DEFEATED 13 TO 6, BUFFALOES WANT REVENGE.

Bulldogs Greater Ground Gainers in Contest-Thanksgiving Game at Clarendon.

The Buffaloes lost Friday's game to the Clarendon College Bulldogs by score of 13 to 6.

The Buffalo team did not get into action as they did the previous week when the Cadets from New Mexico were defeated.4 But even at that the team earned another touchdown of which they were counted out by one of the officials.

The Bulldogs put up one of the fastest and hardest games played here this season, and proved to be greater on ground gaining. They used a larger variety of plays than did the Buffaloes, and kept their opponents guessing all the way through.

The breaks of the game, which are always a great favor in football, went to Clarendon throughout the entire

The first quarter was scoreless, with the ball largely in the territory of the visitors. The Buffaloes attempted a place kick, whick went wide. In this quarter punts were exchanged of-The Buffaloes gained 60 yards to 911/2 by the visitors. Both teams failed in one forward pass.

The second half was practically all in the Buffalo territory. Clarendon scored a touchdown in this quarter, making the score 7 to 0. The Buffaloes gained 26 yards during the quarter to 39 by the visitors, 9 of which was on one completed pass,

Clarendon carried the ball over in the middle of the quarter, making the score 13 to 6. The Buffaloes planted the ball in Clarendon territory, and attempted nothing but passes. The receiver was interferred with time after time, but the official did not call the foul. The Buffaloes were certainly beat out of a touchdown in this





Moreover, there is plain, though not intentional, discrimination in the matter of salaries against teachers in Normal Colleges in Texas as compared with teachers in other state colleges of like rank. There is neither reason nor right in paying a teacher of teachers in a trade or vocational school a greater salary than is paid a teacher of teachers in a teachers' college. Yet, this thing has been happening in Texas all these years, much to the detriment of the teaching profession and, therefore, to the detriment of the schools and the people of the State. We seem to need a kind of educational Moses to lead the people of this State to see that their own interests demand that colleges for teachers (public servants) be placed at least on an equal footing with colleges that prepare men and women for other vocations (which are pursued for private gain). May we express the hope that members of the Legislature will ponder this question

in the interest of the public welfare? Education Building Necessary

Public economy demands that while the paving contractor is on the grounds with his necessary equipment the State should join with property holders on two sides of the campus in a paving contract. Inasmuch as the streets on the campus have very little improvement and have no hard surfacing, wisdom dictates that these, too, be paved and provided with concrete curbs and ditches. To effect the desired economy this matter should be cared for by an early emergency appropriation.

Yet, our appropriations were proportionately no larger. In other words, we had about the same money with which to run the summer session of three months as we had to run the same length of time in the regular session with approximately half the attendance. This throws the heaviest burden on the Faculty in the warm summer months after a strenuous session of nine months. Ahe appropriation for this work ought to be increased 50 per cent over the present amount, so that the Faculty would not have to carry a heavier load in the summer than in the regular session. Many of our teachers are wearing out under this severe strain.






