The News has not had much time for Joe Bailey, but his stand on the labor question must be heartily approved. Neff and Thomason are unsuccessfully dodging the question and calling each other hard names, while Bailey tells the voters just where they will find him. The labor question is not the paramount question in the campaign. Bailey has shown his ignorance or indifference to most of the questions involved in the state race. His residence in Washington has left him with no connection with state affairs. The only specific charge of extravagance in state government was lodged against the state highway commission, when he charged that this commission spent three-fourths of the money they handled. The commission handed him the facts showing they had spent only a small percent of the funds in their care. Bailey has not apologized or acknowledged his mistake. General Ben F. Looney is the best qualified man in the race for governor of Texas, but somehow or other he got a bum start. He has no support. He will be the tall end of the race.

A well known nurseryman was in the city Saturday and examined the locust trees. He states that while the trees are in a very bad condition he doubts the benefit of cutting out every other tree as has been suggested and planting in other trees. He states that very likely the new trees planted in would do very little good and if trees were to be cut out, they should all be taken in certain places and a fight put up to save the lives of those left standing. He advocates planting trees at once which will not become infected and letting these get a good start before there is a possibility of the locust trees dying. The citizens of Canyon will do well to take speedy action in this matter. The locust trees are doomed in Canyon as they are in Amarillo, and unless action is taken, the city will be destitute of trees in a few years and no provision taken to replace the dead locust with varieties that will live.

The election judges are making a special plea this year that the voters go to the polls early Saturday morning. Of course there are a few voters who will stand around until the last minute with both ears open listening for some last minute scandal as to some candidate with the excuse that they want to vote for the best man. Such stuff is pure rot, and if it were not a plain campaign lie, it would have been sprung long before the last day of the campaign. In fact this class of voters could not be changed in their original position no matter the class of campaign stuff that might be put out the last day. Vote early Saturday morning and the campaign tattlers will not bother you during the day.

In discussing the price situation Saturday the representative of a well known wholesale house stated that a month ago it was impossible to sell any kind of goods as merchants believed the bottom was falling out of prices in spite of the statements from the manufacturers and wholesalers that they would be no radical decline this year. This month, so the representative states, business has assumed its usual proportions and the retail merchants are firmly convinced that there can be no decline in prices this year. It is believed now that the decline will come gradual when it does start, and that business will not be paralyzed as would be the case in a general and sudden slump.

Y. W. C. A. Vesper Service Initiation
The Y. W. C. A. held its first service in the Normal Auditorium just after sunset on the evening of June 30th. The Candle Service was used to initiate the members. About three hundred and fifty of the four hundred members were present at the initiation. As each member entered, she was given a small candle. The president, Mary Smith Clark, stood on the stage, holding a tall, lighted candle which throughout the service was typical of Jesus Christ, the Light of the World.

The service began with the singing of "Day is Dying in the West." The candles were then lighted by Y. W. C. A. cabinet members. The president explained that the purpose of the association was to radiate, not the light of our own lives, but rather the light of Jesus Christ, and therefore she asked that each member blow out the candle of self. After a prayer of consecration and the singing of the "Hymn of the Lights," by the choir, the president asked that each member re-light her candle at the large candle, that she might take out into the world the radiance of Jesus Christ.

There followed a long processional of girls, lighting their candles, one by one. Miss Mary L. Clark played a violin solo throughout the ceremony. When the processional of candles ended, the hall was a shining symbol of the radiance and beauty of Christ.

Each member was then given a small fern, which was also to be to them a symbol of the growing life of the living Christ.

The service was closed with the pledge of allegiance of the Young Women's Christian Association—"I will live as a true follower of the Lord Jesus Christ."

