## Mobile home expansion tabled

Dimmitt's City Council said no Monday night to proposed expansion of mobile home placement in the city.

Councilman Don Sheffy moved to table the proposed ordinance to allow mobile homes in the Miller Addition until a definitive need for the expansion could be shown. The council gave unanimous approval. (Larry Gonzales was absent.)

Sheffy said he was unaware of any overwhelming interest in needing more space, and pointed out that apparently none in favor of expansion had been interested in appearing before the zoning board, which had voted March 25 to recommend the expansion.

Four citizens who had brought up objections to the expansion at the zoning board meeting also appeared before the city council to voice their opinions.

Mrs. Ocie Bolton told the council that the zoning board apparently allowed two requests for expansion to override numerous objections by long-time, tax-paying residents of the Miller Addition, many of whom are widows or elderly.

Doyle Wassom said, "I felt in the last meeting [with the zoning board] that we didn't have a voice; that it didn't do any good."

Fern Morgan said, "It tells you something when they won't let any [mobile homes] face on Bedford or Halsell Streets. So why discriminate against our area? It's not fair. It

Latest update on granite tile orders for the Centennial Plaza:

My guess at this stage is that the tile project will be a complete sell-out—probably within the coming week.

Saturday wasn't one of my better days.

Did you hear the fire siren Saturday afternoon? Well, let me explain.

Several weeks ago Kerry Siders, our County Extension Agent/Entomology, had an article in the paper advising us not to scalp our lawns this spring or bag our clippings this summer.

Next time he was in the office, I asked if he would check out my lawn grass when he had time. I didn't think the no-scalp, no-bag system would work on my "African Bermuda," which grows to four inches in height.

The next day he called back. "You're right — that grass is pretty thick and heavy," he said. "I've sent a sample of it to the state turf-grass specialist in Temple to identify and see what he says."

Then, after he got the report back:

"He says it's a hybrid Bermuda, and is one of the highest-maintenance grasses around — water, fertilizer, mowing. And you're right — if you don't bag the clippings, it will build up too much thatch."

"What he said you should do is scalp it, then burn it, then kill it, and replant with a lower-maintenance grass."

Which was just what I had been thinking for several years now.

"It won't burn, though," I told Kerry. "I've tried it with a weed

## OM team advances to World competition

The Dimmitt High School Odyssey of the Mind Super Collider III team will advance to the OM World Competition in May after winning first at the state contest in Dallas Saturday.

The team earned 349-1/2 points out of a possible 350, but suffered a 50-point penalty, reducing the score to 299-1/2. However, they still remained in first place. Their structure held 885 pounds, only 60 pounds less than the world OM record, and 250 pounds more than the second place team.

The team also earned a Ranatra Fusca group award for outstanding creativity in the spontaneous portion of the competition, earning 99-1/2 out of a possible 100 points for that portion.

Team members are Christian Braafladt, Michelle Flores, Kris Keith, Candi Matthews, Kim Spring and Sean Wilson. They are sponsored and coached by Pat and David Keith and Charles and Sue Spring.

The DHS Pompeii III team placed second at the state contest, and team member Matt Sims won an individual Ranatra Fusca award in spontaneous. Other team members are Amy Beck, Amy Flores, Nikki Kenley, Fabian Longoria, and Jennifer Sava. Coaches are Bill Sava and Dana Beck.

The DHS Buggy Lite III team did not place because of vehicle failure. The Dimmitt Middle School Super

Collider II team also did not place, but gave "a very nice performance," according to a sponsor.


Members of the DHS Super Collider team said that Dr. Sam Nicholas of New Jersey, the founder of the OM program, observed their preparations for the contest and made favorable comments about the students doing the work themselves.

One of the judges said that after being associated with OM for seven years, the Dimmitt team had "the most fantastic show I have seen." The team scored a perfect 50 on the style portion for their skit, written by Braafladt two days before the regional competition in Lubbock last month.

Team members said their structure, made of balsa wood, could have held more weights if they had been able to alternate sizes of weights at the top of the pile, but they only had smaller sizes available and it caused the load to shift.

Team coach David Keith said the structure was considerably different from ones designed by past DHS teams, adding that the team used engineering, physics and calculus to refine their design, but used only a razor blade and glue to construct it.

World Competition will be held May 22-25 in Knoxville, Tenn., with teams competing from all 50 states and nine foreign countries.

