## R. E. BAIRD HEADS PEDDY CAMPAIGN IN THIS COUNTY

### ORGANIZATION FORMED—NEXT MEETING TUESDAY NIGHT.

#### More Than Sixty Men and Women Are Enrolled in Club First Day—Declaration of Purpose.

There was a good response to the call made last week by R. E. Baird for a meeting of the Democrats of Randall County who are opposed to the election of Earle B. Mayfield to the office of United States senator, and who favor George Peddy for this office.

R. E. Baird was elected County Manager and will devote his time from now until election to the work in Randall county. C. W. Warwick was elected secretary.

A. N. Henson was called upon, and stated that only three or four times in his life had he felt called upon to take an active part in political measures as confronted the country today. He looked upon the Peddy organization as strictly non-partisan, and that the only issue before the voter was whether constitutional government was to control, or a secret organization. The issue is so clear that he cannot avoid it. At the suggestion of Mr. Henson and motion of O. I. Smith, it was decided to start a Peddy Club in the county. Practically all present at the meeting signed the Peddy list.

The County Manager was instructed to appoint precinct chairmen and have them circulate the Peddy Club membership blanks.

A committee was appointed of C. R. Burrow, John Knight, R. G. Oldham, A. N. Henson and J. L. Duflet to draft a declaration of purposes of the Peddy organization, and to report at a meeting Tuesday night. The declaration was unanimously adopted at this meeting.

A committee of A. N. Henson, R. McGee and A. M. Smith was appointed to secure an out-of-town speaker for a meeting before election time.

Another meeting will be held next Tuesday night.

Ladies are especially invited to the meeting next Tuesday night, and to all meetings of the Peddy Club.

The following is the declaration of purposes adopted Tuesday night:

#### Declaration of Purposes

We, "The Peddy for Senator Club" of Randall County would set out the following as our Declaration of Faith and Purposes:

We believe in, and pledge allegiance to the Constitution and Laws of the United States and of the State of Texas, to the Declaration of Independence and the Bill of Rights, and of the enforcement of these laws through the courts and duly constituted authorities.

We are opposed to mob rule, which will lead to anarchy. We are opposed to secret political organizations that seek to control the election of public servants.

We deplore race hatred and religious intolerance as being inimical to the fundamental principles of free government.

Principles are eternal while party organizations are incidents.

Political parties are tools, not masters, they are voluntary compacts not vital or binding unions. And when party organization is so corrupted or diverted as to render it impossible to carry out desired and legitimate aims and purposes, then patriotism and conscience take precedence over mere party ties and obligations. And since the San Antonio Democratic Convention of this year, which nominated a candidate for United States Senator, rather than repudiate his affiliations repudiated the time-honored democratic principles, enumerated above, by refusing to endorse and re-affirm them, therefore all true democrats are absolved from obligation to support said nominee.

A moral and political heresy has arisen in our state that strikes at the very foundation of free government, and which, if unchecked, will lead to anarchy and bloodshed.

It has invaded our churches, political organizations, and would poison and corrupt the judiciary. It has insinuated and incorporated itself into the organized Democratic Party and has brought about the nomination of a United States Senator, whose election, should it occur, would advertise Texas to the world as favoring this dangerous political heresy and present

us as an object of scorn and ridicule. A stalwart son of Texas in the person of George Peddy has thrown himself into the political arena to combat this hooded and sheeted organization, bringing with him a clean and worthy record as a citizen, a patriot, an official and a soldier.

The Peddy for Senator Club of Randall County calls upon all good citizens, regardless of politics, creed or nationality to join with us in a common cause, at the polls November the seventh, next, to help save Texas from this threatened humiliation and to administer to enemies of good government a stinging rebuke.

Will you kindly confer with as many of your neighbors as possible, bring them with you or take their names and the acreage of cotton each will plant, and meet with the committee at large on the above date? We need your presence and advice.

The State of Texas owes the district nearly one thousand dollars from last year, and has pay nothing on the amount appropriated for this year. It is likely that the state will be very slow all the year.

There are many tax payers who may pay their school taxes this week as conveniently as at any other time. Every dollar received on taxes now means a saving of interest, and every dollar paid out for interest takes away from the school children some needed improvement in the Canyon schools.

