

BUSINESS SESSION COMMERCIAL LEAGUE TUESDAY

MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN WILL
BE PUSHED THIS WEEK.

Secretary W. A. Warren Reported on
Condition of League—39 Men
Attended Luncheon.

The regular weekly luncheon of the Randall County Commercial League at noon Tuesday was devoted to business affairs of the League, and various matters of interest were discussed by the officers and members present.

President C. H. Jarrett had charge of the meeting. He called upon W. A. Warren, secretary, who had a report upon the financial standing of the League and other matters of importance.

Mr. Warren stated that the League now had on hand \$102.45. There were some membership dues now due and payable.

Mr. Warren was given authority to have new stationery printed for the League, and also to have printed some cards to enclose in letters sent out by the League, advertising the advantages of Canyon.

Mr. Warren urged that a campaign be put on to enroll the men who had signified a desire during the recent community meetings to have membership in the League.

Mr. Warren reported upon the meeting of the Commercial Secretaries which was held Jan. 9. He stated that all of the 16 present were live wires in their different communities and all working for the good of this section. He stated that he derived much benefit in hearing the methods that were used in other towns and commercial organizations. He urged that the members of the Randall County Commercial League keep on the job, that we keep pushing to the front, and get over some of the big things that we have been discussing during our meetings.

C. F. Walker reported that the Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show was offering \$2500 in premiums and that a car load of stuff would go from Randall County to the show. He asked that advertising matter be prepared to go with this exhibit.

H. C. Roffey suggested that each man get some of the official stationery of the League to use when they thought they could help advertise the county.

C. H. Jarrett announced that Sheriff W. C. Black had closed all punch boards in Canyon, a resolution having been adopted at last week's meeting condemning these things.

L. G. Allen volunteered to see members of the Normal faculty for membership in the Commercial League.

C. L. Condry and C. W. Warwick will finish up a canvass of the business houses this week. The membership drive will be continued until all of the people of the county are invited to join. Mr. Warren stated that one farmer told him Friday during the community luncheon that he could get twenty five farmers to join the Commercial League if the dues were set at \$6.00 per year.

Upon motion the dues for farmers were set at \$6.00 per year. The dues for the people of Canyon are \$1.00 per month.

Upon motion the secretary was allowed \$10 per month to pay for his trouble in doing the work he is now doing.

Fred H. Ives called attention to the International Harvester school to be held in Canyon on March 8 and 9 and to the Third Annual Tractor School to be held on March 22-23-24.

President J. A. Hill called attention to the effort being made by Plains towns to get a new railroad from Ft. Worth to the Plains, and what an advantage it would be to Canyon should this railroad come. A committee of L. G. Allen, Mr. Hill and C. W. Warwick, was appointed to present plans next week as to the part Canyon should take in this railroad discussion.

Ives Leader Next Week.
Mr. Jarrett announced that Fred H. Ives would be the leader next Tuesday, and that the luncheon would be held at the Canyon Cafe.

Guard Company To Be Completed Within the Coming Week

The government provides an armory, and will build a rifle range costing about \$6500. The men are paid for the time they put in drilling.

The men enlisted in the several companies in this section are most enthusiastic over the advantages offered by the new national guard organization.

BIG COMMUNITY PROGRAM CLOSED SUNDAY NIGHT: CITIZENS ARE WELL PLEASED WITH THE WEEK'S WORK

COMMUNITY DINNER FRIDAY HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL IN SPITE OF COLD WEATHER; LARGE NUMBERS AT MEETING AT CHURCH

The Community Program held under the auspices of the Randall County Commercial League, closed Sunday night with one of the biggest and best services of the week.

At the close of the meeting, the big congregation stood and extended a most hearty vote of thanks to Capt. C. S. Nusbäum and Prof. W. W. Nusbäum for the work they had put on in Canyon during the week.

All of the expenses of the meeting were met with the collections taken at the various meetings.

The Community Dinner Friday noon was one of the most enjoyable events of the entire week. More than 350 plates were served, and there were large amounts of food left over and sent to various families of the city.

In spite of the bad weather, and cold weather, there was a very good attendance from among the country people at the Community Dinner. Practically every family in Canyon's trade territory was reached by telephone and practically all of them promised to come, but the weather was against a very large attendance from any distance.

The churches were crowded at every meeting at the church from Thursday night on. Many people were forced to leave the building Sunday morning and Sunday night on account of the large crowd who could not get into the building.

At the Sunday afternoon meeting for men, there were 190 men in attendance, and about 150 women.

The meeting Saturday night was highly enjoyable, this being music night. The splendid high school orchestra played several selections, the male quartet sang three numbers, the big chorus sang one number, and Capt. Nusbäum and Prof. Nusbäum sang an extra number of songs on account of the subject up for discussion.

