



His figures go to show that if the Government were not subsidizing the. railways to the extent of about £1,-000,000 a week they would be bankrupt already. The highways with which they have to compete are, of course, also heavily subsidized by the immense sums spent upon theeir upkeep, only part of which comes back in the form of taxes upon vehicles. The roads have been immensely improved since mottor traffic began, and these improvements will be continued and extended. Fuel for motors grows dearer, yet not in proportion to the increase in the operating cost of railways. The nailways have been granted an increase of fares, but while this puts upon their patrons a more equitable charge for the increased cost of service given, it also obviously puts the railways at a still greater disadvantage in competing with the motor. Nor is it simply the well-to-do, owners of motor cars, who are deserting the railway for the road; in England the motor coach, known as the charabanc, is competing with the railways much as the intetrurban electric roads were doing in this country two decades ago. England needs its railways; apparently, till the situation clears, it will have to maintain them with little regardto the balance between profit and