## BONDS FOR NEW SCHOOL HOUSE SOLD ABOVE PAR

### BREG, GARRETT & CO. BUY THE BONDS AT AUCTION.

#### Architect Shows Board the First Plans of New Building Tuesday—Bond Election Next Month.

Things are moving fast toward the realization of a new high school building in Canyon. The bonds for the new school were auctioned off Saturday morning to Breg, Garrett & Co. of Dallas, this firm paying par, accrued interest and a premium of \$375. Of course the sale is made subject to the election being carried by the voters of the district.

Four of the largest bonding firms of the southwest were represented in the sale and the bidding was lively. According to reports in the New York Bond Buyer, giving sales all over the United States, the taxpayers may feel gratified that the bonds brought top prices among the sales made this fall. The buyer is to prepare all legal documents and print the bonds without charge to the district. A certified check of \$2,000.00 is up and is to be forfeited if the buyer fails to perform any part of his duty. The only responsibility the trustees assume in the bond issue is to carry the election.

The bond election is to be called for \$100,000.00, bearing 5½ percent, and maturing serially.

Architect E. F. Rittenberry was in the city Tuesday afternoon with the first draft of the plans for the new high school building. The board of trustees spent several hours going into the details of construction. Mr. Rittenberry will correct the plans according to the suggestions offered by members of the board and submit another set of plans soon. He hopes to have all of the plans completed and blue prints ready by the time the bond issue is carried in order that a contract may be let by the first of the year.

The final step in the process of consolidation of the common school districts Nos. 2 and 18 with the Canyon City District will be taken on November 18th when an election is called for the entire district to vote to assume the outstanding bonds of the Canyon Independent School District. There was some question as to the necessity of this election since the two districts voted to come into the consolidation in March, and then in May an election was held to assume the outstanding bonds of district No. 18, but in order that absolutely nothing stand in the way of the bonds being approved by the Attorney General, this election is being held. The election does not affect the question of consolidation, but only a legal question might possibly be raised regarding the issuance of new bonds if the election was not held.

## Foster Bros. Raised Good Cotton Crop in Randall County

Raising cotton has been quite successful in Randall county this year, according to those who have kept a close tab on the cotton situation. It is reported to be entirely satisfactory by all raisers, and the experiments of this year will likely lead to a large acreage next year.

G. C. Foster was in the city Monday from his place in the south part of the county and stated that he and his brother will have about six bales from the cotton they planted this year. They are very well pleased with their first trial, and expect to raise more next year.

Quite a number have planted small patches of cotton this year as an experiment, and the acreage will likely be very largely increased another year.

## BUFFALOES FORFEITED GAME AT A. C. C. SATURDAY

### BUFFALOES LEADERS UNTIL UNFAIR DECISION OF UMPIRE.

#### "Beat Simmons" is the Slogan of the Buffaloes in the Game to be Played Here Friday.

As a result of a squabble in the fourth quarter of the game between the Abilene Christian College Wildcats and the West Texas State Normal College Buffaloes at Abilene, Saturday, October 21, the game was forfeited to A. C. C. making the score 1 to 0 in favor of our opponents.

Leaving Canyon Thursday night, the Buffaloes arrived in Abilene in time to see the Simmons-Trinity mix-up on Friday afternoon.

In the second quarter the Buffaloes made a touchdown and kicked goal. In the third quarter the Wildcats made a touchdown, but failed to kick goal. In the fourth quarter came the climax. Up until this time the Buffaloes had proved themselves to be the better team and had kept the ball on their territory most of the time. The Buffaloes had possession of the ball on the 30 yard line and attempted a long pass. As Hale went down the field for the pass, a Wildcat halfback pushed Hale from the back causing him to miss the ball. The ball was caught by the A. C. C. safety on the 50 yard line and the safety ran for a touchdown. The Buffalo captain immediately protested to the officials, but to no avail. Previous to this, Captain Burson had called the officials' attention to similar illegal occurrence. Rather than take the unjust decision of the officials, the Buffaloes forfeited the game to the Wildcats.

