VISITING PASTORS LUNCHEONED AT NORMAL TUESDAY

PRESIDENT J. A. HILL TELLS OF SCHOOL'S PLANS.

Christian Ideals Taught in the Class Rooms—Sympathy and Cooperation Desired from Churches.

More than twenty pastors of the Methodist church of the Plainview and Amarillo districts were present at the regular study circle of the district, which is being held this year under the supervision of Presiding Elder Hardy. The meeting was one of the most successful and interesting the pastors have ever held.

Rev. H. B. Watts of Lockney, preached at the meeting Monday night. The study circle was held throughout Tuesday.

Tuesday noon, the visiting pastors, and men members of the faculty were entertained for luncheon served by the domestic science department of the Normal. Tuesday evening the members of the local Methodist church entertained the visiting pastors and members of the church at the church, supper being served by a committee.

At the close of the luncheon Tuesday at the Normal, President J. A. Hill was introduced by Rev. J. H. Hicks, pastor of the local Methodist church, who addressed the visitors, telling of the work of the West Texas State Normal College.

In a brief talk he told the visitors what he would like to have them do for the young people of the school and for the school itself. Mr. Hill was highly pleased to have the ministers as guests at the school on account of the work and the church which they represented. He recognized that the Methodist church had a great problem in Canyon and wanted to see the entire church working together for its solution.

Mr. Hill made it very plain that he wanted the church to work with the school on a constructive plan. The Normal has always stood for Christian ideals. Mr. Hill believes that in the effort to divorce church and state, we have gone too far and divorced religion and government. He would like to see real religion in state affairs.

The state institutions are not shutting out religions from their plans. It is the constant purpose of the members of the Normal faculty to keep Christian ideals before the students. Training for Christian service is the great mission of the teacher training school. No teacher is well prepared to teach who does not embody every day in his or her work the essentials of Christian religion. Without Christian, they are not prepared for leadership. When the school sends out teachers, it wants them trained for Christian leadership.

Mr. Hill stated that the school welcomed cooperation of the churches. Sometimes the school had been criticised. The school was opened to constructive criticism. But most criticism had been mere lambasting on the part of some denominations. It is (Continued on last page)

Getting Ready for a Great Meeting During Farmers Short Course

Plans are rapidly developing for the Farmers Short Course which will be held in Canyon on Thursday and Friday, March 9 and 10.

Good Rain of More Than Half Inch Falls Early Yesterday A. M.

A rain amounting to practically an inch fell in the Canyon territory yesterday morning about one o'clock. This was the first rain we have had for several weeks.

The rain was one of the hardest this country has had in years, being accompanied by a high wind, and the water, accompanied by some hail, falling in sheets. The rain lasted only about forty-five minutes.

The rain was accompanied by thunder and lightning. It is rather remarkable to have such a great amount of thunder and lightning at this time of the year. Furthermore, it was rather unheard of to see yesterday morning dawn clear and as warm as a summer day. At this time of year any moisture is followed by severely cold weather.

The rain was heavier around Canyon than in any direction from which reports have come in.

But Cold Weather Came. However, it turned cold during last night, and with a north wind this morning the thermometer stood at 20 degrees above zero.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT PLANS WILL BE PRESENTED NEXT TUESDAY AT THE COMMERCIAL LEAGUE LUNCHEON

The women of Canyon will have charge of the program at the regular weekly luncheon of the Randall County Commercial League next Tuesday.

Civic Improvements will be discussed, an organization perfected for the purpose of putting over some constructive civic improvement work in Canyon.

The leader for next Tuesday will be Mrs. C. W. Warwick.

Mrs. T. V. Reeves will report to the Commercial League the suggestions offered at the civic improvement meeting last Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. C. R. Burrow will discuss civic aims.

C. F. Walker will discuss dairy and milk inspection.

This will be followed by the formulation of plans for work in Canyon and perfecting such an organization as may be decided upon.

There was a good attendance at the civic improvement meeting held at the court house last Thursday afternoon. Practically every club in Canyon was represented, and all those present were very highly pleased with the prospects of seeing some real constructive work undertaken in the city.

