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**THE PRIMARY ELECTION.**

The primary election Saturday was a bitter disappointment to the voters who thought that Texas democracy had become big enough to elect an outstanding business man for governor. As the case stands this Wednesday morning, Texas will have to choose between the two least capable candidates to become governor next January.

Mrs. Ferguson will be the tool of her husband, an impeached governor of Texas, convicted by the state senate of misconduct in office, and who is held by the courts incapable of holding office. Robertson is the tool of the old anti bunch, the Ku Klux Klan and is bossed by a rank republican saloon druggist of Dallas.

We had great hope that the democracy of Texas was big enough to elect Lynch Davidson, the only outstanding big business man in the race, and a man who has served his state with honor. Lynch Davidson was defeated simply because thousands of voters paid their obligation to favorite sons, whom they knew stood not the least chance of election. Had the Barton vote of the Panhandle not been wasted, as practically every voter knew when he cast the Barton vote, Lynch Davidson would have lead the ticket.

As the case stood Saturday, Barton received 27,000, Collins 24,000, Burkett 18,000, Dixon 4,000. We do not believe there were a hundred voters who supported these candidates who honestly thought for a moment that they stood the least chance of election. A large part of this vote would have gone to Lynch Davidson, if it had been placed where the voters honestly thought it should go.

The result of the second primary is not by any means a settled fact. Robertson polled the solid Klan vote. His followers expect a repetition of the 1922 episode when klansman Mayfield easily won over Farmer Jim. It is not certain that the same story will be told in this race. If the Klan would put out a capable candidate, it would not be such a bad thing to have to vote for one occasionally. If Robertson is elected the republicans will be ruling Texas, although the party is of little consequence in the state. Will the voters of Texas hold their noses long enough to vote for Robertson in preference to the woman? If Jim was out of the case, there would be no question of the outcome.

Politically, Texas is between the devil and the deep blue sea.

The rottenness of the convention system lead to the adoption of the primary system. Has there been an improvement?

In the primary two years ago, the two least fit—Mayfield and Ferguson—lead the ticket, and were in the second primary.

With more than 700,000 votes cast Saturday, Robertson and Mrs. Ferguson win places in the second primary with less than 300,000 votes cast for the two. The majority of the voters are thus refused their choice in the matter.

In the convention in New York, two unfit lead the balloting for one hundred ballots, and finally both were eliminated and a good man selected.

Viewing it from recent elections in Texas, is the primary system a success?

Since the Klan is now an issue in the republican and the democratic parties, and since the Klan in Texas is headed by republican Zeke Marvin and sponsored by democratic Tom Love, are klansmen either republicans or democrats? Is not the Klan a separate and independent political organization which should be refused a place in either of the republican or democratic parties?

**THE PASSING DAY**

The movement of the present administration to establish parks throughout Texas is a most commendable effort, and one which will be long remembered to its credit. Unfortunately there will be a change in the state administration before much progress can be made in securing the park sites and the next one may be indifferent about the matter or may be too much occupied to give it the necessary attention. There should be a number of parks in every county in the State and an educational campaign should be conducted to create interest in their proper maintenance. There should, in addition to these numerous local parks be a few large parks of such attraction and magnitude that the whole State could feel a pride in them.

Most of the cities of Texas appear to have sufficient interest in securing city park sites, though it must be admitted that but few cities are as yet properly keeping up those they have. Very few towns and villages of the State seem to be at all concerned about local parks or to appreciate them as assets to their communities. Of course parks are not so much needed where real estate values are low and almost every home is set on a large, well-kept lot, but there is a community need that the home lawn, however attractive, cannot supply. The town park should be made the town gathering place for outdoor amusements and recreation. It is noticeable that the towns and villages that have attractive parks have a town pride that is not found in those places where there are no parks.

Every once in a while some one asks me "What is the matter with East Texas and why do so many people leave there to locate in sections that are perhaps less favored?" Really there is nothing the matter with East Texas unless it be a lack of community interest and effort. Taken as a whole one will not find a bigger-hearted, better people on earth than in East Texas. Their individual and family hospitality is unbounded. As individuals most of them are fairly progressive and enterprising, but in many places unified community co-operation is largely lacking. They do not pull together with the teamlike effort that characterizes most thrifty communities. Each individual, each family, is doing fairly well, it is easy to make a living, and the advantage to be derived from all working together for the general good is not as clearly felt as it might be.

