Energy tax break bill introduced by Hance

U.S. Representative Kent Hance (D-TX) has introduced major tax incentive legislation which provides for depreciation of "qualified energy" refinery facilities over a five year period.

"I think this type of legislation is what we need to get us out of the energy crunch," said Hance. "If we can create a real incentive for private industry then we will have accomplished something toward solving the energy crisis. However, we will never get anywhere if we don't create some major programs very soon."

Hance's bill calls for tax breaks for the production of "qualified energy" which includes synthetic fuels, solar and wind energy, diesel, heating oil, fuels from shale and coal and alcohol-related fuels.

The bill also provides tax incentives for the production of unleaded gasoline for motor vehicles from any resource.

The legislation by the Texas congressman allows private industry to receive accelerated depreciation on any qualified energy-producing facility.

Also included are facilities used for research, bulk storage and equipment used as an integral part of qualified energy production.

"What the bill does is allow private industry to amortize or depreciate their facilities over a five year period," he added. "Not only will this give us increased fuel supplies, but it will build up additional tax bases in communities where otherwise this would not happen without this type of incentive."

"If we are truly interested in declaring 'war' on the energy problem then we need to stop talking and start acting," said Hance. "The fastest way to get new and added forms of energy is to provide a real reason for private industry to get involved. My bill does just that."

Industry Fighting Metal Corrosion

NEW YORK—U.S. industry is waging an expensive war against corrosion that is eating away metal goods at the rate of \$75 billion a year, according to a national bureau.

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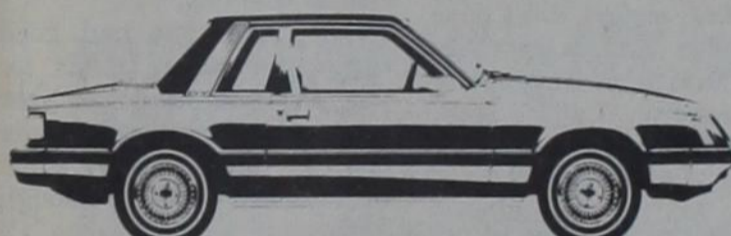


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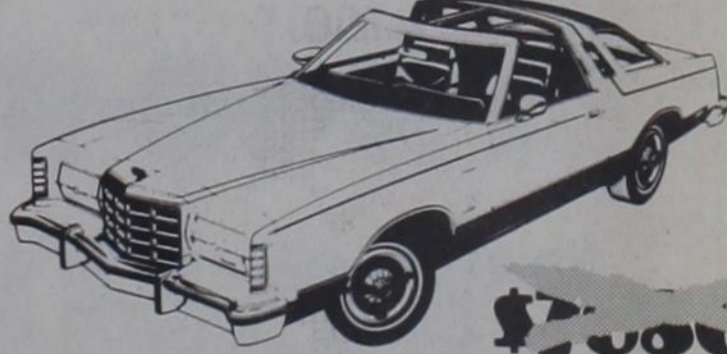


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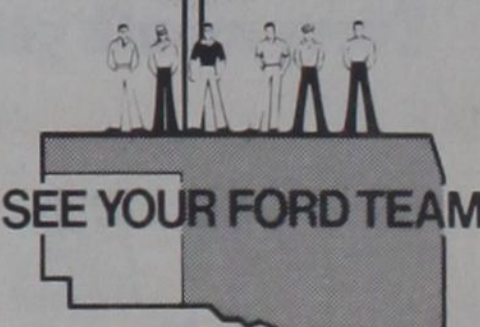


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View from the Library

Rhoads Memorial Library is a member of the Texas Panhandle Library System. The writer often mentions this every so often, but he never knows if it means anything to the readers. Just for a brief explanation, the Texas Panhandle Library System, which we fondly abbreviate as TPLS, is a federation of the 22 Panhandle county libraries. The TPLS has a council made up from representatives sent from each county. The representatives are not librarians.

When a county library becomes a member of TPLS it becomes eligible to receive many extra services (and it means a lot more paperwork for the staff, too.) A member library can get almost \$2500.00 to add to their book budget so the extra paperwork is worth it.

At the last meeting of the TPLS everybody was in the dumps. We had bad news. The federal and state funds which we usually receive had been cut by \$6,000. It was our job to recommend where to economize. That was painful.

The cover letter explained that the State Legislature passed Public Bill No. 480 which rearranged library funding so that faster growing areas received more than slower growing areas. Although the Texas Panhandle is a swiftly growing area, the population is not as large as other areas so, according to the formula

used in the 480 bill, we lost a little of our funding.

One of the librarians exclaimed that we'd better get busy and recruit residents or find another way of boosting the population. Another suggested we start counting head of cattle, also. But all the levity covered up the fact that we lost \$6,000 and we certainly hated it.

As a result of the dispute, Youts last week endorsed petitions calling for an expansion of the city governing board from three to six members.

Youts, who feels the city can afford a police pay raise from surplus funds, said, "We need a full complement of good policemen, and they need to be paid in accordance with the job they have to do."

A city patrolman with a year's experience earns \$11,958.72 in salary, uniform allowance, insurance and retirement benefits. Brown said this is more than a teacher here earns with a master's degree and two year's experience.

Newman, asked if the refusal of pay raise had affected morale or performance of duties, said this week, "I don't think that the effectiveness of the department has dropped at all since the pay raise was refused."

1979 season football tickets to be sold beginning Monday

Reserve season tickets for the 1979 Dimmitt Bobcat football season will go on sale next week, according to school superintendent Robert Ryan. Current season-ticket holders can buy tickets beginning Aug. 6. Those who held reserved season tickets last year