Our Library
The West Texas State Normal College has one of the best libraries of its size in the South. The books were selected primarily for the purpose of supplementing the actual work of the class room; for this reason very few volumes serve only the advantage of shelf-decorations. However, the departments of English and History have adequate equipment for students wishing to do any advanced work in these departments. The library is unusually well equipped in books of reference, and has on its subscription list more than 100 standard magazines. One special feature of the library is the Children's Department. This section of the library has more than 1000 well selected books adapted to the needs of children from the first to the sixth grade. The departments of English, and history give special courses in literature for children. The librarian, also, gives special courses in the building of a library and how to make the best use of the library. The library has, in all, more than 10,000 volumes on its shelves, and the librarian and the departments make a systematic and persistent effort to secure the maximum good from this equipment.

Scholarships in the West Texas State Normal College
The West Texas State Normal Col-

lege now has three distinct Scholarships available to students who attend this institution. Captain Charles Schreiner of Kerrville, Texas, has established two scholarships, of the annual value of two hundred and seventy-five dollars each, open to graduates of the Tivy High School, Kerrville, Texas, the holder having the right to enter any one of the State Normal Colleges or the University of Texas.

The State Board of Normal School Regents, also offers annually a Scholarship worth one hundred dollars, payable from local funds, open to students who have completed with high rank a two-year college course or a three-year college course in a Normal College.

Besides these two Scholarships, the Board of Regents offers annually two Scholarships to all fully affiliated high schools: one to the honor student among the young men, and one to the honor student among the young women. These Scholarships carry with them exemption from any and all fees.

Don't Sell Your Wool
The American Farm Bureau Federation is urging the sheepmen of the country not to sell their wool at the present time. They declare that the loans recently financed for the wool growers will restore confidence in the wool market and will result in better prices later.

Cream Sales Bring \$256 a Week

That the sale of cream means something to the farmers is demonstrated by the fact that during the past week the Farmers Exchange has received from the farmers in this immediate vicinity sufficient cream to test 513.4 pounds of butter fat, and has paid the farmers for the same the neat sum of \$256.70. This is an average per farmer delivering the cream of about \$8.00 per week. Some farmers are bringing the cream from only a few cows, which makes the average low. But even eight dollars per week will go a long way toward paying the "store bills," and if this is done, when the beans are marketed the bean money need not be paid out for past living expenses.

That more of our farmers ought to care for cows and sell the cream is well known. And more are doing so right along.—Mountainair (N. M.) Independent.

Holsteins for Boys and Girls

Twenty head of fine Holstein heifers arrived Sunday from Wauwatosa, Wis., from the Fernwood farm. These animals are eight weeks old and are pure bred stock. They will be distributed throughout the county to the boys and girls who have made application for same, by the club leader, C. G. Head. The heifers cost \$33 each delivered in Tucumcari. They will be cared for according to government instructions and prizes will be awarded to the one whose heifer passes the best test at the end of a certain time.—Tucumcari (N. M.) News.

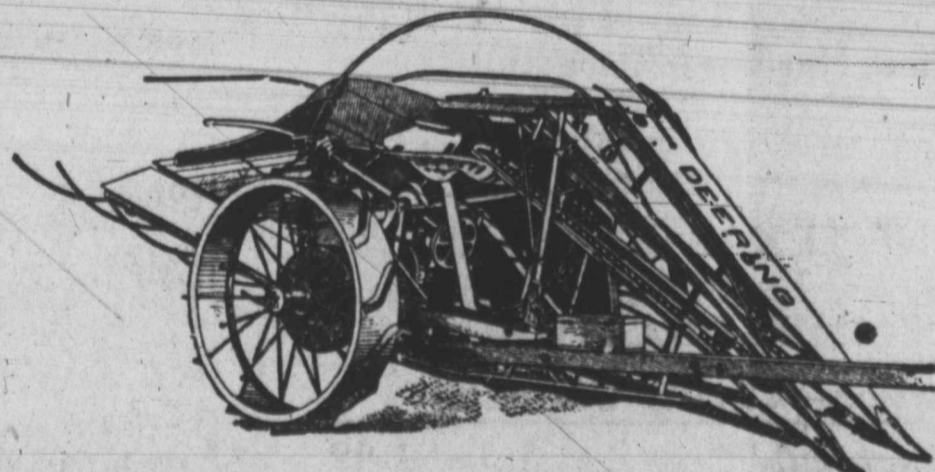
