SECOND PRIMARY **ELECTION TO BE HELD SATURDAY**

FOUR STATE CONTESTS WILL BE SETTLED SATURDAY.

Three County Races and One Precinct of this summer. Race Are All of Great Interest to the Voters of County.

The second primary election will be held in Texas Saturday of this week, caught on fire from an oil stove. when the run-off will be staged in four important states contest, three in Randall county office, and one in a precinct office.

The Mayfield-Ferguson race is creating considerable excitement in Randall, but the largest interest is shown in the county contests.

The voters are urged to go to the polls early Saturday in order that the election judges may not have to work until mid-night Saturday as was the case in the July primary.
