He says:

"The general level prices depend upon the volume and rapidity of turnover of the circulating medium in relation to the business to be transacted thereby. If the number of dollars circulated by cash and by check doubles, while the number of goods and services exchanged thereby remain constant, prices will double."

"The great price changes in history have come about in just this manner. The 'Price revolution' of the sixteenth century came upon Europe as a result of the great influx of gold and silver from the mines of the New World. Europe was flooded with new money. More counters were used than before in effecting exchanges, and prices became 'high'. People talked then of temporary 'inflation,' just as they talk of it now. But it was not temporary; it was a new price level. A similar increase in prices all over the world occurred between 1896 and 1914 following the discovery of the rich gold fields of South Africa, Cripple Creek and Alaska, the invention of the cyanide process in mining, and the vast extension of the use of bank credit."

After analyzing our gold supply and credits and pointing out that prices in Europe are higher than in America, Prof. Fisher arrives at this conclusion:

"Business men should face the fact. To talk reverently of 1913-14 prices is to speak a dead language today. The buyers of the country, since the armistice, have made an unexampled attack on prices through their waiting attitude, and yet price recessions have been insignificant. The reason is that we are on a new high level, which will be found a stubborn reality. Business men are going to find out that the clever man is not the man who waits, but the one who finds out the new price facts, and acts accordingly."

At the same time Prof. Fisher's conclusions were made known there came from the Division of Public Works and Construction Development of the U. S. Department of Labor a resume of the work of ten or twelve experts on price and market conditions. Here again it was made plain there is no evidence justifying the expectation of a general, material reduction in the price level. This report makes these statements:

"The fact is that cost of construction is not high today. It is low compared with food, clothing and commodities in general. Although some readjustments in the wages of individual trades and in the prices of individual classes of building materials may take place, the cost of construction will not come down to such an extent as to endanger a judicious investment made today in the erection of the new building."

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The Washington conference was called to discuss ways and means of stimulating business and providing buffer employment for labor during the period necessary for industrial readjustment. It was submitted that building and construction work served these two purposes more completely and directly than any other industry. It was brought out that the country is short between 500,000 and a million homes. Therefore, while public officials are going in for public improvements, many communities are organizing "Own Your Home" campaigns. These serve several important and desirable ends. Home owning means home building, home building means labor and stimulated business in every locality where a dwelling is built, the home owner is a better citizen because his very ownership makes him responsible and immediately interested in the social and political welfare of his community. Farther, the home owner does not take up quickly with radical movements such as now are threatening the security of governments in Europe.

The Department of Labor, through the Division of Public Works and Construction Development, is cooperating with many communities in the "Own Your Home" movement.

NEW AGRICULTURAL AGENT FOR RANDALL COUNTY

The School Board's Financial Problem

(By J. L. Dufflot, Department of Sociology, Economics and Government, West Texas State Normal College, Canyon, Texas.)

One of the most perplexing problems confronting school boards today is that of providing adequate school room facilities for the increase in scholastic population. Schools are constantly facing financial embarrassments and the public is constantly being called upon to come to the relief of the school authorities. This vexatious problem may find a solution in a very simple manner provided the school men and the public will be willing to break a precedent and at the same time not affect the efficiency of the schools. The story of the man who went to the mill with a small amount of wheat in one end of the sack and a rock in the other with which to balance the wheat across the horse's back may find its parallel in the present management of school affairs. The hours from eight to nine o'clock and from three-thirty to five o'clock and all day Saturday which are now being wasted may be compared to the rock, while the middle portion of the five days now employed may be likened to the wheat. The public is being asked to carry this rock, a waste of public funds, across its back without any reason other than that of custom.

It is not to be presumed that the ideas presented here are anything new. The plan is too simple for it to have escaped the attention of educators and business men. Furthermore, it is not being offered as a makeshift but rather as a working principle in school administration. It does not matter how liberal a community may be with its funds for educational purposes, greater benefits for the individual child will be obtained by a more economical expenditure of these funds. There is a disposition both expressed and implied on the part of the tax-payers that maximum results are not being secured from the money now being spent on the schools. In other words, as much of the money as possible should be spent on character buildings rather than on brick buildings. It is possible that many of the smaller towns and perhaps some of the larger ones are burdening themselves with school erections and thus standing in the way of their making greater educational achievements. It is not to be inferred from this article that the writer is opposed to better buildings, but before erecting new plants the capacities of the present ones should be thoroughly exhausted.

