PRESIDENT HILL ANSWERS ABILENE STATEMENT THAT NORMAL POORLY SUPPORTED

President Hill Takes Issue to Asser- |our hearts to complain at the considertions in Editorial in Abilene Paper;

Canyon, Texas, Jan. 3, 1921. To the Abilene Daily Reporter:

In a recent issue of your valued paper there appears an article under the caption "How West Texas Has Been Discriminated Against," in which you make a statement that is very misleading about a West Texas institution. The statement follows: "Of course, West Texas was 'awarded' a normal at Alpine on the Mexican border, and another at Canyon City, on the New Mexican border. Both are poorly supported and inaccessible."

I do not wish to be understood as desiring in any way, to enter into the controversy as to what the Texas Legislature should have done or should do now for West Texas, but since its organization and being now charged with the responsibility of administering its affairs and guiding, in some measure its development, I feel that I cannot let go unchallenged so damaging a statement as the above.

The statement contains two ideas: (1) the location of the Canyon school is bad and (2) it is "poorly supported." These together produce a third: The school is not worth much to West

Canyon is a tittle more than sixty about eighty miles by rail. Denton, where two state schools are located, and Commerce, the home of another State school, are each nearer than this to the State line. Canyon is 105 miles from the Oklahoma line on the north pulse has been quickened through the and 110 miles from the Oklahoma line on-the east. In fact, it is near the center of the Panhandle-Plains territory which contains 35,700 square miles and 22,,848,000 acres, 71 per cent is tillable-one of the largest bodies of tillable soil in the world. This area produced in 1919 a small grain crop States more than \$120,000,000-more valuable than all the oil produced by the whole State of Texas for the same year. Yet only 27 percent of the land was in cultivation. This same area, so well known as a part of the great American Desert, has an annual rainfall of 22 inches and as many pretty days during the year as any other section of Texas. It has a population of 175,920—a growth of approximately 48 per cent in the last decade while the average growth throughout the United States was 14.9 per cent. These people are served by three main line railways with numerous branch lines,

Canyon is located on one of these main lines and on a branch of same, putting us less than 24 hours from Central and South Texas points, Kansas City and El Paso. The other main lines within forty minutes drive from Canyon, put us only seven hours from Wichita Falls and fourteen hours from Fort Worth, Dallas, Oklahoma City and Colorado Springs. Surely, such a location cannot be regarded as "inac-

As to poor support, it is not quite clear whether your editorial refers to the amount of money with which the State spends here or to the patronage the public has given the institution. As to the former, we have not received of course, all that was needed, but when it is considered that the school is only entering its eleventh year the State's invesment cannot be seriously complained of. For example, we have here the most sustantial, best appointed, and largest individual school house owned by the State of Texas. In addition to this we have five other buildings of value and forty acres of land. According to figures recently compiled for the Board of Control, the State has an investment value here slightly in excess of \$1,000,000. The Thirty-Sixth Legislature appropriated \$512,658,74 for the benial period ending September 1, 1921. In the Panhandle-Plains -region, notable for the excellence of its rural and town schools, nearly half the teachers have received all or part of their training at the West Texas State Normal

In another respect, too, the service of this institution has been conspicuous. During the ten years of its life. the standards of teacher training in this State have been greatly advanced. pletely reorganized, standard degree work has been inaugurated, faculties and equipment have been greatly ex panded, and the general education services of this institution. I know I can say with becoming modesty that all in all this constructive development the West Texas State Normal College has never had to be dragged.

It should be remembered, too, that the record of this institution, as outlined above, has been made in spite of a disastrous fire, which practically wiped the physical plant out of existence in 1914, the World War robbed us of many young men for a period and consumed the resources of our people, and the most disastrous drouth the West has ever suffered. If there is auother higher institution of learning in Texas, State or denominational, that has made such a record in the first tenyears of its life, let us hear about it.

Now, Mr. Editor, I am with you, body and soul for every legitimate enterprise that will develop our great Western empire. I believe profoundly in its natural resources, in its character, its citizenship, and in the glorious promise of its future. But I do not believe that the best way to prodo I believe it is wise to belittle the few institutions we have in my judgment, it would be worth more to the cause you espouse—the cause of West Texas-if you would cite the West Texas State Normal-College as an example of what the West-will do to develop an educational institution whenonce established by the State.

"A desperate situation confronts" the producers of this country-not fanciful, but real. Wheat, corn and cotton, as well as live stock are selling below the cost of production. Relief must be given or farms and ranches of this country will be deserted. In this problem every man, woman and child in America is vitally interested. Everything in this country ultimately depends upon the prosperity of the producer.

"In the first place the net earnings of the Federal Reserve System, alaccumulated should be author-The organized banking machinery-of this country too long has been whereas back of industry, necessarily is the producer. If the producer fails, the business man must finally go to the wall Nearly \$100,000,000 could be furnished at once under this plan. "An absolute embargo should be placed upon the importation of wheat cattle, cotton and wool, so that the million's of bushels of wheat and other products could be kept out of this country until a living price for farm products is restored.

Between the first day of October and Thank giving morning, forty-one New York abnost one a day. Many of them were incidental to premeditated highway -robbery by professional criminals. Men have been assaulted, robbed and killed on the street within a few hundred feet of a policemanand the murderers have escaped.

In Chicago the conditions of lawlessness and violence became so bad that the police "rounded up" all the criminals of whose existence they were informed, kept the suspets undr restraint during examination and then dismissed with a warning those who could not lawfully be held.

In almost every city in the country crimes of violence are increasing. Every year one person out of 10,000. living in our larger cities is murdered. Twenty years ago it was only one in 20,000, and our murder record was even then shamefully bad.

There can be no doubt that the serious out-break of crime with which our cities are contending is one of the bad results that follow a period of war. Murder and robbery are far more common in European cities than they were in the days before the war, though nowhere, unless it is in Russia, is the death list so shocking as it is in the United States. Murder occurs most frequently in the cities that have a large negro or foreign population; which is only saying that it thrives among the less educated and less firmly settled elements of our population. t is owing in many cases to causes of friction that do not exist in the more homogeneous cities of England, France or Germany. But in some instances it attends on incapacity or worse in the city government. There





the Public Places of the City of Canyon, Texas, Defining the Meaning Thereof, Providing a Penalty Thereof for Violation of Said Ordinance and Declaring an Emergency. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CAN YON, TEXAS:

An Ordinance Prohibiting Flirting in

Section: 1. It shall be unlawful for any person by word, sign or act to flirt or attempt to flirt with another person then and there not being the husband or wife of such person, upon any street or in any public place within the Corporate limits of the City of Canyon, Texas,

Section 2. By the term "To flirt" is meant any word, sign, act or mo tion uttered or made by any perso towards another which is reasonable calculated to have been made with th intention on the part of the person other person's attention for the purpose of playing at courtship with such other person.

Section 3. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars.

Section 4. The provisions of this ordinance shall be chimulative of all other ordinances now in force in the city of Canyon, Texas.
