PUBLIC SCHOOLS OPEN WITH LARGE INCREASED ATTENDANCE; NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING IS NEARLY FILLED

The public schools opened Monday with a large increase in attendance over last year, and with almost crowded conditions in the high school building in spite of the fact that a new \$100,000.00 building was opened to the pupils for the first time.

Last year there were about 140 in the high school. The enrollment the first day for the high school was 250, which increased to 265 yesterday, and will be increased more before the end of this week.

After the opening exercises of the school Monday morning, Superintendent A. D. Payne asked the high school pupils to march to the new study hall, two and three sat in the seats, trying to make the 185 available seats take care of 250 pupils. It was soon found by the teachers that classes were too large to be handled, and Mr. Payne called upon the trustees to solve the problem. After several hours spent in going over the matter it was decided that the only possible solution was to divide the high school in some way. The seventh grade was taken out the study hall and given one room in the new building. Miss Esther Rudolph was placed in charge of this grade. Miss Rudolph taught seventh grade work until this was placed in the high school last year. The trustees were forced to employ another teacher, and Emmett Hazlewood was called upon to take the sixth grade work.

Four classes in the high school now

have more than fifty, and the teachers are unable to divide the classes owing to the shortage of teaching force. One class has 59. The auditorium is used for the large classes owing to the fact that none of the recitation rooms are sufficiently large to accommodate these classes.

Since the removal of the seventh grade most of the high school students are given individual seats in the study hall. More seats will be added at once.

There was a very large number in attendance at the opening exercises of the school Monday morning. A short program was held of songs and short talks by G. G. Foster, C. W. Warwick, Jas. L. Wohlforth, W. J. Flesher and Dr. Pierce.

The grades are being taken care of fine, with no overcrowding as has been the case during the past few years.

Foreign manufacturers of building materials, such as brick, glass, cement, interior stone and ceramic ware, are in spite of the tariff, now making a bid for an American market. The costs of production in Europe are almost unbelievably below the costs in America, and some distributors of building materials on the Atlantic seaboard are afraid that there will be a wave of foreign competition. The glassmakers especially are troubled.

Both the gopher snake and the king snake of our southern states are inveterate enemies of the rattlesnake and are immune to his poison. The injection of the poison of a rattlesnake into the circulation of a cobra, in the Bronx Zoological Gardens, resulted in the cobra suffering no ill.

The upper Mississippi bottoms are threatened by a drainage scheme. These bottoms are the most prolific spawning grounds for black bass and other game and food fishes, and to the Bureau of Fisheries they are invaluable for stocking lakes and streams. The bottoms are the natural feeding grounds for ducks, brant and geese, mink, muskrat, raccoon and many other kinds of wild creatures. The promoters have pledged \$7,000,000 toward the project and will ask Congress to appropriate \$14,000,000. Most of this drainage tract will produce farm land of little value even when drained, according to prominent experts of agriculture.

The "lamp" of the firefly consists of a substance termed luciferine, and the light is produced by the oxidation of this substance in the presence of an enzyme called luciferase. The oxygen is furnished by the air tubes with which the "lamp" is abundantly supplied, and is set free by a nerve impulse so that the light is under the control of the insect. The efficiency of the light of the firefly may be judged by comparing it with the efficiency of various other lights. That of a carbon incandescent lamp is 0.0042, of a tungsten bulb 0.012, of an open arc 0.072, of a quartz-Mercury arc 0.068, and of the firefly 0.96. This light is the most perfect illumination known, the radiation consisting practically entirely of light rays, with only an infinitesimal production of heat rays.

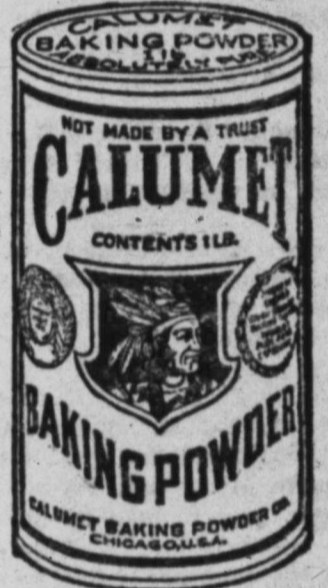

An acre burial plot near Lancaster, Ohio, was bequeathed by Nathaniel Wilson 100 years ago to President Andrew Jackson as a burial place and to his successors in the Presidency. No Chief Executive has ever availed himself of the privilege, however. The donor died in 1836. Locust trees are within the inclosure and it is surrounded by a high octagonal stone wall. The place is known locally as the "President's Acre."

France is developed cotton production under her own flag. Several new plantations have been opened this year in Algiers and a net profit of 3,500 francs a hectare is reported from this crop. In the French Sudan, cotton equal to the best Egyptian has already been raised.

A special waterproof deck of cards is used by bathers in the North and Baltic seaside resorts, who play on floating tables while in the water. So obsessed with the gambling fever are they that they play roulette, baccarat, seven-up and other games of chance at all times, with the bets running into millions of marks.

Calvin Coolidge, Jr., son of the President, is picking tobacco for the firm of Dickerman and Day in Hatfield, Massachusetts, for \$3 a day. He rides a bicycle to and from work. Surely this indicates true democracy.

A race of Lilliputians, scarcely four and a half feet tall, live on the Adaman Islands in the Bay of Bengal. In fishing they do not use hook and line but shoot the fish, the bowman balancing on the prow of his canoe and then following the arrow after the fish is struck. The canoes are hewn with stone tools from single logs and are very thin.

Mangus Johnson, recently elected Farmer-Labor Senator from Minnesota made the following statement: "Sixty-five per cent of the wealth of this country is in the hands of two per cent of the population, and unless there is a better distribution of this wealth the common people are going to revolt against it."

Motor cars belonging to the King of England have no number plate. When His Majesty is on a ceremonial tour throughout his domain his car is distinguished by the royal standard badge which is fixed in front. This badge is superseded by a small blue on the canopy above the chauffeur's head at night.

CASEY SOLD CAFE

P. D. Casey has sold the Casey Cafe to O. E. Guinn of Amarillo, who has taken charge of the business.

P. D. Casey that he has made no definite plans for the future. Mr. Guinn is experienced in the hotel and restaurant business.