There is a constitutional limitation of fifty cents on one hundred dollars worth of property in the state of Texas. Great efforts are being made to have this limitation removed and placed at \$1.00. Whether we succeed in changing the rate or not, the principle of the double use of school buildings should operate in the interest of greater school efficiency for more of the funds will be spent directly on the education of the child.

If it can be shown that a sixty-day program has all of the advantages of a five-day program as now used with fewer of its corresponding disadvantages, it ought to appeal to the educators; and if it can be shown that a better use of the money can be made by a change in the system, it should interest the public. The plan does not suggest changes in the curriculum of any school system, but rather suggests how money can be better spent by rescheduling the subjects now being offered. When it becomes necessary to erect new buildings, accommodations can be provided whereby this program may be more fully developed, but it can be made to apply to the present plants. In the

The much advertised mass meeting for Monday night turned out to be a failure from a standpoint of attendance. The meeting was presided over by Prof. Clark of the Normal and introduced the speaker G. W. Briggs, Field Agent of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Briggs delivered an excellent address to those fortunate enough to be present explaining the wonderful opportunity West Texas has for development along every line and the cooperation which would be given by the newly organized Chamber of Commerce of West Texas. Particularly would Canyon be benefited by the augmented growth of our state normal, which is now second in the state and rapidly growing. President Hill sensed the benefits to be gained in supporting this organization and stated that he hoped the county would see fit to cooperate, and the school would do its share. Randall county has been called upon for ten memberships at \$10 per year, necessary to representation in the organization. Swisher was assigned 15 memberships and signed up at the first meeting of the business men.

This meeting was an occasion worthy of more interest and better attendance than was shown. Only two or three business houses of the town were represented at this meeting. New Livestock Auction Plan.

Livestock auction sales were held this year by the Kern county (Calif.) farm bureau. This idea was worth \$130,000 to some California farmers in 1918. When Kern county secured the services as county agent of George S. Kreutzer, of Australia, he told how the farmers in every community in that country on certain days brought their livestock to a central market place, where it was gathered in carload lots of like quality and sold at auction. The Kern county farm bureau held a sale on the Australian plan and afterwards formed an auction-sales department. The farm bureau centers on certain designated days brought in their livestock for sale at local railway stations. The county agent notified the packing companies of the dates and places of the sales and asked them to send representatives. A committee, appointed from the farm bureau, weighed and graded the stock, making it possible for the buyers to bid on carload lots of uniform guaranteed quality. The farm bureau hired the auctioneer, put in suitable stock scales, and built the necessary pens. Payments for stock sold were made in cash to the farm bureau, which deducted 1 per cent to cover expenses. The farmers secured from 1 to 3 cents a pound more by selling in the farm bureau auction than by any other means—Western Farm Life.

Endorsed The W. T. C. of C.

Mr. George W. Briggs, of Lubbock, one of the field managers for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, was in Tulia Monday. He met that night with the Tulia Young Men's Business League, and fully discussed the organization, aims and purposes of this chamber of commerce. Those present asked many questions and freely discussed the subject. A motion prevailed that the Y. M. B. L. endorse the organization, and that a committee be appointed to see the business men and citizens of Swisher County and solicit their membership in said organization. This committee was named by President J. E. Sweptston, and consists of Messrs. A. W. Sternberg, Meade Griffin and J. S. Engelman. Quite a number joined Monday night.—Tulia Herald.

Hereford Men Organize.

The "Hereford Breeders' Association, of Hereford, Texas," an organization of Dea Smith county breeders of registered Hereford cattle was formally organized at a cracking good meeting Thursday, following dinner together at the Murphy Hotel. The infant organization begins its existence with a membership of about 25, with some eight or ten breeders not present, owing to absence from home.

W. T. Womble is first president of the Association, C. O. Norton vice president, W. E. Dameron, Secretary-Treasurer, and Jim Sanders, G. H. Womble and C. C. Bowman the Executive Committee. It was resolved to hold an annual Sale, the first one to be held about the first of May, 1920.

Boys' Baby Beef Book.

The third edition of the Boys' Baby Beef book has just been issued by the American Aberdeen-Angus Breeders' Association, 817 Exchange Avenue, Chicago. This 16-page booklet is finely illustrated, printed in two colors and contains besides the announcement of Secretary Charles Gray, ten articles from boy and girl champions whose "Doddie babies" have won State, Inter-State or National contests. Substituting Alfalfa for Bran.

Twelve cows during three months were fed chopped alfalfa as a substitute for bran in the standard dairy grain ration of four parts ground corn, two parts bran and one part oil meal without any appreciable unfavorable effect. The slight decrease of 145 pounds in milk and 7.5 pounds in butter fat production while the alfalfa was being eaten was more than overcome by the gain of 272 pounds in the weight of the cows. It is evident that alfalfa is fully equal to bran which most of our westerners have found out.—Field and Farm.