In discussing the needs of Canyon as he saw them, Capt. Nusbäum laid before his audiences several times the greatest needs of Canyon. He was high in his praise of the Normal, and its benefits to the town. He was well pleased with the large number of beautiful homes in Canyon. The court house was praised. The Randall County News was said by the speaker to be one of the best country newspapers he had ever seen. The praised the work of County Agent C. F. Walker.

The pointed out very forcefully the great need of church buildings in Canyon. He did not believe there are too many church organizations here. He stated that he had never found four more wide-awake and enterprising pastors than were working with him in Canyon. They are far above the average. But the great need now is big imposing church buildings.

Mr. Nusbäum highly praised the work that had been accomplished by the Randall County Commercial League, and upon several occasions made strong pleas for every enterprising citizen of Canyon to take membership in this organization. He urged that the scope of the Commercial League be broadened so that it would not cover alone the commercial interests of Canyon and Randall county. He made a direct appeal several times to the farmers to join the Commercial League.

A most crying need of Canyon is a new high school building. Every time he mentioned this need, his words were met with great applause. He suggested that this should be a county high school, as practically all of the citizens of Randall County would be directly benefited by a big high school building in Canyon.

Dr. Nusbäum discussed upon several occasions the curse of the mail order houses, which were taking away from every community, and giving back nothing. He recounted instance after instance of comparing the goods of mail order houses with those handled by local concerns. He urged that people stay with the local merchants who are alone building up their local communities.

He pointed out that there are only two kind of people in this world—lifters, and leasers, and to one lifter there are twenty leasers.

Dr. Nusbäum pointed out a fact that few people ever stop to consider—that

If we are loyal citizens of the United States, we must be loyal citizens of our own communities. The community is no bigger than the individual citizen, neither is this country bigger than the individual citizenship.

The speaker urged that the town and country men get together. Neither can do without the other. The farmers' land would be worth nothing were it not for the market the town offers, and the town would amount to nothing were it not for the product of the farmer. There was never a live town surrounded by a dead country, and neither was there ever a live country surrounding a dead town. The two must work and cooperate together. Whatever builds up the town makes the surrounding country just that much more valuable.

The speaker was glad to hear of the Boy Scout Troop in Canyon, and urged that parents see that their boys were members.

Dr. Nusbäum stated that Canyon was the first town in which he had been that had an American Legion Club. He was highly pleased with the management of the same, but believed that a big Community Club House would be vastly more beneficial to Canyon and Randall County.

By all means put yourself into your community. Get married to it. Do not seek to take from the community, but give to the community, and all will grow together.

JAKE H. HARRISON DEAD.

C. N. Harrison received a message this morning at two o'clock that his father, Jake H. Harrison had died this morning at one o'clock at the family home in San Antonio. Mr. Harrison has been sick for several months, and his death was not unexpected.

Mr. Harrison has visited many times in Canyon at the home of his son, and has many close friends here who are grieved today to hear of his death.

Mr. Harrison gained a wide reputation as a writer of verse, and his works were published in many of the leading newspapers and magazines of the south. This work was interfered with of late years by his bad health.

C. N. Harrison and his sister, Miss Dixie, of Amarillo, left this morning for San Antonio to attend the funeral.

WILL ENTERTAIN WOMEN.

The spirit of the meeting will be that of community service, and is following out the ideas of a closer community understanding that was so forcibly expressed in the Community Program of this week.

The institutions of higher learning in Texas are asking Governor Neff to call a special session of the legislature in order to repeal the very foolish provision of the last legislature that all money appropriated must be spent exactly for the thing named in the appropriation bill. This provision has no place in the bill. The university has about two thousand more students this year than last. Each of the other schools have more students this year than last. The heads of these schools had no idea of the exact amount of money necessary for any particular thing. Changing conditions made necessary a change in expenditures. The legislature bowed to the will of a bunch of small bore politicians in making this provision. This group of men knew that money would no doubt be returned to the state treasury as it would be almost impossible to expend to a cent the different amounts appropriated, and the bills this year forbid the institutions from diverting any moneys, no matter how large or small the amounts may be. No business man can tell two years in advance the exact amount of money that will be necessary to run his business, or any small part of his business. Changing times and changing conditions make necessary changes in the appropriations of every business. Yet the legislature believed that the heads of the institutions could tell two years in advance just the amounts necessary for each and every department under their charge.