A prominent Paris daily paper, deploring the corruption of masculine styles and behavior by Americans in Paris, says that although Britishers in Paris "remain gentlemen, with waistcoats and yellow kids, many Frenchmen follow the lead of Americans who have left their vests in New York, their gloves in Washington, and arrive with naked hands and floating cravats."

"If you had to pay the farm wife a salary based on her actual worth, she could command at least \$3,900 a year, as seamstress, laundress, cook, nurse, assistant hired man, general manager and several other tasks," declares Professor Ruby Green Smith of Cornell.

The late President Harding's tomb will be guarded by a detachment of regular army troops for six months, as required by law, and perhaps longer. Regular troops were on duty about the tomb of President McKinley for nearly two years to prevent souvenir hunters and other vandals from disturbing the sleep of the dead.

To keep the Central American Republics—Costa Rica, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Panama, San Salvador—members of the League of Nations, reduced annual dues will be allowed them. Not one of these nations has paid its annual dues to the League since becoming a member. They claim their assessments are too high.

Prince Obolensky, a former millionaire cousin of the assassinated Czar of Russia, is commissioner of agriculture for all Russia and is successfully spreading the gospel of work in an effort to reconstruct that country. Farmers will carry on negotiations with the government on a basis of wheat instead of a gold basis. The commissioner believes that the coming wheat crop will provide at least 250,000,000 rubles' worth of wheat, and although Germany has tried to purchase the entire output, Moscow officials say they will hold out for higher bids from France and other nations.

The Roosevelt Newsboys' Association of Boston has started a movement to have every newsboy in the country contribute one cent to a collection of pennies to be melted down and made into a miniature reproduction of Laddie Boy, former President Harding's famous dog. The statuette is to be presented to Mrs. Harding.

ANNOUNCED THAT MISS LAURA EDWARDS IS SAFE

Hereford Brand: Miss Laura Edwards, Korean missionary who was aboard the steamship "Empress of Canada," on the high seas during the recent earthquake in Japan and about whose safety fears were entertained, is safe, according to telegraphic advices received here by her relatives. The wire came from the headquarters of the Orient division of the Methodist church work and stated that all on board the Empress of Canada were uninjured.

This grateful news brought to an end the terrific strain under which Miss Edwards' family has been laboring for days. The Empress of Canada was due in Yokohama, Japan, September 6, and until receipt of the wire telling of the safety of the passengers nothing had been heard from her except that the ship was damaged but had limped into port.

The largest alligator in captivity is thought to be several hundred years old. It weighs 1,400 pounds and is thirteen and a half feet in length. The age is determined by the width of the nose between the eye-teeth. After the reptile is ten feet long, the nose widens one-quarter of an inch each fifty years the alligator lives. The average adult weighing about 1,000 pounds will yield approximately one and one half gallons of alligator oil and a valuable hide, which, when tanned, weighs from thirty-five to forty pounds.

The West Texas State Teachers College is a growing spirit, both in influence and in physical size; and it is necessary for every organization connected with it to grow also if it wishes to exist long. The Ex-Students Association has felt the call to expand into broader fields, and to take upon itself larger responsibilities. The feeling has become prevalent that the nature and work of the students and ex-students of any college can make or mar the future of that institution. Realizing this to be true, and feeling, as they do, the most profound love and loyalty to the fountain of their earliest inspiration, many of our students have seen the need of banding themselves together by indissoluble ties to assist in making the future of W. T. S. T. C. just what our beloved president hopes for it to be. Consequently they have been busy in strengthening and broadening the Ex-Students Association, the organization through which they can always work effectively with united effort.

The last year has seen the development of the desire to construct a lasting monument dedicated to the ideals which this college holds dear and commemorating the gratitude and affection which every ex-student feels for the Alma Mater. This undertaking we are all familiar with as the erection of the Mary E. Hudspeth Hall. There can be nothing which will bind people together more than having a vital part in the development of such a common interest.

In addition to this, earnest efforts have been made to organize county clubs of ex-students, and to build a stronger general association, to which end more officers have been elected, their duties have been broadened, membership fees have been increased, and an accurate card catalogue of ex-students' names and addresses is being worked up.

There remains much to be done; indeed the future invites us to limitless progress in this work. Those who are willing to expend a reasonable amount of time and energy can have the satisfaction of seeing the association benefit the college and the people of the

Panhandle in a very gratifying way—in no sense, should we be willing to rest upon the laurels of the past, but they should serve rather as a challenge to greater and nobler things in the future. And, let us remember that whatever we do, we can never repay the debt we owe to our school, for

"Thou hast taught us, Alma Mater
All we have to give;
In the joy of loving service
Ever let us live."

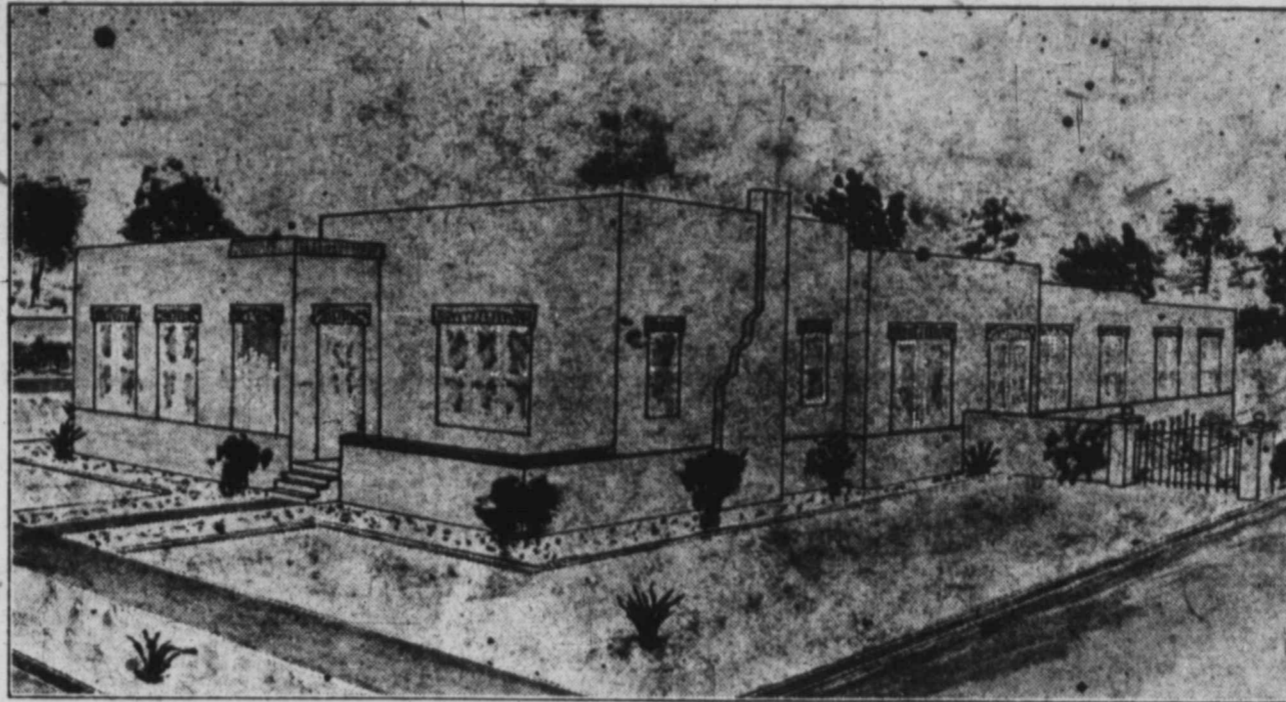
Each year Americans drink 4,000,000,000 bottles of soft drinks, exclusive of such beverages as near-beers made of cereals.