Pneumonia in Cows.

Cows are especially subject to pneumonia in winter and this is something that ought to be watched closely. At calving time the cow should be kept in a well ventilated, bright barn which should be rather warm but not draughty. The animal should be kept warm with a blanket. The application of a mustard plaster in the pleural region very frequently brings relief and aids in recovery. The plaster should be kept open. 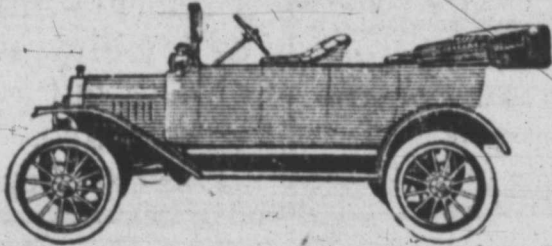

Medals From German Cannon.

Mrs. E. B. Reppert, Federal Reserve Chairman of the Woman's Liberty Loan Committee in the Eleventh District, has just been advised by the Treasury Department that the War Loan Organization has made two million medals out of the captured German cannon for Victory Loan workers.

Certified lists of the names of the workers of the Woman's Liberty Loan Committee will be forwarded to Washington at an early date, and it is the plan of the Treasury Department to present medals to all Liberty Loan workers as a recognition of their patriotic service.

Alleged Cattle Rustlers Jailed.

After an almost all night search, Sheriff Romero landed two alleged cattle thieves at a very early hour this morning, when he placed in jail Pedro Romero and Antonio Ortiz, both of whom live in the vicinity of Romeroville, Las Vegas (N. M.) Optic.

ARE NOW CONSIDERING LEAGUE AMENDMENTS

COVENANT BEING SHAPED FOR INCLUSION IN PRELIMINARY PEACE TREATY.

Paris.—Efforts are now being directed to shaping the league of nations covenant to insure its acceptance by the supreme council and win the approval of those Americans who are demanding its amendment.

Colonel House has conferred with Lord Robert Cecil, Leon Bourgeois and the American delegates and reported to President Wilson. It is conceded that some of the suggested amendments can safely be adopted, for instance, those safeguarding the Monroe doctrine and fixing conditions which will permit of the adherence of the late enemy powers.

One of the five powers had hesitated to accept a distinct impression of the right of secession from the language. The Americans are proceeding on the supposition that the covenant may be included in the peace treaty.

Foreign Minister Michot states that he feels it is practically impossible to include the covenant in the first treaty.

The present determination in peace conference circles is that, after the allied and associated powers have reached a complete understanding regarding the conditions to be imposed on Germany, the German delegates will be called to Versailles, but they will not be allowed to discuss the conditions, the intention of the allied and associated powers being to dictate peace.

Either the German delegates must accept the terms and sign or a state of war will continue. The general opinion here is that, in view of the internal situation in Germany, the delegates of that country will accept rather than expose the country to a graver risk and more drastic measures.

KOREA WOULD THROW OFF JAPANESE RULE

MOVEMENT FOR INDEPENDENCE RECENTLY LAUNCHED STEADILY INCREASES.

Osaka, Japan.—Disturbance continues in the provinces of Korea and are resulting in bloodshed on both sides, according to advices received here. Eighty-five localities have been affected by the riots.

Some of the Japanese say missionaries have encouraged or even instigated the riots. The leading missionary at Seoul, however, has refuted the accusation that the missionaries inspired the unrest, declaring that none of them knew that trouble was brewing.

Isaburo Yamagata, deputy resident general of Korea, is quoted as saying that the chief cause of the turmoil has been an erroneous conception of self-determination. M. Yamagata added that as a result of the disturbances the government had discovered a flaw in the administration of Korea which would be rectified.

200,000 Attend Stock Show.

Fort Worth, Texas.—Fancy live stock from the best improved farms of Texas are now en route home after exhibition at the most successful show in the long history of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show. Secretary-Manager M. Sansom, Jr., states that the total attendance during the six days of the show was more than 200,000, and live stock raisers who have visited the show for years were a unit in declaring the live stock exhibits were the best in the history of the show.

PRESIDENT WILSON IS NOW IN PARIS

REACHES CITY SHORTLY AFTER NOON AND PLUNGES AT ONCE INTO WORK.

Paris.—President Wilson, returning to the peace conference after his trip to the United States, arrived in Paris shortly after noon Friday.

