## County Exceeds 6th Bond Quota Over \$13,000.00

Final report of War Bonds purchased in Castro County during the 6th War Loan was received this week by Mr. H. W. Golden, County Chairman, from the Federal Reserve Bank. The final report discloses that Castro County exceeded its quota by \$13,358.50. The overall quota for the county was \$120,000.

The following letter was received by Mr. Golden from Mr. C. M. Smith of Plainview, Regional Manager:

"I am attaching hereto the final report of sales for your county as processed through the Federal Reserve Bank in the Sixth War Loan Drive.

We are very proud of the record of your county and wish to thank you and each member of your committee for your fine help and co-operation.

I believe this has been the most successful drive we have had in the Region, from many standpoints. We secured the widest distribution of sales we have ever made. The Region attained 127.4% of its 6th Bond quota and 122.4% of its overall quota."

## European Children Plight Cited

Following is a letter received this week by little Martha Rose Noble from her brother, E. B. Noble, who is with the A. E. F. somewhere in France:

Somewhere in France Dec. 11, 1944

Dear Martha Rose:  
Well when are you going to write to me?

Yesterday I managed to get a half day off, so I went to a nearby city. One of the most interesting but sad things I visited was an orphanage and child's hospital. You don't realize or can't what these little children over here know and have gone through in this thing, and I hope that its God's will that the children of our country won't ever know that sort of thing or any other generation of any country for that matter.

There was children in there that will never know kindred even, let alone what it is to have a mother and father and brothers and sisters. One little boy about 2 1/2 years old that will never remember what he saw with his eyes. Several children will, I guess be frightened at any strange noise for the rest of their lives. I can't describe all, but it is the one thing I've seen in this (and I've seen lots of torn up people) that I couldn't stay around long. I had to get out. Maybe this isn't the sort of thing to write, but I hope it will help you to sort of realize that you are very lucky to be where you are, and that you'd be sorry for puns, dimth willifil t l xbg bk these little children over here.

The ones that weren't wounded and have their families, are running around this winter with no coats, caps, and very ragged, dirty clothes. Their shoes are made of wood, and some old G. I. shoes that are 10 times too big and worn out.

It's still raining every day and its beginning to hail and sleet more.

Write sometime, and next time maybe I'll have something more interesting and pleasant on my mind.

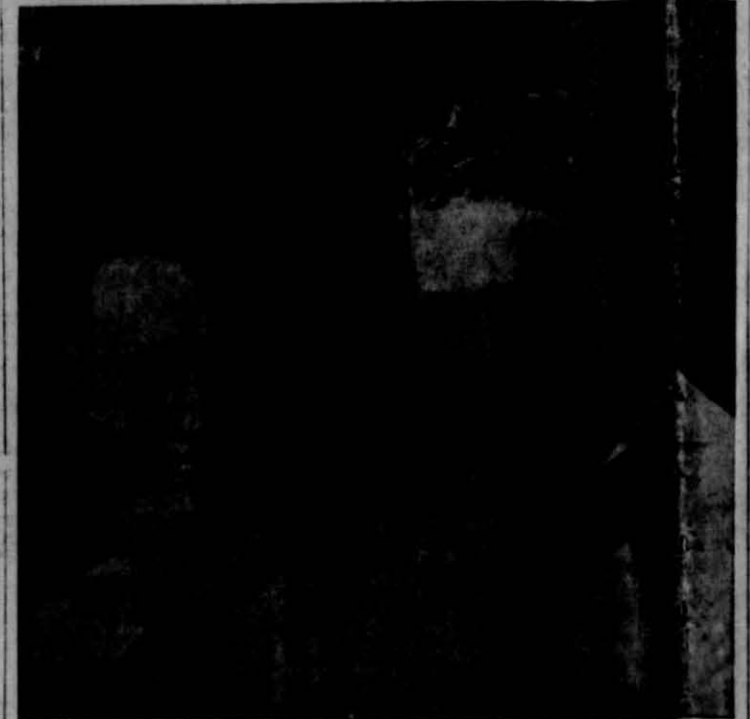
It was rather interesting and amusing to hear the officers tell of some of their experiences while serving as officials of Castro County.

## Sheffy Brothers Battle Japs In All Major Naval Engagements In the Pacific War Zone

Pictured above are the three sons of Mr. and Mrs. Sid Sheffy of Dimmitt, all three of whom have seen action with the U. S. Navy in the Pacific, Ted and Bob having participated in practically all of the major naval engagements with the Japs. Rex was the last one to join the Navy and saw his first action in MacArthur's reconquest of the Philippines.