THE MARY E. HUDSPETH HALL



The Mary E. Hudspeth Hall, the proposed co-operative home for girls, as you know, is to be a gift of love and appreciation to Alma Mater from her grateful children.

The plan for the Hall calls for a one-story brick structure of the Spanish mission type of architecture with an attractive patio and other features which will make it distinctly Spanish both in atmosphere and style. The Spanish style of architecture was chosen for several reasons: first, because it is dear to the heart of the queenly woman for whom the hall has been named, the woman who has been the friend and counselor of the girls of this institution since it opened its doors in 1910, who has unreservedly given her time and her energy to the formation of their interests—Mary E. Hudspeth, head of the Spanish Department and Dean of Women in the college. Other reasons for the choice of this style of architecture are that it typifies the old West, and that it gives a pleasing air of comfort and hospitality.

The Hall will house twenty-two girls and a matron. It will include a reception hall, a dining room, a kitchen with modern built-in features, a butler's pantry, a supply pantry, twelve bedrooms with double closets, baths, and a corridor to run around the patio. In the basement will be found the laundry, a storage room for trunks, space for the heating plant and for fuel. In addition to the comfort and conveniences provided for in these arrangements, there will be the restful inner court, with its soft blue canopy of Panhandle skies, with flowers, swings, and tea tables to make the Hall a veritable haven for tired school girls and a place not wholly lacking in inspiration perhaps for those youths who during the twilight hours of verdant spring, radiant summer, and flaming autumn, feel the urge of love's young dream.

The immediate management of the Hall will be in the hands of a matron who will arrange the household duties so that each girl will be responsible for a definite portion of the work. This co-operative plan of housekeeping will materially reduce living expenses and at the same time will give opportunity for valuable training in the art of housekeeping and home making. The material benefits which living in the Hall will confer upon the girls are many, and those to whose hearts, the project is dear, fully appreciate this fact; but they are looking above and beyond these material advantages, to the larger spiritual values that will accrue to the girls and through them to the boys and girls of the state. It is for this reason that we want to place the girls in a refined atmosphere to make their surrounding attractive and uplifting; and we hope that the influence of such surroundings carried out by succeeding groups of girls in this and coming generations, will help raise standards of living and home making wherever the girls may go. Firm in this high hope, the ex-students of the

W. T. S. T. C. have consecrated themselves to the holy cause of making it possible for ambitious young girls with limited means to come and drink at the fountain of Alma Mater in surroundings that are worthy of her.

Perhaps those of you who have been away may be interested in the history of the development of the movement. In the summer of 1921, the students council which was composed largely of young men and women who had been out in the field and who had come back home for renewed inspiration, resolved that the time had come for the children of Alma Mater to give a practical expression of their feelings for her. It was agreed that one of the most pressing problems was that of improving housing conditions, particularly for those worthy students who, unable to pay current prices for board and room, resort to light housekeeping that they may remain in school. The members of the council decided that an attempt to help solve this problem would be a fitting expression of loyalty and love. Many plans were considered. Among these was that of a tent city to help relieve the crowded conditions that prevail every summer. This plan was rejected because it didn't appear to be a good business proposition to tie up as much money as the tents would cost in temporary quarters, which at best could be occupied during only a part of each year. Another plan considered was that of building small cottages on the campus. This plan was being investigated when the summer session came to a close. Thus no definite steps were taken, but a seed and been sown which was destined to bear fruit. The succeeding winter the Randall County Ex-Student organization was formed for the express purpose of working with the general Ex-Student Association, in maturing, if possible, the plans initiated in the Students' Council and of providing for the execution of these plans. Much time was given to a consideration of the cottage scheme. The plan appeared to be feasible from a business standpoint, but the questions arose: Is the arrangements best for our students? Will the home life be as cultural as is desirable for students who are to become moulders of the tastes and ideals of childhood? Cannot some scheme be devised which will include the benefits of the lowered cost of living and at the same time provide an ideal home situation? Finally the idea of a co-operative home for girls under the direction of the college was advanced and in a general meeting of the Ex-Student Association the members pledged themselves to the task of raising funds for the building of such a home. Thus you see that the movement is the result of mature deliberation.

The campaign to raise funds for the building was launched Wednesday, July 21, 1922. A legal corporation has been formed and chartered under the laws of the state. The charter provides that the incorporators and their successors in office shall constitute a

permanent Board of Directors for promoting the purposes of the organization, that the government and internal management of the Hall when erected shall be vested in the administrative officers of the W. T. S. T. C.; that the books and all financial records of the corporation shall be audited annually by the Secretary and Accountant of the W. T. S. T. C., and that the annual report of said Secretary and Accountant shall be published in the college paper, The Prairie, and in such other publications as the Board of Directors may designate.