The demonstration attending the president's arrival in Paris for his second visit lacked the magnitude of that upon the occasion of his initial appearance last December. Nevertheless it was spontaneous and cordial.

The people had been purposely kept in ignorance as to which railroad station his train would enter. The president had requested this, as he desired to come into the capital this time merely as a private citizen. Nevertheless the population heard early in the day that the station selected was the Invalides and they had assembled there in great numbers by the time his train was due.

President Wilson got to work immediately after his arrival at his new residence in the Place Des Etats Unis. Premier Lloyd George was waiting there for Mr. Wilson and the two had a long conference. The president then arranged for a conference at the Hotel de Crillon in the afternoon with Premier Clemenceau, Premier Lloyd George and Colonel House.

The president is fully conversant with the work accomplished by the peace delegates. During his voyage from the United States he was constantly in communication with Paris, by wireless. Colonel House took to Brest a large number of papers bearing on the work of the conference during his absence.

The president spent several hours in going through the papers and receiving explanations from Colonel House. He resumes work with a grasp of matters under discussion.

Court-Martial for Capt. Chamberlain.

London.—The investigation of the stories of the remarkable air exploits of Captain Edmund G. Chamberlain of San Antonio, Texas, an officer of the United States marine corps, which has developed to an extent that the American naval authorities consider a court-martial necessary. The court has been called to sit in London March 24. The court-martial, it is announced, will investigate chiefly whether Captain Chamberlain's recommendation for decorations were all forgeries and whether there was any truth whatever in his story of destroying an extraordinary number of machines in a short time.

131st Artillery at Newport News.

Newport News, Va.—Thirty-four officers and 1,412 men, comprising the 131st field artillery of the thirty-sixth division, have arrived here on the Aeolus, which docked at an early hour Thursday morning. The regiment is commanded by Colonel Claude V. Birkhead of San Antonio, and formerly was the second field artillery of Texas national guard. The regiment will be sent to Camp Travis, San Antonio, for demobilization.

Unexcelled Road System Promised.

Austin, Texas.—The final passage of the \$75,000,000 road bond issue amendment by the Texas legislature by a vote of nearly 6 to 1 in the house and 10 to 1 in the senate means that Texas is to have a road system second to none and that we are to be the happiest, the most enlightened and the most progressive people in the United States," says Adrian Pool of El Paso.

Appropriations Exceed Revenues.

Austin, Texas.—The most conservative estimates so far made of appropriations asked in departmental budgets for the coming two fiscal years is \$32,326,746.25. This is \$5,538,317.49 in excess of the total appropriations for the preceding two fiscal years. It is \$4,326,746.25 in excess of the probable revenues available under present laws for the two ensuing fiscal years.

No Decrease in Sugar Consumption.

Jersey City, N. J.—Putting the United States on a sugar ration did not reduce the consumption in 1918, according to the annual report of the American Sugar Refining company.

Master in Chancery for T. P.

New Orleans, La.—Col. W. M. Duffour has been appointed by Judge Foster in the United States district court here to be master in chancery for the T. & P. railroad receivership.

Employment Service Reduced.

Washington.—Reduction of 80 per cent in the force of the United States employment service, effective March 22, has been announced by Director General Denmore.

Archie Parr Wins Election Contest.

Austin, Texas.—The senate, by a vote of 16 to 14, has adopted the majority report of the Committee on Privileges and Elections, seating Archie Parr as senator from the twenty-third senatorial district, thus ending the Glasscock-Parr contest which was instituted at the beginning of the session. The debate was quite interesting and a large number of spectators were attracted to the galleries. A number of ladies occupied seats on the floor of the senate.

Some Good Currants.

None of the small fruits grown in the garden will yield more abundant crops than the currant if given good treatment and none will continue longer in bearing. The currant worm has completely driven out the currant in some places, but this need not be. If white hellebore is dusted over the bushes after a rain or sprinkling this worm is easily destroyed. There are many varieties of currants, excellent in quality, vigorous and productive. Of the red varieties the Cherry, Fay's Prolific, Perfection, Wilder and the Victoria are among the best. The Cherry is the largest of all red currants, but not so good a bearer, perhaps, as Fay's Prolific. The Victoria is a large bright red variety, of which the bunches are very long. It is late in the maturing, and in consequence will furnish fruit in August. The Black Champion and the Black Naples are shy bearers and not much good anyhow. The White Dutch and White Grape stand high among the blonde varieties. The former is an old and tried sort; the latter grows fruit of very large size and is excellent for table use. This hardy and valuable fruit may be propagated from cuttings, so that the expense of introducing need not be more than the cost of one or two bushes at the first.—Field and Farm.