## MultiVision to have resident technician

The MultiVision Cable Television system has announced that Castro County will soon have its own resident technician to handle local technical difficulties in a more timely manner, and some subscribers may get a price break and an upgrade in signal reception, too.

At the Monday night meeting of the Dimmitt City Council, City Manager Reeford Burrous told the council that the cable company will begin offering a \$2-per-month discount to subscribers who only have 12-channel capability on their television sets and who do not have conversion equipment. The cable

system offers about 24 channels, besides premium channels such as Disney, Showtime and HBO.

Burrous commented that any subscriber having problems with reception should contact him or the cable company now while the company is performing extensive repairs and updating of equipment within the city, so that they can determine where further work might be needed.

Burrous said the company is replacing nearly all the cables in the south and west portions of town because much of the lines were cracked, allowing the signal to

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## Rail strike called

A railway workers' strike may soon affect consumers and businesses in the county.

The strike was called to start at 11:01 a.m. Wednesday. Locally, three strikers from Amarillo were on hand for picketing. They were Gene Ross, Bryan Woods, and William Larsen.

Dimmitt station master Gary Huffhines said the biggest local rail

customer is American Fructose, which will probably feel the pinch first when the rail cars stop moving.

The coast-to-coast strike was called when contract talks between freight lines and their unions broke off Tuesday night.

The picketers said management was unwilling to negotiate a new contract, and workers were frustrated after three years of trying.

## Rodriguez family still needs help

Arthur and Eva Rodriguez's mobile home in Dimmitt was totally destroyed in a fire March 27, and the family of eight lost everything they owned.

The Rodriguez family had lived in Dimmitt for four years, and Arthur said he was just recently laid off from Dimmitt Agri Industries. The couple have six children: Johnny, 15, Rhonda 13, Sandra 11, Arthur Jr., 7, Jennifer, 5, and Rocky, 4.

Arthur said Friday that the family is living in a rented house in Hereford, which the Hereford chapter of the Red Cross helped them find, and is helping pay the rent for one month.

"I don't know what we will do after that," Arthur said. The family had no insurance. Eva said they had just barely finished paying off the mobile home, and had recently purchased some new furniture, a VCR and a washing machine—all of it

now gone. They also had a rented refrigerator that still has to be paid for, even though it was rendered totally useless.

Arthur said a used refrigerator has been donated to the family, and they have borrowed a cook stove, but they still need blankets, furniture, and cooking and eating utensils, as well as additional clothing.

The children have been transferred to the Hereford schools, and Arthur said they are having problems adjusting. One of the problems is that the children don't have adequate clothing, and they feel self-conscious about it.

Arthur said the younger children received quite a few donations of clothing, but the older ones, and he and his wife, have not received very many items that they are able to wear.



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
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# Swifts, Swiftettes to advance in track

## TCPB is working to correct farm bill's split base confusion

Confusion in the feed grains section of the 1990 Farm Bill could cost Texas corn producers about 75% of their yield base. It could force 160-bushel irrigated corn farmers to receive deficiency payments on only a 40-bushel dryland yield base.

"Corn farmers already are facing up to a 30% cut in income under the farm bill's triple base provisions," said Carl King of Dimmitt, president of the Texas Corn Growers Association. "Confusion regarding corn and grain sorghum cross production has the potential to wreck producers even more."

The old "feed grains system" of past farm programs has enabled growers to maintain a production history for both acres and yields.

However, that apparently has been changed in the new farm bill, in which the secretary of agriculture has discretionary authority to switch the yield base.

For example, under the new farm, producers who planted corn on grain sorghum acres the past two or three years would be forced to use a dryland corn yield in his deficiency payment plan.

"Section 505-B of the farm bill states that base acres and yields will be protected," said King.

"Unfortunately, Clayton Yeutter apparently used his discretionary authority to change the procedure before he left office earlier this year."

All Texas corn production in the Panhandle-South Plains area is on an irrigated basis. Much corn in south Texas also is irrigated. There is some dryland production in central and south Texas.

"Just to give you a dryland yield

base on corn because you planted milo (on corn acres) for two years isn't fair, said King. "It is essential that we go back to the old 'feed grains' system in which our historical bases remain intact."

Some Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) officials have indicated that it's possible farmers raising both corn and milo will receive an advance deficiency payment on a dryland yield basis and a final payment based on their irrigate dyield.

"The foundation of the farm program is to keep yields and acreage bases intact," said King. "In our opinion, the USDA is violating Congress' intent."

