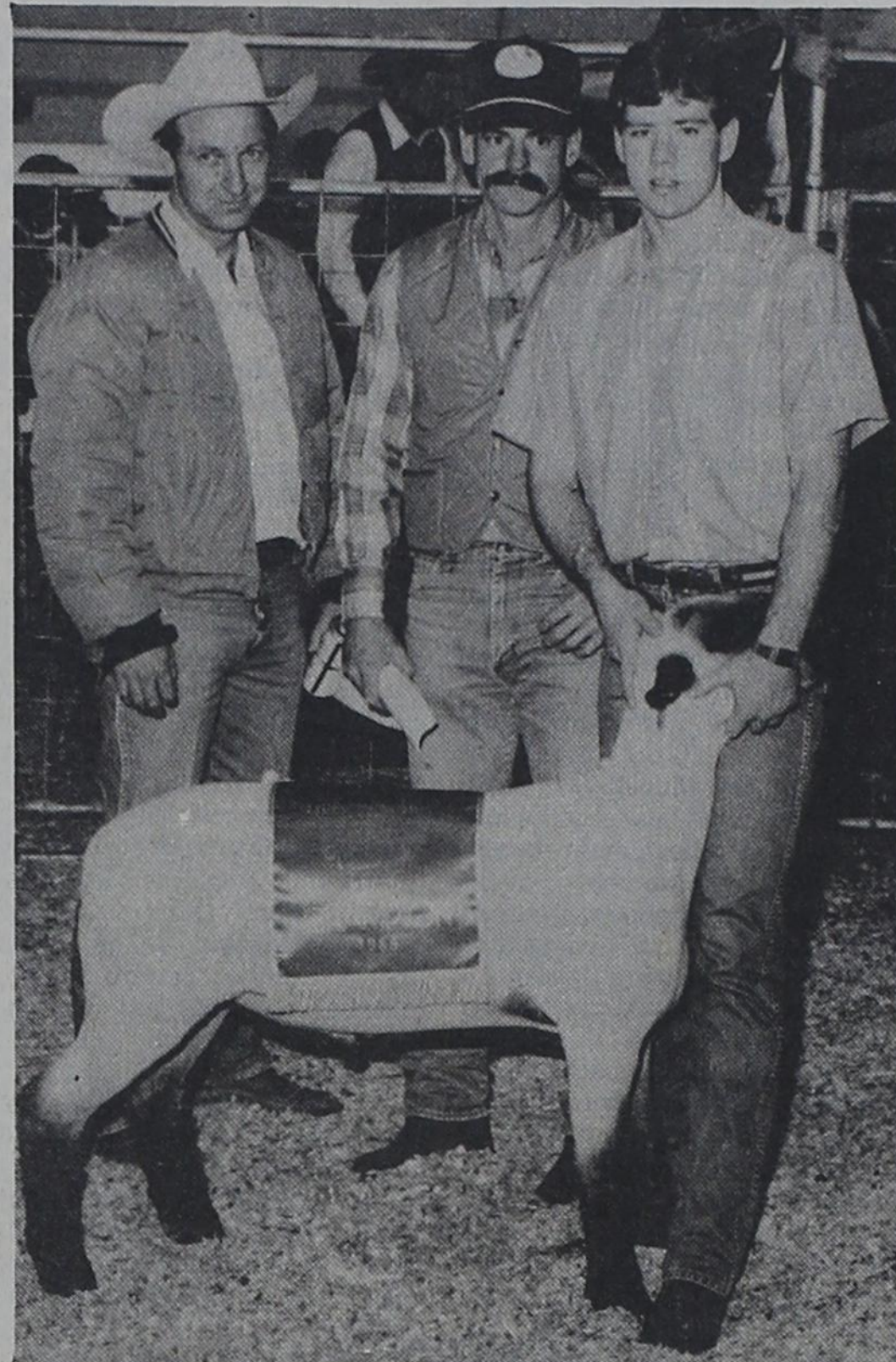

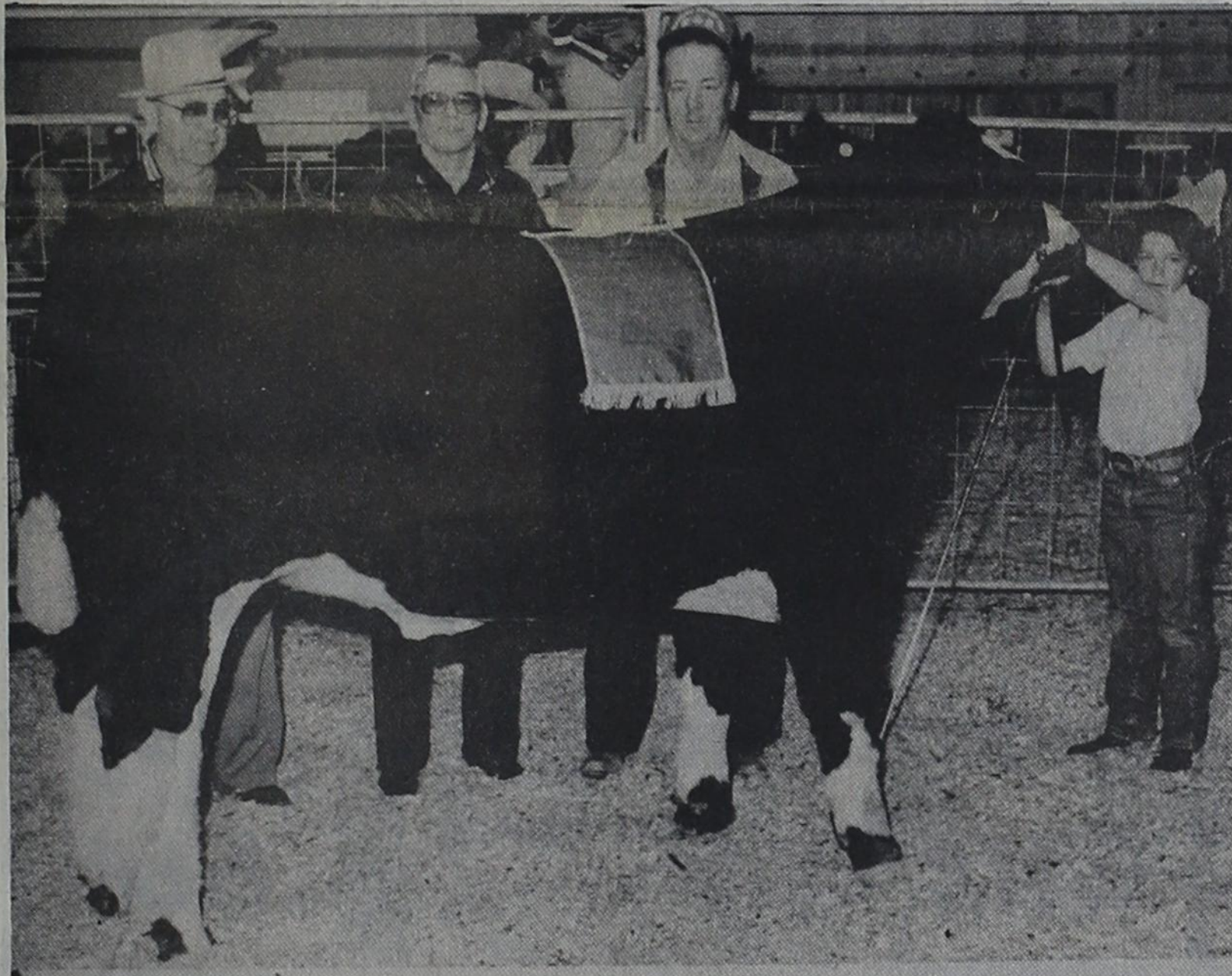

Friday. Saturday, Al Gibbs of Dimmitt Consumers, Bill Clark of Dimmitt Agri Industries and Randall Small of Castro Co-op Gin provided a guaranteed bid of \$2 a pound for the steer.

For the second consecutive year, an old record was blazed at Saturday's sale at the Dimmitt Young Farmers' 32nd Annual Castro County Junior Livestock Show at the Expo Building.

And, with the floor animals that didn't make the sale added to the grand total, the sale topped the \$200,000 mark for the first time ever.

\$178,868.28 was received for animals alone, then another \$15,352.78 was received in donations, raising the total to \$194,221.06, breaking last year's record of \$179,877.

Also lending a helping hand was the First State Bank of Dimmitt, which guaranteed to pay all hog showmen in the sale at least a \$2 minimum.

With floor animals thrown in, the final grand total was \$201,968.01.

Donations included \$4,000 by the Dimmitt Buyers club, \$4,300 to the Dimmitt Young Farmers, \$1,866.91 to the Nazareth FFA, \$1,684.86 to the Castro County 4-H, \$1,253.18 to an air conditioning fund for the Expo Building, and \$937 to Girlstown.

Floor prices, which reflect current market prices, were off this year on steers and barrows but were higher for lambs. The floor prices this year were 66.25¢ a pound for lambs, by Estacado Industries; 55.75¢ a pound for steers, by Rafter 3 Feed Yard; and 42.75¢ a pound for barrows, by Ron Davis.

A combination of three cooperatives went together to buy two of the show's three grand champions, including Frankie Huseman's champion barrow and Justin Gleghorn's grand champion steer.

