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Thirty-five years ago the pioneer plainsman made his way across the present site of Canyon with great difficulty after night had fallen. Strain his eyes as he would, it was only seldom that he could make out the gleam of a kerosene lamp through the window of some isolated ranch house.

And 35 years is but half the span allotted to one man's lifetime.

Nevertheless, it is a far cry from the lonely journey of that day over almost untracked plains to a ball-tired spin between lanes of blazing electric lights and over brick-paved streets. Even five years ago such a transmutation would have been laughed at as an empty dream.

But who today would characterize as visionary Mayor Harrison's plan for a white way nearly two miles long?

Not even the most skeptical can fail to admit that the mayor's proposal to the property owners of Fourth Avenue is not only sane but most reasonable.

To put in the highest class of improved property one once fenced plains at a further expenditure of only 35 cents a front foot is a step that should be taken without debate. Such a white way cannot be other than a practical far-sighted investment.

Renewed efforts on the part of the railroads are being made this summer to lessen the number of deaths and injuries at railroad-highway crossings. One of the leaders in this campaign is Isaiah Hale, safety superintendent of the Santa Fe railroad.

Statistics gathered by Mr. Hale show that 80 per cent of all crossing accidents involve motor vehicles, and for that reason the automobile at railroad-highway crossings is a serious problem and should command the attention of every thoughtful citizen.

While our population increased 68 per cent in 30 years, fatal railroad crossing accidents increased 345 per cent, injuries in such accidents 652 per cent, and the number of motor vehicles from 0 to 15,092,177. In 1923 there were produced in this country 4,014,000 automobiles, an increase of 23 per cent over 1922.

Last year there were 2,298 persons killed and 6,314 injured at railroad highway crossings. It is estimated, based upon previous reports, that during the present year 2,800 persons will be killed and approximately 8,000 injured. Every day in the year 7.6 persons will be killed and 21.8 injured.

While it is agreed that the ideal solution is the elimination of such crossings by putting them above or under the railroad tracks, the cost is often prohibitive. Therefore, it is logical to assume that education of the traveling public to the exercise of a reasonable degree of care when approaching and passing over railroad crossings is the only practical way of reducing accidents.

"Crossing Crossings Cautiously" will save many, possibly hundreds of lives.

Harvesting in the county is practically over, but in Canyon there is a crop which should be gathered without delay—the weed crop.

Without regard to the plan of the city commission for stimulating interest in a general cleanup, the weeds should be cut at once, because:

Weeds harbor insects, and with them, disease.

They choke the grass and shrubbery. They spread to the fields and hurt the crops.

After first comes they constitute a fire hazard.

Worst of all, weeds cry aloud the slothfulness and lack of personal and civic pride of every citizen who permits their growth. Eventually they become a blight on the vitality and progressiveness of the city itself.

Out the weeds!

THE PASSING DAY

Since the women have been voting, greater numbers of them are to be found standing as near the polling places as the law permits, handing out candidates' cards to voters on their way to vote. The candidate who can't get some pretty young woman to hand out his cards seem to regard himself as out of luck. It is doubtful whether many voters change their votes on their way to the voting booth just because a pretty girl hands him a card and asks him to vote for her candidate. Still, there is little harm done by this custom and it does help the printers who print the cards.

Do the women vote for candidates because they know them and like them, or do they vote for them because of the principles for which they stand? It is pretty safe to say that as yet most women do not take the trouble to inform themselves as to the views of candidates on public questions or as to their records in public service. They are more influenced by friendship for candidates than are the men, or by the social and moral standing of those offering their services. That accounts largely for the extensive circulation just before elections of rumors reflecting on the morals of candidates, for whatever may be his virtues on other questions women as a class will not vote for a man or doubtful moral character or of social vices. Some of them insist on knowing the candidates personally and excuse themselves for not voting with the statement, "Oh, I am not crazy about any of them and do not care to vote."

The next attractions to follow after the second primary that will get the people together in large numbers will be the district, county and community fairs. It is to be hoped that they will draw as large crowds as the political picnics and barbecues. If they do, they will be worth more to the people than all the political gatherings of the year. The campaign orators, of whom the year has developed many, might be utilized to impress the people as to the importance of co-operative effort in the right kind of community development. Every community in Texas has great opportunities that are going to waste through lack of systematic effort. The people merely need to be aroused to the advantages of united effort.