Courts May Furnish Feed.

Attention has been called to the fact that Senator Bell's bill (No. 149) authorizing the commissioners' courts to furnish seed and feed for work stock to farmers who are poor and unable to procure the same, was approved by Governor Hobby several days ago and it now is a law. That bill is practically a duplicate of one enacted in March, 1918, authorizing such relief for the crop season of 1918, except that this bill provides for such relief for the crop season of 1919.

Planting 1,200 Acres Spring Wheat.

Reuben M. Ellerd informs us that he is planting twelve hundred acres in spring wheat on his farms in this county.—Plainview News.

Posters and advertising copy for the Fifth Liberty Loan campaign are being sent out from headquarters. The News is in receipt of a large roll of ad-copy for the local merchants.

The following is an editorial comment on Prof. Clark's article on community music published in The News and reproduced by the Star-Telegram:

We reprint this because we believe it should have as wide circulation as possible in the territory served by the people of the West Texas State Normal. Besides what it sets forth about the need and the value of community music cannot be stressed too much even in Ft. Worth. There are many signs that we are on the eve of a revival of a community music. Ft. Worth has been a leader in this field for some time and our sing-songs, which were started about three years ago, have attracted attention throughout the U. S. Now that we are developing it further by organizing chorus and sing-songs in the stores and other places where men and women are employed, it is gratifying to see that the movement is growing everywhere.

We can endorse Prof. Clark's statement absolutely when he says "no community should lack for musical leadership and no community should be without community music." Not only should there be organized choruses, but there should be periodical gatherings of the people—young folks and old—to sing the old songs together and occasionally learn new ones.

We hope that the time will come and that soon, when there will not be a community in the West Texas and the Panhandle where this practice has not been established, and we hope that the time will never come when Ft. Worth will lag in this matter. Uncle Sam demonstrated to the world what a "singing army" could do, and a singing community will find it just as valuable and just as much fun.

one of the most difficult financial problems of the school board:

1. Use six days in the week by working one-half the pupils and teachers from 7:50 to 12:20 and the other half from 12:40 to 5:10, giving about twenty minutes at noon in which to make the shift. The idea of a five-day school grew out of a rural condition which does not apply to city schools.

2. As will be observed, no more teachers will be required under a six-day program than under a five-day program.

3. Under the present five-day program of five and one-half hours in some cities and five in others (nine to twelve and one to three-thirty or one to three as the case may be) twenty-seven and one-half hours are used per week for the former and twenty-five for the latter. Under the six-day program of four and one-half hours per day for each shift of teachers and pupils twenty-seven hours are used. Thus as much time is given for recitation and study under this plan as under the other.

4. Miss "A" will teach, for example, the Low 4th grade in the morning and she and her pupils will be free for the afternoon. Miss "B" and her pupils who were off during the morning will occupy the same room in the afternoon. Every nine weeks, one-fourth the school year, the morning grade teachers and pupils may exchange time with the afternoon teachers and pupils so as to eliminate any seeming advantages. This can be done without disturbing the program. It may be argued that all of the pupils will be handicapped half the time, for the morning hours are considered better than the afternoon hours, which fact has not yet been clearly demonstrated. Granting that this is true, the same disadvantage exists under a five day program, for all of the pupils are in school practically half the time in the afternoons. In fact, it appears that pupils who were in school in the morning under the five day program begin afternoon work with more or less mental fatigue that would not be obtained under a six day program. If a pupil in the elementary grade succeeds in getting a job for the period of the day off from school, it is unnecessary that he change his time but only change teachers every nine weeks. The work of the grades usually advances at about the same rate, so the pupils should not find any difficulty in articulating with the work of another teacher.

5. In the high school a six day four hour program can be arranged (eight to twelve and one to five and six to ten if the latter is desired)

so as to give each pupil and teacher as many as six subjects if need be. All college entrance requirements are met under this program. Pupils recite four times a week with one hour recitations. If the recitations take place in the morning, those taking laboratories will come in the afternoon twice a week for two hour labs. Those having their recitations in the afternoon will do their laboratory work in the morning. With the exception of the pupils and teachers doing laboratory work, those coming in the morning will not be required to come in the afternoon and vice versa. Thus it will be observed that any high school plant and its equipment will accommodate twice the number of teachers and pupils as under the present system. The following high school program is offered as a solution for this problem of scheduling the subjects. Let the letters A, B, C, D, E, F represent different subjects. This scheme can be applied to any number of subjects for any number of teachers and without conflicts.