Mrs. S. L. Ingham was elected temporary chairman and Mrs. T. V. Reeves secretary.

Among those who spoke at the meet-

ing along lines they would like to see undertaken were F. P. Guenther, Mrs. C. W. Warwick, Mrs. L. G. Allen, A. W. Blough and J. M. Vetesk. These persons talked of various ideas of civic improvements, among them being more flowers, trees, cheaper water rates, forbidding hogs in the city limits, forcing that chickens be kept up, use of containers for trash and rubbish.

It was moved that a civic improvement club be organized, and the following committee was appointed to present plans: D. A. Shirley, Mrs. C. W. Warwick, J. M. Vetesk, Miss Hudspeth.

It was decided to ask that the joint meeting be held with the Commercial League at the regular weekly luncheon time on Tuesday, February 28. This request was granted by C. H. Jarrett, president of the Commercial League.

The arrangement committee for next Tuesday's program was appointed with the following members: Mrs. D. A. Shirley, Mrs. A. J. Arnold, Dr. F. M. Wilson.

The luncheon will be held at the Canyon Cafe next Tuesday at 12:00 o'clock. Manager C. L. Condry requests that all be as nearly on time as possible, and he is making arrangements to quickly serve the large numbers who are expected to attend this luncheon.

District Court Will Open Next Monday The Spring Session

The spring session of the District Court will open next Monday at the Court House at ten o'clock a. m.

Judge Henry S. Bishop will be here to preside over the session. He has appointed W. J. Flesher as district attorney for the term, taking the place of W. H. Childers, who is ill in Amarillo.

The grand jury will be empaneled Monday morning and start its investigation.

The docket for the term will likely be quite heavy, owing to the fact that there are several booze cases to come up and these will take a lot of time.

TESTS MADE FOR TUBERCULOSIS AMONG REGISTERED HERDS

Dr. W. M. Hobdy, representing the government, was here Friday and Saturday and made tests of registered herds for tuberculosis.

Three dairy cows and a bull were found affected in the herd of A. B. Haynes. These were at once removed from the herd and will be shipped out.

A bull was found affected in the herd of P. D. Hanna and will be shipped.

Two cows were found in the C. O. Keiser herd, both of which were killed and burned.

One cow was found in the W. F. Jameson dairy herd. She was taken out of the herd and will be shipped with those from the Haynes and Hanna herds.

The government pays the owners of registered stock \$100 when an animal is found affected with tuberculosis, and requires that the one affected shall either be killed and burned, or shipped out as canners. This is having the desired effect in cleaning up the herds of the country, and all are getting freer of tuberculosis. Tests are required every six months.

HEREFORD SHERIFF WARNED

Sheriff C. S. Purcell received a warning Thursday morning signed by the Ku Klux Klan in which the Sheriff was warned against his activities in certain lines. The Sheriff did not believe the warning to come from the Klan but from bootleggers, or perhaps practical jokers.

School Election Will Be Held March 18 For Consolidation

The petition asking for the consolidation of the Canyon Independent School District and the common school districts Nos. 2 and 18 was signed up by Friday afternoon and presented to Judge Worth A. Jennings Saturday morning.

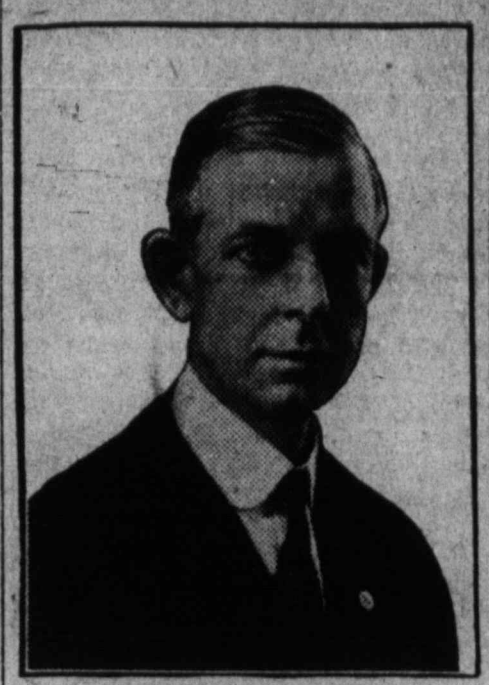
Judge Jennings has ordered the election to be held on Saturday, March 18th at which time the residents of the two districts will vote upon the proposition of coming into the district, and the voters of the present independent school district will vote upon the question of receiving them into the districts.