We are going to build a new school building in Canyon one of these days. When we do, you good friends of the place where you send your cash, and ask them for a small donation in order that your children may be educated. Just ask them to match the dollars put into that new school building by the merchants of Canyon. If it were not for the merchants of Canyon, your home in Canyon would be worth fifty percent less than the money it took to build it; were it not for the business houses of Canyon, the land of Randall county surrounding Canyon would be worth 75 percent less than you now ask for it. It takes a town to make a prosperous community. The town is the very heart of the commercial interests of the community. There are farm lands in the Panhandle as good or better than the lands surrounding Canyon. These lands go begging at \$10 per acre because they are so far from a town. Land around Canyon is worth \$40 to \$50 per acre. The better and bigger Canyon grows the more the surrounding land is worth. Help build Canyon rather than giving all your money to build Chicago and other big center which are now so big they don't know what to do with all their people.

It was a great inspirational meeting which we had in Canyon last week. People were aroused to the need of community spirit and community cooperation as never before. The great big question now is—What are we going to do about it? Are we going back into the same old rut? Are we going to allow our petty jealousies and bickerings to stand in the way of community development? Are we going to take advantage of the opportunities offered and the suggestions made for the betterment of Canyon? Are we going to just "feel good" over the results of the meeting, and forget all about the great series? The time for action is now. We are glad to say that some action has already started in Canyon taking advantage of the spirit manifested in the week's campaign. Are you going to throw yourself into this community building when approached by community workers? Let's see some genuine good result from this community meeting.

Every civilized man and woman owes it to themselves to be a voter. A poll tax receipt is necessary to go to the polls.

Pay your poll taxes before next Tuesday night. There are vital issues to be decided in Texas this year.

It looks very much like the Washington politicians were going to put over the bonus bill. The fact that it is getting close to election time again is the main consideration for passing the bonus. The News has always been opposed to the bonus bill. We believe that we clearly stated our position when we asserted months ago that the bonus would be a very, very great blessing to possibly 10 percent of the men receiving it, and an absolute curse to the other 90 percent. Furthermore, we do not believe that 10 percent of the men are asking for the bonus, and every one of these fellows are the ones who do not need it, and to whom it would be the greatest curse. The politicians are ignoring the advise of every financier in this country. Politics seems to be the greatest force in American life today.

One of the biggest needs of Canyon today is a big fine school building. But the district must be enlarged before the building is erected. Why should those living outside the boundaries of the district, and who are now getting the benefit of the good school we now have object to paying a little more taxes in order that their children be given the best educational advantages? There is certainly no higher mission in life than giving the young people of this community the best possible educational advantages.

No the Church has not lost its power, nor neglected its opportunities. It is true that a lot of its members have been very sorry members, but the Church is built on Jesus Christ and will prevail. Go to Church Sunday and show that you are willing to do your part to uphold the teachings of the Church.

During the year 1921, there were a total of 19,652 failures, and the majority of them were among non-advertisers. There are going to be a lot more than 19,652 during 1922 unless some business men accept business principles, rather than mere private hobbies.

If you feel that you are above the work of the community, pull up, help lift up the community—or pull out and seek those with whom you are more congenial. Chances are that the fellow who feels above his community is looked upon by the rest of the citizen as pretty much of peanut calibre.

Go to Church Sunday. We are wondering why big strong men often do not take more interest in their churches and the work of the churches. Suppose there were no churches in Canyon. Just how many of us would stay here.

A stranger can come into our community and tell us our needs. But it takes the home people to put over the really big program of community building. Are you a community builder, or a community spirit buster?

Last week we took occasion to brag a little on the weather man and before the last part of the paper was printed, the old cuss sent the mercury down to zero, and held it there until all of us hollered.

France has demanded that Germany pay her war debt. Alright, France, come across with your Uncle Sam. You owe us a terrific debt, and haven't even mentioned paying past-due interest.

It is seldom you find a knocker member of the Randall County Commercial League. The members are all boosters. Join forces and help make Canyon the biggest town in Texas.

This community is no better than you and I. What kind of a community is it? Don't be too self-satisfied with yourself when you answer this question.

A poll tax receipt should be the property of each and every man and woman in Randall county before next Tuesday night.

Plant your faith in Canyon. A beautiful home, or a substantial business house is a good way in which to express that faith.

Join the Randall County Commercial League. Help put over the things in Canyon that should be put over.