Castro Co-op Gin, Dimmitt Agri Industries and Dimmitt Consumers paid \$6.50 a pound for the 257-lb. crossbred barrow and \$2 a pound for the 1,350-lb. steer.

Dwight Gleghorn of K-Bob's Steak House paid \$10 a pound for the grand champion lamb, a 130-lb. medium wool lamb driven by Woody Glass.

Reserve grand champions included a 253-lb. York barrow shown by Kelly Howell, who received a bid of \$6.25 by the First State Bank; a 130-lb. lamb driven by Kevin Bruton, who received a bid of \$8 a pound from Jay White of Farm Bureau Insurance; and a 1,350-lb. crossbred steer shown by Charlynn Hunter, who received a bid of \$1.75 a pound from her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Sutton and Rachel Hunter.

Huseman was the only repeat grand champion, but his win was in a different division — last year, he drove the grand champion steer.

## City will get tough on litter

The City of Dimmitt is going to start getting tough on littering, thanks to a new state program okayed by the Board of Aldermen at their meeting Monday night.

The aldermen endorsed a resolution that will include Dimmitt in a program that will include over \$1 million to be spent across the state to give cities incentives to issue citations to litterers. The citations may be issued only to persons who litter on state highways, which, in Dimmitt, includes Broadway, Bedford, Butler Boulevard and West Halsell.

"This is a big problem everywhere," City Manager Paul Catoe said, "but I guess most people have just been overlooking it." Catoe also said some of the litter is trash lost from city garbage trucks, but Catoe said that problem really can't be corrected unless the city forces residents to bag their trash.

"In spots we're covered up with it (litter)," said Alderman Joyce Hunter. "I hope this will help do something."

The citations may or may not include a fine, but the city will receive \$20 for every citation issued, up to a total of \$2,500. The money will be designated for use by the aldermen at a later date.

Enforcement of the program is slated to start immediately, as will research on a new litter ordinance for the city.

Aldermen accepted a bid of \$32,860 from Appian Construction of Hereford for seal coating 50,000 square yards of city streets this summer. The only other bid received was \$34,440 from High Plains Pavers of Plainview.

Aldermen accepted a bid of \$290,810.40, subject to Federal Aviation Administration approval, from DePaw Construction Co. of Amarillo for the planned FAA improvement project at the Dimmitt Municipal Airport. The bid

was the lowest of three submitted, including \$298,084 from Appian and \$338,815 from High Plains Pavers. The project is being paid for by FFA grants, which total 90% of the funding, and local revenues generated by hangar rental and other fees from the airport.

Aldermen set a March 14 date for opening bids for new apron paving and hangar construction at the airport, all of which will be paid for through airport fees. City officials estimate the fees will pay for the projects over the next eight to ten years.

Aldermen voted to drop most city officials, including policemen and the aldermen, from surety bond coverage. Only city workers who actually handle money will be covered by bonds, while other city officials are covered, according to Catoe, by the city's blanket liability coverage.

The board tabled discussion of new insurance coverage for Dimmitt's volunteer firemen, and appointed Ted Sheffy to be the election judge for the upcoming municipal election, while naming Bill Birdwell to serve as alternate judge. The aldermen also asked Catoe to invite Steere Tank Lines and Texas Water Commission officials to visit with the aldermen at their next meeting Mar. 3 to discuss continuing high Biochemical Oxygen Demand readings in the Dimmitt wastewater system.

## Naz downs Sudan, takes area title

The Nazareth Swiftettes did what?

Only two Sudan Hornets scored as the defending state champions rolled to an easy 44-30 win over their perennial playoff rivals Tuesday at the Texan Dome in Levelland.

JoAnn Wooley, who had 22 points, and Krista Kirkland, who scored 8 points, were the only Hornets to hit anything for Sudan as the Swiftettes rolled to an early lead and were seldom threatened during the area championship game.

The win puts the Swiftettes into the regional tournament, which they will open against Vega at 2 p.m. Friday at the Texan Dome.

Neither team scored for almost five minutes during the first quarter after Traci Hill sank the game's first basket just 21 seconds into the game, before Mona Heiman scored off

a steal to put the Swiftettes up 4-0. Wooley scored a few seconds later, but those were the only two points the Hornets could muster during the opening quarter, while the Swiftettes reeled off six more points to lead 10-2 at the end of the opening period.

Sudan closed to within four points, 12-8, two minutes deep in the second quarter, but that was as close as the Hornets could get as the Swiftettes outscored Sudan 10-4 over the last six minutes of the first half to grab a 22-14 halftime lead.

Sudan never got closer than within six points of Nazareth during the second half, and that was on two Wooley free throws early in the third quarter.

The Swiftettes will face Vega in the Region I-A Tourney's first game at 2 p.m. Friday.

