## EVERYBODY MUST CLEAN UP MONDAY

ALL BUSINESS HOUSES ARE TO BE CLOSED FROM 9 A. M. UNTIL 4 P. M.

Citizens of Canyon, do not forget! Next Monday is Clean-Up Day. This is not a clean-up day to be observed by a few public spirited individuals. It is a day full of meaning and action for every man, woman and child in Canyon. It should not be necessary to bring into play the force of the law to draft this clean-up army. It should not be necessary to hold a registration day and assign each person a draft number. We are facing an enemy that has swept more of our loved ones from the earth every year than has the vanquished Hun. Every year more people die from disease caused by filth than from any other cause. Last summer Canyon paid its toll in human lives caused by unsanitary conditions resulting from negligence. We should take our lesson from this bit of history. Filth and flies, one and inseparable, have no excuse. This spring we shall renew the offensive early. In his heart everyone should feel himself drafted to the task. In this war against a common enemy there are no exemptions, industrially or otherwise. The front door of every public building should be locked and kept locked until the town is clean. In last week's issue of The News, we published the plans of the clean-up committee naming those in charge of the different sections. Was your name in this list? You had better look twice and be sure. There must be no hitch in the plans.

All trash and tin cans should be piled in a compact heap in the alleys in order that it may be hauled off to the dump grounds. Wagons will pass through all the alleys to get the trash.

And when the town is thoroughly renovated, care should be taken to keep it that way. Garbage should be stored in barrels with tight fitting covers so it may be hauled away, or it should be buried. It should never be thrown upon the ground. The old screens should be patched up and made fly tight or replaced by new ones. The time to begin swatting the fly is NOW. There should be a sanitary commission to make regular inspection tours of public and private premises and see that sanitary regulations are strictly enforced.

All business houses to close from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m.

The captains of all sections are earnestly requested to marshal their forces for a thorough clean-up. If you are in doubt about your section consult last week's Randall County News. Get busy and secure teams for your section to haul off all rubbish that cannot be burned. All combustible material is to be burned. Report all stables, cowlots and hog pens found to be in an unsanitary condition. Everybody is requested to clean up back yards and alleys between now and Monday. DON'T BE A SLACKER!

When one section has finished their work move over to some other section and help them out. Continue this until the whole town is cleaned up. Let us go into this Clean-Up with a seriousness of heart, a fixedness of purpose and an unconquerable determination to make Canyon the cleanest, most attractive and best town in the Panhandle.

## RAILROADS FAST RETURNING TO NORMAL CONDITIONS

In a report from Hale Holden, Regional Director for the Central Western Region, to Walker D. Hines, Director General of Railroads, conditions generally were favorable to all railroad operation during the month of February, and all traffic moved currently. The equipment of all classes in this region was plentiful during the month and a surplus of box and coal cars was accumulated.

Mr. Holden states that the hog movement in the Region is rapidly returning to a normal basis, which will make possible the removal of embargoes at all primary markets within the near future. The Kansas City market handled a total of ten thousand and nine hundred six cars of livestock inbound, an increase compared with February nineteen eighteen of seven hundred sixty-nine cars. Total of three thousand three hundred ninety cars moved outbound; an increase of seven hundred twenty-three cars, Feb., nineteen nineteen over the corresponding month last year. Four hundred and thirty-six special oil trains were operated from the Mid-Continent Field during the month with ten thousand nine hundred four cars, an average of twenty-five cars per train. One hundred and six special trains were employed in the transportation of troops, a total of forty five thousand seven hundred ninety men being handled.

Terminal managers in this region report favorable conditions with a free movement and interchange of traffic through all terminals.

The Illinois Central Railroads made several readjustments in its passenger train schedule in Illinois during the month in the interest of "on time" service, and was authorized to add an additional train between Clinton, Illinois and St. Louis, Mo., which resulted in an increase of one hundred and five thousand eight hundred fifty passenger train miles per annum.

## CITY ELECTION PLACES NEW OFFICIALS IN OFFICE

An entire new body of aldermen and a new mayor was elected at the election Tuesday. None of the old officials placed their names on the printed ballot. Sixty-eight votes were cast, the result being as follows:

For Mayor, J. D. Gamble, 65; for alderman precinct No. one, T. C. Thompson, 63; for precinct No. two, C. N. Harrison, 68; for precinct No. three, Giddy Holland, 58.

