## Announce Time Change Santa Fe

The Santa Fe Railway announces that a new time card will be effective May 1st, for the entire system. The new card will be ready for publication in a few days.

An important change is the return to the use of central standard time on the Plains and Slaton divisions. During Federal control of railroads the dividing point between central and mountain time zones was changed from Clovis, N. M., to Waynoka, Okla.

This change was unsatisfactory to the people in Northwest Texas and Congressman Marvin Jones secured the passage of a law to return Northwest Texas to the central time zone.

The enforcement of the law was placed with the Interstate Commerce Commission. But no order to change the time was issued by the commission until recently. When the Santa Fe Railway published a new time card for the Plains division March 27th, no order to change the time had been received.

When the order was issued by the Commission, no date was fixed for the change of time. As the Santa Fe had under consideration a new time card at the time the order was received to go into effect May 1st, it was decided not to issue an extra time card on the Plains and Slaton divisions for the couple of weeks intervening.

On May 1st, Clovis, New Mexico, again becomes the dividing point between the central and mountain time zones. All trains on the Plains division from Waynoka to Clovis and on the Slaton division from Sweetwater to Clovis and Canyon will be operated on central time after May 1st, 1921.

#### ELECTION ORDERED ON SCHOOL TAX RATES

**THE PRESS MEETING**

The meeting of the Panhandle Press Association at Amarillo Friday and Saturday was the greatest meeting ever held by the association. The boys and girls of the press were there, almost every paper in the entire Panhandle being represented.

Amarillo certainly put out the very best she possessed for the entertainment of the press gang—and sent to Havana for a little extra treat—some roasting ears on the cob, although maybe perhaps some of the boys might have enjoyed the corn a little more had it been introduced to a distillery.

The program, under the expert management of Frank R. Jamison, was the best ever made for a country publisher, and everything went over with a snap.

The visit to the Great West Mill and the Nissleys Creamery were greatly enjoyed, especially the latter where free access to a huge tub of butter milk and huge bricks of ice cream constituted a part of the entertainment.

Congressman Marvin Jones sprung a surprise by giving a fine dinner Friday night, although he was unable to leave his duties in Washington. Jones was forthwith elected to the presidency, or any other job to which he aspires, so far as the newspaper folks are concerned.

The Board of City Development, with Secretary Bill Estes in charge, passed out free tickets for hotel bills, shows, taxi and street car rides, to the golf club, to the gun club, and for the taxi ride to the hotel upon the return to Amarillo in 1922. It is no wonder that the vote was unanimous to return to Amarillo next year.

Col. Ernest O. Thompson put on the last big stunt of the convention by giving a luncheon Saturday noon. Mr. Thompson explained the big hotel he is going to build in Amarillo and cordially invited the convention to meet on the roof garden next year.

Dr. J. J. Taylor, State Press of the Dallas News, was a distinguished guest and greatly delighted the ordinary country publisher in the two talks he made to the association.

Señ Holman of Hereford was elected president, R. H. Nichols, vice president, and Frank R. Jamison, secretary-treasurer, with next year's meeting in Amarillo.

It is interesting to note the change that has taken place in the material filling the columns of the big farm and stock journals. Whereas the beef cow was the principal subject of treatment for a few months and years ago, today the dairy cow has usurped the throne and is given the chief space in these journals. The beef cow is the product of the big ranch, which has about passed out of existence. The dairy cow is the basis of national prosperity in so much as no agricultural section is safe unless this prosperity is founded upon the individual farmer. The dairy cow, the hog and the chicken have jumped into national importance in the past ten years, and will greatly increase in importance as the demands for food stuffs increases with the big population growth. The farmer who neglects or overlooks the dairy cow, the hog and the poultry lot will find it mighty hard to get credit with his banker and will note in the passing years that the man who pays special attention to these money makers will greatly outstrip him in prosperity. Let Randall county become the great dairy, hog and poultry section of this Panhandle section.

Editor L. P. Loomis of the Canadian Record is a statistics wizard. He delves deep into the secrets of any

question which he attempts to dissect. Whether you happen to agree with him or not, you must respect his logic and the way in which he approaches his subject. There has been considerable newspaper talk during the past few years regarding the division of Texas. Most writers advocate the division because they are mad about one thing and another. Loomis is the only man who has presented facts and figures which are authentic, reliable and certainly convincing. Last week he devoted four columns to a discussion of this subject, presenting figures from the states of Kansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico to compare with the Panhandle-Plains section. We shall take pleasure in reproducing his article at an early date.