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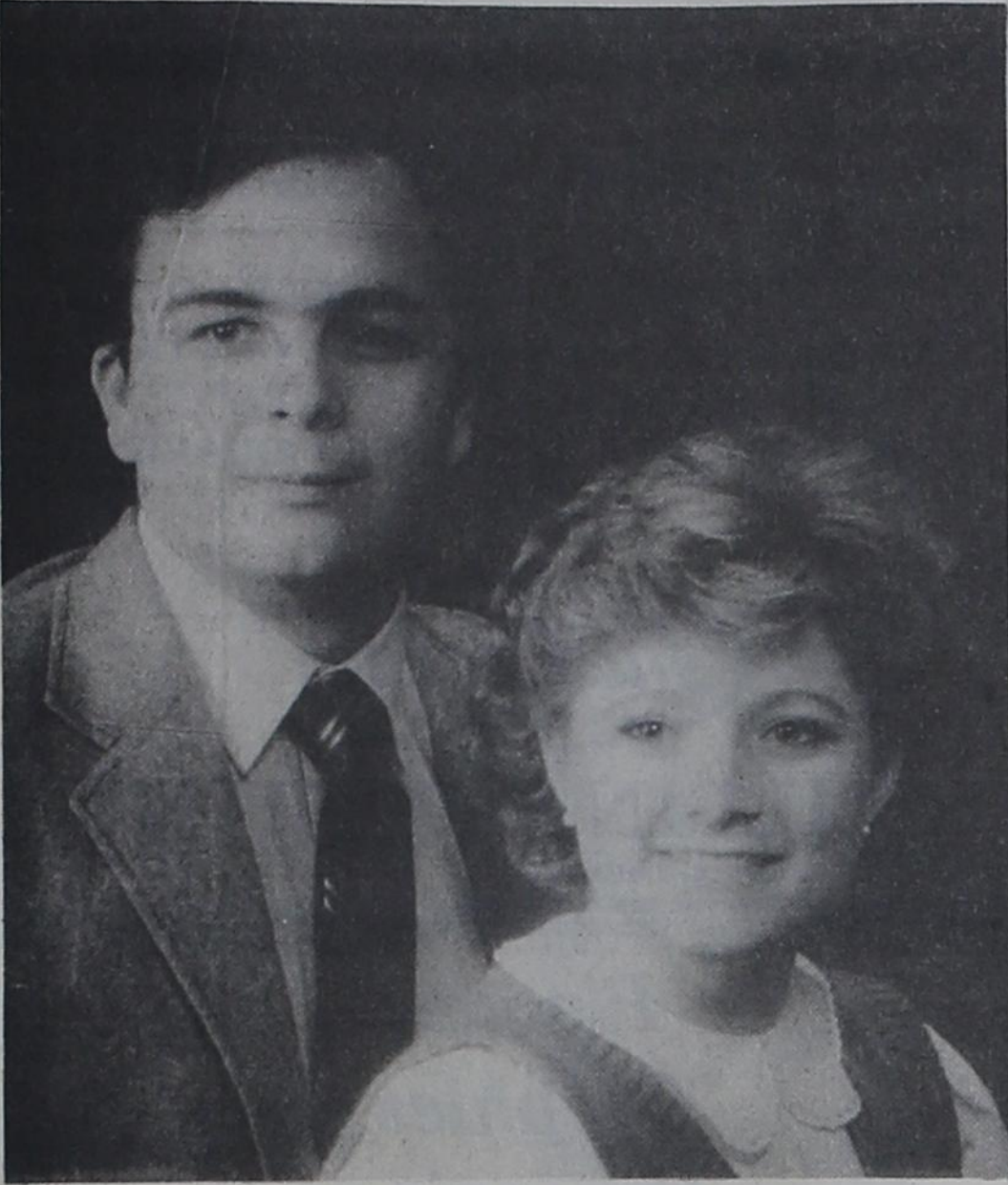

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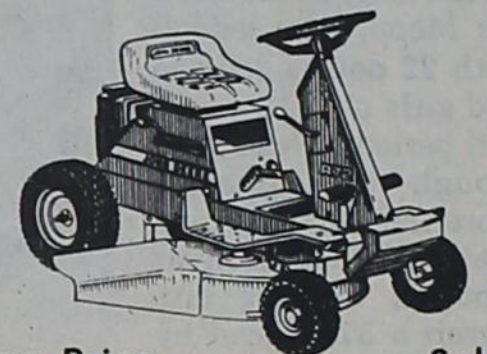

## Bi-district game

### Bobbies fall in overtime

Stephanie Stromberg and Michelle Moon led the River Road Lady Wildcats to a 59-58 overtime win over the Dimmitt Bobbies in the bi-district championship game at Amarillo's Civic Center Friday, ending the Bobbies' season one game deep into the post-season playoffs.