The petition asking for the election bears the names of a very large majority of the voters in the two common school districts, and it was emphasized that no serious opposition will arise as the people of these districts realize the great advantage that will come from this consolidation for the children of the districts.

DISCONTINUE SEXTON JOB

At the meeting of the Commissioners Court Friday, it was found that all of the available cemetery fund had been exhausted, and it was voted to discontinue the position as sexton of the cemetery. W. H. McCorkle has been sexton for about a year.

THE WEST TEXAS CHAMBER COM'CE JOINED BY MANY

B. F. BENNETT TALKED TUESDAY AT LUNCHEON.

More Than Twenty Members Secured in Canyon for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The Commercial League Luncheon Tuesday at the Canyon Cafe was given over to B. F. Bennett, representative of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, who made a very pleasing address on the merits of his organization. He told of what they are doing in other parts of the Panhandle and hoped for a good sized membership from Canyon.

Mr. Bennett stated that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce was second in size only to the United States Chamber of Commerce which has a membership of something like 45000; while the West Texas Chamber has a membership of over 7000.

Last year the Cotton Palace Show at Galveston offered a prize of \$1000 for the best exhibit from Texas. Mr. Bennett stated that the State was divided into four sections, East, Central, South and West Texas. And when the judges came to award the prize, they unanimously gave it to West Texas.

Mr. Bennett was very profuse in his praise of the West Texas State Normal College, and urged the people of Canyon to get behind President Hill and push for appropriations that Mr. Hill has plans for. He stated that as representative of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that he would guarantee that body to get behind any movement, for the betterment of the College and send representatives to Austin to help fight for the needed appropriations.

He also pledged the organization in making efforts to secure better shipping conditions, in getting better freight rates and securing cars during the car shortage in the grain shipping season.

Mr. Bennett stated that his organization was not putting on a fight against any other organization, but rather wanted to co-operate with the organizations that now exist in the Panhandle.

He stated that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention would be held at Plainview in May, and issued an invitation to the Commercial League to attend the convention.

Mr. Bennett stated that he was here to secure new members and asked for a committee to assist him in this work. President Jarrett and Secretary Warren were with him Tuesday afternoon and they report that something over twenty members have already taken membership in the organization.

COUSINS NOT RETAINED IN HOUSTON SCHOOLS

The following taken from a recent issue of the Houston Chronicle will be read with interest throughout the portion of Texas, for Dr. Cousins was not only state superintendent of public instruction for a number of terms but later became president of the West Texas State Normal College at Canyon and held that place through a trying period in the history of the institution, including the burning and reconstruction of the college plant.

"The city school board, at a special meeting held Friday afternoon at the University Club, decided to notify Superintendent H. B. Cousins that his employment as head of the public schools will cease at the end of the present school term on June 1.

"Professor Cousins was elected as the temporary successor of Prof. P. W. Horn by the school board last September, when Superintendent Horn resigned to go to the American school in Mexico City.

"Professor Cousins said Saturday afternoon that he had not been notified of the action of the school board."

FARM BOOKKEEPING WILL BE DISCUSSED HERE NEXT MONDAY

M. M. Laugherty of the Extension Service of the A. and M. College, will be in Canyon next Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock for the purpose of presenting the subject of farm bookkeeping.

Mr. Laugherty will present a very simple system of bookkeeping which will aid the farmer in determining what it costs him to produce a bushel of wheat, a bushel of oats, a ton of hay, a pound of butter, a dozen of eggs and a pound of meat.