The lots for the building have been purchased. They are across the street from the southeast corner of the campus, facing a little to the east of the President's home. Besides the amount paid for the lots and for publicity we have to our credit something near two thousand dollars. This sum has been pledged and paid by students, ex-students, friends of the institution, clubs and organizations of various kinds over the Panhandle. Perhaps the most gratifying occurrence in connection with the entire enterprise has been the very hearty co-operation of the men and women of our town and of the members of the faculty of the college. Due to their participation in performances staged by the Randall County Association we were enabled to clear in one program given last summer the sum of \$339.40, and in another during the winter about \$478. The Women's club of Canyon has gone on record as favoring the project. The Cousins and Sesame Literary Societies raised \$60.00 in one evening as a result of a double header basket ball game between women members of the faculty and girls from the Sesames, and between the "long" and "shorts" among the Cousins.

The Daughters of the American Revolution in their meeting during the winter in Amarillo, decided to donate \$100.00, preferably in the form of furnishings that they may add to from time to time. Mr. J. S. Smith, banker of Amarillo, has stated that he and his wife will present to the Hall the best encyclopedia that money can buy.

From all over the state letters are coming from ex-students expressing their delight in the project and their eagerness to help the movement, and these assertions are being substantiated by checks given individually or as

a result of some group activity. For example, the ex-students in and near the little town of Muleshoe held a bazaar a few weeks ago and sent as a result a check for \$51.00.

With such encouragement at home and abroad, the local ex-students of the W. T. S. T. C. believe that the Mary E. Hudspeth Hall is an assured fact, and we invite you who are going out from here at this time to make what we consider to be our privilege your privilege, and so now in a spirit of love and sincere appreciation to Alma Mater, let us each and every one pledge anew our energy toward the making—in the immediate future of our dream child, the proposed Mary E. Hudspeth Hall, into a living reality—a materialized Mary E. Hudspeth Hall.

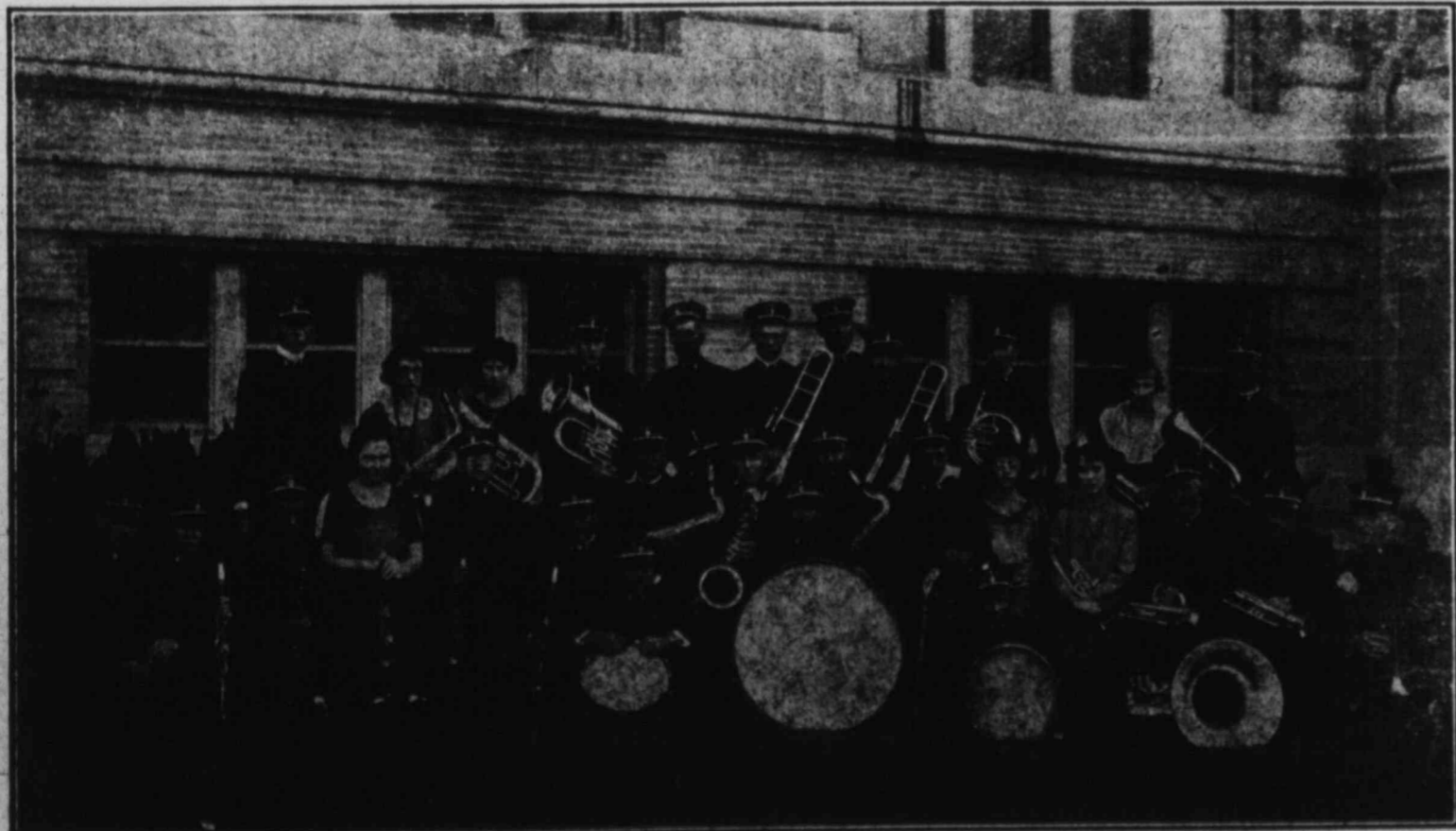

TEACHERS APPROVE WORK OF INSTITUTE AND VOTE TO RETURN TO THE COLLEGE NEXT SEPTEMBER

The West-Texas Teachers' Association closed the annual consolidated institute at the College Friday afternoon. Those attending were high in praise of the work accomplished during the week.

The following resolutions were adopted:
Report of resolutions committee of the West Texas Teachers' Association:
We the committee on resolutions submit the following report:

Be it resolved: First, That this Institute go on record as favoring the five day Institute as has been held heretofore.

Second, That we lend our assistance in every way possible to the committee which is to make the Educational Survey of our State within the next year.

Third, That we endorse the All-Panhandle School Fair that was held in Amarillo on May the fourth and fifth of last school year and recommend the formation of plans whereby this project may be perpetuated.

