Laymen, out of respect for the courts, assume that the Supreme Court judges of California interpreted the law accurately when, by a majority of only one, they decided that La Follette's electors, although duly named by petition, should not go on the ballot in No-

The people do not like to be told by a judge, or anybody, that they may not vote for their own choice. For a court by a majority of one, in disregard of established custom, to say that State electors are the servants and agents of political conventions, and therefore the people have no right to name their own electors by petition, is DAN-GEROUS.
