

SECOND PRIMARY ELECTION TO BE HELD SATURDAY

FOUR STATE CONTESTS WILL BE SETTLED SATURDAY.

Three County Races and One Precinct Race Are All of Great Interest to the Voters of County.

The second primary election will be held in Texas Saturday of this week, when the run-off will be staged in four important states contest, three in Randall county office, and one in a precinct office.

The Mayfield-Ferguson race is creating considerable excitement in Randall, but the largest interest is shown in the county contests.

The voters are urged to go to the polls early Saturday in order that the election judges may not have to work until midnight Saturday as was the case in the July primary.

HAS FINE MAIZE.

He plants only about half as much seed per acre as is customary, and does not plant it so deep. He has a very fine 80 acre crop, all uniform and it has not suffered from the continue drouth of this summer.

Paving Will Extend Two Blocks East of Square—May Go West

Mayor J. D. Gamble stated yesterday morning that arrangements were practically completed to extend the paving two blocks east of the square on Houston street, and that the city made money to go that far west of the square on Houston street if the majority of the property owners wanted the paving.

The contract that the city has with the Panhandle Construction is the best one ever awarded in the Panhandle, and the city council feels that it will be the best the city will ever get. The contractors will do additional work while on the ground for a great deal less than it will be possible to get a contract in future years, as the cost of moving to a town is always included in the price of the job.

The contractors landed a contract in Wellington and one in Lamesa this week. Both towns are done more than twice the amount of paving as is Canyon in spite of the fact that Lamesa is a much smaller town.

Mayor Gamble is anxious to see the property owners get busy and extend the paving while the contractors are on the job.

LOST PEACH CROP.

W. J. Wooten states that he lost a peach crop on his farm in Oklahoma on account of the hot, dry weather. He estimates his loss at about 500 bushels.

Mr. Wooten got in a small shipment Thursday, and gave a number of peaches to friends. They were certainly fine peaches, and it is too bad that the crop was lost, not only on account of the financial loss to Mr. Wooten, but also from the fact that he had intended shipping a car load to Canyon, and the people were very anxious to get them.

COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS TO BE BY REV. HICKS

SCHOOL WILL CLOSE ON NEXT FRIDAY EVENING

SHACKS AND COWS STAKED ON LOTS ARE DISAPPROVED

J. L. DUFLOT SPEAKER TUESDAY AT THE LUNCHEON.

All Cities Adopt Measures to Beautify—Building Permits Needed and Keeping Cows Up.

J. L. Dufлот was the leader at the luncheon Tuesday, taking the place on short notice of Rev. J. H. Hicks who was out of the city for the day.

The attendance was very small, but the meeting was highly enjoyable as Mr. Dufлот brought home a fundamental message for beautifying Canyon.

Mr. Dufлот announced that his message would be "Shacks and Staked Out Cows." These are two problems Canyon has to face and solve.

Mr. Dufлот believes there are few people who do not have some sense of beauty. Even the savage would trade his wife for a brass trinket which was bright and shiny. Individuals try to improve their appearance, and likewise communities. There are of course some people who fail to think along these lines, but most people have good tastes. The good tastes of the individual is usually expressed in the home and home surroundings.

Mr. Dufлот stated that he did not object to people building homes within their income. He favored every man staying within his means in home building.

A good town is one in which the homes conform to a type. Mr. Dufлот pointed out the fact that on a number of streets of Canyon the citizens were trying to establish a type of home, with pretty lawns and trees, which are expressive of better eccentric tastes. The question that confronted the people of these communities was how to keep shacks from being moved onto the lots adjoining these good homes and thus ruining the beauty of the neighborhood. There are many very beautiful homes in Canyon, but mixed in with them are too many shacks, moved here to rent to all kinds of individuals.

The people in the east part of town have tried to maintain a uniformity of homes built by going to the owners of vacant lots and requesting that they do not sell to persons wanting to move there shacks. This was only voluntary upon the part of the lot owner. Mr. Dufлот pointed out the fact that every city required a building permit before any building was done. Certain types of houses were required for every street, thus giving the homes a uniformity which made for a beautiful town. This would encourage building beautiful homes. Smaller homes were necessary to every town, but these should be confined to certain streets.

