Mr. Jennings emphasized the need of farmers to take advantage of the fagood seed. There were only a few cilities of the Chamber of Commerce. reputable seed companies, but there were many bootleggers in the cotton seed business who bought any kind of seed and sold them at good prices for pure seed. A half bushel of good seed to the acre was sufficient. It would take nearly a bushel of bootleg or gin run seed to the acre-there fore pure seed was cheaper in the long run than ordinary seed.

Asked pointedly what kind of seed he recommended, Mr. Jennings stated that he had found at Lubbock the Mebane variety to be the best. He recommended seed from the Plains if they could be procured, but knew of no pure seed in this section owing to the bad weather this fall. He stated that the Lubbock experiment station had made a thorough test of seeds from all parts of the state that one developed as quickly as the other after the seed once came up. The Plains seed seemed to come up a little sooner than seed from other sections.

Mr. Jennings knew of only a small amount of pure seed for sale, and appointed a committee of J. M. Craig. Tom Slack and George Frank to investigate buying these for the farm-

Mr. Roffey states that in the opinion of C. C. Frampton of Amarillo, recently connected with the brick manufactory there and who brings a sheaf of letters of reference as to his ability and experience, the local clays are much better than those obtainable at Amarillo, due to their freedom of foreign substances. Mr. Roffey computes that it would require around \$30,000 capital to set up a plant here, but believes that it would pay 100 per cent annual dividends, due largely to freight rate sav-

If these statements can be borne out, it would seem in the interest of the city that the Chamber should investigate and obtain sufficient expert information in the matter ot be able to advise intelligently with prospective promotors of such an institution, whether financed by foreign or local capital.

Another of Canyon's pressing needs is an ice plant. Seventy cents to \$1 a hundred for ice is a price which it would seem should make the installation of a plant here a matter of paramount importance for householders and business men alike.

It is very probable that it would be more economical and profitable to install such a plant in connection with some other industrial organization, as a cotton gin or electric light plant. The light company, it seems, is not anxious to make further outlay unless the city will waive its right to take over the light company's holding here in 1925. It is believed the city is now ready to do this.

A definite expression from the city commission would give the light company the right of way to install an ice plant, if favorable, and if not would open the way for the securing of a plant through some other source,

Still another proposition which should evoke much interest in Canyon is the question of a laundry. While there have been several attempts to begin a laundry business here, the plants installed have either been too small to

ONE JAP DREAM IS SHATTERED

Marked by Relinquishment of Tsingtao Leasehold.

CAME TO LIFE 24 YEARS AGO

Snatched From Its Existence as a Shabby Fishing Village Germany Spent Sixty Millions to Transform It Into "Spotless Town" to Serve as Gateway to German Kultur and Commerce-Taken Over by Japan at Outbreak of War and Again Transformed.

"The relinquishment of Tsingtag and the Kiaochow leasehold by Japan recently, and its subsequent troubles with Chinese bandits mark the passing of one dream of Japanese expansion in the Flowery Kingdom, just as the surrender of the same territory to Japan almost exactly eight years ago marked the tragic end of the dream of German imperialism in the country," remarks a bulletin from the Washington headquarters of the National Geographic society.

"This 200-square-mile slice of famous old Shantung," continues the bulletin, "for millenniums had little in its lot to distinguish it from similar sleepy patches of China's coast country. Suddenly it awoke 24 years ago with the world's spotlight beating fully upon it. It has been in the glare ever since; the bone of contention of empires, and an object for powerful if immaterial diplomatic forces and ultimatums, when it was not the target for all too material naval guns and their high explosive shells.

From Shabbiness to Prosperity. "Tsingtao, the port of the Klaochow leasehold, has been a veritable Cinderella among oriental communities -and to mix the metaphor, a chameleon nationally. Snatched from its existence as a shabby fishing village it was made into a 'Spotless Town,' to serve first as a gateway for German kultur and commerce; and later as an entrepot for Japanese influence and

"When Germany decided to compete" with other European nations that were taking possession of slices of Chinese territory, and landed her forces at Tsingtao in 1898, it consisted of little more than a narrow main street lined by low Chinese buildings with paper windows and straw roofs.

The German flag came down in November and most of the Germans were sent to Japan as prisoners. Civilian Japanese as well as soldiers poured in; and while the architecture of 'Little Berlin' remained for the most part unaltered. the whole atmosphere of the place became that of Japan. On their part the Japanese displayed greater energy even than had the Germans, to give the city its second transformation, There, amid the incongruous German buildings, blossomed the influence and culture of Nippon. Indeed the Japanese were more thorough than their predecessors. By the middle of 1920 more than 28,000 Japanese had moved to the city. Schools had been established for teaching Chinese to the newcomers, as well as the regular system of lower and higher Japanese public schools. Commerce through the port grew amazingly, most of the hips, flying the Japanese flag.

"Three out of four apparently healthy persons examined reveal physical impairments of which they are ignorant and which are usually easily remediable or preventable. And if more than fulfilled," says the council.





HISTORY SOCIETY WILL BANQUET

TO BE HELD AT TEACHERS COL-LEGE FEBRUARY 15.

Many Old Timers to be Here, Drive is Being Inaugurated to Increase

Plans are being made for the annual banquet of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society to be held in the Home Economics dining room of the Teachers College on February 15th at 6:00 o'clock, Mrs. T. V. Reeves, director of the Bureau of Public Service of the College, announces.

Speakers for the banquet program have been chosen, and the most interesting program the Society has ever had is expected to be given. Not only members of the Society will be allowed to attend the banquet, but anyone interested in the pioneer history of the Panhandle-Plains country or in any other phase of the work, Mrs. Reeves says, may attend. The price of tickets to the banquet will be one dollar.

Many old timers from all sections of the Panhandle are expected to be in attendance at the banquet and the business session of the Society which will take place at 4:30 on the day of the banquet. Hon. T. F. Turner of Amarillo, president of the organization, has appointed Misses Ritchie and Auderson and Prof. Wallace R. Clark as a committee to nominate officers for

the coming year. The Society is about to inaugurate a drive to increase its membership. A part of the money raised from membership fees will be used in marking the Adobe Walls battle ground. The marking of this battle ground is expected to be the first of a series as the Society expects to mark every such battleground in the Panhandle.

Mrs. Reeves states that the organization is endeavoring at present to make an extensive collection of brands and branding irons used by the ranchmen in the early days of this section.
