STORY HOUR FRIDAY.

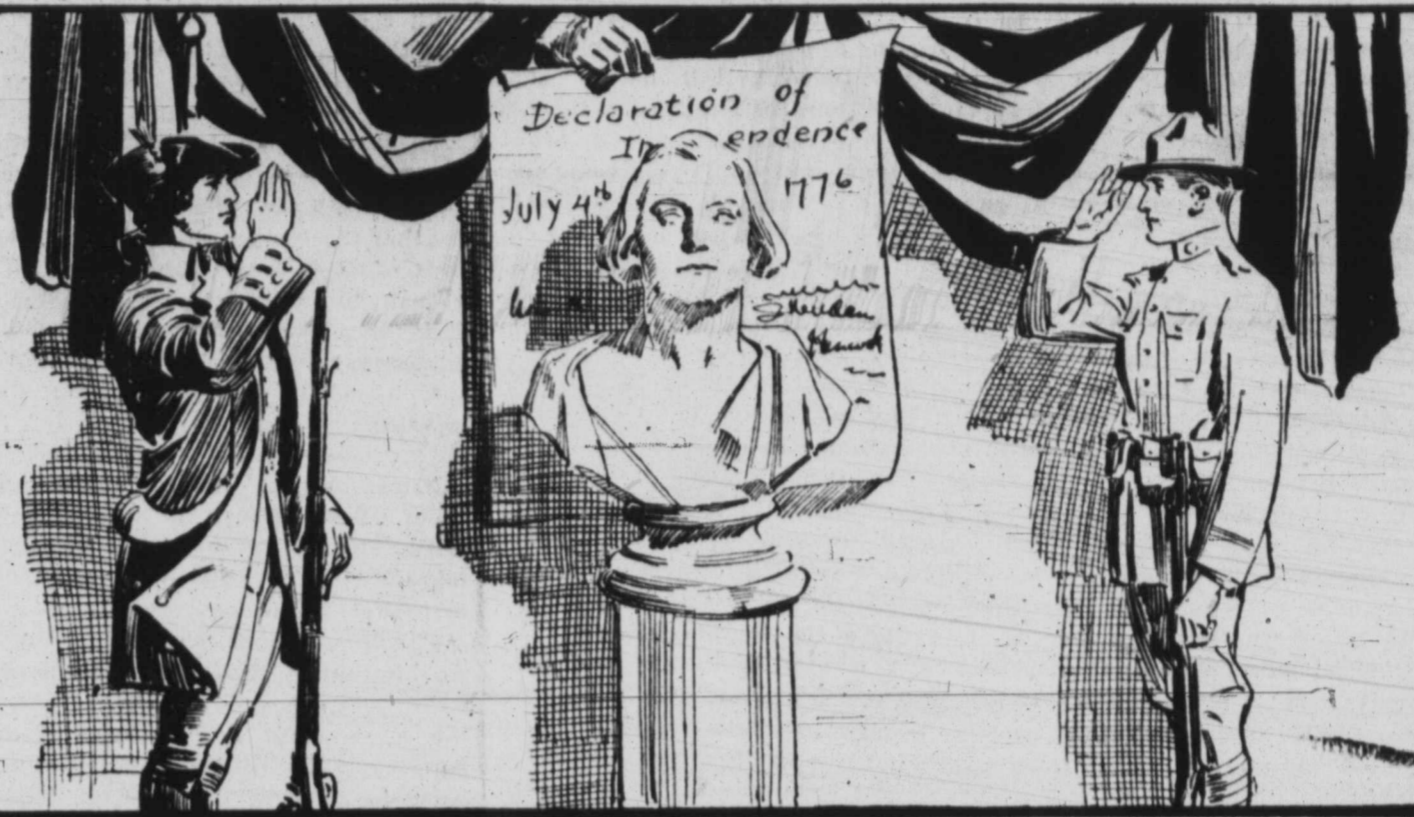
The weekly story hour for the children will be held Friday evening from 6:30 to 7:30 on the lawn of the R. P. Jarrett home. All of the children of the city are invited.

CITIZENS OF CANYON CALLED UPON TO CUT THE WEEDS AT ONCE—WEEDS MENACE TO HEALTH OF THE COMMUNITY

Since the heavy rains, weeds are growing very rapidly and the streets and vacant lots in many places in the city are looking very badly on account of the high weeds and grass that have not been cut.

The following call is made upon the people of Canyon by the Mayor and President of the Commercial League: "Our attention is called by the city health officer to the high weeds in all parts of Canyon, which should be cut at once.

