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CHOOSING YOUR CANDIDATE

The July primary is about here, and politics are getting warm in Texas. It is the common pastime of Americans to cuss the public officials from president down to constable, laying heavy stress upon congress and the legislatures. We Americans forget that we are the ones responsible for the election of those officials, and if the ones we put in office are failures, the fault is not so much in the officials, but within ourselves for having made the mistake of choosing these officials.

The News has never believed of making a poor farm of public office. It is cheaper for the county and state to pay public pensions than to elect to office inefficient persons who simply need the money on which to live. Yet, hundreds of county officials are elected to offices which they are entirely unqualified to fill, simply thru the plea that they are worthy and need a job.

The News has but one qualification for any public official—can the candidate fill the office? We care not whether the candidate is without means and must have a job, or whether he is independently wealthy. We would rather vote for a man with means who is qualified to serve the public, than for a man who has neither money nor ability, but who hopes to feed from the public treasury.

Randall county is confronted with a large number of candidates this year offering for public office. If the voters are to be satisfied with their public officials for the coming two years; if we are to get 100 cents value for every dollar paid the officials for salary; if we want the records of Randall county to be an honor to this good country rather than a mess of which we shall be ashamed, there is no other way for the voter to determine the candidate which he will support than apply to the test of efficiency.

The News is not writing this editorial with a view of sticking a pin in the political balloon of any particular candidate or candidates. We take it that every candidate in Randall county this year feels that he or she is qualified to fill the office, or none of them would have announced to the voters that they wanted the place. This editorial was prompted by the everlasting criticism that all of us hear against all of our public officials. We want to call attention to the fact that we, the voters of Randall county, are the persons directly responsible for the officials and in a way the official acts of those with whom we have delegated the authority of public office. If we are not willing to elect to public office men and women qualified for the positions of public trust, what can we expect of those we have placed in these offices?

The Pampa News came out last week in a new form, changing from a seven-column four page edition to a six-column eight page edition. The Smiths—J. M. and his son—are good newspaper men, and have always given Pampa a very interesting newspaper, well patronized by the merchants of the town. The new change adds much to the attractiveness of the News.

Hon. Lee Satterwhite will be representative from this district, since Randall county was placed in the Amarillo district under the new law. Lee is a candidate for the speakership of the house. His many friends trust that he will be elected.

Joseph P. Yungle of Harrisburg, Pa., came to the United States in 1867, with only \$2.67 in money when he landed. He came from Stuttgart, Germany, in order to escape military service in the German army. He is now a wealthy shoe manufacturer, having climbed up from a \$4 a week job to the ownership of the great factories. During the recent war his son fought in the American army in France. Mr. Yungle was active in all kinds of war work at home. In a talk the other day at a Rotary luncheon in his home town he said, "The United States of America is a great, glorious country, where nationality, religion or humble birth does not hold back the young man who is struggling to work from the bottom up to financial success. What makes me happy is the fact that there is no class distinction in America. Every man is the peer of every other man. He gets out of life just what he puts into it. In many countries of Europe it is different. Class distinction keeps the poor poor and the rich rich. In Germany, I could not have achieved what I have here. There I would have no right to aspire above the class in which I was born, and no war, will ever change that."

That is the kind of talk that makes America a great nation. America would be another dwarfed, gnarled and petty nation were it made up of people with ideas other than those expressed by Mr. Yungle. America needs more such men. America does not need the kind of men who come here and try to transform this good nation into a seething hell of Bolshevism.

Why does he wear those things and WHY was he able to tell the representative of this paper the names of the brands so readily? Simply because they're all ADVERTISED the length and breadth of the nation.

Articles on this merchant's shelves were examined and in almost every instance they were from manufacturing concerns who advertise their pro-

ducts constantly in every conceivable way.

The merchant said that his customers called for this article and for that one quite frequently. When asked why his customers wanted things made by certain companies, the merchant replied that he supposed they had used them before and found them to be worth the money. All of which is true, but it's a safe bet that the first time they tried an article, they did so because they had read the manufacturer's description of it in an advertisement and that after purchasing they found the article exactly as advertised and through truthful advertising they became satisfied customers.

The clothes this merchant wore were made by companies which advertised and he knew the names of them because they were advertised; the car he drives and the tires he uses on it are advertised every week in this paper and he admitted he bought the machine because of the things he had read about it; the biggest seller in his store, the things his customers call for by name, are advertised brands; yet this merchant says he doesn't believe in advertising and that money so spent is wasted.

He's kidding himself at his own expense and doesn't know it.

OUSLEY AND STATE RIGHTS

Clarence Ousley is a candidate for the senate. This is an excerpt from one of his speeches: "I remind you that state sovereignty is positive as well as negative. It is an attribute to be used actively as a state responsibility, and if it is not used to suppress evil or to promote the general welfare it will pass to the nation.