Fourth, That we lend our support to the National Illiteracy Commission by endeavoring in our respective school districts to eliminate illiteracy from the Panhandle counties represented in this Institute.

Fifth, That we believe in the County Unit plan of school management and urge that proper steps be taken towards its adoption.

Sixth, That this body of teachers endorse the present administration of the State Board of Education and express our approval of the special attention and help that is being given to the rural schools.

Seventh, That we go on record as favoring the consolidated Institute and believe it to be the most helpful plan. We also recommend that the Institute be held in Canyon next year.

Eighth, That the following relative to the Interscholastic League be approved: A general endorsement of the work of the league, that the larger schools in each county assume the leadership in pushing forward the work of the league, that every possible effort be made by county executive committees to enroll every school in their county, that we adopt the Code of Ethics of the National Association of athletic coaches as a guide in our athletic affairs, and that we do not give emphasis to the athletic activities of the league, but that each phase of the work be given full consideration and active support.

Ninth, That we express our sincere thanks and appreciation for the most excellent and efficient service rendered by the instructors of this Institute.

Tenth, That we also thank the following for their help in making this Institute a success and our stay during the week pleasant: The management of the College for the use of the buildings, grounds and their financial help; the Parent-Teachers Association for their splendid reception and entertainment given at the College; the Commercial Club of Canyon for their liberal donation; the citizenship of Canyon for their hospitality.

Eleventh, That we express our thanks to our Conductor, Mr. R. P. Jarrett, for his faithful and efficient service during this Institute.

Twelfth, That we recommend the executive committee of the Interscholastic League of District No. One, provide for appropriate trophies for all district contests, the same to be paid for out of the proceeds of the meet.

O. V. These folders will be printed on book paper.

The people living along the Yukon River in Yukon and Alaska bet when the great ice break will occur. They organize pools at Fairbanks and Dawson where large sums are won and lost at the betting. A pole four inches thick and twenty feet high is frozen in the ice in the middle of the river. A wire cable connects this pole with an electric stop clock on the shore, set to Standard Time. The second the ice moves the pole the clock stops, and that moment marks the record of the beginning of the ice break and decides all bets. The usual date is about May the 10th.

CHILDREN TO BE TAUGHT SAFETY

Anti-Accident Study Will Be Part of Regular Curriculum in Public Schools.

Atlantic City, N. J.—Two million school children this fall will begin the study of accident prevention as a part of the curricula, Marcus Dow of New York, president of the National Safety Council, reported recently to the executive committee and directors in session here. Special textbooks have been provided and other instruction by drill, slogans, statistics, organizations, debates and other features which are intended to reduce drastically the estimated annual 20,000 fatalities among school children.

School officials and teachers joined in mapping out the program and a textbook covering virtually every form of accident and prevention was compiled intended to appeal to the children's instincts for self-preservation and self-impressions, said the report.

Use English Classes.

For example, it is continued, English classes offered an unlimited field for work in accident prevention through reading, composition, speeches and debates. Drawing had an equally extensive scope through posters, construction, sand-table models, scrap book and bulletin boards.

An arithmetic class, it was found, could use accident statistics of the city, state and country as a basis for groups, problems, learning meanwhile to keep an accurate account of accidents so that the extent of the accident situation might be known. It was found civics could include the study of municipal governments' agencies for the protection of lives of citizens. Safety is emphasized in geography through the study of forest fires, and floods and peoples of various climates and countries.

Study Current Dangers.

Each month of the school year will be devoted to study of the accident danger most imminent at the time. These will start with street dangers, and continue through the list of fires, weapons, burns and scalds, poisons and asphyxiations, electric safety, falling objects, railway tracks and trains, accidents in play and drowning.

Mr. Dow disclosed that in some cities where safety education had been tried out, fatal accidents among school children had decreased nearly half. In Cleveland such deaths decreased by 161 in the year. A 50 per cent reduction resulted from six years of school safety work in Detroit, he said, and St. Louis also had made a good record. The larger cities where school superintendents have taken up accident prevention instruction included New York, Chicago, Cincinnati, Buffalo, Milwaukee, Seattle, Boston, Louisville, Rochester and Baltimore.

The American Museum of Natural History, Mr. Dow added, had co-operated with the council in preparing exhibits showing protection among animals, and showing the connection of preservation of life by present-day methods.

Automobile and Pump Gun Threaten U. S. Wild Life

Washington.—Dr. William T. Hornaday, the naturalist and director of the New York zoological garden, writing in a recent number of Nature, arraigns the automobile and the automatic shotgun as destroyers of wild life which threaten its extinction and recommends a reduction of 50 per cent in all bag limits and the length of all open seasons.

Hunting by automobile, rapidly on the increase, Doctor Hornaday says enables a shooting party to cover many times more ground than could be covered by a hunter afoot or on horseback. Added to that, he says, the modern rifle kills big game at a quarter of a mile or more and the automatic shotgun sprays pellets of lead "like water from a hose sprinkler." He recommends reducing the capacity of automatic and pump shotguns to two shots.

Bear Punctures Tires of Car Which Hit Him

Kane, Pa.—John H. Newell, of Buffalo, motored into Kane and told of meeting a big bear on the road 15 miles from here.

He said that as he rounded a curve he saw 100 feet ahead a large black bear at a point where high banks bordered the road for a considerable distance. He speeded up the car and started in pursuit. He soon caught up with it and struck the animal. The infuriated bear turned and snapped at a front wheel, puncturing the tire in three places.

The bear then scrambled up the bank and disappeared into the woods. Newell offered as evidence an almost new tire with three holes in it.

Beats Hard Luck by Drowning Self

Chicago.—"I dreamed that I was going to have some bad luck. I guess I'll beat that bad luck."

These were the last words of Stanley Janik of this city. He plunged into the river after speaking them and was drowned.

LEARN FACTS ABOUT STEEL

Interesting Discoveries Concerning Most Useful Metal That Have Recently Been Made.

Very fascinating are the unsolved problems of metallurgy which were discussed at a recent meeting of an institution of civil engineers.

There is a common carbon steel which, when heated to 725 degrees centigrade and quenched in brine bends on becoming cold, 43 degrees, and possesses the hardness number 228 on the Brinnell scale. If heated only ten degrees higher, to 735 degrees, and then quenched and cooled, it bends only 1 1/2 degrees and its hardness becomes 512. Finally, when the heat is increased another 5 degrees, to 740 degrees, the effect is that the steel will not bend at all and its hardness number rises to 713.

