The turning yellow of leaves of maple trees in Amarillo and the surrounding country is caused by a disease known as "chlorosis" according to information contained in a letter receved by County Agent Harmon Benton from J. J. Taubenhaus, chief of the Division of Plant Pathology and Physiology of the Texas A. & M. College. THE CROOKEDEST RAILROAD IN THE WORLD.

THE Mount Tamalpais and Muir Woods raifway runs from Mill Valley, California, to the top of Mount Tamalpais-the guardian of our famous Golden Gate, the entrance to San Francisco bay. This miniature railway is but 20 miles long. The longest plece of straight track is 413 feet. It contains 281 curves. In one place the track parallels itself five times in a little more than 300 feet-forming an almost perfect double bow-knot. So crooked is this line that if all the curves were continuous, they would make 42 complete circles. It is one of the most wonderful pieces of engineering on the American continent.

The curious looking, oil-burning locomotive squirms its way tail first, pushing the train up the tortuous track, on a grade averaging six feet to the hundred, to the summit, 2,592 feet

above the valley below. The reason for it all is, of course, the view from the top of this peak which stands on the very edge of the U. S. A. Here, the eye, in one farof mountains, forest, bay, island, city and sea, lying between the Slerra mountains and the Pacific ocean which, 'the said, is not surpassed from the summit of any other mountain peak in the world. -

Worth mentioning in passing, too, is the fact that the government recording station here, shows more sunshine per day than any other recording station in this country.

The return trip is made by gravity -the train coasting all the way down.

Dancing in Haiti.

Dancing to the music of a drum, saxophone and flute is the chief source of amusement for Haitians in their little villages on Saturday night, according to an article by William Almon Wolff in Collier's. Beginning at sundown every Saturday night, he writes, one will come to a wine shop, if one follows the sound of the drum, The drummer sits outside. His unceasing drumming marks the rhythm of the music; what melody there is, is borne. by a flute, and almost always there is a saxophone. The music is the same at every dance. It is in common tone; a single cadence is repeated, over and over again.

Dancing in Haiti resembles the saturnalia among the Australian aborigines, Mr. Wolff writes. The dancers are frank and unashamed and one gets little or no feeling of a personal note between the two one sees dancing; rather they are staging a spectacle.

Known as Laziest of Birds. The laziest of birds is the frogmouth. He sleeps all day, and at night, instead of flying about in search of food, he sits on a limb and literally waits for the insects to come and feed him. He is such a sound sleeper that you can push him off his perch with a stick and not wake him. He inhabits Australia and the Islands of the Indian ocean. In size the frogmouth resembles the whippoorwill, and gets his name from his wide mouth, which serves as his insect trap. Too lazy to fly for his food, like other birds, he crawls along the limb of a tree, opening his wide mouth and snapping it shut, catching what files and gnats come within his range. At night he perches with his mate on the roofs of houses, on fences, or stumps. Only after the sun goes down does he show any inclination to move about.

Petroleum in Mexican Lake. For hundreds of years Mexican Indians had a horror of what they called the pest spot of Lake Chapala, near shore at Tizapan. They would not bathe in it or sail around it, declaring that the water was oily. Then, after a time, they cautiously began to paint oden boats with this oil, which proved so effective in keeping out the water that it became the general custom to use it. Lazy or inefficient folk are seldom at a loss for self-justification of this sort. Some of us can remember the oldfashioned country storekeeper who used to spend most of his time sitting on a box whittling or gossiping with the loafers when he should have been studying his business. This cheerful soul held the same views as the slack housekeeper.

But we do not see much more of old-fashioned, happy-go-lucky country merchant. -He has long ago been put out of business by his enterprising competitor who learned the value of good bookkeeping.

The answer to those who would shirk home account-keeping is simply this: You cannot plan your affairs with any certainty unless you know about them, and you cannot know about them unless you keep records of them.