"Many states neglected to employ their sovereign powers to prevent the sale of adulterated foods and drugs and the nation assumed the jurisdiction. Other states permitted child labor to be cruelly exploited for gain and the nation violated the constitution in protest. Other states permitted the liquor traffic to corrupt their politics and the nation took over the police power. These examples suffice to illustrate the point that states will continue to lose their sovereignty if they assert it only in resistance of federal power."

Clarence Ousley is a scholar and a thinker. He did not go wide of the mark in what he said. He told the truth. When a state refuses to correct evils within its border or to redress wrongs within its border, why shouldn't the nation act? State rights were shot to pieces when the flag of Lee went down. State rights were given another jolt when congress created the interstate commerce commission and John H. Reagan was one of its creators.

State rights were jolted again when the eighteenth and nineteenth amendments to the constitution were sub-

CITY ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF CANYON, COUNTRY OF RANDALL.

On this the 5th day of June, A. D. 1922, the City Council of the City of Canyon, Texas, convened in regular session at its regular meeting place, the following members thereof, to-wit: J. D. Gamble, the Mayor, and Aldermen T. C. Thompson, C. D. Lester, C. N. Harrison, G. G. Foster and Grady Oldham being present, among other proceeding had was the following:

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Canyon deems it advisable to order a special election for the adoption or rejection of the benefits and terms of Chapter 11, Title 22, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1911 with reference to the construction of permanent Street Improvements.

Therefore, Be it Resolved by the City Council of the City of Canyon that it is hereby ordered that an election be held on the 8th day of July, 1922, at which Election the adoption or rejection by the City of Canyon of the benefits and terms of Chapter 11, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1911 shall be submitted; that said election shall be held at the Court House in the city of Canyon, Texas, and that the following named person is hereby appointed manager of said election, to-wit: A. M. Smith.

And that at said election only resident property tax payers of the city of Canyon who are qualified voters shall be allowed to vote and the form of the Official Ballot shall be as follows, to-wit:

"For the adoption of Chapter 11, Title 22, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1911, with reference to the construction of permanent street improvements."

"Against the adoption of Chapter 11, Title 22, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1911, with reference to the construction of permanent street improvements."

The manner of holding said special election shall be governed by the Laws of the State of Texas regulating regular elections in the City of Canyon.

A copy of this Order signed by the Mayor of the City of Canyon and attested by the City Secretary of the City of Canyon shall serve as proper notice of said special election, and the Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to cause said notice of the special election to be posted up at the Court House and at one public place in each of the voting places in the City of Canyon for at least Thirty (30) full days prior to the date of said special election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of said Special Election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in the said city of Canyon, which notice shall be published once each week for four weeks, the date of first publication being not less than Thirty (30) full days prior to the date of the election."

The above order having been discussed and put to a vote, it was carried by the following votes, to-wit: Ayes: Aldermen T. C. Thompson, C. D. Lester, C. N. Harrison, Grady Oldham and G. G. Foster. Nays: None.

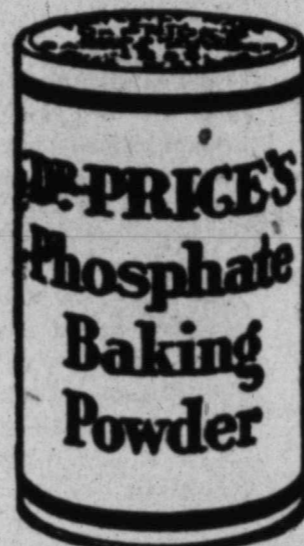

The delivery last month of the ship Western World to the Shipping Board Emergency Fleet Corporation ended the shipbuilding of the government. The Shipping Board built 2312 vessels of various types, of a total of 13,626,711 dead-weight tons. At present more than a thousand of the ships are lying idle. At thirty-five tons to the car it would take nearly one seventh of all the freight cars in the country to load the ships.

The Rockefeller Institute is studying the causes of yellow fever in Mexico and a special commission has been appointed to gather data on the work done by other medical societies and institutes at work in the fever districts.

A new aerial mail service has been established between London and Copenhagen, making it possible for mail posted in London in the evening to be delivered in Copenhagen on the afternoon of the following day. The line is operated by a Danish company, whose service also connects Copenhagen with Amsterdam and Rotterdam.

A new type of airplane wing made it possible recently for a Handley-Page machine to ascend and descend almost vertically in England. The new wing is slotted and operates like a bird's wing when it opens and closes the main feathers for slow landing.

French traffic experts will try to solve congestion difficulties in Paris by reserving alternate streets for one-way traffic.

New York City last year paid \$100,000 for their supply of frog legs.