The churches of Northwest Texas are recognizing Canyon as the most important city in this section so far as religious work is concerned. There is a great work to be done with the hundreds of the best boys and girls of this great Panhandle-Plains country coming to Canyon every year. Perhaps there are too few of our own citizens who thoroughly appreciate the importance of the Canyon, and the life of the community. Too few perhaps are unaware of the great responsibilities that rest upon the shoulders of our citizenship. The members of the Canyon churches should awaken to the necessity of a great building program for the city. There is need right now of four good church buildings in Canyon. We cannot expect the church body outside of Canyon to get up much enthusiasm for our needs in Canyon until we show some disposition to help ourselves. When the churches of Canyon should the right progressive building determination, there is certain to be sufficient help from the outside to complete the building program of every denomination in Canyon.

Canyon certainly needs a dairy inspection ordinance. What is the use to wait until there is an epidemic of typhoid, or a number of cases of tuberculosis developed before taking steps which will eliminate these dangers? There is less danger of contracting tuberculosis from milk brought from large herds than from milk bought where the owner has a single cow, as the large dairy will likely have only one or two diseased cows, whereas the owner of a single cow may find that his one cow is badly infected, and his customers therefore be using all of their milk supply from an infected source, whereas the milk from the infected cows in the big herds is mixed in with other milk free from disease and the danger thereby lessened. Canyon has been talking about dairy inspection for two years. Why wait any longer? Is it necessary that death shall take some of our citizens before we are inclined to do something?

There is going to be a big acreage of cotton planted on the plains this year. It seems that the movement broke out strong all over this section, and farmers of every county are planning to put in a cotton crop. Those who have watched cotton raising in this section are certain that it will be a paying crop. It does not have to be chopped, thus eliminating a slow and costly part of the raising cost. It does not grow rank and invite infection from the boll weevil, as is the case in central Texas. The weevil has spread so that farmers of this section believe that cotton is going to be produced only in small quantities in the central part of the state until the pest is destroyed. They figure that cotton is the best gamble for the Plains country this year since there is little or no chance for a wheat crop.

The next time you want to pay the preacher any of the money—that rightfully belongs to the work of the Lord, why not get dramatic about it. Mask up, and march into the church four or five at a time. Why be ordinary about such a thing? Of course the preacher ought to appreciate having his services broken up by the appearance of a masked mob at his service. At any rate, the Lord ought to give double credit for such acts, as the fellows who are giving the money have likely been cheating and robbing Him of His just payments for the past twenty years.

The Harding administration is certainly doing everything within its power to wreck the civil service of this government. In postoffice appointments that have so far been made in this section, not a single applicant receiving the highest grade has been appointed to the office. The republican candidate has always been the second or third man, and has always received the appointment.

Canyon has built many homes during the past year, and is continuing to build a large number in spite of the close financial times. A good home is always a good investment. Build a home in Canyon this year.

Landis has resigned from the federal bench and will devote his whole time to the job of baseball commissioner. The judge does not state whether it was on account of the furor his dual position created in congress and among the law profession that he decided to resign, but possibly this had its effect. Judge Landis has always been a great judge. There is no question but that his role as baseball commissioner took away from his efficiency as federal judge, and therefore it is better that he resign.

The city daily newspapers have great sport making fun of the country rubes, but all of the crop is not found in the rural and small town districts. A professional touched the people of Boston last fall for several thousand by wild promises of great return on their investments. Now comes the story of a similar raid made by a fellow in Chicago. No, the "easy marks" are about as plentiful in the cities as in the country.

D. B. Hill of Shamrock has announced that he will be a candidate for the speaker of the house of representatives when the legislature meets. Lee Satterwhite is also a candidate for this office. It looks like West Texans are always blocking each other in political affairs. These two gentlemen should get together and one of them stay out of the race.

The bonus bill is said to be dead for the present. When it came to financing the deal, the republican leaders were afraid to face the music. They trust to get the elections this year with the promise that the bill will be promptly passed once their party is returned to power.

The consolidation of the two common school districts to the south and west is meeting with the approval of the people of these districts and the people of Canyon. The consolidation means better schools, and better citizens of the future.

The Buffalo basketball team is an easy winner of the Northwest Texas championship, and would have run some of the big college teams of the state a hard race. College athletics of the right kind are great college builders. Success to the track and baseball teams.

Harry Koch of the Quannah Tribune-Chief will approve of the Ku Klux Klan if it will put the loafers to work. Harry forgets that most professional loafers would rather die than go to work. More tar and feathers would not hurt them in the least.