All these results are produced by a range of temperature less than that experienced by the air on an ordinary spring day. There is a steel containing 20 per cent of nickel which is almost non-magnetic and has a tenacity of 40 tons per square inch. If immersed in liquid air it becomes strongly magnetic and its tenacity rises to 115 tons. Then, after returning to ordinary temperature, it retains a tenacity of 115 tons.

RELATIVES DIED WITH CUSTER

Many Members of the Famous Soldier's Family Lost Their Lives in the "Massacre."

In the battle of the Little Big Horn, popularly known as the "Custer Massacre," in the government's campaign against the Sioux Indians in the summer of 1876, and in which, besides Gen. George A. Custer, every man in his command lost his life, several near relatives of Custer were among the killed.

With Custer in that memorable fight was his brother, Capt. Tom Custer, the only man in the United States army who held two medals for capturing two flags with his own hands in the Civil war. After the battle the Sioux chief, Rain-in-the-Face, made good a previous threat, and accomplished a terrible revenge for an old grievance against Captain Custer by cutting open the breast of the brave young soldier and eating his heart. Calhoun, a brother-in-law of the general, was among the slain, as was Boston Custer, another brother of the general, who was civilian forage master of the Seventh cavalry, and Auntie Reed, the general's nephew—a mere boy, who wanted to see something of life in the West, and who had welcomed with joy this opportunity to make the campaign.

Learned Barbarisms.

The use of Greek or Latin roots from which to form new words, required by the advance of scientific knowledge, is almost universal among learned men. On the whole the practice is useful, but it can be carried to absurdity. Dr. Brudenell Carter, the English oculist, in one of his books, protests against doctors who air their supposed acquirements by coining horrible verbal compounds that are usually intended to express very simple conditions.

I have, he writes, seen dacryocysto-syringokataleisis used to express obstruction of the tear duct, and amphi-blestrocitis to express inflammation of the retina of the eye. I once met a country cabinetmaker who built wooden frames, covered with needwork, to protect polished fenders against the feet. He sought a name for his contrivance from the local schoolmaster, who furnished him with antitribosodochedion and with a literal translation—an against-friction-of-the-ashes receptacle!—Youth's Companion.

Paradise of Departed Heroes.

The way in which the departed Scandinavian heroes passed their time in Valhalla, or in the palace of Odin, is described in several places in the Edda.

They have every day the pleasure of arming themselves, marshalling themselves in military order, engaging in battle, and being all cut to pieces; but when the stated hour of repast arrives their bodies are reunited, and they return on horseback safe to the hall of banquet, where they feed heartily on the flesh of a boar and drink beer out of the skulls of their enemies, until they are in a state of intoxication. Odin sits by himself at a particular table. The heroes are served by the beautiful virgins named Valkirie, who officiate as their cup-bearers. But the pleasures of love do not enter at all into the joys of this extraordinary paradise.

Made No Hit That Night.

A certain actor, who walked across the stage in a street scene of a third-rate drama, was very fond of telling his friends what he would accomplish when he had a speaking part. No matter how small it was, he would show them what real acting meant.

Eventually his opportunity came. He was to appear in one of the scenes and say two words—"It is."

For three weeks, nightly, before his mirror he rehearsed; trying all sorts of gestures, expressions and tones, until he felt perfect.

The eventful night arrived when the curtain was to rise on the new play for the first time, and the actor impatiently awaited his cue. It came. "And so this is the end?"

With his best tragedian air he stalked to the center of the stage and in a voice of thunder cried: "Is it?"

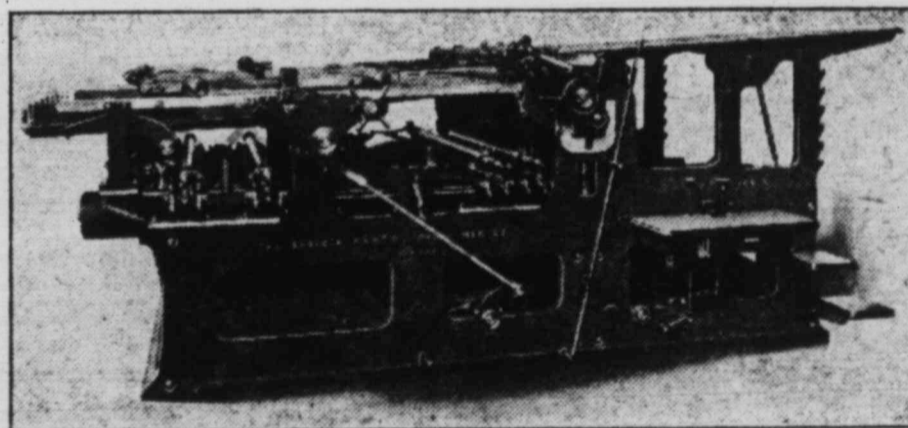

The following department heads were appointed by Mr. McClure and he requests that they get busy to see that everything regarding their department is attended to: Agricultural exhibit—D. N. Redburn. Poultry—R. A. Campbell. Hogs—Poland Chinas, Forrest Burton; Duroc Jerseys, John Knight. Dairy cattle—A. B. Haynes. Herefords—Bob Stratton. Short Horns—Dr. C. E. Donnell. Those who wish to bring in their exhibits early may report to Mr. McClure. All exhibits will be assembled in the county agent's office until fair date.

In stock judging, no premiums will be awarded except on registered stock. Where there is only one exhibitor in a class, first premium will be awarded, but only second money awarded. The department managers have the right to reject any stock from exhibition if the animals are affected with disease. Exhibitors in the poultry show are requested to bring their own coops. Any kind of a coop will be allowed in the show. It was impossible to rent suitable coops for the show this year. Farmers are urged to bring in grain samples, melons, fruits and other farm products. Mr. McClure is trying to arrange suitable amusements during the fair. Concessions for the three days are to be sold. Competent judges will be selected from the A. & M. College for the different classes. The Futurity Show will be one of the big attractions of the fair. Two hundred dollars in cash premiums are being offered for the Futurity Show.