Notwithstanding the youth of its editor and publisher, The Randall County News is getting to be an old-timer. It recently passed its quarter of a century milestone and that's venerable so far as Plains newspapers go. While there are very few older papers in this section, it is also true that there are no better ones. 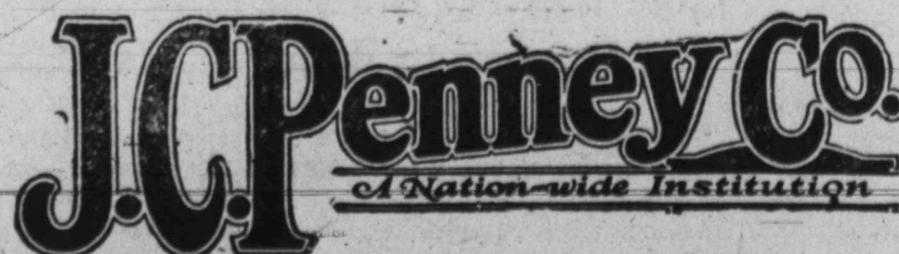

**Clarendon Has Nature Freaks**

A recent issue of the Panhandle Herald recounts the fact that a miniature earthquake happened in the new oil field near there in March 1917. Since this announcement has been made, local old time citizens are able to recall a number of similar instances of where the earth became "freaky." Several years ago a large body of land amounting to several acres suddenly sank some distance east of Memphis. A bunch of cattle had been held on this particular spot the night before, and the cow boys of that early day were dubious of traveling over that section for several years. Again just a few years ago a small body of land sank in the field of the Chas. Johnson ranch some fifteen miles southwest of town. Right near town to the northwest may be seen a large sink on the Dr. Gray place. Large trees are to be seen growing in the sink. Sinks may have been caused by water washing away the gyp or soft limestone; but we have yet another freak of a more extensive nature to consider. Some three miles east of town for several miles running in a north and south direction may yet be readily seen a crack in the earth. This happened during a night in the year 1908. The crack opened without disturbing anyone and yet it was from six inches to three feet in width. Some, by way of investigation, dropped large rocks down the crevice only to hear them bounding for several minutes. In some sandy places the crevice did not show plainly. If this freak of nature or terrestrial phenomena is any indication of either gas or oil, then we have it in Donley county.—Clarendon News.

After practicing for fifty years, however (in spite of her ten children), her sight failed, and for some years she has lived on the verge of starvation, refusing the invitation of the public charity authorities to enter the pauper's home.