When the boys and girls grow up, instead of creating through community effort, some enterprise or industry for them to engage in at home, the well-to-do old people just let them drift away to those places that are affording better opportunities. The west is hustling and is constantly calling attention to what it is doing, and boys and girls leave East Texas homes, not because they are anxious to leave, but because other places give them something to do. That is why so many places are no larger and no better than they were a quarter or a half century ago. Individual effort in East Texas is not strong enough to combat community effort in other sections. It can't do it anywhere. To keep the boys and girls from leaving their home towns and villages the people must work together, not separately, to provide something worth while for them to do.

Bad roads have done more to hinder East Texas development than anything else. Co-operation is negligible where people have difficulty in getting together. The mountainous sections

without roads are the most backward countries to be found. West Texas has been fortunate in having good natural roads across unfenced lands and it has profited thereby. When it saw the necessity of building roads the people began getting together to build them. Many places in East Texas are now building roads, and wherever they have been built the country and towns are taking on new life, and have a community pride not dreamed of a few years ago. They find it pays to work together and they are beginning to build together in a way to hold their young people and keep them employed at home. The progressive communities and towns are not only holding their own, but they are attracting from less progressive places the young blood so essential to progress and development.

Successful merchandising is done the same way. The merchant whose store force is idle more than half the year is not likely to make much profit from his business. In those sections where only one crop is grown business is good while the crop is being marketed, extra and often incompetent help has to be employed during the rush season, and the rest of the year the sales force is standing around consuming the profits of the busy season. Rents and overhead expenses go on without interruption even though business all may stop.

The only successful way to farm to manufacture goods, to merchandise, to do anything is to arrange for a steady output of labor and effort and a steady income. It is easier to do this on the farm than anywhere else, and yet it is less practiced there. Our soil and our climate lend themselves to varied production of crops and farmers can grow almost everything in Texas, but they are not doing it in many sections of the state. It is something that each one can do for himself without waiting for his neighbor to act, or without asking permission from others.