The Normal lads dazed the C. C. five so completely that they won the first game quite easily. At no time did it look like the game was in danger. In the second clash the Clarendonites came back strong and led the scoring nearly all through the first half but the Buffaloes pepped up and the first period ended with the count 25 to 23 in herd's favor. After Coach Burton had instilled just a little fight in the Normal lads, they came back strong in the second half and completely swept the Bull Dogs off their feet and when the final whistle sounded the score was 62 to 38 with victory in the Buffalo's possession.

Coach Burton remarked that the herd performed better in those two games than they had during any games this season. He said that the student body should have seen the Normal quintet "pour it on" our old rival team Clarendon.

These games probably ends the season for the herd and considering the stiff schedule they have made a great showing. Out of fourteen games played they won ten and lost four, all of the latter away from home. Their percentage stands at 750. The teams played this season were: Simmons College, Abilene Christian College, New Mexico Military Institute, Clarendon College, Decatur Baptist College, and Wayland College.

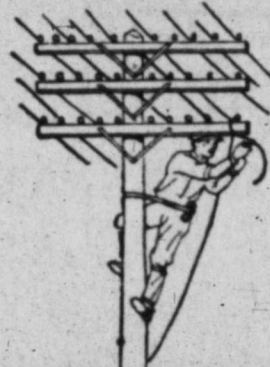

Y. W. C. A. IN THE NORMAL COLLEGE

The Y. W. C. A. in this institution was organized by Miss Helen Knox in November, 1910. The work was carried on under the leadership of the girls with the help of some of the faculty members.

But as the organization grew, it became necessary to have a special leader for the work. Consequently, in 1918, Miss Abbie Graham was employed as the first Student Life Secretary. She was interested primarily in people interested so much that she helped every student over some kind of a difficulty. One of the specific things she accomplished was the betterment of boarding house conditions. She is now teaching in a little country town and writing the book which she so often told the students she intended to write.

In the summer of 1919, Miss Edith Cousins was our Student Secretary.

Many of the biggest problems of the Y. W. C. A. arose during the summer term, and Miss Cousins proved equal to them. Since that time she has taken her Master's degree at Columbia University and is now teaching English in Decatur, Georgia.

In 1920 Miss Harriett Graham came to be our secretary. The task which she undertook was quite different from the one our first secretary had. To her was left the working out of the details of the organization after the vital spirit had been created. In working out the details she gave many girls

tasks which they had never dreamed could be. In this way she gave an insight into the why of the Y. W. C. A. and so strengthened them that they had lights of their own to let shine. After a year she decided that Mr. Boatwright needed her worse than we did. She is now Mrs. Boatwright of Monetta, North Carolina.

Our present Secretary, Miss Edds, is a graduate of the Illinois State Normal University, and has been director of student work of the Christian church in connection with the University of Illinois. Her work here is well known by all the students, for she is a vital factor in our social, intellectual, and spiritual life. Every girl who has done some task for the Y. W. C. A. this year has felt the spirit of service; and everyone who has been associated with Miss Edds personally knows that she represents the biggest and best thing there is in life—the spirit of Christ.

WHAT IS THE MATTER WITH EDUCATION IN TEXAS?

(The first of a series of articles on the educational situation in Texas).
Governor Neff has just held a conference in Austin of those who are charged with educational leadership in this State. Governor Hobby held several such conferences during his administration. The State Department of Education and the Teachers' Association have jointly conducted several educational campaigns in Texas in the last few years. The Thirty-seventh Legislature will go down in the history of the State as one of the stormiest that ever gathered and that because public education with its perplexing problems became the storm-center of thought and action. Country schools all over the State are expressing alarm at the prospect of shortened terms and poorer teachers for 1922-23. City schools, though in better condition, in many cases face inevitable reduction in the quality and quantity of service. The institutions of higher learning are finding it increasingly difficult to maintain present standards, much less to expand with the expanding needs of society. We are told several times a year that Texas ranks low in education among the states of the union and that ignorance constitutes a grave social and national danger. Yet, in spite of our popular indifference to public education in this State and our failure to educate ourselves we are constantly face to face with the problem of financing the educational facilities we

have. The legislature asserts its eager willingness to appropriate money, provided it can be found, but is wholly unable to command it in sufficient quantity to meet the situation. The people are groaning under what they term "the burden of taxation" and we now face in all probability the longest delinquent tax list the State has ever known.