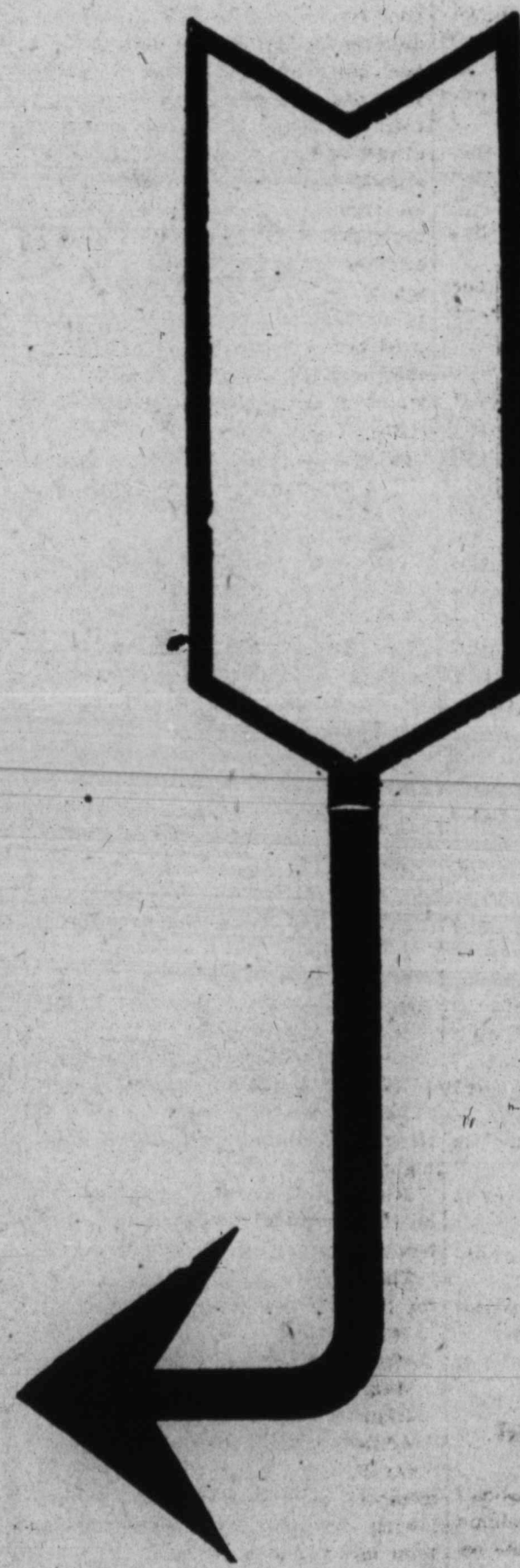



Law Enforcement:

The Governor of our state with many of our best and purest citizens is pleading for a rally to the cause of law enforcement and civic righteousness.

The pulpits, the courts, the schools and the press are urged to propagate the doctrine of obedience to constituted authority.

The unruly and disobedient child makes the law breaking adult. The child who is compelled to recognize parental authority and conform to home regulations will become a good school citizen and grow into a man or woman who is considerate of the rights of others.

The prime and almost only purpose

of the school is to make good citizens of its pupils—citizens who can and will fill their respective places as they are called to service in their communities. The school forces accept the responsibility and undertake, to do their part in this great work, but the home cannot shirk its part and give the child a fair chance.

The teacher attempts to not only instruct in the text books but inculcate the principles of cleanliness, truthfulness, reverence and usefulness, hoping to thus reinforce the like teachings at home, but too often she finds no foundations lain upon which to build these better qualities and must undo many evil characteristics already acquired.

Parents encourage stealing by allowing their children to bring home and keep an article purported to have been found.

They encourage lying and slander when they have open ears to their children's accusations of unfair and harsh treatment by teachers unless they will get in touch with the teacher and find out the other side of the question.

They encourage rebellious and childish lawlessness when they censure the acts of the teachers before the children with out first making an intelligent investigation of the facts connected with the matter complained of.

Many parents are doing these very things, thoughtlessly, no doubt, but just as surely as if they were positively teaching that these childish crimes were of no consequence. As a result throughout the land in all our schools and in almost every grade we find boys and girls, many of mature age, who will steal, who will cheat, who will lie, who will slander and who are as ready to combine with the spirit of the Bolshevik or the anarchist against any authority which proposes to cur-

tail the trend of their misconduct.

Who is to blame? The school? Yes. The community? Yes. The home? Yes.

In what stratum of society? In all. No home is so safe that it should not be guarded; no family so well bred but evil influences must be combated.

Parents, teachers, while the crime wave is sweeping our country and our leaders are trying to protect the honor of our state against those who regard no rights or privileges of others and while they are trying to protect the property and lives of our citizens, may we not get busy in our own homes and our own schools and raise our boys and girls so that there will be no danger of their swelling the forces of lawlessness and crime.

Canyon is a good place but she has furnished her quota of criminals, boys and girls who only a few years ago were as innocent as our little folks now in our schools but whose character building was improperly supervised at home and school and as a consequence drifted into evil and actual crime.

Again let me say if good wholesome home and school laws are enforced now few courts will be needed in 10 years from now.

If neglected we shall reap a fearful harvest in our disappointed homes and in the life failures of our children.