"Every property owner in Canyon is called upon in the spirit of civic pride to cut weeds on all his property. Those owning vacant lots are called upon to cut weeds on these properties if they have not already done so.

"We call upon the citizens of Canyon to inaugurate a weed cutting campaign in order to make the city more beautiful and, which is far more important, to rid the city of a public nuisance which any patch of weeds creates.

R. B. COUSINS VISITS COLLEGE AND TALKS AT CHAPEL

FIRST PRESIDENT OF COLLEGE LOCATED IN THIS CITY.

Reviews Some of Work Accomplished by Institution and Talks of the Work of a Teacher.

Hon. R. B. Cousins, superintendent of the Houston Public Schools and president-elect of the teachers college to be opened at Kingsville, visited here Monday and Tuesday on his way to the meeting of the National Educational Association to be held in California.

Mr. Cousins spent a most delightful visit to the city, renewing friendships made during the eight years he was president of the College, and meeting many of the new people who have come into the life of the College and the city since he left in 1918.

Mr. Cousins spoke Tuesday morning at the chapel period, President J. A. Hill, asking the former president to take all of the time he desired in speaking to the students and members of the faculty and many citizens who were present.

Mr. Cousins reviewed some of the outstanding work that had been accomplished in this College since its founding in 1910. This college was the first to establish a training school as the laboratory for practice teaching.

Mr. Cousins described the condition existing in teacher training when this college was established and the awakening that had taken place by the advance steps taken by this college in educational matters. He complimented the students that had come to this institution, which was the fountain from which flowed the living water which was having such an effect upon education throughout the state.

Mr. Cousins recalled that of the fifteen members of the faculty in 1910, three of the eight men had been called to presidencies of teacher training colleges in Texas, and that the supply of available material was by no means exhausted.

He wished for the teacher a broader view of life. He deplored the apologetic attitude of some teachers for being in the profession, and trusted that something would drive all such out of the school room.

Many teachers are not paid as much as they are entitled to, and as much as Texas can afford to invest in teachers. Some are getting paid more than they deserve. Real teachers cannot be compensated. "I wish that all were worth more; that all would receive more," stated the speaker.

Education is an investment. Education must be paid for either in manhood or in money.

Teaching is not the only profession in which there is financial failure. A doctor may be well trained, but had no patients; the lawyer may be well qualified, but lack for clients; 95 percent of the merchants go broke; the farmers is always busted. If the teacher is prepared to teach and will live economically, he can live above the level. The teacher cannot live below the level and get anywhere. The speaker would take the false notion out of the heads of the teachers.

Bernice Graves Elected Director of Athletics in the Sul Ross College

Bernice Graves has been elected as director of athletics of the Sul Ross Teachers College at Alpine.

Word was sent to Mr. Graves Monday by President H. W. Morelock of his selection.

Graves is a letter man with the Buffaloes in football and baseball. He was quarterback on the football squad last fall, and was star pitcher on the baseball team this spring. He did not go out for basketball, but had considerable experience while attending Wayland college.

Graves receives his B. A. degree from the College this spring.

Under adverse conditions in farming and industrial occupations, there is an innate desire upon the part of people to want to change their occupation and find a more profitable occupation. Farming has been unprofitable, and therefore the farmer seeks to quit the farm and go into business. The mechanic has not had the rosy time that he enjoyed during the halcyon days of 1919-1920, and therefore he seeks to quit his job and get into some kind of a profitable business; oftentimes the teacher seeks to leave the position for which he has been adequately trained, hoping to find a more profitable occupation. The word "business" carries a certain charm that is alluring and enticing to say the least. It is pictured to the man on the outside as the easy life. It is thought to be the most profitable life. All the business man has to do is buy something and sell it for a profit; or render a service for which he is paid a big price, and all is fine and dandy. 1919 was perhaps the most profitable business year in the past decade, a year when it looked as if every business concern should be making big money. Corporations are considered always to have the best chance to make money as they are usually well financed, and usually have at their head men well trained for their jobs. In 1919 there were 320,198 corporations in the United States. With the biggest business year possible, and with conditions generally very favorable, more than one-third of these corporations, 119,564, to be exact, failed to show a profit. This very clearly shows that merely being in business is no ticket to prosperity, or guaranty of a profitable career. During periods of stress and financial depression is the most natural time for people to wish to make a change. But such conditions do not last forever. It is a good time for every person who knows some line of work to stick firmly with his job, no matter if unprofitable for the time being, and to get better prepared for the better times that will surely come.