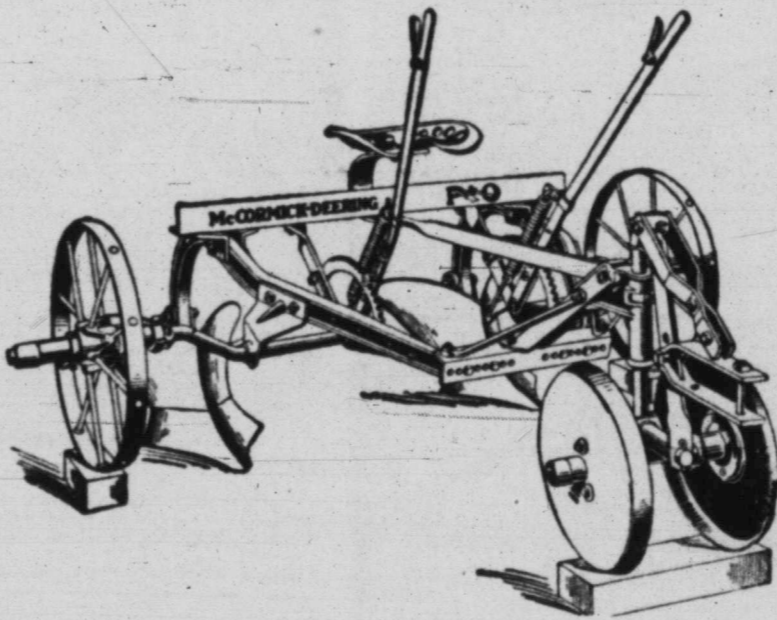

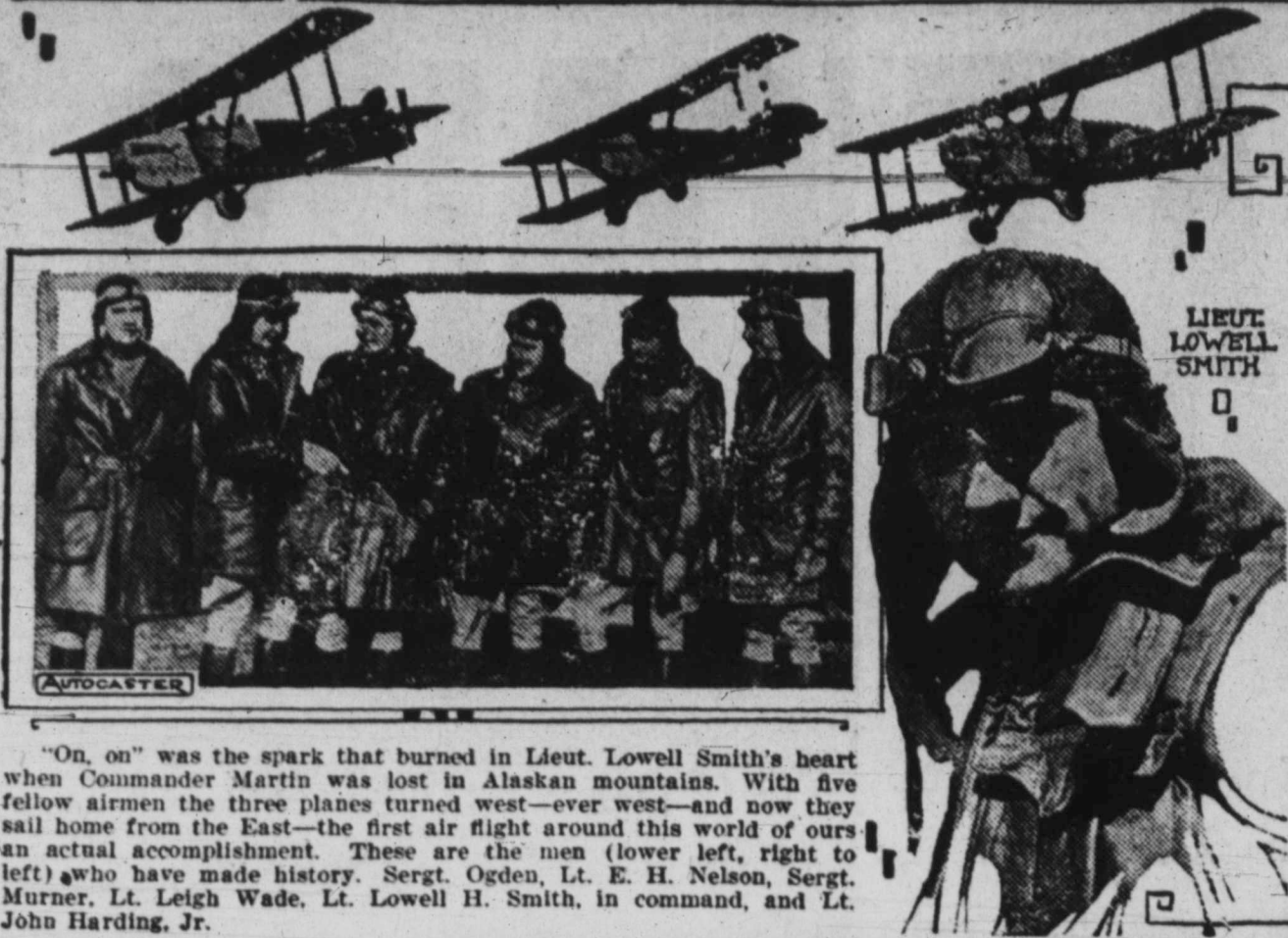
### BAKER ASKS ASSISTANCE IN FINDING STUDENT WORK

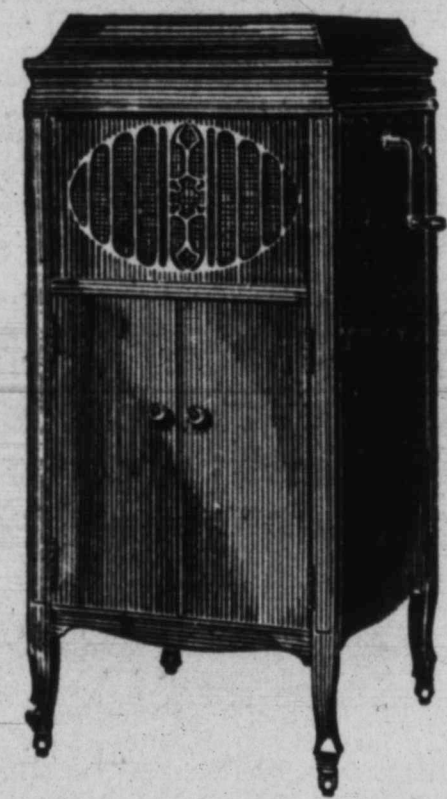

### ADEQUATE GYM IS NEEDED AT ONCE

MOVE IS STARTED TO BUILD GYMNASIUM.

Coach Says Plans Call for One Wing of Future Athletic House; To Seat 2,500.

We all realize that a new gym is needed very badly at the College. But only those in charge of athletics and those who are taking physical education know just HOW BADLY it is needed. The gym we have is an excellent room for physical education classes and will accommodate large classes in that work. But when it is required that it be used for both boys and girls it can readily be seen that there will naturally be conflicts and some one will have to give way—the result is that both boys' and girls' gym classes are hampered to some extent. But the big reason for a new gym is the fact that our present gym, which was planned for a physical education class room, is not adequate for basketball. The floor is not large enough to meet the minimum requirements for the regulation game. The seating capacity is not enough to take care of more than half of our students who hold the blanket tax. This alone makes it impossible for us to secure any gate receipts at the games held here.

"When is Denton coming here for basketball?" "Why don't we get more F. I. A. A. teams?" "Why don't we have more games at home?" These questions and many others are asked those in charge of athletics every day or two. There is only one way that we can make it possible for these teams to come here and that is to secure a gym with a playing court of legal size, and also one with a seating capacity sufficient to accommodate the crowds.

It is believed that a move is now on foot that will have this problem solved before the opening of the next basketball season. Plans are being drawn and it is believed that work will be begun within the next month or six weeks. It has not been definitely decided as to the kind that will be built, but it is hoped that we may build according to the plans now being made by Prof. R. A. Terrill, which call for a building of tile, stucco and steel. This building will contain a playing floor 48 by 90 