Ted and Bob joined the Navy at the same time and received their boot training together, they completed their third year in the service January 2. Their experiences since joining the Navy have been almost identical, in that they have seen action in all the major naval encounters between the U. S. Fleets and the Japs. Their naval units fought in the battles of the Coral Sea, Midway, Guadalcanal, Guam, Saipan, and others of the Marianas, New Guinea operations and Leyte in the Philippines. After much coaxing Bob finally divulged the information that he had fought in 18 major engagements. Although this writer has never had the opportunity or pleasure of interviewing the Sheffy boys, with the exception of a brief conversation with Bob, while he was here recently on leave while his ship was receiving repairs in a West Coast port, it is doubtful if an excessive amount of information can be secured from either of the boys as they are very modest and depend more on action than words as is verified by their records—records that will, with other like them, make the achievements of the U. S. Navy, while fighting a ruthless aggressor, legendary. Although Bob's ship received special citation he requested that we not mention the name of the vessel, and it is our belief that the Japs couldn't make him divulge any information either.

Rex joined the Navy August 2, 1943, and received his boot training at San Diego, California. He was stationed in the Administrative Office in Hawaii for several months and finally, in order to get the thick of the fight with his brothers, requested transfer to a combat unit. He saw his first naval action at Letye.

The fulfillment of General MacArthur's promise to return to the Philippines has been made possible, in a large measure, by the superb fighting quality of men like these boys who constitute our naval personnel, and it is through their courageous behaviour that the U. S. can lay claim to having the greatest Navy afloat.

## Cadet Joseph B. Alley, Jr., Begins Flight Training

Aviation Cadet Joseph B. Alley, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Alley of Dimmitt, has just arrived at the Thunderbolt Field No. 1, a contract pilot school, at Glendale, Arizona, to begin his primary flight training course. He will remain there for 10 weeks of intensive flying training, which he will receive in a steerman type Primary Trainer.

Cadet Alley transferred from Co. F, of the 142nd Infantry into the Air Corps in 1940. He joined the Cadets in September 1943 and was stationed at Chanute Field, Illinois. His wife, Mrs. Eileen Land Alley, lives in Cincinnati, Ohio.

## Ration Calendar

January 1 to February 1.  
Meats and Fats: Book IV, red stamps A8 through P5 are now invalid. Q5 through X5 are good for 10 points each.

Processed Foods: Book IV, blue stamps A8 through W5 are now invalid. X5 through G2 are good for 10 points each.

Sugar: Stamps No. 30, 31, 32, 33 and 40 in Book IV and all home-canning coupons and certificates are now invalid. Stamp No. 34 is good for five lbs. sugar.

Shoes: Book III, stamps one two and three, with airplane pictures, each good for one pair indefinitely.

Gasoline: (Coupons must be endorsed on front) A coupons, 4 gal. each with No. 14 expiring March 21, 1945. B-4 and C-4 coupons are invalid January 1, 1945. B-5, B-6, C-5 and C-6 rations have a value of 5 gal. each. R-1 and R-2, 5 gal. (valid for bulk delivery only); T coupons designated "Fourth Quarter" are invalid Midnight December 31, 1944, and T coupons designated "First Quarter" will become valid on that date, good for 5 gal; D, one and one-half gal. and E-1 and E-2 coupons each.

Tire Inspection: T book holders every six months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first. New mileage rationing record required to obtain gasoline rations. Application for passenger car tire replacement must show condition of all tires in use.

**Baker-Fleming Begins Expansion Program**



Shown here is the initial excavation and contract work done at 4th and Columbia Streets in Plainview on the BAKER FLASH O'Gas Co. building to be erected on the site. The caterpillar tractor in the foreground is owned and operated by Jameson Brothers Machinery Company of Matador. Jameson Brothers, possibly, have the most modern and best equipped dirt moving equipment in West Texas. The road grader shown in the background is operated under the direction of the County Commissioner, Mr. Charles Howard. It was used to cut the side edge of the excavation and to level the moved dirt. The excavation shown here is 6 feet deep, 50 feet wide and 120 feet long, and the approximate 1500 yards of dirt removed was used in leveling off the property preparatory to the installation of two 18,000-gallon Propane and Butane storage tanks to arrive soon.  
At the present time, a 40x100 foot tile building is being constructed. This building will probably be completed by February 1, 1945. Part of the building will serve temporarily as office and display, the main part of the building will be used as a work shop and garage for the repair of trucks and equipment. Later, when the larger building will be erected at the excavation site the present building will be used entirely for repair of trucks and as a special building and work shop for equipping trucks, tractors and irrigation well motors with Butane gas carburetors.  
This building was designed by Mr. E. S. Merritt and is being erected under his supervision. All cement work was contracted for and is being done by Mr. W. C. Green.  
Robin Baker, in company with his son, Buddy, Baker, and Mr. Raymond Green, manager of the Muleshoe branch of Baker Flash O'Gas Co., have just returned from a two weeks trip to Los Angeles and vicinity.
