ORDINANCE NO. 47

An Ordinance amending Section No. 11 and Section No. 17, of the Franchise granted to the Canyon Power Company

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Canyon City, Texas, that Section No. 11 of the Franchise granted to the Canyon Power Company by said City shall be amended to read as follows:

"Said grantee shall be required to furnish continuous service of Lights 7p2 each and every day during the life of this Franchise, except in case of fire, unavoidable accident or other unavoidable calamity," and that Section No. 17 of said Franchise shall be amended in part as follows: "The City of Canyon City acting through its City Commission hereby agrees to take, and the grantee hereby agrees to furnish not less than Seventy-one (71) street lamps, to be located at the place or places designated by the City Commission, and for the benefit of the Citizens of Canyon City, for a term co-extensive with this Franchise, and to pay the said grantee for such service not June 7, to Aug. 26. Fall term, begin- more than One and 50-100 (\$1.50) years successful teaching. 'For further Term "lamp" is to be based on a standard 60-watt tungsten lamp, or its

equivalent in current consumption. All of said Lights are to be installed and kept in operation at the cost and expense of the Grantee; said lamps land patented. Also buy Vender Lien are to be burned on what is known as 'Moonlight schedule," but it is expressly provided that said street lights are to be burned on all dark, stormy