Piping made of paper by an improved process is the invention of a Frenchman. This piping is made by winding paper in a very tight manner together with the use of an adhesive compound. It is almost unbreakable and very light.

Three loafers, taken in a raid on a pool room in Omaha, were sentenced in police court to spend 10 days in the public library. Should they fail to spend eight hours there each day, they will be taken to jail for double the sentence.

The battleship Maine, built to replace the one sunk at Havana, it to be scrapped and turned into plow shares. A Philadelphia firm is said to have purchased the warship for less than \$100,000.

FOSTER'S WEEKLY WEATHER BULLETIN FOR MONTH OF JULY

Washington, D. C., June 24.—Two principal severe storm periods are expected for July for the weeks centering on 3 and 28. To locate these storms as they cross the continent in about five days read the division forecast for your section. Rainfall for the states and provinces east of the Rockies crests will be near the average of past ten years. But your immediate vicinity the general long slopes will modify the amount of moisture which will come from the vicinity of a line drawn from northern point of South America to the Rock of Gibraltar. On all long southeastern slopes more than average rain may be expected and on all northeastern slopes less moisture than the ten year average. The severe storms of the week centering on July 3 will be most severe of the month and very severe storms are expected near July 1. Heavy rains are expected on southern slopes from both storms. Best crop weather of the month is expected during the eleven days centering on the 13. That good weather will come during harvest time near latitude 40.

INTEGRITY

The word in its original sense means wholeness; disintegration is the breaking up of the whole into its elements. When we speak of a man of integrity we mean that he is a man who has maintained his wholeness of character and who can be counted on not to part with any of its elements or principles for any consideration. Shakespeare's line, "To thine own self be true," is an exhortation to preserve integrity. If you betray any part of yourself, you lose your integrity. If you descend to meanness or trickery in order to obtain a personal advantage, you lose it. If through motives of vanity or self-interest you resort to pretense, you lose it. Failure to be industrious and to make the most of your capabilities is failure to maintain your integrity. An indolent man may be honest, but his indolence robs him of his integrity.

Can a man who is conscious of some loss of integrity regain what he has lost? Surely it must be possible to heal wounds to the character as well as wounds to the body. But the healing process in either case requires surgical treatment and the utmost care to guard against further infection. And as there is a limit to the power of the body to resist injuries and infection, so there is a limit to the power of character to renew itself after a succession of weakening and disintegrating attacks upon it. The person who wants to keep his integrity had better not be always making small compromises with himself.

TOWN FOR SALE

Do you want to sell your town? If you must sell to yourself before you can hope to sell to a stranger. Whenever 100 per cent of the citizens of any town or community sell to themselves the outsiders will clamor to buy. But before selling yourself the town, here are a number of questions which you should ask yourself. If you find that your town is not one that you can conscientiously sell to yourself, then it is either time for you to make a move or do your part to make it attractive to buy.

1. **Attractiveness.**—Shall I like the town—its "atmosphere"? Does it have the beauty of shaded streets and other beautiful features? Is it a quiet, roomy, airy, well-lighted town? Does it have attractive public buildings and homes? Is it well paved? Is it clean in every sense?

2. **Healthfulness.**—Will my family and I have a reasonable chance to keep well in that town? How about its water supply? Its sanitary system? Its methods of milk inspection? Its health department? Its hospitals? Is it without any congested district?

3. **Education.**—Can I educate my family and myself in that town? How about its public schools—present and future? Its institutions of higher education or of business training? Its libraries? Its lecture and concert courses? Its newspapers? Its postal facilities? Its schedule of salaries to teachers? Its investment in school property?

4. **People.**—Shall I like the people of the town? Are they "home-folks" without false exclusiveness? Are they neighborly and friendly? Is the town free from factionalism? Does it have strong religious, fraternal and social organizations? Is it a law-abiding community? Do the people use their public libraries and support artistic undertakings? Do they keep their children in school and not in factories? Are they good American citizens?

5. **Recreation.**—Can I have a time in that town—I and my family? How about the theatres, museums, gymnasiums, parks, etc? Are there active agencies for providing good entertainments, athletic contests, etc? Are inviting opportunities for pleasure drives afforded by well paved streets?

6. **Living.**—Can we live reasonably and well in that town? Are the best of modern conveniences available for its residents—electricity, gas, telephones, etc? Are the housing and shopping conditions favorable? Rents, taxes, and prices fair? Hotels good? Home and truck gardens and dairy products plentiful? Is it a good town in which to bring up children?

7. **Accessibility.**—Can we go and come easily? Does the town have adequate railroad connections and train service? Street car lines? Interurban lines? Well marked automobile routes and hard surfaced roads? Desirable proximity to other cities affording additional advantages?