While it was stated above that any high school building will accommodate twice the number as is now being done, yet by a careful study of the above schedule it can be shown that any high school building will accommodate twenty-five per cent more pupils in one shift than is being done under a five day five, or six hour program.

6. The one argument that is likely to be offered against such a program is that the children will have an opportunity "to loaf" or "be in the way" during the half day off from class room work. This fault exists under the present program especially on Saturdays with the additional disadvantage of not having an opportunity to do profitable work either at home or at some odd job in the city. However, the half-day off from school studies is one of the strongest arguments for such a program, for, (1) more funds will accrue under this plan to provide playground directors for the grades

and physical directors for the high school. The crying need today is for physical education and no real concerted effort is being made to answer this call. By adopting such a program the children will be given an opportunity for such training. Under the right kind of supervision, physical education will be made so attractive that children will not be found at home "in the way." (2) In the high school there are many boys and girls who can find profitable employment in the morning or afternoon as the case may be. If a pupil is carrying five subjects, he will never have more than four any one day. If he is carrying four subjects, as he is likely to do if he is at work, he will never have more than three any one day, and, in that event, he will have from one to two hours per day in which to prepare some of his work at school. Time is saved and profitably used by properly programming his subjects. Whether the pupil works or not, opportunity is given to both the teacher and pupil

to do more intensive studying on the subject at hand for there will not be so many lessons to prepare any one day. But if you give the pupil an opportunity to work, he is being trained into citizenship rather than for citizenship.

7. Instead of voting bonds for new buildings for class room purposes and making possible a reduction of the maintenance fund, or at least prohibiting a substantial increase of these funds, in order to meet the sinking fund and interest of a new bonded indebtedness, the present maintenance funds will be gradually increased from year to year in proportion as the present bonded indebtedness is paid off. This increase in maintenance funds will make possible the increase in teachers' salaries and the purchasing of better school equipment. Under the present system, the teachers will never get the benefit of the increases made in property valuations, as a result of increased population, for the money is constantly diverted into erecting new buildings to accommodate the increase in scholastic population. Under this plan instead of spending the money for building material, it will be employed in securing better teachers, providing for better equipment and making possible a higher grade of instruction.