"I'm just glad we got this far, and I'm glad we played well despite losing," said Dimmitt coach Richard Wood after the contest. "I would feel a lot worse if we had played poorly and lost. Of course, this doesn't make up for not winning, but I thought we all played well."

The Bobbies especially played well early in jumping to an eight-point lead in the second quarter after a sluggish start by both teams in the first quarter that ended with the Bobbies leading 6-4. The Bobbies jumped out to a 16-8 lead early in the second quarter before River Road closed to 18-16, then had another late spurt before River Road closed the gap to three at halftime, 21-18.

The Bobbies might have had a larger lead if not for 14 first-half mistakes that kept River Road in the game, and turnovers let the Lady Wildcats grasp the lead early in the third quarter as Moon, who led all scorers with 22 points, led the River Road girls on a 12-4 tear in the third period to lead midway through the quarter, 30-25, before the Bobbies came back to grab a 31-30 lead. River Road went on another late spurt to grab a 37-34 lead by the end of the period.

Lisa Nelson and Becky Schroeder had a strong inside game when they were able to penetrate a sagging River Road defense, and led the Bobbies back into the lead in the fourth quarter as River Road, who had just 12 turnovers in the first three quarters, had 9 turnovers in the fourth quarter, including six in the first three minutes. The Bob-

bies jumped out to a 48-41 lead with just over three minutes left, before losing Nelson to fouls. River Road went on a free-throw tear in the last three minutes, going eight-for-eight from the line while holding the Bobbies to a field goal and a single free throw down the

stretch.

The Bobbies had several chances to score in the last few minutes, but most were frittered away as the Bobbies tried desperately to maintain their lead.

"It seemed like they (River Road) never missed a free

throw," Wood said. "They sure hit a bunch of them."

River Road, in fact, outscored the Bobbies from the line, 21-12, while the Bobbies outscored the Lady Wildcats from the field, 46-38.

Stromberg hit both ends of a one-and-one with 32 seconds left in regulation to tie the score at 51-all, and neither team could score in the last half-minute, sending the game into overtime.

River Road jumped out to an early four-point lead in the overtime before Schroeder and Molly Waggoner, who scored nine points, brought the Bobbies back to within one, 56-55. The Bobbies lost the ball twice, however, on breakaway opportunities in the last 1:30 of the extra three-minute period, while Stromberg hit both ends of a one-and-one with six seconds left as the Bobbies were forced to foul to give River Road a 59-56 advantage. Nadine Gauna hit an unmolested shot as time expired to bring the Bobbies back to within a point.

# Bobcats grab last-second win

38-36. The Dragons, 27-1, went in front in the third quarter by as many as three points, 48-45, before the Bobcats mounted a late surge to lead 51-50 at the end of the period.

Paducah went back on top, 54-53, two minutes deep in the fourth quarter on a basket by 6-8 sophomore Will Flemmons. Two minutes later, Paducah had built a six-point lead as Dimmitt's Pat McDonald was hit with three quick fouls and was assessed a technical foul when he was charged with the third, his fifth of the game. Paducah's Curtis Vaughn, who led the Dragons with 19 points, hit all three free throws to give Paducah a 61-55 lead.

The Dragons turned the ball over on their next five possessions and seven of the last eight possessions of the game, while the Bobcats fought back without McDonald, their leading scorer through the season.

"We've played without him (Pat) before, like when we beat Hereford, but it's a lot tougher without him in there," Cleveland said. "Even as valuable as he is, I think it might have proved a lesson that we can play without him, but we don't want to play

without him, because we need Pat. He could have cost us the game with his emotional reaction—I'm just glad it wasn't a playoff game.

Tuesday, the Bobcats were not quite as fortunate as they dropped a 72-68 overtime decision to Class 4A Borger at Tascosa Gym in Amarillo.

Dimmitt had one of its strongest inside games of the year, pulling down 15 more rebounds than did the Bulldogs, but the outside game that normally pumps about 20 points a game onto the scoreboard from Danny Martinez and Jeremy Warren was shut down by a wide-ranging 2-3 matchup zone.

The Bobcats jumped out to a four-point lead in the first quarter before the Bulldogs came back to grab the lead late in the period, going up by three points with less than ten seconds to play before Todd Braafladt hit a layup with two seconds left to cut the gap to 19-18.

The Bobcats got into the lead early in the second period, and led 28-23 with 5:47 left in the quarter on a Warren McDonald basket, but the Bobcats managed just two more

field goals in the second quarter as the Bulldogs claimed the lead just two minutes later on a basket by Terry Whitcher, who hit 21 points in the contest. Borger extended its five-point halftime margin of 39-34 to a seven-point cushion on several occasions during the third period, then raced to a nine-point advantage in the fourth quarter before the Bobcats, much like their late charge against Paducah, played error-free ball while taking advantage of Borger's mistakes to send the game into overtime.

