McLeRoy Sizes Farm Outlook Up; Cites Trend to Cotton

Outgoing Castro County Agent Edd McLeRoy, giving an annual farm report before Tuesday's Lion Club luncheon meeting, told members that 420,000 acres of land in the county is under cultivation.

McLeRoy said that of this acreage under cultivation a large portion is planted in cotton. The some 70,000 acres in cotton is probably the largest acreage ever allocated to this crop in the history of the county, he added. He also said that cotton under irrigation should average over one-half bale per acre.

Approximately 35000 Acres of Wheat To Be Harvested In County In 1953

The 1953 wheat harvest in Castro county is in full swing and approximately 35,000 acres to be harvested will be in the elevators within the next two weeks if weather permits, according to County Agent Edd McLeRoy.

County irrigated wheat should average 25-30 bushels per acre while dry land wheat that will be harvested will bring about seven bushels per acre, the county agent indicated. A number of irrigated and fertilized fields of wheat will cut from 40 to 60 bushels per acre, McLeRoy added.

George Bradford, who owns a farm ten miles west of Dimmitt, has 90 acres of Wichita and Western wheat. Bradford, along with other wheat growers over the area will help keep the high quality of seed for those who continue to raise the crop, McLeRoy surmised.

Other farmers in the county such as, Clyde Renfro, J. Boston, Earl Cole, W. W. Gilbreath, Jack Summers and many more, will have wheat that will pass the 40 bushel per acre mark and in some instances reach 60 to 70 bushels to the acre.

Most of the wheat that is being

ing hauled here is being placed in government loan at \$2.08 per bushel. Average moisture content for wheat brought to Dimmitt is reported at 14 1/2 percent.

Word from Horace Blagg at the PMA office here is that farmers on land on which no wheat was seeded for any of the years 1951, 1952 and 1953 may apply for a 1954 wheat allotment. He added that to be considered for an allotment on a farm which had no wheat seeded for any of those years, the farmer must apply in writing to the PMA committee by June 30 of this year. Blank application forms are available at the county PMA office for use in filing for allotments.

Other lucky winners who received prizes were: Paul Brooks, who won a bench grinder; W. N. Curry, half-inch electric drill (which was returned and sold for \$50); Jack Stuard, Sunbeam Mixer; and Edward Armstrong, Sunbeam Coffee-maker.

Other features of the "highly successful" event were a cake walk, Progressive "42", bingo and musical entertainment.

The celebration was planned by the Hart Progressive HDC to raise funds, decorate and furnish the new hut, which was recently moved to its present location near the school.

In a telegram to the News Tuesday it was learned that Dr. R. E. Cogswell, who has been taking some specialized training at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., will return to Dimmitt this week end.

Dr. Cogswell stated in the telegram, which was dated in Nebraska City, Neb., that he would be at his office for practice Saturday, June 20 at 9 a. m. The doctor telephoned county commissioners last week that he would try to bring another physician with him to set up private practice here.

Dr. Cogswell left Dimmitt in early May and was to be away about six months, but due to the resignation of Dimmitt's only remaining physician, Dr. Jerry Culwell, he notified county commissioners he would return here.

Pendleton Trains At Camp Rucker, Ala.

Camp Rucker, Ala.—Private George Pendleton of Dimmitt has arrived at Camp Rucker to undergo initial military training.

Inducted into the Army in March and processed at Ft. Sill, Okla., he will receive basic training from the 47th "Viking" Infantry Division here.

During his course of training he will follow a rigorous schedule including a wide range of military subjects from military courtesy and field sanitation to machine gun and bazooka familiarization.

After completing eight to 16 weeks of primary training, the recent inductee will be eligible for reassignment for further infantry or specialized training.

The 47th Division, first permanent assignment for the new soldier, is commanded by Maj. Gen. Robert L. Dulaney. The Division is composed of men from all 48 states and three territories.

Work Starts On 9th County Gin

Work on Castro county's ninth cotton gin, which is being constructed one and one-half miles west of the Flag community at an approximate cost of \$100,000, started Wednesday with the laying of the structure's foundation.

Owners of the new gin, which will employ the Murray system, are Glen Huls of the Stamford Builders Supply and Floyd Lindsey of the Great Plains Life Insurance Company of Lubbock. The building will be made of steel and will house all-steel machinery. Four 80-saw gin stands will be in operation when the structure is completed around the first of September.

Tom Davis of the Flag Community will supervise construction of the gin and serve as general manager when it is completed. Dimmitt's third gin, which was started the latter part of March, is slated for completion the first week in September. W. H. Brown of the Brown Gin Company of Levelland and Martin, also of Levelland, are building the gin at an estimated cost of \$150,000. They are co-owners of the new gin here.

Wills Declines Position Here

Hood Wills, former Ochitree County Agent named to succeed County Agent Edd McLeRoy last week, has decided against taking the post, according to County Judge Robert Estes.

Judge Estes said he talked to District Extension Agent Knox Parr of Amarillo by telephone late last week, at which time he was advised that Wills declined to take the job. Parr said he would locate another person to fill the vacancy created when McLeRoy resigned here last week and recommend him for consideration at the next meeting of county commissioners on Monday, June 22.

McLeRoy, who served as county agent for the past two years, resigned in favor of entering business with a local firm. His resignation becomes effective Saturday. He reportedly will assume his new duties Monday.

County commissioners were high in their praise of McLeRoy and expressed regret over his decision to quit.

McClesky and his family were to move to Dimmitt this week. He reportedly has already assumed his new duties.