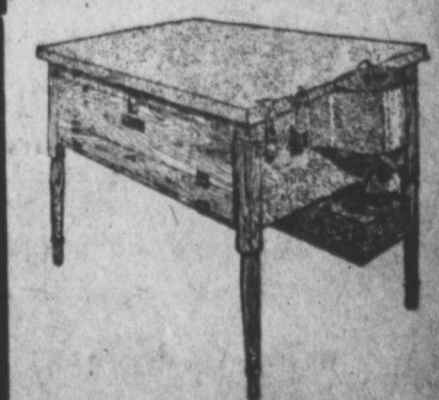

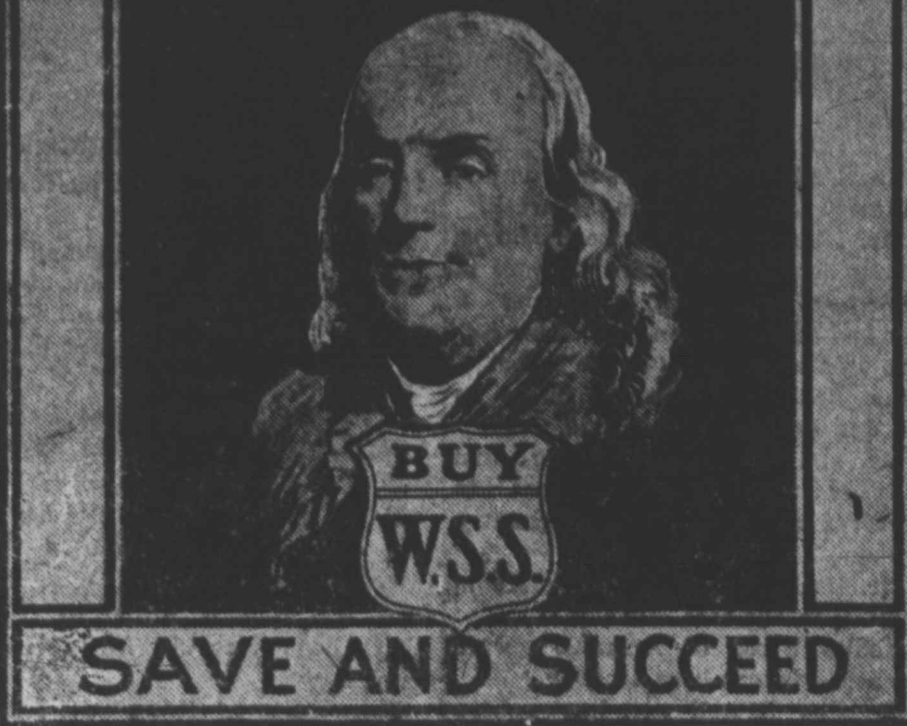

Legislature Unanimously Urges Buying of War Savings Stamps

Wise spending, wise saving and the buying of War Savings Stamps is the financial program suggested by the present Legislature. In fact, a resolution was unanimously passed in both the Senate and the House in which the War Savings campaign is enthusiastically endorsed. Senator W. L. Dean of Huntsville and Representative C. F. Richards of Lockhart, presented the resolution.

"The importance of the War Savings Campaign is evidenced by this action of the Legislature," said Frank M. Smith, Federal District Director for the Eleventh War Savings District. "Every War Savings Stamp bought means much more for the support of the Government. It also means that the investor is making of himself a better citizen and laying aside a reserve for emergencies."

The resolution on War Savings, passed by the Texas Legislature, follows:

"WHEREAS an intelligent thrifty and saving citizenship is the greatest guarantee of the prosperity of a Nation or any subdivision thereof; and

"WHEREAS, such characteristics are a certain proof of a strong, self-reliant and independent people; and

"WHEREAS, the United States Government through a nation-wide educational campaign is seeking to inculcate the science of wise spending and wise saving through the practice of intelligent personal economy and conservation; and

"WHEREAS, the United States Government through the War Savings Movement is urging its citizenship to attain the goal of success through the systematic and business-like saving and investment of their savings in United States Government War Savings Certificate Stamps and Thrift Stamps; and

"WHEREAS, a safer and surer investment than United States Government War Savings Certificate Stamps, which constantly increase in value and which constant increase is guaranteed, cannot be had; and

"WHEREAS, the power of our State and the Nation have given their lives by the thousands upon the battlefields of France that the world

might be made safe for Democracy and the citizens of our State and Nation enjoy the blessings of world peace; and

"WHEREAS, the United States Government spent of its treasure that victory might be won, believing that its people appreciate the blessings of peace to the extent that they will lend of their savings that the Victory bill may be paid and lasting peace assured; and

"WHEREAS, there are still thousands of our soldiers guarding the Rhine and bearing the torch of Democracy on the snow-covered plains of Russia; and

"WHEREAS, the test hour of the patriotism of our people and honor of our State is here; therefore,

"BE IT RESOLVED by the Legislature of the State of Texas that the citizens of the State of Texas be urged to the practice of wise spending and wise saving that by thrift they may acquire power and by saving succeed; and further,

"BE IT RESOLVED that the citizenship of Texas set itself to the practice of thrift, giving expression thereof in the acquisition of United States Government War Savings Certificate Stamps and Thrift Stamps."

Army Rapidly Releasing Men.
Total demobilization now stands at 1,103,310 men and 71,235 officers Gen. March said a few days ago.

A total of 1,501,000 men have been ordered demobilized and 305,000 have already embarked for home. Of the men released 227,000 have actually landed in this country.

Gen. March revealed that demobilization in camps in the States is about at an end.

Discharges of men from overseas will depend on shipping conditions, Gen. March indicated. Since the armistice the United States has converted considerable army shipping to Europe food relief work. The army now has virtually completed shipment of 276,000 tons of food to Rotterdam, Gibraltar, Constantinople, Constanza and the Black Sea.

With embarkation speeded up and reaching 68,000 for the first ten days of February, the State Department was advised by the Dutch Foreign Minister today that Holland will facilitate United States troop movement by way of the Rhine. Such troops will be trans-shipped at Rotterdam. Special regulations require the transports to fly only the commercial flag and that soldiers be not permitted to carry arms during the trip on the river.

Some of the army shipping is being readjusted and turned back to useful employment other than military. Some cargo vessels have been remade into troopships and a total of fifty-five have been or are being completed so as to add a 120,000 monthly troop-carrying capacity to the present rate.