King and other state corn officials have been in contact with Sens. Lloyd Bentsen and Phil Gramm on the matter, along with Texas congressmen. He notes that the Texas Corn Producers Board recently put out another fire in which the USDA attempted to classify food grade corn as a vegetable, which would have cost growers deficiency payments as well as flex-acres provisions.

"There are two kinds of corn—sweet corn and field corn," said King. "Food grade corn is a field corn. We were able to correct the situation before it caused major problems."

## Insects of Interest

### County agent urges alfalfa farmers to check for weevils

April is a critical time for alfalfa producers in Castro County and on the South Plains, according to Kerry Siders, Castro County Extension Agent - Pest Management. It's a time when producers need to examine their alfalfa for presence of alfalfa weevil larvae.

With the beginning of warm spring weather, overwintering female weevils begin laying eggs. The young larvae, which hatch out are very small, yellow-green in color and feed in the growing tips and developing buds. Older larvae are green with a white stripe down their backs.

"We expect to have our peak alfalfa weevil activity in our area in April," Siders said.

If larval numbers are high enough to reach the economic threshold, one properly timed application should give control. Treatments should be applied in alfalfa two to six inches tall when populations average one larvae per stem or when 30 to 40 of the plant terminals show weevil feeding damage. Taller plants, seven to 14 inches tall, should be treated when larvae average 1.5 per stem or when 25 to 30% of the terminals are damaged. Several effective insecticides are registered for alfalfa weevil control.

The alfalfa weevil has only one generation per year and is usually only a pest of first cutting, said Siders.

After the larvae finish feeding, usually by mid-May in our area, the larvae spins a net-like cocoon on the plant or in the soil debris. The adult weevil emerges from this cocoon and leaves the field. The weevils stay out of the alfalfa fields all summer and re-enter in the fall.





# First Baptist Church will hold centennial celebration June 8-9

The First Baptist Church of Dimmitt will celebrate its 100th birthday June 8 with a fellowship supper and program in the church's fellowship hall, and the party will continue June 9, with a worship service.

The church's Centennial Committee also hopes to have a 10:30 a.m. worship service Sunday, June 9. Frank Pollard of Jackson, Miss., who was pastor of the local church from 1964 to 1967, will be the speaker.

Following the morning service, a catered lunch will be served in the Expo Building, followed by a historical program in the afternoon at the same location.

There will be no evening services Sunday, June 9.

The church is hoping for former members to come from far and near to join present members in the special centennial celebration.

The Dimmitt First Baptist

Church was chartered on June 7, 1891 and was the first chartered entity in the county—older than the city or county government.

In May 1897, the church petitioned for membership in the Llano Estacado Baptist Association. Later on, in 1908, they joined with the new Tierra Blanco Association and in 1961, as associational boundaries were reset, the church began to cooperate with the Llanos Altos Association.

Baptist Women's Work started in 1909, stating as their purpose Bible study and collecting funds for a church building. In 1921, they officially organized as Women's Missionary Society.

On Sept. 9, 1928, 78 people met to organize a Baptist Sunday School and become a full-time church.

The church was first housed in an old store building. Around the turn of the century, worship serv-

ices were held in the first red brick school building located where our city park is now located.

In March 1929 ground was broken at 503 W. Bedford for a new church building and it was completed in 1930. A new auditorium was added in 1949 and a new educational unit was built in 1955. These facilities were used until November 1970, and then in 1971 they were old. The two east buildings were torn down and the west building is used by the City of Dimmitt as a fire station today.

On Oct. 2, 1966, the church voted to build new facilities on a 10-acre site located at 1201 Western Circle Drive and that is where the church is located today.



## Cancer Society's annual crusade drive is Tuesday

Castro County residents have the opportunity to strike a blow against cancer by donating to the American Cancer Society during the organization's annual crusade drive, which kicks off Tuesday.

Volunteers will be going door-to-door Tuesday in Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth collecting contributions for the American Cancer Society.

This year's theme is *The Great American Food Fight Against Cancer*, appropriate because diet is suspected as an important cause of as much as 35% of all cancer deaths. Research continues to uncover more information on which foods may help reduce cancer risks.

Heading up the Dimmitt residential campaign this year will be Jack Flynt. Ann Kern is in charge of the Nazareth fundraising drive and Deb Clinton will spearhead the Hart drive. Other volunteers county-wide are Sue Boozer and Charlene Howell, west of Dimmitt and the Flagg area; Janice Matthews of the Easter Community; Becky Stovall and Polly Simpson, both north of Dimmitt; and Melinda Riley, in

charge of the drive in the Sunnyside Community.