2 Local Residents Seriously Injured In Highway Crash

Mr. and Mrs. Troy Langford of Dimmitt suffered serious injuries over the weekend when their car crashed into the side of a truck, driven by an unidentified Mexican, two and one-half miles north of Springlake on Highway 51, according to Langford's father, Lawson Langford, who was notified shortly after the accident occurred.

The victim's father, who also lives here, said both Langford and his wife were taken to the hospital at Amherst by a passer-by where they were given emergency treatment. Both suffered cuts about the head in addition to broken right legs. Mrs. Langford is reported in good condition but will remain in the hospital for about six weeks for treatment. Langford was described as in fair condition but still not out of danger. He will be confined to the hospital from six to 12 weeks.

The Langford's 12-month-old son, Freddie Lee, who was lying on the front seat when the wreck happened, suffered minor bruises. He was reported in fine condition.

Investigating state highway patrolmen said the Mexican driver, who entered the United States illegally, was obviously uninjured as he abandoned the truck he was driving and fled the scene of the accident. Patrolmen have been unable to locate him.

The crash occurred Saturday at 11 a. m. when the Mexican, who was driving a one and one-half ton truck, suddenly made a "U" turn directly in front of the Langfords. Langford told patrolmen he was unable to stop his car in time to avoid the collision. The Langsford car, according to his father, struck a corner of the truck bed from the side. The car reportedly was a total loss while the truck was undamaged.

The owner of the truck, a Mexican, has been taken in custody by the officers and is being held in the Littlefield jail.

The Langfords were returning from Lubbock where their oldest son is in the hospital when the accident occurred.

Golf Course Here Is Approved; Club Association Is Organized

One of the first steps toward providing Dimmitt with better recreational facilities was taken here Monday night when local golf enthusiasts met in the chamber of commerce office and voiced approval of a new golf course for the city. The new organization, formed to insure installation of a course, will be known as the Dimmitt Golf Association.

Various committees were appointed and work was to begin this week on a nine-hole course covering 3160 yards. The course, to be located just southeast of the city near the rodeo grounds, will cost in the neighborhood of \$500. The longest hole will run about 450 yards. Greens will consist of cotton seed hulls and oil film.

Officers and committeemen appointed to serve the association are Goldman Dyer, secretary-treasurer; Don Gladman, board chairman; Earl Brock and Dyer, board members; Eldon Singer, Earl Brock, Frank Latimer and William Webb, course committee; B. M. Nelson, Gene Rutledge and P. M. Nelson, membership and finance committee; and Joe Benson, H. D. Griffith and Earl Harrison, rules committee.

Initial membership fees were set at \$10 per family with the understanding that thereafter dues would run \$2 a month per individual, according to Bob Curtin, who kept minutes of the group's meeting. Some \$180 was collected from those in attendance at Monday night's meeting. Curtin added. He said the membership finance committee would endeavor to get at least 50 members which would adequately finance the project.

Curtin pointed out that golf fans that are not familiar with cotton seed hull greens would be interested to know (from reliable sources) that this type green plays as fast as a grass green, although not as pretty as a grass green it offers a comparable game to that played on a grass course, he explained. This is evidenced by the fact that many golf clubs that can't afford grass greens are installing the cotton seed hull type, he said.

Residents who do not play golf, but would like to make Dimmitt a better place in which to live from the standpoint of work and recreation can buy an initial membership of \$10, excluding dues to support the worthwhile project.

A number of persons reportedly have signified their desire to do this for the betterment of the community.

The course will be open to county as well as city residents. It will be completed and ready for play shortly after July 1.

Lots of entertainment is in store. The Lubbock Cotton Exchange will give a complimentary dinner, the oil mills will give a barbecue, and compress groups a luncheon.

A large attendance from the High Plains area is expected to be on hand for the widely-heralded event.

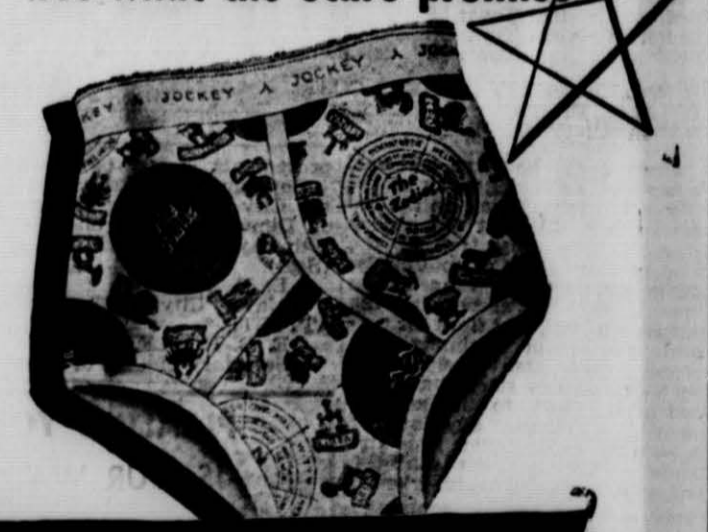

To illustrate, suppose John Doe and his wife have amassed community property worth \$20,000. John wants his wife to be well taken care of during her lifetime. To save an attorney's fee, he writes his own will leaving everything to his wife. He dies soon thereafter and his wife dies six years later. The federal estate taxes on his one-half of the \$20,000 estate amount to \$4,800. When the wife dies her estate is worth her original one-half of \$20,000 (\$10,000) plus the estate she inherited from her husband, \$95,200. The federal estate tax on this is \$19,040.