These facts constitute an anomalous situation. From one point of view it appears that our schools must deteriorate for the want of money; and, from another point of view, that our money will dry up from the want of education. But whichever is cause and whichever effect, or if both are cause and both effect, as may easily be the case, there is something seriously wrong with education in Texas. In fact, it must be apparent to all who have given real study to the problem that there are systemic ills that are gnawing at the very vitals of our edu-

cational organism. Failure to differentiate between symptom and disease accounts for our present ailments. It is high time that we strike at the root of the evil. In this series of articles the writer attempts a diagnosis and offers a remedy.

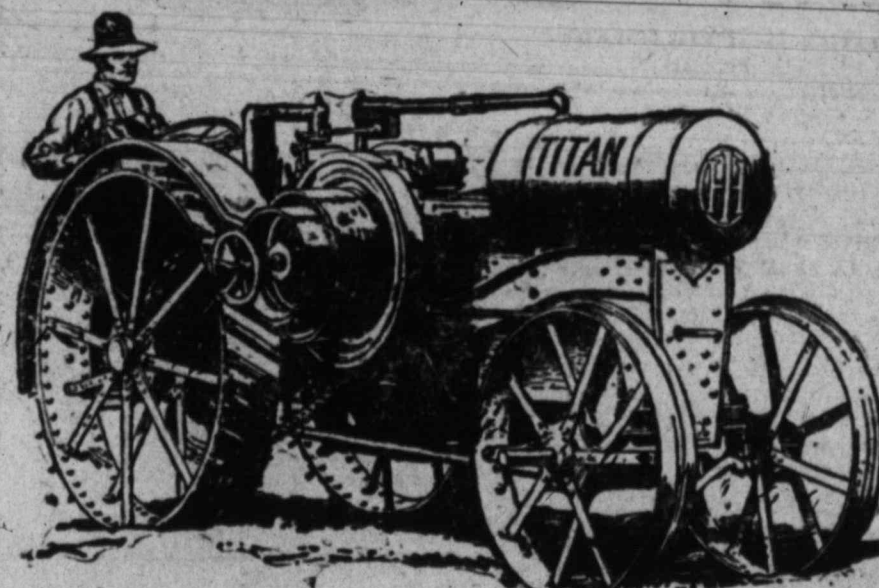

ELECTION NOTICE

On this the 6th day of February, 1922, the City Council of the City of Canyon, Texas, convened in regular session at its regular meeting place in the city hall, all members thereof, to-wit: J. D. Gamble, the mayor, and aldermen J. W. Reid, C. D. Lester, T. C. Thompson, G. G. Foster, Grady Oldham and C. N. Harrison, being present, among other proceedings had was the following:

It was moved by Alderman J. W. Reid, and seconded by Alderman C. D. Lester, that there be submitted to the qualified voters of the said city, who are property taxpayers therein, the proposition for the issuance of the bonds of the said city in the sum of \$20,000, for the purpose of street improvements, the election to be held on the 11th day of March, 1922; the motion carried by the following vote:

Aldermen J. W. Reid, C. D. Lester, T. C. Thompson, G. G. Foster, Grady Oldham and C. N. Harrison, voting AYE; and none voting NO.

Thereupon the following Election Order was adopted:

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Canyon deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

Therefore, Be It Ordered By The City Council of the City of Canyon, Texas, that an election be held on the 11th day of March, 1922, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City of Canyon, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Canyon, in the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000) Dollars, payable twenty years from the date thereof, with option of redemption at any time after ten years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of street improvements in the City of Canyon, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and Chapter 9, General Laws passed at the Regular Session of the 37th Legislature, 1921, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the Court House in the City of Canyon, and the following named person is hereby appointed manager of said election, to-wit: A. M. Smith.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, R. S. 1911, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds."

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas regulating general elections.