8. **Business.**—Can I make good use of capital in that town? Are there good banking facilities? Manufacturing interests? Up to date stores? Good shipping facilities? Favorable labor conditions? A prosperous farming territory? Fair real estate values? Reasonably cheap power? Active co-operation among business interests?

9. **Employment.**—Can I get a job in that town at fair pay and with good prospects for the future? Can I count on co-operation from organizations making it their business to introduce and establish new commercial interests and to welcome new citizens?

10. **Progressiveness.**—Shall I find that I am in a live town having a progressive city government, active civic organizations, modern fire department, adequate police protection, organized measures for accident prevention, and a pull-together spirit in everything—a town with a future?—Portland News.

Tonga, a little kingdom of 100 isles, is the one remaining independent state in the Pacific, and, though under British protection, it still flies its own flag. It is a limited monarchy and the British consul is the real power. There is no poverty or wealth in Tonga, as the tribal system is altogether opposed to any member of the tribes accumulating property. Tonga is said to be the only country in the world without a national debt. Everyone of the 20,000 adults in the kingdom can read and write their language.

A group of capitalists has submitted a scheme to the British Government for using five lighter-than-air airships for a weekly passenger service to Australia and India. A new carburetor, using gasoline or oil combined with hydrogen, is a factor adding strength to the feasibility of the scheme. This will permit the shipload to be increased 40 per cent. The journey to Bombay would be reduced to 11½ days. The fare would be 85 pounds to India and 130 pounds to Australia. This is 30 pounds less than first-class small steamship accommodations at present rates.

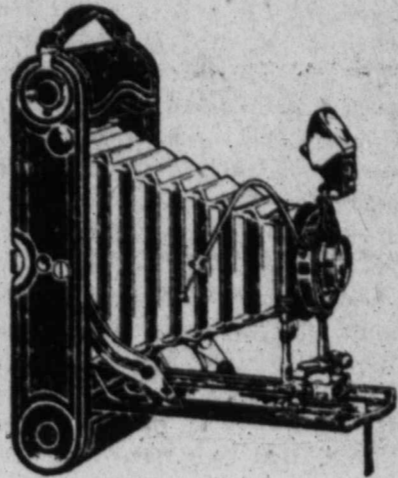

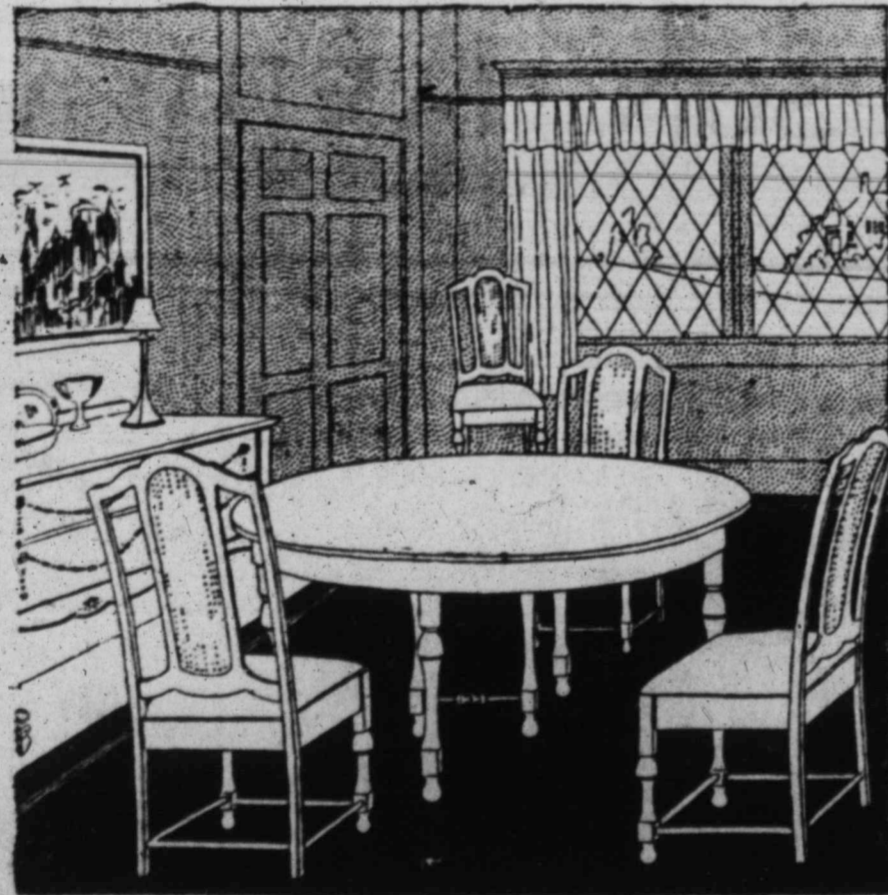