Most of the large towns in Texas are growing. Many new and improved homes are being built in them. Except along a few well constructed highways not many country homes have been built in this State in the last few years. The most noticeable improvement in country districts recently has been in the school buildings, largely as a result of consolidating school districts. The ideal condition is where farm improvements keep steady pace with those in towns and cities. Improved machinery and quick transportation over country roads are taking many people out of the country, because so many are not needed to do the farm work. Those who are left in the

country should soon be doing well enough to build better homes and to live more comfortably.

The time is coming when a Texas county that grows cotton will be ashamed to admit that all its cotton crop is sent out of the county to be manufactured into cotton goods that sell from three to ten times as much as the raw cotton. Such an admission will be regarded as evidence of thriftlessness of a kind that is inexcusable. Heretofore there has not been enough money in Texas to carry on the farms, to handle the commercial business of the State, and to operate factories to any great extent, but with the State steadily growing richer it will soon be in position to manufacture its products of all kinds.

Most of us are quitters. We start out well, but most of us soon tire in what we undertake. This characteristic develops early in life. It is much in evidence with students of the University of Texas with whom I come in contact, and, for that matter, with young people everywhere. They start to school with their minds made up to use their time to the best of their advantage; in a short time they begin to weaken in their determination, and by the end of the first term they are sent home solely because they lack interest in their studies. They are just quitters, plain quitters, who lack the energy to work at a thing till they succeed.

Once the piking habit is formed, it is hard to shake it off. It soon develops into an "oh-what's-the-use" attitude toward everything in life that requires effort. The school loafer in most cases will loaf along through life whenever he gets the chance. Procrastination so on becomes habitual. It is always easier to follow the lines

of least resistance, to drift from one day into another. It takes effort to go against the current, and when effort fails not only does progress stop, but the advance already made is soon lost, and more strength is required for another trial.

Some farmers are quitters. When the sun gets hot and the ground gets so dry that weeds will not grow, they quit working their crops. They reason that as weeds are not growing, and rains do not lake the soil there is no need to keep the plows and hoes going. It does not take a good farmer to see the folly of such a method. Farming requires intelligent action just as much as it is needed in business. The worse the crop prospects look the greater, usually, is the need for hard work and intelligent effort. Whatever one is doing should get his best efforts all the time and especially when the outlook is discouraging.

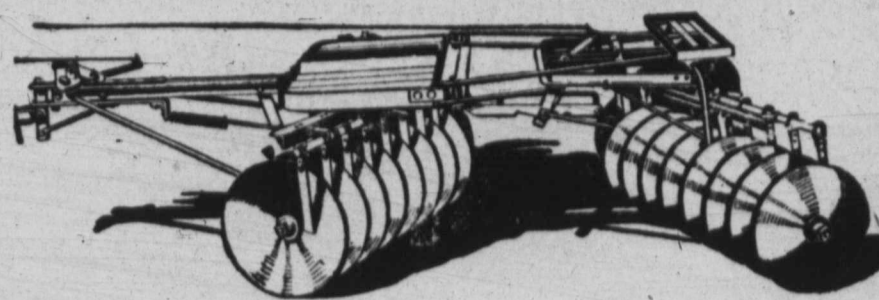

**TUNNEL ELIMINATES 200 MILES OF PACIFIC ROUTE**

Colorado Springs, Aug. 7.—Through the generosity of a small group of Colorado Springs men, headed by A. E. Carlton, the transcontinental motor distance to the Pacific coast has been reduced about 200 miles. The saving in distance is effected through the coming opening for traffic of the new route through the Busk-Ivanhoe tunnel over the roadbed of the old Colorado Midland railroad which was given to the state of Colorado for a motor highway. The state highway department is now contemplating the task of transforming the old railroad roadbed into a modern motor highway.

The Busk-Ivanhoe tunnel eliminates a long hard climb over the Continental Divide on the Pikes Peak Ocean to Ocean Highway which always has been a hardship to transcontinental motorists headed for California. In addition to reducing the grade it opens for the traveler a wide vista of mountain scenery unrivaled in the west which will greatly add to the attractiveness of a long motor trip.

The new route which directly connects Colorado Springs with the Pacific coast will be opened about September 15, according to an announcement by the Colorado State Highway Department.

Nutrition Worker Says Vitamin Most Essential to Health

"Vitamins," declares Miss Mildred E. Smith, Red Cross Nutrition Worker, stationed here last winter, "the insignificant in themselves, are like the spark in the gasoline engine—absolutely necessary to the running of the whole machine."