feet and the ceiling will be 30 feet from the floor. There will be seating room for 2500 people and the shower baths and lockers for the boys will also be located in the building. Offices and store rooms will also be included in the plan. According to the plans this is to be just a wing for a real, sure-enough, adequate physical education building to be erected sometime in the near future. This building will give the College one of the very best gyms in the state and it is believed that it will have a great deal to do in helping the boys of this section of the country select the college they will attend.

### Ex-Student Collects Material to Publish Western Songs

Miss Ina Sires was here Tuesday and Wednesday of last week for the purpose of obtaining western folk lore from the collections of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society. Miss Sires, who attended school here in 1915 and the summer of 1917, lives near Tulsa but she has been teaching in Arizona and lately in Kansas City, Kansas. She is giving much time and is incurring considerable expense in the endeavor to publish a book of cowboy and western songs, with music for each piece. It is planned to put out a collection which will be suitable for use in high schools, glee clubs, in addition to cowboy reunions, etc.

Miss Sires now has more than seventy-five different tunes. In as much as many songs were sung to the same tunes, this collection is really an extensive one and contains many melodies which have not been published in any form. Simple four-part melodies have been written to the songs by Arnold Volpe, of the Kansas City Conservatory of Music.

The songs have been obtained from many sources. Cowboys passing thru Kansas City have heard of the plan and volunteered to sing all the tunes known to them. The school children of Camp Verde, Arizona, where Miss Sires taught for a while, collected many of the better known tunes and words. Cattlemen and cowboys have shown much interest in the project. The first edition will perhaps deal entirely with cowboy songs, about twenty-five in number. All of them will be chosen particularly for their genuine range spirit and lyric qualities.

### "Facts Is Facts;" Count Reveals 140 Non-Bobbing Co-eds