Flynt stated that many of his 50-plus volunteers have been touched in some way by this disease, and that it is difficult to find a family member anywhere that has not had some experience with it. Over the years, cancer will strike in approximately three of every four families.

Local volunteers will pick up their Cancer Crusade packets at the Dimmitt City Hall meeting room at 5 p.m. Tuesday and will make "house-to-house calls" that evening. The completed packets will be returned to city hall.

"We hope we can complete the bulk of our door-to-door canvass in two or three hours on that night," Flynt said.

Local volunteers will be distributing brochures and informational materials to residents throughout Castro County during the door-to-door campaign.

The funds raised by the local campaign will be used to support American Cancer Society research and rehabilitation programs.

"This year, the American Cancer Society estimates that one in every nine women will develop breast cancer during her lifetime," according to Gwen Bryant, Castro County ACS unit president. "This represents an increase from one in 10 last year."

The incidence of lung cancer continues to rise in women at a rate of 3% annually and an estimated 60,000 women will be diagnosed with lung cancer in 1991. Over 101,000 new cases will still be diagnosed in men this year, representing only 1,000 fewer cases than in 1990. Lung cancer remains the number one cause of cancer death for both sexes in the US with an expected 143,000 deaths in 1991.

"Overall, there will be approximately 1,100,000 new cases of cancer diagnosed in 1991, reflecting the 1% annual increase noted since the early 1970s," Bryant said. "As long as cancer incidence continues to rise in our work in providing education and service will remain a vital part of the community."

"Contributions to the American Cancer Society in Texas represent one of the best returns on the dollar that I know of," said Doris Lindsey, chairman of the American Cancer Society's 1991 educational and fundraising Community Crusade in Castro County.

In preparing for the April community crusade, Lindsey feels it is important for Castro County residents to know how the society invests their contributions.

"We are proud of our fiscal record and I know our friends and neighbors will be even more willing to give to the American Cancer Society when they learn how well their money is being spent," she said.

Contributions raised in 1989-90 will be invested during this fiscal year (Sept. 1, 1990 to Aug. 31, 1991) in Texas with 32% going to cancer research, 24% to public education, 20% to patient services, 8% to professional education, 13% to fundraising and program development and 3% for administrative costs.

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

will depreciate our property, which we don't need at our age."

Councilman Wayne Proffitt assured the protesters that "it did do some good" to bring their concerns to the council.

Bolton asked whether the zoners had final say in the matter, and Mayor Wayne Collins replied, "You're talking to the top ones right here."

In other business, the council approved the first reading of an ordinance banning sale of fireworks within one mile of the city limits of Dimmitt. The ordinance will not become final until a second reading.

Dimmitt Volunteer Fireman Charlie Lane and Fire Chief Randy Griffith expressed concern that moving sales further out in the country might endanger CRP rangelands, which are extremely dry this year.

The council asked the two firemen to investigate whether any CRP land is within one mile of the city limits, and to present that and any other information at the second reading of the ordinance, set for the May 6 meeting of the council.

The council voted to appoint Mary Oliveros to the zoning board in place of Jerry Annen, whose term expired. City Manager Referred Burrous said Annen had declined to serve again. Oliveros works in the Dimmitt schools and lives in the Miller Addition.

The council re-set the wages for election judges and clerks in light of the recent mandatory raise in the minimum wage rate. Clerks will receive \$4.25 an hour, and judges and alternates will receive \$4.75 an hour.

An executive session was held to discuss legal matters, but no action was taken.

In his manager's report, Burrous told the council that the city expenditures are remaining under the level budgeted by a little over 3%.

The company will call in technical experts to run frequency tests all over town after completion of the update to make sure the system is delivering adequate signals, according to Burrous.

Mayor Wayne Collins asked City Attorney Jack Edwards if the company had indicated yet whether they will comply with the city ordinance governing the cable franchise.

Edwards replied, "No. They have indicated they wouldn't. They believe parts of it are unenforceable or not applicable, but they haven't said which parts yet."

Edwards added that he feels the upgrade project is an effort to meet part of the ordinance's requirements.

Councilman Lloyd White asked about the quarterly reporting requirements and how the city would enforce the quality of reception clause.

Edwards said the city would need to hire outside experts to check the system.