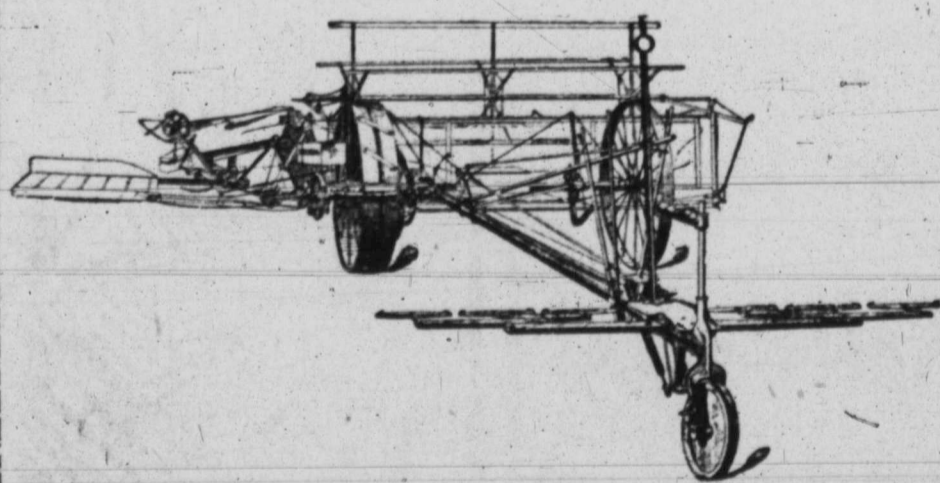

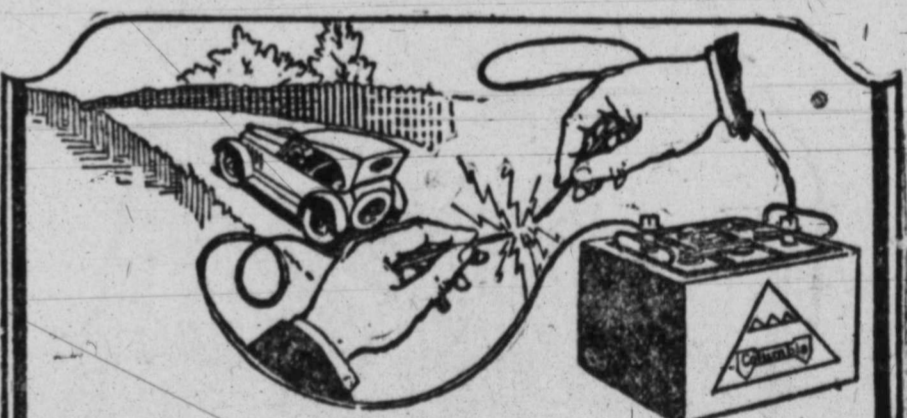

Senate Joint Resolution No. 4 A Joint Resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas amending Sections of the Constitution of the State of Texas as follows: Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, relative to the compensation of executive officers; and Section 24, Article 3, relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature; of said State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, and Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary not to exceed Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture.

Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same, and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, and no more.

Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold his office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and, from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power, or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, toll, freight, or wharfage, not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of all such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor or other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary not to exceed Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$7,500.00) Dollars, and no more.

Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, and the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, shall each hold office for the term of two years, and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary not to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, and no more; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office; and perform such other duties as are or may be required of him by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive for their own use, any fees, costs or prerequisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury.

Section 24. Mileage and per diem: The Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may, from time to time, be provided by law, not exceeding Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per day for each regular session of one hundred and twenty days; and not exceeding Five (\$5.00) Dollars per day for the remainder of such session; and provided, further, that Members of the Legislature shall not receive not to exceed Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per day for each special session of the Legislature that may be called from time to time by the Governor. In addition to the compensation above provided for, the Members of the House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government which mileage shall be ten cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct travel by land regardless of railroads and water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by such table the mileage of each Member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election these amendments shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words: "Official Ballot." "For the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of

the State of Texas providing for compensation of executive officers." "Against the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers." "Official Ballot." For the amendment of Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature of the State of Texas." "Against the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature of the State of Texas."

Those voters who favor such amendments shall erase by marking a line through the words "against the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election; and

Those who favor such amendment relating to the mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature shall erase by marking through the words "Against the amendment of Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of the members of the Legislature of the State of Texas." Those who oppose such amendment relating to mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature shall erase by marking through the words "for the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of the members of the Legislature of the State of Texas." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.

Sec. 3. If a majority of the votes cast in the election herein provided for should be in favor of the amendments proposed, the maximum sum named herein shall become effective and be the compensation thereafter to be received by the officials named herein on and after the first day of January, 1922, and so remain until otherwise provided by law, and the compensation so allowed shall be paid out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any fund in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of these amendments and the election to be held hereunder. (A True Copy)

House Joint Resolution No. 11 Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$0.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purpose, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment, and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof; Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: Section 51: The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever, provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and to their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the states served in organization for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas who were in active service during the war between the states and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this section shall not apply to women born since the year 1861, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be en-

itled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this State under any existing law or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (\$0.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied, and provided further that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all voters shall have printed or written on their ballots: "For amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows who have been a resident of this State since January 1, 1910," and "Against amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers and their widows."

Sec. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general funds of this State not otherwise appropriated for expenses of publications and elections thereunder. (A True Copy)

Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 Proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by providing that only native-born or naturalized citizen of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and permitting either the husband or the wife to pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive receipt therefor. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the Fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting." And all those opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, "Against

the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution, and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election. (A True Copy)

House Joint Resolution No. 30 Relating to the amending of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the prison system under the supervision, management and control of such officer or officers as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Sec. 2. The above constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "For the amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "Against the Amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Sec. 4. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. (A True Copy)


