OUSLEY SPOKE IN COUNTY UPON SENATORIAL RACE

Candidate for the United States Senate Addresses Voters of Randall County Upour Issues.

Yesterday was a strenuous day for Hon. Clarence Ousley, candidate for the United States senate. He arrived on the morning train, spoke at the chapel period at the Normal, at the noon luncheon, at Happy at three o'clock and at the court house last night. In between these dates, he was meeting the voters, and making himself known.

Mr. Ousley was given an attentive hearing at the court house last night. He made it plain in the beginning of his talk what the people have a right to expect from their servants in Washington. Having spent a couple of years there during the war Mr. Ousley knows what is expected of a tee, states that all vacancies in the senator, and the powers that rest with committee have been filled and the that body of men, and how it influences our whole country.

Yesterday was visitors day at the weekly luncheon of the Commercial League and the attendance was much better than it has been for several weeks. The meeting was highly interesting.



In the crisis of 1919-20, the banker minds of the Federal Reserve Board could only see liquidation: they did not percieve the sacrifices that would carry vast asset values and collateral securities below the margin of the loans. They sought ot liquefy the gases of inflation by pressure: they did not realize that the pressure which liquefies a gas, if persistently applied will solidify the liquid, and before they were aware of what they were doing they had frozen the loans which they were trying to collect.

They made the burden heavier upon the debtor class by unreasonably advancing the rediscount rates and compelling member banks to charge higher rates than they were were inclined to charge at a time when there was no new borrowing, no normal flow of credit, but only a renewing of notes. As a consequence, the Represe Banks made profits beyond the contemplation of the law which limits them to six per cent dividends and Grandmother Rowan's seventy-second reasonable additions to surplus and appropriates to the Federal Treasury all above as a franchise tax.

The result was to impose upon the whole debtor class an additional burden of tax in the form of the Reserve Bank interest. A man ought to pay taxes on what he owns and on what he earns, but he is outraged when he

But, according to the original meaning of the word, he should be the one and wear the other !

The Roman usage demanded that all who were openly seek ing public office should be dressed in white and this, by degrees, led to their designation as candidati, or "wearers of white," derived from the verb candidare, to whiten. It is from the same stem that we obtain the word "candid." a word employed by some of the old English authors in its physical meaning of "white." but which has in ordinary everyday use been transferred to indicate a mental quality, a freedom from bias prejudice or deceit-all of which might be regarded as dark spots upon a character.

It is in its original sense of "white," however, rather than because of its connection with the modern meaning of the word candid, that we derive our word "candidate." and, to be strictly in accord with etymology and custom, no seeker after office should appear unless garbed in clothing of spotless dazzling white, (Copyright.)