Mr. Dufлот stated that the objection would at once be raised that the individual had a right to build as he liked upon his property. The interests of a community are paramount to those of the individual in many respects, and this is true of building in every large city. Mr. Dufлот would like to see an ordinance passed in Canyon regulating building. He further suggested that the business houses display types of homes in the stores and offices which were desirable for Canyon, buildings from three rooms up.

Mr. Dufлот called attention to the practice of staking out cows in Canyon, and stated that Canyon could not be a clean town so long as this was allowed. He did not want to be understood as opposed to people owning cows, as the cow had been one of the great favors in civilization and pointed out the influence the cow had had. But Canyon does not need cows staked on the vacant lots to bring flies by the multitudes to the doors of our homes.

Mr. Dufлот called attention to the cities which prohibited such practices and the influence it had had in decreasing flies. And besides, it had given employment to men who took the cows out to pastures in the mornings, and brought them back in the evenings, distributing them to their owners.

Mr. Dufлот is greatly interested in seeing Canyon made a beautiful town, and wants to see these measures adopted which shall make the town more beautiful.

Voters Cautioned Against Mistakes in Marking their Ballots

After the July primary, the News was requested to call attention to a number of errors made by the voters. A large number of ballots were void on account of these common errors, and the election judges suggested that the News against call attention to the mistakes made:

The voter is not allowed to bring to the polls copies of this or other newspapers, which have the list of candidates. If the voter needs help, he must appeal to the election judges. No guides may be used in the polls.

In the primary election Saturday there will be only two candidates for each office, as this is the run-off between the two highest candidates. The voter must choose between the two for each office, BY RUNNING A PENCIL MARK THROUGH THE NAME OF THE ONE HE DOES NOT wish to vote for. The name left on the ticket is the voter's choice.

It will not do to put a check mark before the choice of the voter. That is the way things are done in Missouri and other states, but in Texas we MARK OUT the candidate we do not want to support. And mark out ALL candidates which we do not wish to support.

Do not sign your name on the ticket. This makes the ticket void.

When through voting, hand the ticket, folded, to the election judge. He puts a number on it, and this number together with your name is recorded by the clerks. Several voters in Canyon lost their votes in July by throwing their tickets on the table and walking out during the rush.

Hi-Jacker Gets \$75 and Boys Pay Fine On Gambling Charge

A Mexican by the name of Antasio Cruz is in jail charged with hi-jacking being committed on the person of F. Montgomery and Clarence Russell.

The boys reported to Sheriff Black that they were engaged in a "game" Sunday in one of the Mexican shacks near the depot. The Mexican walked in with his knife drawn, and told them to turn over the \$75 which was alleged to be on the boards. The Mexican won the argument and got the money. The case was reported to Sheriff Black who chased the man thru the west part of town down to the W. F. Heller place where he was captured.

The two boys turning in the evidence paid a fine Monday morning on the charge of gaming.

Canyon has an institution which will draw us more and more each year the very best people of West Texas. Are you getting ready to make Canyon a great city? Prof. J. L. Dufflet called attention to two things at the luncheon of the Commercial League Tuesday which ought to be looked after. If Canyon is to be a town of good homes, there is no better way to make it a beautiful town than require a building permit from every individual who seeks to build. Foolishness? Yes, it sounds like nonsense to a lot of people. These same people would have considered a building permit foolish had they lived in Dallas or Chicago when building permits were first required. Yet, if you will go to other of these towns the officials will tell you of needless worry and expense which would have been saved if these cities adopted a building program years before they did. City building is not for a moment, not for a year. The city that is willing may come a temple of beauty, or on the other hand a mass of buildings without form or figure.

In appreciation of the work of a Kansas editor for their community, a bunch of citizens recently presented him with a bouquet. On the same occasion a quartette from a local church sang a few sweet songs and a minister made a little talk. After the minister's talk six husky men carried a popular editor from the house and tied him tenderly in a model 1921 model sedan, and the whole town lined a parade behind the editor's sensitive car. After the parade the precipitate crowd returned to their homes serene in the thought of having provided one bright day in the life of their local news purveyor, even if they wait until he was dead to do it.—Anah Tribune-Chief.
