Double Primary is Ordered; Pledge in Statute to be Followed-Candidates Must Pay by June 26.

At the call of the county chairman a majority of the members of the Democratic Executive Committee met at the court house at 2 o'clock last Monday afternoon.

As presented at Oberammergau, it is in-effect an open-air play, for, although the auditorium is covered, the stage is open, with a background of sky and forest-covered hills. The out-door setting, the songs of birds, the trees swaying in the wind, give the scene an air of reality that is most affecting. On one occasion a thunderstorm came up during the crucifixion scene, and to many of the spectators the black clouds and the lightning were more realistic than pleasant.



Indians from Montana, California, and British Columbia will join the Yakima Indians during a big fish carnival held at Prosser, Washington, to celebrate the victory of the Yakimas over the state of Washington. For years the state has tried to exclude the Indians from separing salmon at the falls as the fish are on their way up the river to spawn. The Indians, beaten in state courts, went to the Supreme Court of the United States and their case was upheld in the highest court in the land. Salmon caught in this manner is dried and smoked for winter food.

Tonga, a little kingdom of 100 isles. is the one remaining independent state in the Pacific, and, though under British protection, it still flies its own flag. Tonga is said to be the only country in the world without a national debt. Everyone of the 20,000 adults in the kingdom can read and write their language.

A group of capitalists has submitted a scheme to the British Government for using five lighter-than-air airships for a weekly passenger service to Australia and India. A new carburetor, nsing gasoline or oil combined with hydrogen, is a factor adding strength to the feasibility of the scheme. This will permit the shipload to be increased 40 per cent. 
