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DIFFERENCE OF OPINION

Last week Amarillo threatened to divert all automobile traffic away from Canyon unless certain things were done to improve the highway. At the same time the threat was made, it was almost impossible to get over the streets of Amarillo from the paving to the Randall county line, owing to bad washouts on Amarillo property and lack of dragging.

The same day that Canyon received the threat from Amarillo the Plainview Evening Herald had the following to say regarding the roads of Randall County:

"The main roads through Randall and Potter counties are in excellent condition despite the recent heavy rains. The commissioners of these counties dragged the roads following the rains. Good culverts have been built and the roads are well drained. There are two bad holes in the road between Plainview and Amarillo, one three miles north of town, and one three miles north of Kress."

Considerable difference of opinion seems to exist. Amarillo is going to cut our friendship and take away our business on account of the roads, while Plainview has always been very profuse in complimenting the way Randall county built and maintained the highway.

A prominent woman of Dallas was killed one day last week in a car accident near that city. While driving she met a big truck whose driver persisted in staying in the middle of the road, and as there was not room enough on either side of the truck her car was forced off into a ditch turning over on her. Recently while driving near Canyon, the editor's car was forced off into a ditch by a big commercial truck, which held to the center of the road. Had the driver turned the truck but two or three feet the passage could have been safely made, and we would have been saved nearly an hour's time getting the car back into the road. The trouble with so many of the big truck drivers is they are ignorant roughnecks who take delight in forcing a good car off into a ditch. The arrogance of those truck drivers is having its effect in the present campaign for modification of the state truck law, and it is pretty safe to say that after next January 1st the big trucks and their hogish roughneck drivers will disappear from the public roads.—Plainview News.

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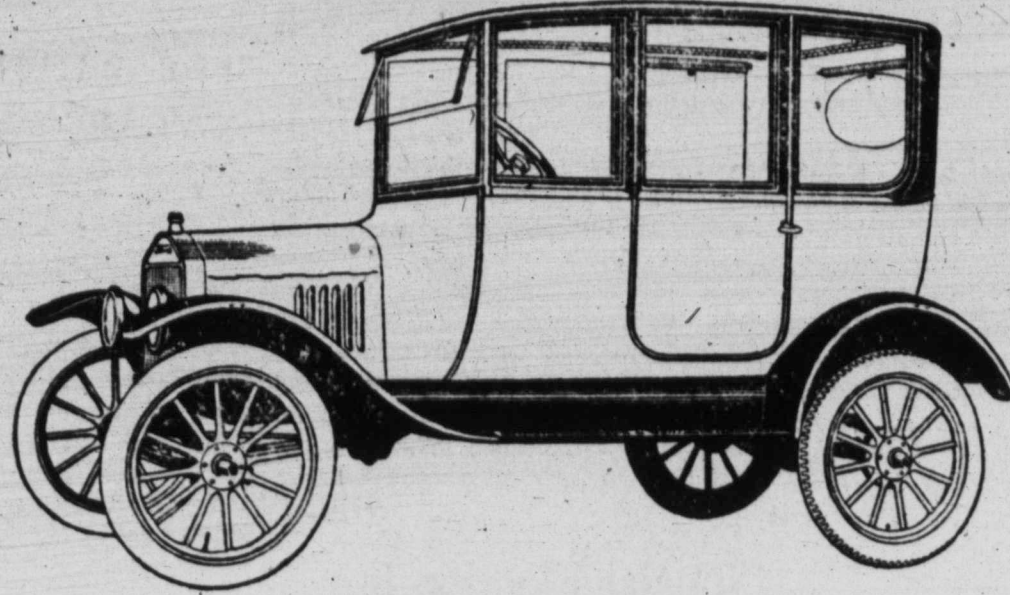

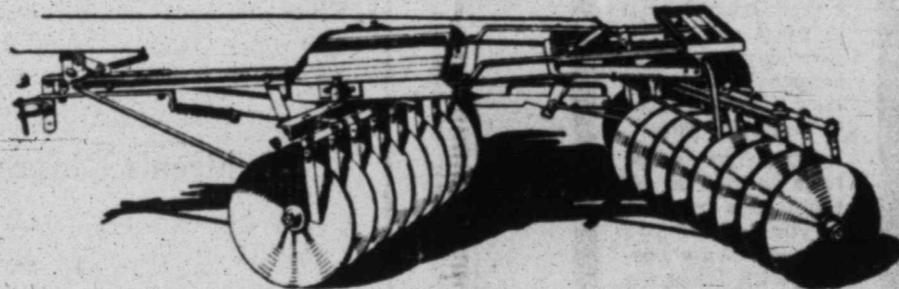

Another Fraud Scheme

Persons who have the habit of paying off hand for parcel post packages delivered C. O. D., without taking the precaution of determining something about the senders, are warned by the Post Office Department to control the habit.