Henry Ford, who says that he is not a candidate for the presidency, states that the reason Harding is shifting his attention to the World Court, is for the purpose of shifting responsibility of domestic problems with which he is unable to cope. Ford believes that Harding is not interested in a World Court, but seeks this as an excuse of postponing the discussion of the many pressing domestic problems. For a man who is not a candidate and says he will not be a candidate, Mr. Ford is showing exceptional interest in political questions, and is taking a peculiar stand of criticism of the Harding administration which can spell only intense interest and a longing desire for the presidency, with a desire to shield this desire from the public until the time is more opportune.

People can make more excuses about church obligations than about any other kind of an obligation. People will shirk church obligations quicker than any other kind of an obligation. Men who are supposed to be perfectly honest about any other kind of a debt will use the slightest excuse to avoid paying church obligations. Everything good that the world enjoys today it owes to the influence of the church. Those who do not believe this should move to a community where there is no church, or a nation which does not foster the Christianity. These folks would be the last to move to such a place, and would be the first to return to the shadow of the church were it necessary for them to move to such a place. What Canyon is today, she owes to the influence of the church. It is therefore a very pitiable sight to see the people most benefitted in our community by the church influence refusing to return to the church the support which they must feel that it due the church, and to partially repay for the great advantages they enjoy on account of the church. The churches of Canyon are up against a stone wall until they are more adequately housed. The churches will be unable to be of the greatest use possible for them, and properly serve until such a time as a definite building program is put over. This is true of every church in the city. Postponement is to only make the task harder. If every church member in Canyon will do his dead level best, and every person in Canyon who knows the influence that the church has had upon his surrounding will come into the project as he knows he has been benefitted, then the church building program will go over easy.

Childress Post: Can a Ku Klux be a bank robber? That question has been running through many minds in Childress lately, for it is stated that one of the men accused of being a participant in the bank robbery last week was last summer known to hold high office in the local Ku Klux organization. Some reports state that he was given the high honor of driving the truck on which reposed the great fiery cross during one of the cow pasture stunts pulled off in this community last summer. To be placed in jail on a charge of robbing a bank would seem to be all out of harmony with the great law enforcement program of the high and mighty organization of the three K's. We are sure that bank robbing is no part of the K. K. K. program and we are sure that this man is not highly honored by the knights of the bed sheet because of his criminal prowess, but if the reported stories are true, it is an unfortunate circumstance against the boasted moral standards required for membership in ranks of the klansmen.

**HENRY FORD SPEAKS.**  
If our officials feel that they are able to go over and straighten out Europe, what can they do for the United States? Usefulness should begin at home. This country has a number of problems to solve and it does not look well to run away from them nor to obscure them with a smoke-screen of foreign politics. A swing around the country would reveal that nearly every section has a serious, unnecessary and unjust burden to carry. Not merely a political dissatisfaction, a partisan prejudice not a conversational grouch, but a daily painful burden originating in some form of government action or neglect of action—and nothing is being done about it. While Europe is getting in to shape where it will accept the only kind of help that will really help it, our officials should keep their hand in by doing something for the United States.—Henry Ford.

Childress Index: For several years the leading men of Texas have realized that under present conditions, so far as the State Legislature is concerned, the State could not expect to secure service that was commensurate with the purpose and dignity as a member of the State Legislature. The recent sessions of the Texas Legislature has opened the eyes of the people to this condition as nothing has in recent years. It is a well known fact that the members of the Legislature are not truly representative of the people who elect them to the positions they hold. It seems that the only solution to the matter is to fix the rate of pay at a figure that will entice men of affairs to accept the positions. Under the present law the member is paid \$5.00 a day for sixty days at the regular session, and \$2.00 per day during the remainder of the term. For special sessions, which are limited to thirty days, \$5.00 per day is paid. It is practically impossible for a man to live in Austin on that sum of money, not counting what the candidate is required to pay for his campaign expenses. The result is that the successful business man refuses to per-

mit his name to be brought forward. His business needs his attention and he cannot afford to remain away for three or four months on a salary that will hardly pay his hotel expenses. The result is that the man who has just got by is selected to legislate for the people of Texas. The assertion is made by a members of the present Senate that 25 percent of the members of the Legislature pay only a poll tax, and that 35 per cent pay less than \$10.00 in taxes. Can men with that limited wealth successfully run the business of the great state of Texas? Of course not. There is no business man who would pay them even \$5.00 per day to work for them, let alone placing his business in their care. Until the voters of Texas realize that the compensation of the members of the Legislature must be enough to entice successful men to seek the positions they will have Legislatures just like the one that has just closed its third session in six months.