He will receive his discharge and be home in a few days. Dr. Griffin has been with the Army of Occupation at Coblenz, Germany for the past few months.

Walton Percy Hart, Battery A, 131st Field Artillery, 36th division, has arrived home from France, having received his discharge. He was in France seven months and said that in this time there were hardly 30 sunny days.

Grady Holland will leave Saturday for Fort Worth to attend a large entertainment to be given there at Lake Worth by the Mystic Shiners, April 11, at which time it is stated 300 Novices will be taken over the hot sands of the desert.

Jeff Wallace will leave today for Iowa Park, Texas, where he will make his home. Mrs. Wallace and the baby preceded him a short time ago, the baby receiving treatment in a Wichita Falls sanitarium.

## YOUNG MAN IS ELECTROCUTED WHILE WORKING AMONG WIRES

Fatal Accident Happened in West Canyon Monday Morning.

Arthur Shehorn, age 27, for two years employee of the Canyon Power Company, was electrocuted Monday morning about ten o'clock, while working with live wires in West Canyon. Death came instantly.

The wires carrying the electric current to the city were cut that morning in order to move the Methodist church past them. The trucks upon which the church was resting broke down and Mr. Shehorn climbed an electric light post to reconnect the wires until the church was ready to move again. Mr. Arnold, manager of the light plant, offered to connect the wires but Mr. Shehorn insisted there was no danger. Mr. Arnold was preparing to return to town when he noticed the young man was hanging rigid to the wires. He called to him and receiving no answer he immediately phoned the plant to shut down. When he returned to the spot the current had released the man and he had fallen to the ground.

Mr. Shehorn leaves a wife and three children who have the sympathy of the entire community. The funeral was held yesterday evening at the home, interment being made in Llano cemetery.

## In Memory of A. E. Shehorn.

Arthur Evert Shehorn was born in Haywood, Ill., Sept. 19, 1891, and died March 31, 1919, being at the time of death, 27 years, 6 months and 11 days old. Mr. Shehorn was reared in Lincoln, Ill., and in 1912 was married to Miss Annie Fletcher, of Canyon, Texas, to whom were born three children, two boys and one girl. Also his father, two sisters and two brothers all of Lincoln, Ill. with these and many other friends to mourn his sudden demise, we can only look to the God of love for comfort.

Mr. Shehorn was very energetic, enthusiastic and ambitious to climb higher and learn a trade which would be beneficial to his family. Now we can only look to the God who is ever present for protection, so good bye beloved husband and dear Papa, we only can hope to meet you in the Heaven ever there.

## German Helmets to be Given Away.

Thirty-five hundred German helmets have been shipped to Dallas for distribution amongst prominent workers in the Victory Liberty Loan Campaign. Every county chairman will receive his full share to be distributed as personal gifts and mementos of the great war. Some will use them as cuspidors and others will place them under a glass case and hand them on as heirlooms in the family.

## Y. M. C. A. WORKERS HOLD CONFERENCE IN AMARILLO

Two Delegates in Attendance From Here—Prof. Dufflot Speaks.

Beginning Monday evening there has been a three days conference of Y. M. C. A. workers in Amarillo. About fifty were in attendance from over the Panhandle. L. F. Sheffy and S. B. McClure were the delegates from Canyon. The purpose of the meeting was that of stimulating communities into welcoming and assimilating the returning soldiers, and planning programs that will hold the interest and develop the best in these men.

The conference was financed by the War Work Council of the Young Men's Christian Association, the expenses of all delegates being paid by them.

There were addresses by representative men of every profession from towns over the Panhandle. Tuesday morning the Body was addressed by Prof. J. L. Lufflot, of the Canyon Normal on "Community Civic Problems Growing out of the War."

## PANHANDLE TEACHERS' INSTITUTE HERE FRIDAY-SATURDAY

The Panhandle Teachers' institute will convene in Canyon tomorrow morning for a two days session. The program will be given in the Normal Auditorium. M. C. A. as a club for the soldiers in Coblentz.

ASSOCIATION AT VERNON VOTES UNANIMOUSLY TO HOLD NEXT MEETING HERE

A group of local pig fanciers went down to the convention at Childress vowing to bring the next meet to Canyon or never return. To further the plot Canyon business men sent telegrams and telegrams to the convening body telling what nice things Canyon had in store for the 1920 meet with the result that the Canyon lobbyists were able to wire back that the association had accepted our invitation unambiguously, and there you are.