Borger's Charles Walker hit the second of two free throws with 13 seconds left to give Borger a 66-64 lead. The Bobcats raced down the court and put up two shots in the last five seconds before Alexander, who led the Bobcats with 13 rebounds, grabbed a carom and put the ball in the hole with two seconds left to send the game into overtime.

While the Bobcats played without a mistake during the fourth quarter, they turned the ball over three times in the extra period while Whitcher hit all six of Borger's points in the overtime to give the Bulldogs the win.

Now it's time to get down to the real business—the playoffs, which the Bobcats will start with the bi-district game with Dalhart Friday at 7:30 p.m. at Sandie Gym at Amarillo High School.

"They're a scrappy, scrappy ballclub," Dimmitt coach Kenneth Cleveland said. "They have some size, and they have a good outside shooter. They have two big kids underneath—they're both about 6-3, one's 210, the other 190. If they all have a good night, then it's look out time."

If the Bobcats win their bi-district game against the District 1-3A runnerups, they will be going south next week for their area game, with the regional tourney slated for Lubbock next Friday and Saturday.

The entry fee remains at \$10 for the 1986 season, which includes team shirts and insurance.

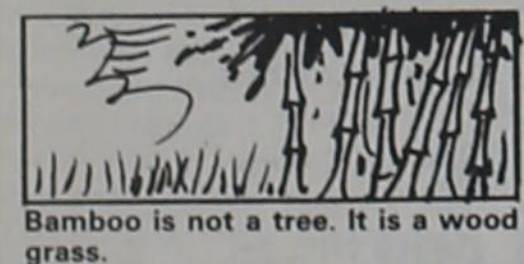

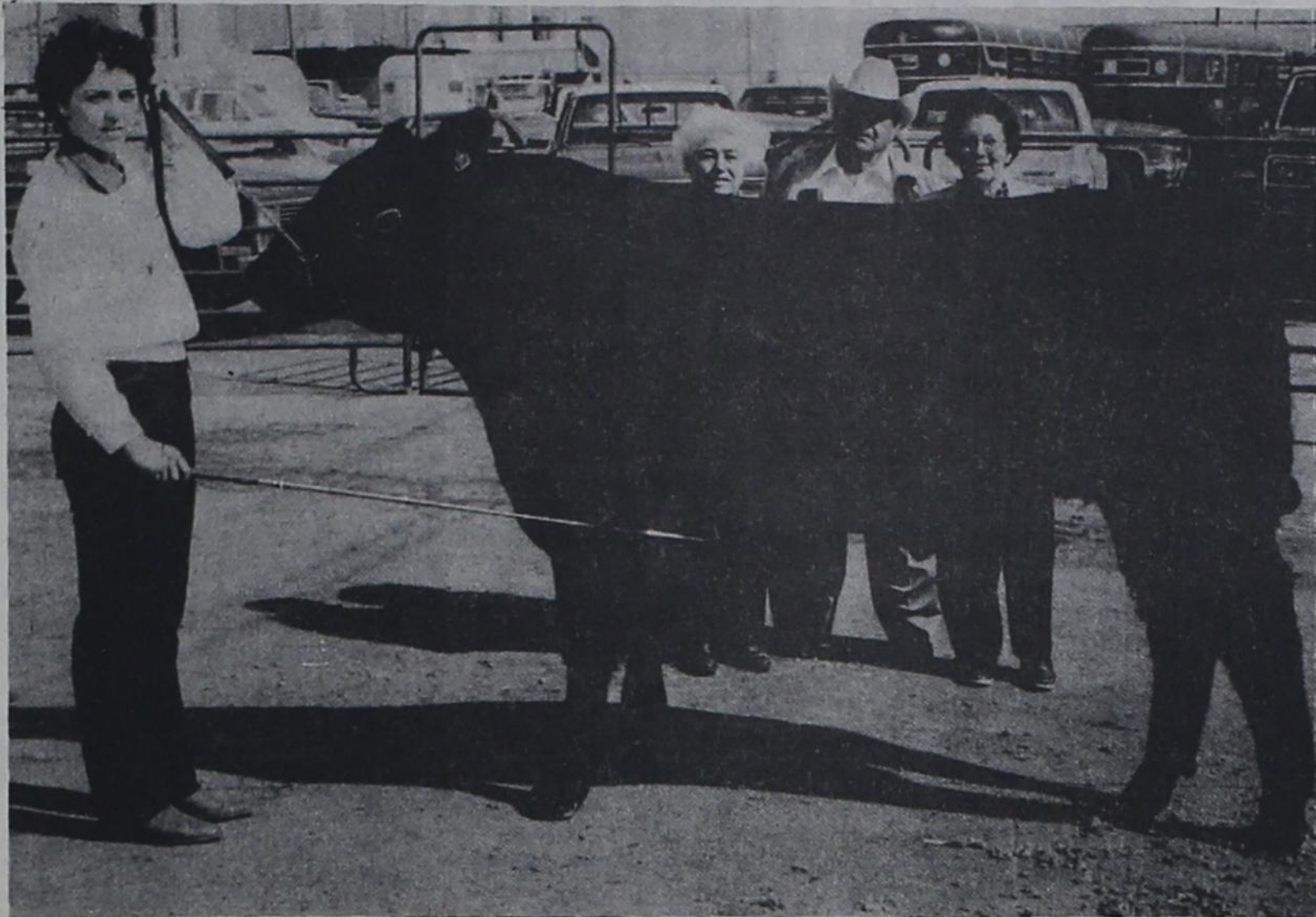

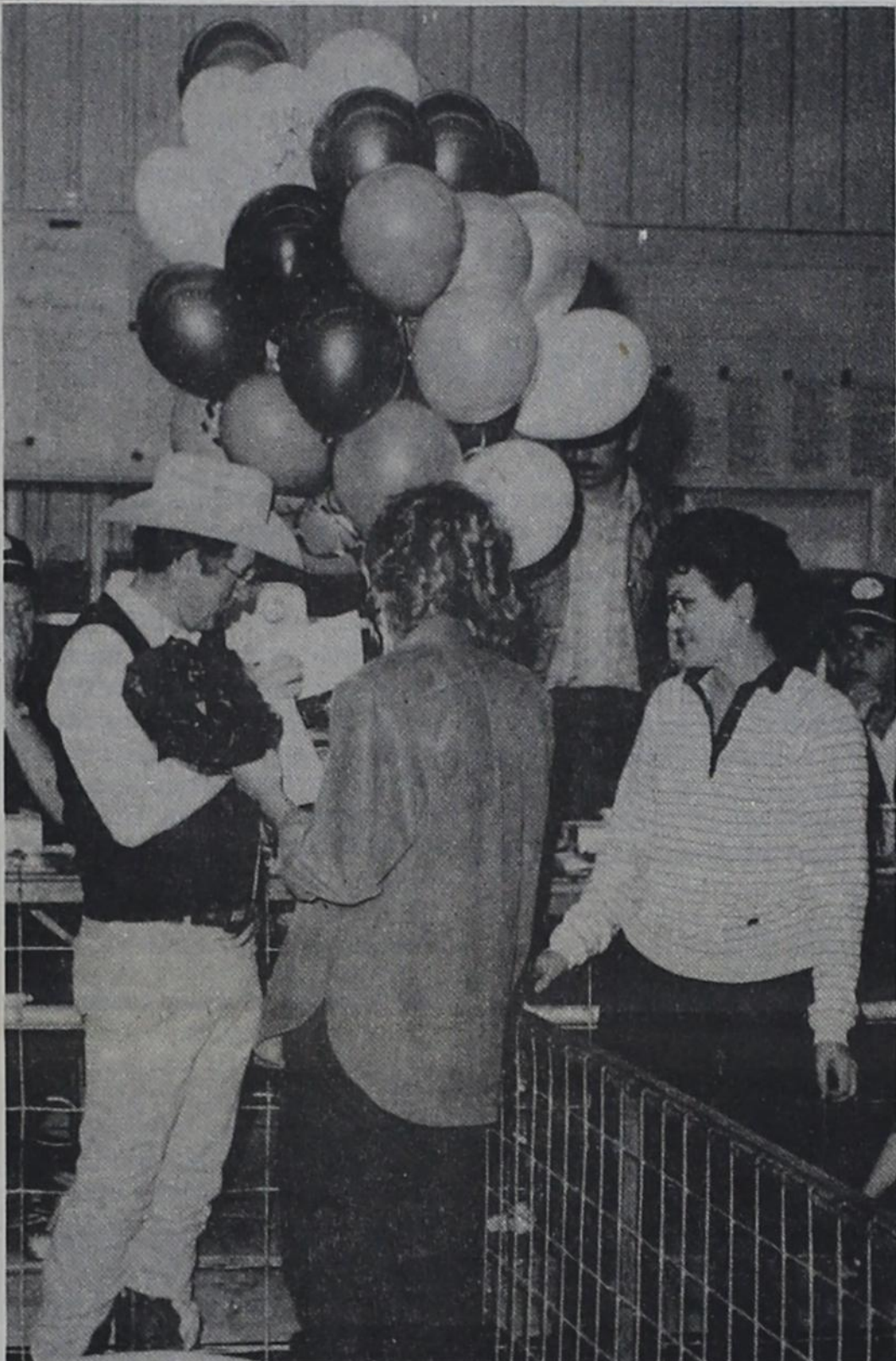

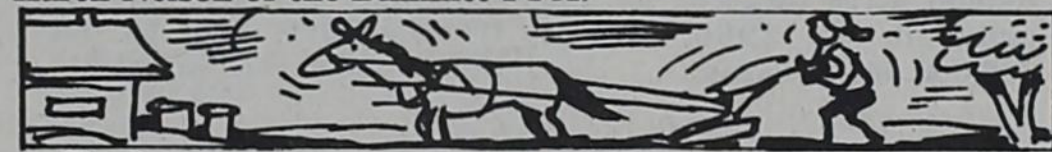

## TAES sets CRP meeting

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be conducting five regional meetings in February to explain to producers the new Conservation Reserve Program that is part of the recently passed farm bill.

A meeting is scheduled in Lubbock Tuesday at the Extension Center from 9 a.m. until 12 noon.

Extension Service specialists plus officials with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and Soil Conservation Service will be on hand to explain the provisions of the program.

"The Conservation Reserve Program is intended to protect

soil resources by removing highly erodible cropland from production," points out Dr. Bill Harris, Extension Service soils specialist. "It also should assist in curbing production of surplus crop commodities."