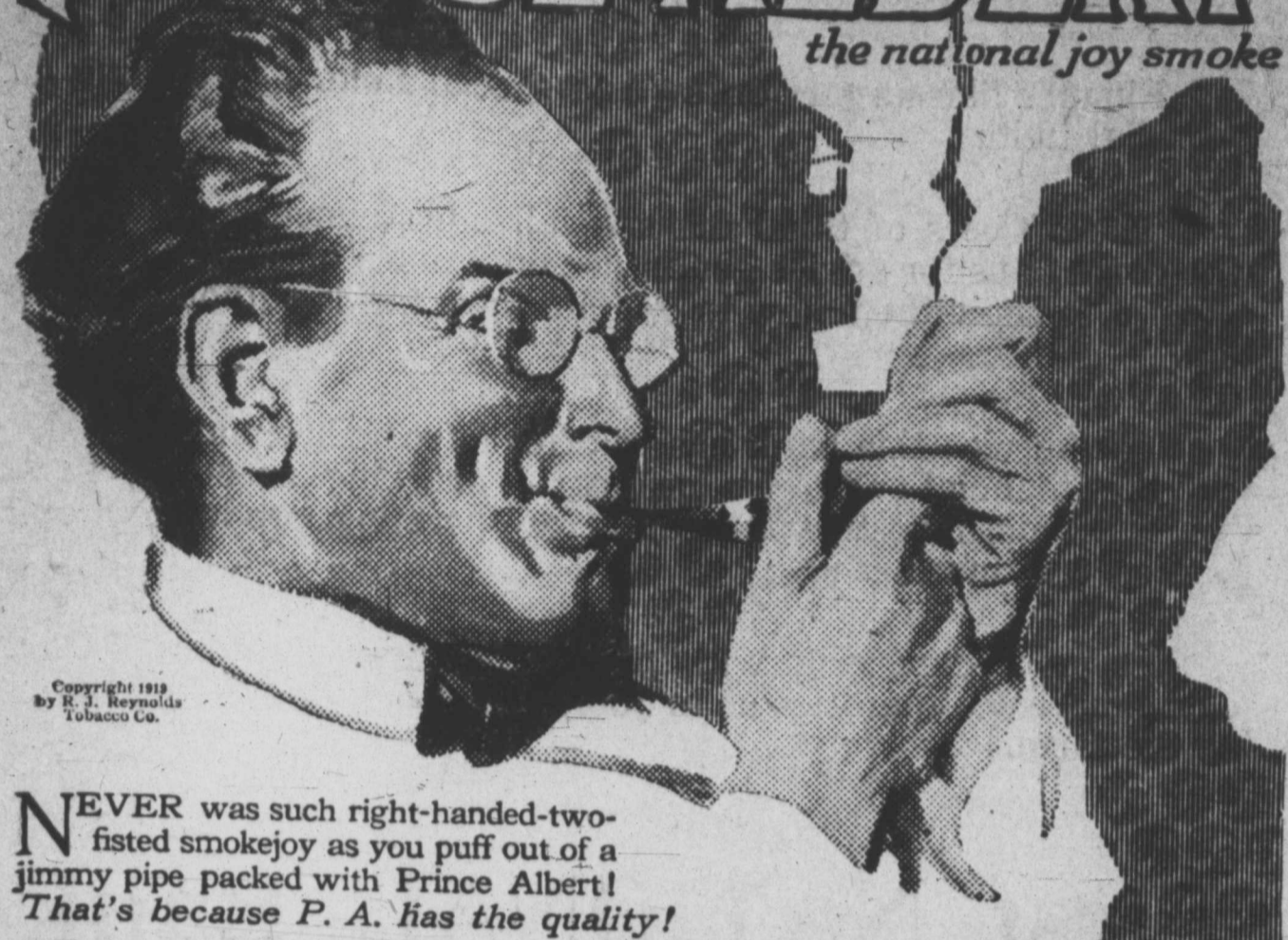

Senate Joint Resolution No. 13.
A resolution to amend Section 5 Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as follows: Strike out the words "Four Thousands," found in the third line of Section 5, and insert in lieu thereof the words "Ten Thousand," and adding after the word "furniture" the words, "and this clause shall be self-enacting," and making an appropriation to pay necessary expenses hereof.

Be it Resolved, by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section No. 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 5. ARTICLE IV. GOVERNOR'S SALARY AND MANSION. He shall at stated times receive as compensation for his service an annual salary of ten thousand dollars, and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture, and this clause shall be self-enacting.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in May, A. D. 1919, same being the twenty-fourth day of May, A. D. 1919, and the Governor of this State is hereby directed to make the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same duly published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State and the official ballot shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the words, "OFFICIAL BALLOT," and also the words, "For the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," and the words, "Against the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas."

All voters favoring such amendment shall erase, by making a mark through the words "Against the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," and all voters opposing such amendment shall erase by making a mark through the words "For the amendment to Section 5 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas in regard to the salary of the Governor of the State of Texas," said amendment shall be so declared.

Section 3. There is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary to cover the necessary expenses attached to the proclamation and publication of this amendment, and the Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation and cause the same to be duly published.