This is, indeed, an honor for Canyon. It will bring some of the most progressive stock raisers in the state to our town, along with speakers of national reputation. Canyon has something to look forward to in the meeting of this association. And we are sure the town will fulfill the promises made to this body in the way of entertainment. Through your columns allow me in behalf of the Panhandle Swine breeders to thank Canyon City, and its citizens for the kind invitation to hold our next annual meeting in your city, which was accepted by a unanimous vote on the association. We will look forward with pleasure to the meeting, which all the breeders predict will be the greatest ever held on the Plains. The outlook for the breeding of pure bred swine was never better, and the demand for breeding stock for the exportation to the South American countries has grown until the breeders in the Southern part of the state can no longer take care of the orders. The Ass'n. was swamped with orders at this meeting that they could not fill, one being three car loads of bred cows for export to Cuba. Another was ten car loads of feeder hogs, and the stipulation in the order was that they were to be from the plains and were for a Kansas feeder. The feeding qualities of hogs from the plains country are now recognized by all the big feeders, and there are great possibilities for the raising of hogs on the plains if the farmers will only get good stock. **Frost Warnings For Fruit Growers.**

A local frost warning station for the benefit of the fruit growers has been established at the Flood orchards and is in charge of C. W. McElmurry. The station began its work last Monday evening and will continue until all danger of frost damage is ended. Forecasts of local temperatures will be made from the Roswell office of the Weather bureau on data furnished by the local station. These forecasts will be available to the fruit growers by calling Mr. McElmurry when you wish to know what temperature to expect. They will only be issued however when it appears that there might be damaging frosts, otherwise no forecast will be made.—Roswell (N. M.) Weekly Star.

**To Kill Blue Weeds.**

The following formula for a spray to kill blue weeds has been tested out in various parts of the country, and is said to be very effective. The spray will kill all vegetation but will not deaden the soil. The only question is in regard to the return of the weed in following years. Thus far no one has reported a recurrence of the weed pest. Take it for what it is worth.

White Arsenic, 1 pound.  
Caustic Soda, 1-2 pound.

Dissolve in one gallon of water, add arsenic and boil until clear. Dilute to 20 gallons and use as a spray.

**Will Have Motor Truck Mail Routes.**

The Democrat is in receipt of a letter from Senator T. P. Gore, in which he states that the postoffice is now installing motor truck mail routes, the principal object of which is to gather up along the routes farm products, eggs, chickens, etc., and these routes will be extended into the districts where the service is most limited.

Senator Gore has filed an application for such a route from Woodward to Beaver, and from Beaver to Boise City, including the following towns: Woodward, Mooreland, Curtis, Haskell, Charleston, Buffalo, Doby Springs, Gate, Madison, Logan, Riverside, Beaver, Boyd, Grand Valley, Range, Hardesty, Guymon, Goodwell, Texhoma, Sampel, Griggs, Garlington and Boise City.—Buffalo (Okla.) **Don't Put It Off.**

A silo is a hole, entirely surrounded by a wall, fur storin' cow feed. Sometimes the hole is in the ground; sometimes it is up in the air. To build a silo, first select a nice spot for the hole, then build a wall outside of the hole, if you build up, or inside of the hole if you want a pit silo. Either kind is good, but you got to go about it different. If you can't put up a silo, put one down, but don't put it off.—Farmer Putnam in Western Farm Life.

**State Should Purchase Buffaloes**  
(From The Star-Telegram.)

The Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas, at its meeting in Dallas, adopted the following resolution:

"One of the outstanding characteristics and ever to be cherished dispositions of the cattlemen of Texas is their willingness ever to do homage to the man or woman who in the early days blazed a trail into the then unknown, but fertile prairies, drove their stakes, stretched their tents and then contested with the Red Man for a right of habitation for themselves and with the real spirit of a pioneer sent word back to the settlements, 'Come on, bring your cattle, I have found the great grazing grounds'.

"Cherishing the above sentiments, and we have an opportunity of not only showing our appreciation of a typical representative of the pioneer Texas cowman, but also an opportunity of lending our indorsement to the perpetuation of his life's efforts.