#### Simmons Coming Tomorrow.

Simmons College of Abilene will be the opponents of the Buffaloes in Friday's game at 3:00 o'clock. Every student, member of the faculty, and many town people are wearing badges "BEAT SIMMONS." Coach Burton and his pupils saw Simmons in action Friday, while the Simmons team saw the Buffaloes in action against A. C. C. in Saturday's game. The dope sheet places the two teams on about an equal footing, and the battle will be a worthy one.

#### ALL BRICK ON THE ROAD.

The Panhandle Construction Company received a telegram Monday that all of the brick for the paving around the square was now in transit.

It is expected that all paving around the public square will be completed by the end of next week if there is no delays in transit.

Work is going along well with the curbing on the south side of Houston street, this work having started at the highway and is coming west.

#### MAYFIELD JURY STILL OUT.

The jury at Corsicana, which is trying the case against Earle B. Mayfield, had not reported this morning. Mayfield is charged with spending more than the lawful limit of \$10,000 in his campaigns.

Another case is before the Supreme Court, this appeal being made by the Secretary of State seeking authority to place the name of Mayfield on the ticket.

The United States District Court in New Orleans refused to hear the appeal of George Peddy this week for a place on the ticket, deciding that this court had no jurisdiction in the case.

#### CAR SHORTAGE IN SECTION

The worse car shortage this territory has ever known is being experienced by the gentlemen of Randall and surrounding counties.

More than \$50,000 worth of cattle have been ready for shipment from this city for nearly a month, and no cars are to be had.

Two men from Slater, Mo., bought 700 head of yearlings from C. O. Keiser three weeks ago and has been here all this while waiting for cars.

The bankers and cattlemen appeal daily to the Santa Fe for cars, but so far to no avail.

**MAYFIELD AND THE PLEDGE**  
The people of Texas voted according to the dictates of their conscience. They would everlastingly be determined. There is only one reason he is elected—if this should be a fortunate verdict of the electors. Nov. 7. That is the party

it happened to be Mayfield and in the democratic primaries, certainly Mayfield's example be sufficient for any good democracy to follow.

Mayfield, as state senator, bolted from the democratic party and voted for Joe Bailey for United States Senator after Bailey was elected by the people of the entire state and Mayfield was directed by the vote of his own district to vote for Bailey.

Moreover, the so-called democratic convention held in San Antonio in violation of the democratic principles of government by refusing to confirm the pledges upon which the democratic party stood, since the days of Jefferson.

Mayfield took the oath of the Ku Klux Klan, he bolted the democratic party and bound himself, head and hands, to follow the dictates of the old Wizzard, rather than the democratic party which is made up of Protestants, Catholics and Jews. Mayfield claims to have observed the democratic pledge while posing as a prohibitionist, yet Mayfield never raised his voice in the cause of prohibition until it was entirely popular to do so.

It is further charged that he has been highly rated in the interests, and he has not denied the charge. In this he has violated the democratic pledge since this state has been for prohibition during these several years.

Mayfield is some better himself. His Texas voters who do not assume that our seat of government was removed from Austin and brought to some back alley of Dallas.

**PANHANDLE AT DALLAS FAIR?**

The Panhandle-Plains counties won practically all of the money offered by the Dallas Fair this year for agricultural exhibits, and Panhandle-Plains counties took the first nine places in the county contests.

This wonderful winning for the Panhandle-Plains, has brought up once more the discussion of the Panhandle Fair, which was allowed to die a few years ago by the city of Amarillo.

We have always believed that Amarillo made a great mistake in allowing the Panhandle Fair to die, but no doubt there were sufficient reasons at the time. There should by all means be a Panhandle-Plains Fair in some city on the Plains, and Amarillo is the logical center.

However, we take issue with those who advocate having a regional Fair in this section, and refusing to send our exhibits to the Dallas Fair. Thousands of people heard about the Panhandle-Plains this year at the Dallas Fair, who never would have heard of this section had it not been for the exhibits from this section. The Dallas Fair is one of the cheapest advertising mediums possible for our great section. It is one of the best advertising mediums. We might have as great a Fair in the Panhandle as the Dallas Fair, but it would fail to attract but a few score from the outside world, as compared with the attraction of the Dallas Fair.

