#### **Good Cotton Seed Scarce This Year** Says State Expert

Many planting seeds on the market at the present time are of inferior quality, according to J. M. Del Curto, chief of the division of pathology and seeds, Department of Agriculture, Austin, Texas. Unfavorable weather conditions is responsible for the low grade of the seeds, according to Mr. Del Curto. In speaking of the situation, Mr. Del Curto has the following to say:

"The unfavorable weather conditions which prevailed over a great portion of the Southern States during harvesting time have not only delayed threshing, but have caused much of the planting seed of various agricultural field crops to be of inferior quality as pertains to germination. Tests made on various kinds of field seeds by the State seed laboratory at Austin have verified these facts. Many of the sorghums and especially the nonsaccharine sorghums, such as kafir, feterita and mile are unusually low. However, most of the earlier tests were about normal, indicating that a portion of the first seed harvest escaped the unfavorable conditions. This, of course, affects the general averages of germination tests made on new crop seeds and should be held in mind when considering these averages, which are as follows: , Milo, 63 per cent; kafir, 57 per cent; feterita, 70 per cent.

Big Demand for Cotton Seed "The greatest interest that is being taken in cotton should bring a heavy demand for seed as the season progresses. The germination of cotton er this year on the account of the presence of a large number of sensitive lots of seed. By a "sensitive" lot is meant cotton seed that shows a satisfactory percentage of live seed, but a poor actual percentage of germination. Cotton seed of strong vitality will show a high percentage of germination, and a high percentage of live seed. Sensitive lots under very favorable conditions will produce a stand nearly equivalent to live seed percentage, but under ordinary or slightly adverse conditions behave in the field as indicated by the standard germination percentage. The average germination test on new crop

live seed average is 90 per cent. "The Texas seed law requires that the germination percentage be placed on the tested seed label of all cotton seed that is offered for sale, but leaves it optional with the dealer to place the live seed percentage as a supplement.

Use Care in Selecting Seeds "In as much as the production of a good crop depends a great deal upon the acquisition of a satisfactory stand during the proper planting time, the planter should use care in selecting his field seeds this year and have all suspicious lots tested before planting. The State seed laboratory of the Department of Agriculture is already being rushed with a great variety of field seeds and the work should be of great benefit to both seedsmen and farmers

It may be an annoyance to feel that others have education and you lack it. one ever will be again. There are specialists; that is, men who recognize what is possible at the start and seek to master only one little acre in the vast realms of knowledge. But unfortunately even the specialist is outdistanced. With a hundred books a year published on his particular subject, he cannot pretend to keep up with what it is indispensable that he should know. Unfortunately too specialties are so correlated that you cannot really know one without knowing a dozen others.

What is the remedy? There is this obvious lesson: that education must come to deal more and more with doing rather than with knowing. The nineteenth century rated mere knowledge too high. The twentieth must effect an adjustment by which we shall train our habits and instincts of living to the highest possible efficiency and trouble ourselves much less with the barren why.

Mr. Travis Shaw, Secretary of the College, talked to the economics class on the Federal Reserve Bank and other practical phases of banking last

Mr. Shaw, who spent some years as a banker, discussed in detail the organization of the bank from the side of the banker, and with the relation of the bank to the depositors. He then took up the discussion of the operation of the banking system before the Federal Reserve Act. The discussion of the weaknesses of the banking system before the federal reserve act included the condition which operated to place the money center of the United States in Wall Street. At other times it is better disposed, yet not quite amiable -boisterously humorous, usually at the expense of people who dislike boisterous humor. But even those people will admit that now it has got rid of its malic and is merely prankish and not above playing the clown.

When the wind ceases to be aggressive, it becomes gentle, confiding, sympathetic, affectionate; it soothes and caresses, it stimulates and refreshes. It seems then to have the most agreeable personality of all the forces in the natural world. To the poet's imagination it becomes a lover murmuring endearments to his lady, or a mother singing a lullaby to her babe, or an old nurse crooning softly to a child.