J. W. Carr and J. M. Gibson have presented to the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society two State Warrants of \$10.00 which were issued in 1863. One was issued to I. W. Dibrell and the other to W. W. Reynolds; one for military and the other for civil service. One was issued April 30, 1863, and the other May 29, 1863. Mr. Carr and Mr. Gibson had Judge Worth A. Jennings send the warrants to Austin recently to see if the state would redeem them. It was stated that a large number of these old warrants were outstanding but that the appropriations for these causes had long ago been exhausted.

FIVE HUNDRED MORE PEOPLE IN CANYON TODAY THAN THERE WERE ONE YEAR AGO—BIG DEMAND FOR HOMES

There are at least five hundred more people in Canyon today than there were a year ago! This statement is made by the public utilities of Canyon, which are always a safe check upon the prosperity of a town. Not long ago the telephone company discovered that Canyon was the second fastest growing exchange in the state, being very close after Dallas, and leading Amarillo by a good percent. The light company states that it has one hundred more customers on the books today than last year, which means about five hundred additional people. The city finds that water users have increased in proportion. In spite of the fact that more than a hundred new houses have been built in the city during the past year or eighteen months, there is a great shortage in homes. One firm states that it has had at least a hundred opportunities to rent homes to people who wanted to move to Canyon. The big increase in public school attendance is another evidence in the rapid growth that has been made in the city's population during the past year. Canyon has a population of 5,000 if all of the citizens and business men get on the job of telling the world the truth about the advantages of Canyon.

GO TO THE COUNTY FAIR!

The County Fair, like Christmas, comes only once a year. Therefore, every farmer in the county ought to go. The next thought is that a County Fair is a farmers' show, therefore every farmer ought to take something to his county agricultural show. If only a few farmers take exhibits the Fair is a poor one. If a great many take exhibits, then the fair is a good one. This year there has not been plenty of rain to make good crops. But there are some very fine crops in spite of the dry weather. Any farmer can find on his place some excellent crop specimens to exhibit at the Fair. Stock are in good condition and will require but little "fitting" for the Fair. For those reasons this is the year that every county should try to have the best Fair in the history of the country. This is possible if all farmers will make exhibits.

One of the most common remarks heard at a county fair is "I have a better hog than that at home," or better corn, or better maize. We have heard that remark ever since fairs were started; but remember, the stuff you bring to the Fair is what counts. If you have better products at home then you could make your County Fair better by bringing your products. But if you and others like you keep your stuff at home then you are to blame for the poor exhibits. Why don't you bring those fine exhibits and make the Fair better? You will profit in two ways—first you will get your farm and yourself advertised a good deal which may quickly result in some good sales of your best products or livestock; second your county becomes widely advertised agricultural county, which contributes indirectly to your prosperity.

If you are disposed to think your stock and crops are too sorry to show you should just remember that it is your neighbors who do take exhibits and some win the ribbons. Are you going to admit that they are all better farmers than yourself? Of course they are not, but if you don't go and prove your ability they will prove their superiority as farmers and the laugh is on you. Show what you have. You may be surprised at your winnings. Success is encouraging.

Can't Depend on Almanac Forecasts Says Weather Bureau

The publishing of weather forecasts by days for an entire calendar year as practiced by many almanacs is undoubtedly based on the willingness of many people to accept without question anything that appears in print, says the Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture. Actually such forecasts are not based on sound principles and therefore are without any value whatsoever. Accurate prediction of the weather and temperature for a season in advance can not be made for places in general because there are no known laws on which to base them. An exception to this statement is found in the case of forecasting the strength of the monsoon winds of India, on which the summer rains of that country are dependent. These forecasts, while not claiming to be infallible, give in general terms an indication as to whether the rainfall will be above, below, or approximately normal for the summer months. They are, therefore, valuable.

The farmer who attempts to carry on his business with only almanac forecasts to guide him must necessarily lose rather than gain by following them. Similarly, forecasts of weather and temperature for a long time in advance published in the newspapers should be disregarded in planning farming operations. When daily weather maps of the world can be made the first step at arriving at the principles of seasonal weather forecasting will be possible.

Mrs. Phoebe K. Warner of Claude, one of the best informed and most interesting newspaper writers in Texas, in a recent contribution to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, talks about the public schools of Texas in the following manner:

"1,297,991 school children in Texas.
11,399 schools in Texas.
33,683 teachers in Texas.
20.2 per cent of these teachers are men.
79.8 per cent of these teachers are women.

"The public school system is one of the most wonderful systems on earth. The only reason it does not function at 100 per cent efficiency is because the people who own the system and make the system and pay the system and furnish the raw materials to keep the system going right or wrong, are the people who take the least interest in it and pay the least attention to it.

But these are the bare facts. Let's repeat them:

1,297,991 school children.
11,399 schools.
33,683 teachers.

"You bet it is a big, big job, and somebody will have to do a lot more than he ever expects to get paid for in order to make up for those who will not earn what they get and then bring things out even next Spring. To look those figures in the face almost blinds one. And they would blind us if we had any conception of their meaning. But who ever saw more than a million school children in one pile? And who can conceive of a million children all at once?"

"To think of all the schools and all the school children in Texas in one breath is staggering. The task of collecting them and training them all for life seems all but hopeless. But right here is where the beauty and the simplicity of the system comes in. No one except Mr. Marrs has to think of all of them, and he is furnished with helpers to rest him once in a while, when the State needs him for other duties. All any of us have to do is to look at these figures and then pick out our own little ONE school with its special teacher and our own children and make the very best school possible of our small part of the system.

"That's our individual job. That is our community job. And it ought to be one of the happiest privileges in all our lives. There should be nothing hard about it. It should be a joy to get together as mothers and fathers and school-boys and girls and make OUR school the very best one in the whole State. And the reason we happen to know this and the reason we believe this is because we happen to know a few communities in Texas where the owners of the school and the children are doing this very thing. They are making the school, the school-

house, the school grounds, and the school equipment and the school activities the greatest work in their community. They are putting their whole heart into the building up of their school and they are the happiest, proudest folks we know anywhere. And the best of all is they are building up their own lives and their own characters and the morals of their entire community by setting a real goal for their school.

"You don't have to educate the whole million and a quarter and then some. Your part is just your part. Your very own. That's all. And if every school district in Texas would only resolve to do its best this year for its own children, this big, big job would simply become a big, big joy."