It is further ordered that if the proposition for the issuance of the bonds herein described receives a favorable vote of the qualified property taxpayers voters of said city, voting at the election hereby ordered, then the City Council shall issue such bonds in lieu of an issue of \$20,000 of street improvement bonds authorized at an election held in said City of Canyon on October 30, 1920, and which have not been issued and sold, it being the intent hereof that the proposed bonds shall be the same in every respect as the bonds authorized at the election held October 30, 1920, except they shall mature twenty years from the date thereof with option of redemption at any time after ten years from their date, and shall be dated on a date subsequent to the date of the election hereby ordered.

A copy of this order, signed by the mayor of the City of Canyon, attested by the city secretary of the said city, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, and which notice shall be published once each week for five weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

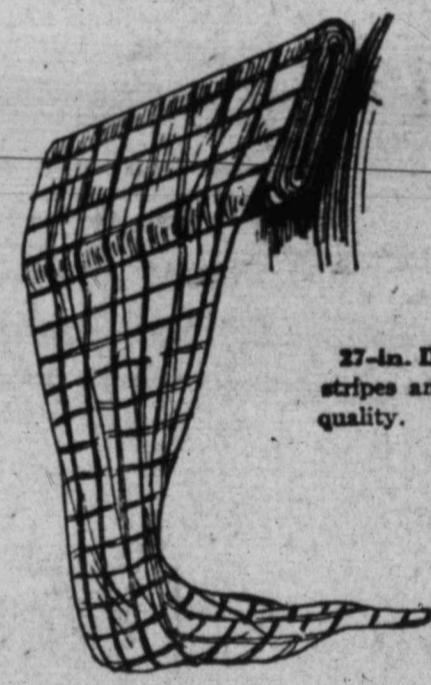

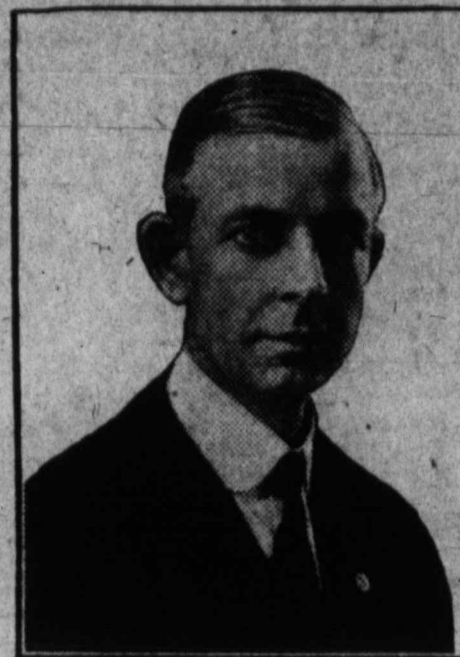

 duty of every one as a citizen of the state to see that the right men were at the head of our institutions, to make the public schools and state institutions a Godly system.
 A religious atmosphere may be created here in this school and Mr. Hill asked for sympathy and cooperative interest in order to make a distinctly Christian influence.
 Mr. Hill pledged his support to any denomination in Canyon which would undertake a progressive, forward looking program. There is a great opportunity here for all.
 Mr. Hill then addressed the ministers directly as the Methodist problem in Canyon. During last year there were 600 Methodist boys and girls enrolled in the school. There are fifteen members of the faculty who are Methodists. The school is in the 12th year of its existence, and will enroll this year something like 2000 students, fully thirty percent of whom will be Methodist.
 Mr. Hill then explained the property which the school now owned, and showed the visitors the map of the plans which he was looking forward to during the coming fifteen or twenty years, and the building he hoped would stand upon the Normal campus at the end of that time.
 Presiding Elder Hardy was then called up and spoke for a few minutes for the visitors. He had looked for several years upon Canyon as one of the most important charges in Northwest Texas. He had sent to this charge one of the best equipped preachers in the conference. He believed that he fully understood the problem in Canyon, and believed that a great program would be put on in Canyon within a very short time by the Methodist church in order to take care of the Methodist interest here.
 Fred H. Ives, superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School, closed the program, telling of the work in the Sunday School, something of the agricultural department, and the work of the Y. M. C. A., with which he is affiliated.