"Whereas, there has been introduced in the Texas Legislature a bill authorizing the purchasing by the State of Texas of the Goodnight ranch and the herd of buffalo thereon, the same to be preserved and perpetuated as a State institution; and

"Whereas, the perpetuation of this the only herd of buffalo in our State, and we believe the largest number of pure-bred buffalo in the United States, should appeal to the pride of every loyal Texan; and

"Whereas, we believe the ever increasing value of these buffaloes and the certain increasing value of the lands will not only make this a self-supporting proposition, but will, as the years go by, develop into a very valuable asset to the State; therefore,

"Be It Resolved, That the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, in convention assembled, respectfully urges the Texas Legislature to pass the bill authorizing the purchase of the Goodnight ranch and the buffalo thereon at a fair price."

The bill to which this resolution refers was introduced in the regular session of the Legislature and died on the calendar. The House sent a committee to inspect the Goodnight herd and that committee reported favorably on the proposition. It was a unanimous report and it was expected that the bill authorizing the purchase would be passed without much opposition. However, the session adjourned without any action being taken.

The resolution adopted by the Cattle Raisers represents the deliberate opinion of all who have had any part in the great work of blazing the trail in the West. The "old timers," many of them now the leaders of the cattle industry in the State, are all in favor of this purchase. The Cattle Raisers, as a class, who cherish the traditions of Texas, because they are their own traditions and the traditions of their ancestors in the industry, are unanimously in favor of it. The adoption of this resolution is a plea to this generation, who enjoy the fruits of a civilization built upon the sacrifices of the pioneers, to perpetuate this memorial of a heroic age which Texans should never forget. It is a plea to the representatives of the people to perform a duty in the name of the State which the State has too long neglected. That plea ought to be heeded.

The only way that this matter can be brought before the special session of the Legislature is through a special message from the Governor. We feel certain that Governor Hobby will submit it and recommend strongly that the bill be passed. We know that the matter has been brought to his attention, and do not think there can be any question as to his attitude, for he well knows that as a memorial of the glorious past of Texas this buffalo herd is priceless. He knows that such things cannot be measured in money and that it would be an unworthy generation that would fail in its duty to perpetuate it because of the few paltry dollars

that it will cost. We expect the Governor to submit it, therefore, and to urge the importance of the matter upon the members of the Legislature.

When this is done we think that the Legislature will not fail of its duty again. It can easily find time during its thirty days' session to pass such a bill as this. However, we must confess that we did not expect it to adjourn the regular session without taking this action, and for that reason we are prompted to press the question at this time. It must not be said that Texans have so far forgotten their past that the urgency of such a matter as this cannot move them to action.

**Raising The 1920 Layers.**

If you don't go forward you go back. You cannot stand still in the poultry business. Therefore choose now which way you will go. If you are not progressive, if you are careless, you will go back, you will be classed with the failures in the poultry business. You won't get eggs in the fall and winter and few in the summer. Your eggs won't hatch well, your baby chicks will die and the poultry business won't pay on the farm.

On the other hand if you are progressive and looking forward you will study your business and decide what breed you want and will get eggs for hatching or baby chicks of that breed early this spring. By getting early hatched chicks you will build the foundation for your future flock and will provide for the fall and winter layers. The early hatched pullets are the fall and winter layers.

Chicken houses, yards and brooders are essential to success and provision should be made for them. To get baby chicks without making provisions for brooding is to court failure. Get some literature on brooders and study how best to care for chicks. If they are kept warm, dry and properly fed they will live and do well.

Properly built poultry houses and yards are necessary for best results. Don't keep chickens in a dark, poorly ventilated house or in one with cracks and openings that will cause drafts. The County Agricultural Agents have on file bulletins that give you the best plans for brooders, poultry houses and yards. They also have bulletins on other phases of the poultry business and will be glad to supply you with them.—Union County (N. M.) Farmer-Stockman Exchange Bulletin.

The Elks baseball committee is in receipt of a letter from Fred Mitchell, Manager of the "Chicago Cubs" now in training at San Diego California, in which he says that the Chicago team, the winners of the National League Pennant and of the "World's Series for 1918, are getting in the pink of condition and that when they leave their training grounds and travel east through Amarillo where they will play a game with the local Elks team, and later open the season on their home grounds in Chicago, they will be very "fit". He says that this year he is going to permit his first team to play in the game at Amarillo and that the people of Amarillo are assured that they will see a quick, snappy game and full of sensational plays. The old battle cry of the Chicago "fans" that brought double plays was, "Evers, to Tinker, to Chance", this year it will be "Hollecher to Killduff, to Merkle", the lightning infield trio. This team has in its ranks "stars" of the first magnitude in the baseball world, such men for instance as Killifer who is admittedly the best catcher in the National League, and who with Grover Alexander was