Nothing particular has been done to make this growth possible. Just thin, what might have been the growth of the town if we had had on the job during the past year a good live commercial secretary who was on the job every minute telling the people of Northwest Texas the wonderful opportunities that they could find right here in Canyon. Canyon is to continue to grow. The town will grow in spite of what the citizens do or leave undone. But just think what a wonderful growth can be accomplished with all of our citizens and all of our business interests working hand in hand for a greater town. The greatest towns in the country today are the ones built under the most trying condition and in the least suitable place for a big city. They have realized their present development, not on account of their natural resources, but in spite of their disadvantages, all of which were overcome by the persistent effort of the enterprising citizens. Get into the game and help double Canyon's population during the next three years.

Some people in Canyon thought during the period of construction that the new high school building was entirely too large and would not be filled in ten years. On the very first opening day, the study hall proved to be too small to accommodate the big student body. It has always been the same. We understand that when the first unit of the old school building was erected there were many who thought such a large house could never be used. Unless we are badly mistaken in five or six years it will be necessary to replace the old building with a modern ward building equally as large as the new high school building. Canyon is in the educational business. As long as we stay in the education business this will be an attractive town which will draw more and more people. Good public schools is one of the ways to make the city grow, such as it has grown during the past year, and it is the best possible way to help the College grow as it should grow.

The Randall County Fair is not the biggest fair in the world; nor is it the biggest fair in Texas. A county fair is an institution established that neighbor may show neighbor what each is able to produce, and to exchange ideas on production. It is a great educational institution when entered in the right spirit. Let all the farmers of Randall county enter into the spirit of making the Randall County Fair the best one ever held.

TO SPEND \$1,300,000 ON RIVER BRIDGE

Canadian Record: When Chief Engineer Harris of the Santa Fe railway offices was down from Chicago a few days ago inspecting the newly completed approach to the railway bridge over the Canadian River at this place, he is quoted as making the statement that the work of building the approach had cost \$70,000.00 but that the repairs are only temporary, and do not come up to the requirements of a standard bridge. That he would recommend the putting in of more concrete piers at each end of the present bridge which is over the center of the river only, and the building of additional spans so that the approaches can be taken out and the bridge extended en-

tirely across the river, which is over one-half mile wide at this place. There are at present several hundred feet of approaches in the river bed at both the north and south ends of the bridge. Jetties will also be built to keep the river from running wild and from cutting new channels.

It is estimated that the work of lengthening the bridge will require an expenditure of about \$1,300,000.00, and that the work will be done this coming winter.

CAPITAL SYNDICATE OFFERS STATE CHOICE OF TRACTS

Austin, Texas.—The Capital Syndicate has offered the State of Texas three selections of land in satisfaction of the final judgment obtained for the recovery of excess acreage in the original grant of 3,000,000 acres made in payment for the State Capital, in Austin. Each selection comprises 59,298 acres of land, the amount of the judgment. None of it is in a solid body, it being in two tracts in Archer county, three in Dallam and Hartley counties.

In the near future the Attorney General and the Land Commissioner will inspect the land tendered to see if it is of the same general average value of the remainder of the land in the grant. They will also decide which of the three propositions will be accepted, should one or all come up to the average.

If the land is accepted by the State it will be surveyed under the direction of the Land Commissioner and placed on the market for sale. While the Dallam County tracts are said to be of high average value, they are a little far north. However, that may not be a bar to acceptance.

Contract for Bridge at Six-Mile Crossing is Let by the Court

A contract was let Monday by the Commissioners Court for a new bridge over the Palo Duro creek at the Six-Mile Crossing.

Up until this spring the crossing at this place was made by fording. In ordinary conditions the ford was easy to cross and the water never deep. In the big flood that swept down the creek last spring a great gully was washed out at the place the ford formerly existed. A ditch seventeen feet deep and sixty feet wide was all there was left of the gently sloping ford of possibly four feet deep. It was one of the hardest washouts ever seen along the Palo Duro.

The Austin Bridge Company of Dallas will construct the bridge.

DIFFERENT WAYS OF DEALING WITH THE HOT SCHOOL LUNCH

The idea of at least one hot dish at the noon meal for rural school children has developed rapidly in the counties of North Carolina through the influence of food production and food preparation demonstrations carried on by extension workers. In some places questions concerned with obtaining materials for the lunch, equipment for heating and serving it or time to prepare it, have arisen. These have been met in various ways, according to a report received by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The Women's Club at Lilesville, Anson county, N. C., partly financed the hot lunch school last year, and it was also supplemented by things brought from home. Each teacher, with the aid of the larger girls, prepared the hot soup for her own room. The rural children enjoyed it immensely, and all the town children wanted to stay, too. In the summer 250 quarts of soup mixture and tomatoes were canned by mothers and donated for winter lunches.

In two schools in Halifax County the larger girls do the work connected with serving the hot lunch, under the supervision of the teacher. It is so divided that only two or three are taken away from classes at a time. When the girls are on duty they plan their menus and see that the supplies are on hand.

In one community a woman gives all the milk needed. Some of it is sold for 3 cents a glass. This money is used to buy other supplies. All lunch dishes are sold at cost. In another place the children bring a great many of the supplies from home, such as potatoes, canned tomatoes, milk, and eggs. No charge is made for the hot dish. Considerable improvement in quality of the cold lunch carried was noticed in most schools after demonstrations in food selection and preparation given by the home demonstration agent.

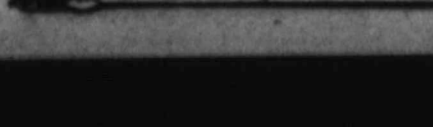

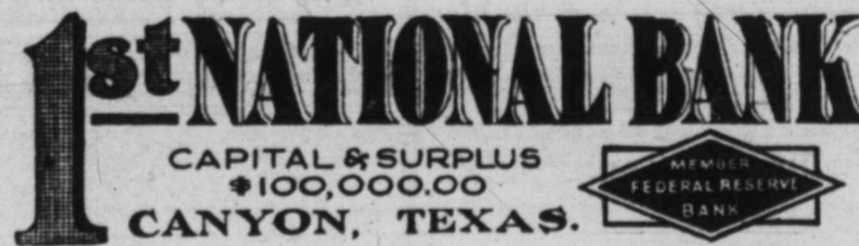