Certainly we must have a Panhandle Fair, but do not overlook the wonderful possibilities of the Dallas Fair.

The News was greatly surprised last week to note in the Childress Index that the Ku Klux Klan had been invited by the American Legion to feature a parade during the Armistice Celebration on Nov. 11th. We believed this impossible, and the next issue of the Index printed the statement that this was not true, but Editor Haskett attempted to hide behind the statement of a supposed member of the Legion. Haskett is often referred to as a Kleanman, which he has not denied. Certainly the man who went over the top, or wallowed through the slush and slime of no-man's land would be the last to affiliate himself with a masked mob which announced itself as 100 percent American. 100 percent American was the great lesson the boys learned in France, and it was there that no man stopped to ask his buddy if he were a Protestant, Catholic or Jew. A Ku Klux Klan parade in connection with an American Legion Armistice Day Celebration would be an insult to the 70,000 men who willingly gave their lives on the battle fields of France that America might be free from autocracy, and which autocracy is now the watchword of the Klan. Those 70,000 dead heroes are not all Protestants; the men who fought in the trenches and endured hell on earth are not all Protestants; Jews and Catholics gave their lives for America and freedom's cause as freely as did any Protestant; religious hatred was not the spirit of the trench. If there is any cause in America today which the American Legion could unitedly espouse, it is to rid this country of the cancerous Ku Klux Klan, which stands for everything that the 70,000 stands opposed to the principles for which the 70,000 buddies in France gave their lives.

Henry Ford, a democrat and personal friend of Woodrow Wilson, was nominated by the republicans, and came very near being elected. In Iowa this year Smith Brookhart is the republican nominee, and President Harding's father advocates the election of the democratic nominee, while practically the entire machinery of the republican party has been turned over to the democrats in an effort to defeat Brookhart. These are noble republicans, in the eyes of Texas democrats. Here in Texas, a real prohibition democrat has been nominated to fight a so-called democrat who takes his orders from Atlanta, Ga. George Peddy was nominated by Democrats and his nomination endorsed by the Republicans. The republicans of Michigan and Iowa are noble creatures for attempting to elect a real democrat. However, in Texas those republicans and democrats are outlaws for seeking to elect a man who has always been a democrat, a prohibitionist, fought for woman suffrage when it was a very unpopular cause, rather than vote for a candidate who is pledged to repudiate a large percent of his own party because they are not of his religion and his nationality.

**CAMPAIGN IN PLAINVIEW**

Mr. Mayfield seems to be very unfortunate in the selection of his political and legal friends. It is said that his closest political adviser is William Hanger of Fort Worth, whom Mr. Peddy in his address here Tuesday, referred to many times as "the floor walker of the Ku Klux." Hanger is a life-long anti, and we have found him on the wrong and immoral side of practically every issue that has come up in Texas for many years. Now, it seems that Mr. McLean, Fort Worth criminal lawyer whose record in turning loose criminals is known all over the state, is representing Mayfield in the ballot litigation in the Navarro county courts. Mr. Mayfield's connection with these two men will cost him thousands of votes in the November election. Many voters will scratch his name, and many of those who vote for him will first adjust a strong clothespin about their noses.—Plainview News.

Mr. Peddy says that his experience as assistant-district attorney of Harris county (in which is the city of Houston) has proven that nine-tenths of the bootleggers in that county belong to the Klan. The Klan is stronger in Harris county than possibly any other county in the state. The Klan, so we have been told, is composed of "red-blooded 100 per cent Americans" and its chief aim is to "run out the bootleggers." The fact is, in every county, where there is a Ku Klux organization, the bootleggers and criminal element are gradually getting into it in self-protection and will in time dominate it. There is no possible defense of the Klan—its bad thru and thru, and there is something wrong with any man who becomes a member of it.—Plainview News.

The Plainview News is strong for Mayfield, but offers the best possible reasons for his defeat. Mayfield, from the beginning of his campaign, has thrown in with the wrong bunch. He has courted Hanger and Hanger's crowd. He admits that he is a Ku Klux, and the Ku Klux is composed largely of just such men as the Plainview News points out.

The Plainview News should come across and help defeat Mayfield. The Ku Klux, as a political force, must be destroyed, and Nov. 7, 1922, is the time to do it.