purchased last year by the Chicago team from the Philadelphia Nationals for the huge sum of \$50,000. Merkle who was a star at first base for the New York and Brooklyn teams before going to Chicago; Killduff a famous second baseman and Charlie Hollicher at short who was the wonderful "infield fiend" in 1918; Chas. Deal at third base who became famous in the 1914 World's Series with Boston; and an out field composed of Mann, Flack and Pasert that has no equal in the National league. The pitching staff is made up of James Vaughn, Leftie Tylor, Claude Hendricks, Phil Douglas, Nick Carter and A. Lincoln Bailey. Grover Alexander is among the pitchers but is not with the team at the present time as he has just gotten his release from service in France and is now on his way back to this country but he may not arrive in time to join the team before it reaches Amarillo, however, it is hoped that he will. Among the other players who have also seen service are Killifer, A. Lincoln Bailey and Leslie Mann. During nearly all of last year Leslie Mann was in the Y. M. C. A. work at Camp Logan and was released late in the season so that he might play in the "world's series".

A Lincoln Bailey is one of the new pitchers and while he was at the front, he pitched two games against Grover Alexander, winning both.  
A big league ball team in training and during the season carries lots of wires. The "Cubs" are at this time carrying twenty-four men and a manager and are accompanied by the representatives of five great eastern newspapers. These men send daily wires to the papers they represent as to the progress that is being made in training and the general condition of the men.  
The local Elks committee has in contemplation some little entertainment for the visiting ball team. They will arrive in Amarillo late in the afternoon of April 15th and the game will be played in the City Park at 2:30 o'clock the afternoon of April 16th. ### CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS

With all its natural facilities Canyon can wisely be made the most beautiful town on the Plains, and a summer resort for tourists. But the first thing is to clean up. No tourist cares to stop in a dirty unattractive town. Then more and better shade trees should be planted. Although the locust is a quick growing tree, it is short lived tree, the borers soon ruin it and flowers, gardens and grass will not grow good near locust trees. Nothing makes a town on the Plains more attractive than good shade trees. There should be a lawn started and flowers planted in every yard this spring. It is the cheapest and best way to improve a home. Then the roads of the county should be greatly improved. Many counties down in the state are spending as much as a million dollars on their roads. This county should by all means have good roads. At present this county has available one of the largest road funds of any county in this section. Through the efforts of Judge Flesher this county was placed on the state highway No. 34 and \$14,000 appropriated from the state fund. In addition to the highway now being built north and south through the county, there will be about \$30,000 available for other roads without further bond issue. Canyon is situated between two very pretty little creeks, both having flowing water and good fishing. Then to the east of us a few miles lies the great Palo Duro canyon, having scenery scarcely surpassed even in the Rockies of Colorado. By all means a good road should be built east to this canyon. With good roads and a little advertising people would soon motor from all parts of the United States to spend the hot summer days in cool Canyon and view the wondrous scenery so close to us and as yet, so little known and appreciated. And while here they would see what wonderful school facilities we have and it would attract the best class of citizenry to move to our town. Development along this line could be done far cheaper than an oil field could be developed. A cleaner, more desirable class of people would be brought to our community and the benefits derived would be far more certain and more lasting.

## LEAGUE OF NATIONS COVENANT DRAFTED

MONROE DOCTRINE AND JAPANESE RACE EQUALITY AMENDMENTS ARE OMITTED.

## IT WILL BE OFFERED LATER

Nation Can Withdraw Only After Two Year's Notice and After Obligations Are Performed.

Paris.—Containing neither any reference to the Monroe doctrine nor the Japanese proposal for the recognition of equality of races, the draft of the covenant of the league of nations is now in the hands of the special drafting committee.

The draft was completed early in the week at a sitting of the full commission, and the covenant is expected to be ready in completed form next week. The two amendments around which has centered the greatest interest and much divergence of opinion, however, may be offered either in the council of ten or to the plenary peace conference, to which the covenant must go for final action.

Among other amendments adopted was one directly recognizing the principle of woman suffrage, in that it provides that the offices of the league are open to women as well as to men.

The much discussed question as to the policy of the withdrawal from membership in the league of nations, was settled by an amendment permitting withdrawal on two years' notice, but not until such nation has filled out its international obligations.