The sign-up period for the program will be March 3-14 at local ASCS offices.

"Farmers putting eligible cropland into the program will qualify for 50% cost-share payments to cover expenses for establishing permanent cover (grass and trees) and conservation treatments needed to adequately protect the soil," notes Harris.

The farmers also will receive

# Board looks at classrooms

The Dimmitt School Board agreed last Thursday to take the bids for carpeting at Dimmitt Middle School and Dimmitt High School, and looked at probable classroom needs for Richardson Elementary School for the 1986-87 school year.

Last year, the board received a waiver from the Texas Education Agency allowing the local schools to exceed the 1:22 teacher-student ratio in the first grade at RES, and will apply for a waiver for the next school year.

School projections for next year indicate a probable need for an additional teacher in the

first grade and two additional teachers in the second grade; however, if Lucky U Christian School should close, school officials estimate they would need an additional Kindergarten teacher and two additional teachers in each of grades one and two.

At present, there is one empty classroom at RES, hence the possible need of two new classrooms if Lucky U continues to operate, which is doubtful at this point, and four if the private school closes this May.

Before building new classrooms, which are expected

to cost about \$39,000 apiece, the board will examine the possibility of using portable classrooms.

The carpeting will be installed, if the board accepts bids at its March 17 meeting, in the west portion of DMS and in all DHS classrooms, with part of the project to be financed by the \$26,000 recently received by the local schools from the Permanent and Available School Funds.

"We can't replace some of our floor tile," said Supt. Robert Ryan. "Plus, the tile is getting so old we need to do something."

In other business, the board

approved the district's Discipline Management Plan, making only minor revisions, and passed a resolution to tax automobiles, which must be passed annually, and discussed mandated training for school board members.