This description of the value of these important constituents of food is given in a recent interesting bulletin, entitled "Timely Information on Vitamins," issued by the U. S. Public Health Service.

The bulletin warns that we should obtain vitamins from our food, and not from the drug store; "we need select only the proper foods to eat and we will get an abundant supply of these precious substances."

It was long ago noticed that sailors who lived on canned food for months at a stretch, often developed a disease known as scurvy; some died from it. Later they discovered that lemon juice, or other fresh food would cure this disease.

Likewise, many people in the East were found suffering with a nervous disease known as beri-beri. When brown rice, taken before the husk is removed, was given to them instead of the polished rice, which was almost their only article of food, they recovered.

It has been found that rickets and other diseases are due to a lack of vitamins.

Experiments on animals have proven that vitamins are necessary for promoting growth and maintaining health. Up to the present time, four of these substances have been found. They are lettered A, B, C, and D.

Since it has been proven conclusively that vitamins are necessary, it is important that we learn in what foods they are found, in order that we may get enough of them. Milk, butter and fruits, green vegetables, cereals made from the whole grain, and eggs are the most important sources. Meat, except for liver and other glandular organs, contain practically none. Neither does white flour, sugar or vegetable fats.

If we have a good varied diet we will get enough vitamins. A good diet means plenty of milk, 2 fruits and 2 vegetables besides potatoes every day, cereals made from the whole grain, not too much meat or sugar.

People who are good enough citizens to have consciences that sometimes trouble them are, we think, responsive to the stimulus afforded by the hope of reward rather than goaded to goodness by the fear of punishment. They do right because they want to be comfortable in their own minds, not because they are afraid of being miserable if they do otherwise. Perhaps the distinction is finer than that, but it seems to us important. Civilization is accomplishing its purpose only as it is bringing more and more people to a state of mind in which all the knowledge of the rewards that life well-lived offers, the fear of punishment can never be wholly taken away, but with the advance of civilization it should influence fewer and fewer people.

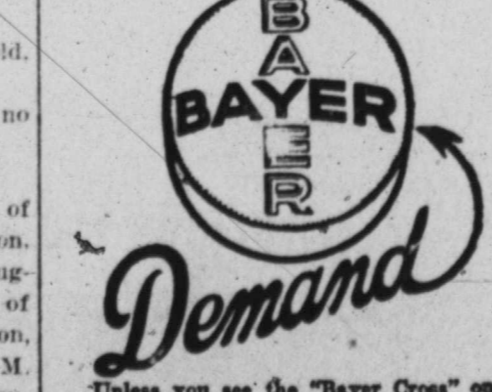

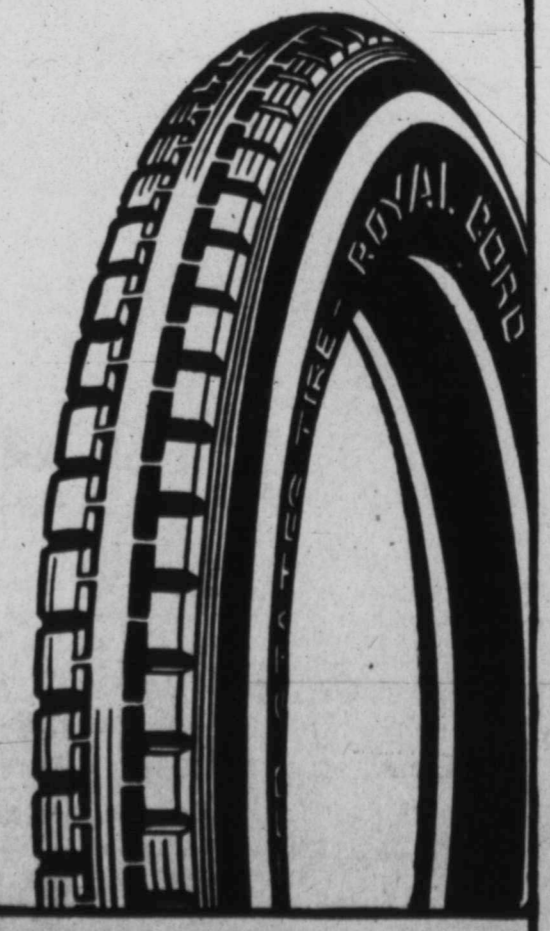