**CALLED DEMOCRATIC SOREHEAD**

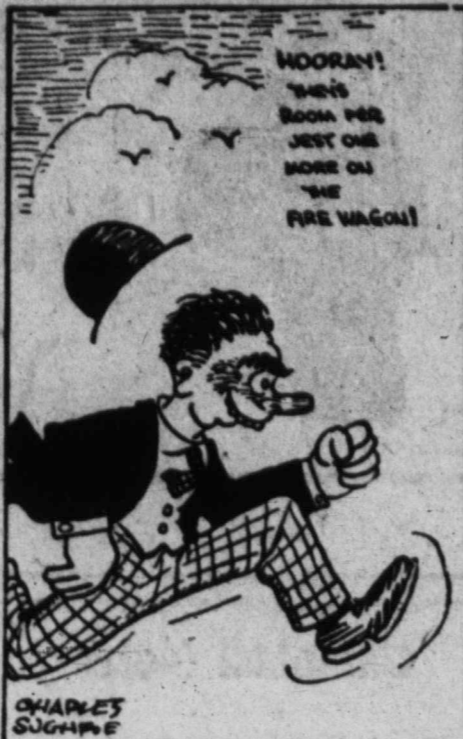

Whereas, at an election heretofore held, on to-wit the 18th day of March, A. D. 1922, in Randall County, Texas, for the purpose of determining whether or not Common School Districts Nos. 2 and 18 should be consolidated with the Canyon City Independent School District, all located in said Randall County, Texas, which election carried in favor of such consolidation; and

Whereas, there is an outstanding bonded indebtedness against said Canyon City Independent School District as the same existed before such consolidation, in the principal sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00), said bonded indebtedness being represented by two issues, to-wit: One in the principal sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00), dated August 22, 1903, running for a period of 40 years from date, but payable after ten years from date, and bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, interest payable annually; and one in the principal sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00), dated March 22, 1910, running for a period of 40 years from date but payable after 20 years from date, and bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, interest payable annually, the annual interest on each of said issues being paid up to the last interest paying date; and

Whereas, an election was heretofore, on to-wit, the 20th day of May, 1922, held for the purpose of determining whether or not the said consolidated district should assume the payment of the outstanding bonds against said Common School District No. 18, which election carried in favor of assuming said bonded indebtedness, but no election has been had nor the question submitted to the voters of said consolidated district in regard to the assumption of the payment of the bonded indebtedness outstanding against said Canyon City Independent School District, as the same existed prior to such consolidation; and

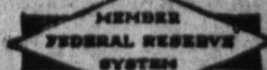

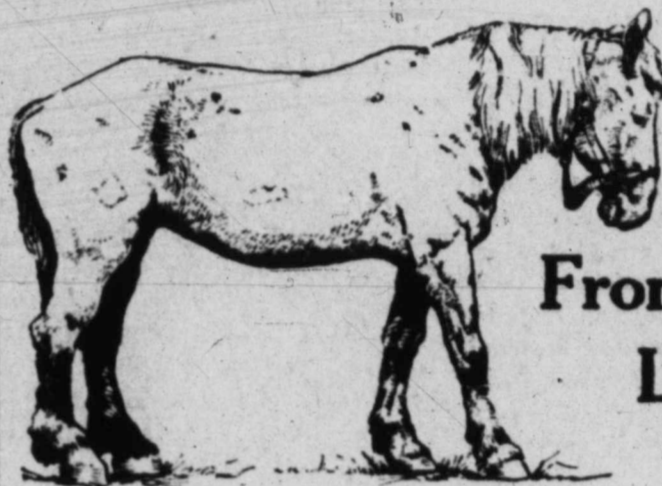

The United States still owns one of the largest coal mines in the world that it took over during the war. The road has twelve miles of track along the water front of Hoboken, New Jersey, and with an operating equipment of three steam locomotives and two electric engines hauls freight cars of other roads to and from the steamship piers. The road recently declared a cash dividend of 2 per cent on its capital stock of one hundred thousand dollars. The management has held it to prevent it falling into the hands of speculators but has reached a tentative decision to sell it to the Port of New York authority.