Pampa News: A newspaper may boom a town through its editorial and news columns, but a critical investor takes his cue from the advertising columns for substantial evidence as to the thrift and prosperity of the place. To him the advertising is the barometer that measures the prosperity of the town. The ads reflect a prosperous condition and tell him that the place is up with the times in business.

### BIG MEN NEEDED.

"The recent prolonged session of the Texas Legislature is going to have a material effect upon the people of this state by bringing them to realize the necessity of selecting men for the Legislature who are not only patriotic, but also eminently qualified to serve," is the prediction of Representative Cecil Storey of the 112th district. Mr. Storey returned to Vernon Saturday from Austin after the close Thursday night of the third called session of the Legislature which session lasted two months.

Mr. Storey states that there are approximately ninety new members in the House of the present Legislature, indicating that less than a third of the old members returned.

"The enormous amount expended each year to maintain our State government which amount is exacted by taxes from the people, has reached the point where the people are beginning to open their eyes," he continued. "This recent prolonged session revealed one element in the Legislature fighting for appropriations and additional revenues, while the other more conservative element was fighting for appropriations which will keep within the present available revenues. The people of the State are sensing the significance of the struggle between these two elements and are coming to realize that the importance of selecting legislators capable of administering the State government on not only a practical, but also on an economical basis."

The time for Texas voters to show that their eyes are open will come at the next regular State election, when an opportunity will be given to send the proper kind of legislators to Austin, according to Mr. Storey.—Vernon Times.

### Improvement Made On Athletic Field

Considerable work is being done on the athletic field this summer. The baseball diamond, and other parts of the field where the native grass has been killed is being sodded with bermuda. This will give an excellent grass infield for baseball. It is believed that this will be the only grass infield in this part of the State. The track is being levelled and more cinders will probably be added. The entire set of tennis courts, (twelve in all), are being worked over, and it is the intention of those in charge to have the entire athletic field and grounds in tip top shape before the opening of the fall quarter in September.

### Duflot Gives Lectures To Federated Clubs

The different Woman's Federated Clubs in different Panhandle communities have centralized their study upon two vital social problems, "The Woman Program" and "Child Welfare." The "Mystic Club" at Plainview, a woman's club at Floydada, and The Home Economics Club at Plainview are studying "The Woman Problem." A club at Hale Center and one at Wheeler are studying the problem of "Child Welfare." Mr. Duflot, head of the Sociology Department, is giving to these clubs from time to time, lectures on these subjects. Both of these problems are studied in detail in the Sociology Department. Mr. Duflot says that these clubs are taking vital interest in this work.

### House Joint Resolution No. 16

Proposing an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which relates to taxation and revenues, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 9a, directing the Legislature to provide for the construction, operation and maintenance, under State control, of a State system of public highways; providing for an election for the ratification or rejection of amendment therein proposed, and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there be submitted to the people of Texas, for ratification or rejection at a special election provided herein an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending said Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 9a, which shall read as follows:

Section 9a. The Legislature is authorized and directed to provide for the creation, establishment, construction, maintenance and repair of a system of improved highways throughout the State to be under the control of the State; and in order that the State may provide the means, revenues and instrumentalities the establishment and maintenance of such system of highways, the Legislature is empowered to levy and cause to be collected specific excise and ad valorem taxes in addition to those permitted for other purposes in the Constitution, but such an ad valorem tax shall be imposed only for the purpose of retiring the bonds authorized by vote of the people of the State as provided for hereinafter in this section.

When said system shall have been designated and taken over by the State as provided in Section A hereof, the Legislature is authorized to make provision for the equitable compensation to such counties for the value of such improvements as have theretofore constructed by the Counties of the State.

Provided, also that save for the State highway system, in all other respects, Counties shall have the right to build, construct and maintain roads, turnpikes, and bridges within their respective boundaries, and the Constitutional provisions relating thereto are not qualified or repealed by reason hereof.

The Legislature, at any Regular or Special Session, is authorized and directed to pass and enact all appropriate legislation necessary to carry out and effectuate the purpose and intent of these Articles.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1923, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and Laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words:

"OFFICIAL BALLOT": "For the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways."

Those voters who favor such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "Against the Amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.

The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.