Art. X of the covenant, to which the Monroe doctrine amendment would apply, stands in its original form, President Wilson having reserved for the present the amendment which had been prepared as expressing the views of the American delegation. It is now explained that it was not the exact text, but only the general form of the text, which was given to the press and that hence criticism must be withheld for the present.

Careful soundings are being taken to ascertain the reception that is likely to be given this amendment by other delegations. If unfriendly sentiment develops or the pressing of other and obnoxious amendments is threatened as a consequence upon the Monroe doctrine it is said the amendment may be altogether withheld.

The language of the mandatory article has been changed so as to make it clear that no nation shall be obliged to act as a mandatory.

## Has Praise for Camp at Brest.

Paris.—Josephus Daniels, the American secretary of the navy, with party, has reached Paris from Brest. The secretary will remain in Paris about five days, during which time he will discuss the naval lessons of the war with French, British and Italian naval authorities. He will visit Italy and parts of the fighting frontier in France. The secretary said he has inspected the American military camp at Brest and added: "I can see no reason for criticism of this camp, but more to praise than any camp I have visited in the United States. What they have done there will thrill Americans who take pride in big achievements."

## Fort Worth Gets I. O. O. F. Meeting.

Dallas.—Fort Worth has been chosen as the meeting place for the eighth grand lodge session, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, in 1920. Hillsboro put up a plucky fight for the next annual session, but Fort Worth was on hand with a hundred or more members and carried away the prize.

## German U-Boat to be at St. Louis.

St. Louis, Mo.—Assurance has been received from the office of the secretary of the navy that one of the German submarines being brought to this country would be sent up the Mississippi river to St. Louis for the Victory Liberty loan campaign.

## Wants to Build Ships in Brazil.

Rio Janeiro.—Domenico da Gama, minister of foreign affairs, has received an offer from a New York corporation to build a shipyard in Brazil for the construction of concrete vessels.

## Ready to Finance Export Operations.

Washington.—The government's \$1,000,000,000 fund for financing foreign trade soon will be opened to American exporters through loans from the War Finance corporation.

## Bavaria Will Not Furnish Troops.

Zurich.—The Bavarian minister of foreign affairs has informed the German government that Bavaria will not furnish troops for the empire.

## Arranging for Good Roads Convention.

Mineral Wells, Texas.—All details for the seventh annual convention of the United States good roads exhibit and third annual convention of the Bankhead National Highway association have been worked out, according to announcement made by J. A. Rountree, director general of these organizations. Delegates living east of Texas are requested to purchase round trip tourists' tickets. "This is the only rate that can be secured for the convention."

## MONROE DOCTRINE SAFEGUARD PROPOSED

AGREEMENT IS REACHED ON AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 10 OF LEAGUE COVENANT.

Paris.—The American peace delegation, it is understood, has definitely agreed upon the amendment it will offer to Article X of the covenant of the league of nations to safeguard the Monroe doctrine.

The amendment provides that agreements under the covenant shall not be construed as an infringement upon the principles of international policies heretofore generally recognized.

Article X of the draft of the league of nations covenant read as follows:

"The high contracting parties shall undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all states members of the league. In case of any such aggression, or in case of any threat of danger of such aggression, the executive council shall advise upon the means by which the obligation shall be fulfilled."

As framed the amendment will be an appendix to the article pledging members of the league to respect and preserve against external aggression to territorial integrity and existing political independence of members. Mention of the Monroe doctrine by name is avoided purposely.

Inasmuch as President Wilson and Colonel House on several occasions have discussed the subject with Premiers Lloyd George, Clemenceau and Orlando, it is assumed that the president is assured himself of favorable action in advance of submission of the amendment to the commission.

An American amendment to protect nations against the influx of foreign labor has been adopted. It assigns the right of any country in the league to control matters solely within its domestic jurisdiction.

Another important amendment to the league covenant affects Article VIII, which empowers the executive council to formulate a plan for the reduction of armaments. The language of the article is altered so as to limit the powers of the council to a simple recommendation to the governments affected.

Levy, Fort Worth; widows and orphans' home trustees, S. B. Spaulding, Waxahachie and W. W. Clopton, Corsicana.

## 133rd in Dallas Saturday.

Camp Morrison, Va.—The 133d field artillery as a complete unit of the thirty-sixth division will shortly be on its way to Dallas. The regiment, according to official announcement made by Colonel Fred A. Logan, will make the trip to Texas in three sections. Colonel Logan states that the regiment would have a two-hour holdover at Terrell, Texas, prior to arriving in Dallas. Railroad officials state that without mishaps the troop train would arrive in Dallas some time Saturday morning.

## Provides for War Insurance Bureau.

Washington.—Financial stringency of the War Risk Insurance Bureau has been relieved by a message from President Wilson to Secretary Glass, saying the president had made an allotment from his emergency war fund to pay expenses of the bureau until congress appropriates at the next session. The amount allotted was not specified. Treasury officials have estimated a little more than \$3,000,000 will be needed to pay the bureau's expenses until the middle of May.

## Employment Bureau to Remain Open.

Dallas.—That the employment service bureaus of the larger cities of Texas will continue to be operated locally is the advice received from H. W. Lewis, federal director of employment for Texas. Mr. Lewis announced that the offices in San Antonio, Houston, Austin, Beaumont, Dallas, Fort Worth, El Paso and Texarkana will be continued.

## Ousley's Advice to Southern Farmers.

Washington.—A plea to the southern farmer to make sure of his meat supply and cereals for next year before turning his attention to cotton, is made by Clarence Ousley, assistant secretary of agriculture.

## Cotton Meeting to be Held April 7.

Dallas.—For the purpose of perfecting a state-wide organization to protect the interests of the cotton producers and to take steps to give producers a voice in the distribution of their product a meeting has been called in Dallas April 7, at which delegates from the entire state will be present. The call was issued following a conference in Austin March 17, and community meetings were held throughout the state to choose delegates to the Dallas meeting.

### Lamb and Mutton.

The difference of a few cents in the cost of a pound of meat frequently determines whether that meat appears on the table in many households. Yet that difference of a few cents just as frequently is caused by the limited knowledge of the house-wife of the meat which she desires.

### 1919 Show Animals Yield Less Beef.

Figures obtained from Armour & Co. and Swift & Co., reveal the fact that the majority of fat cattle purchased at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in 1919 did not yield as great a per cent of beef as the winners at the 1918 Show. Prices this year, of course, were much higher.

The grand champion steers this year, as well as the champions of 1918, were out-dressed by other cattle. This applies to the carlots as well as the singles.

R. E. Gatewood's grand champion Herefords, this year, brought \$23 to Armour & Co. and yielded 61.56 per cent beef. R. V. Colbert's second prize Herefords, bought by Swift & Co. at \$22 yielded 62.13 per cent beef being the highest yielding carlot of cattle of the Exhibition.

In 1918 J. W. Cook's grand champion Herefords selling to Swift & Co. at \$18.75 dressed out 63.60. They were beaten at 65.79 by Dan Casement's second Herefords which sold at \$17.75 to Armour & Co., and Gatewood's first Hereford Steers, two years and over, which sold to Armour at \$15 and dressed out 65.71.

This year's grand champion single steer, "Rob Roy," Hereford, selling to Swift & Co. at \$41.50, and owned by J. W. Cook & Son, dressed 68.70. He was out-dressed by the famous Red Cross steer, which was the champion of the Oklahoma Show, selling to Armour & Co. at \$29, which yielded 68.98. This Red Cross steer was sold for the Red Cross after the Stock Show here last year, was sent to the Dallas Fair, then to Washington, to Oklahoma and then back to the Fort Worth Show. This time he was sold for the block.

In 1918 the grand champion steer, "General Pershing," owned by the Texas A. & M. College, an Angus,

sold to Swift & Co. at \$26 and yielded 64.27. Benny Dale, Oklahoma A. & M. College, third prize Shorthorn, two-year-old, bought by Swift & Co. at \$14.75, out-dressed him at 69.81.—Ft. Worth Livestock Reporter.

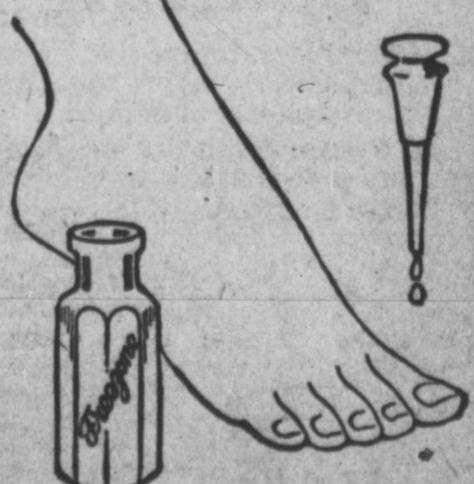