## CofC releases survey results

Results of a "community survey" conducted during the recent Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce banquet reveal that most Dimmitt residents believe many of the services available and provided in Dimmitt are at least adequate.

About one-half of the 350 persons who attended the banquet filled out the 63-question survey, which asked respondents to answer "very good," "adequate," "inadequate" or "don't know" to the questions.

The most responses were

received for assessments of the school staff for primary grades (85) and junior high (178). Those two areas received the most "very good" responses, 85 and 86, respectively, but the "very good" and "adequate" spaces were checked by only 83% of those who filled out the survey, with each receiving 30 "don't know" or "inadequate" responses.

The big winner was the Chamber of Commerce, which scored 98% in the "very good" and "adequate" categories, while telephone service was the

big loser, with 62% of the respondents marking the telephone service "inadequate."

Other areas receiving top marks in the survey included the city's water supply, gas and electric utilities, newspaper services, fire protection, medical and dental services, traffic regulation and shopping facilities.

Areas receiving low marks included parks and picnic areas, job opportunities in all age groups, recreational opportunities, public meeting places for teenagers and social activities, and motels and hotels.

## Backaches have no obvious cause

An aching back has been called the great American pain because so many people are affected each year. Backaches are one of the most common causes of work days lost through illness, says the Texas Medical Association.

The vast majority of backaches are often called "non-specific" because they have no obvious causes. There

are also no obvious, easy cures. Most non-specific backaches are probably due to a strained

There are several things you can do to protect your back and lessen your chances of backache. When lifting heavy objects, keep your back straight; bend your knees and let your legs do the work. Avoid high heels; they force your stance into an unnatural position that strains your back. Select a firm, high-backed chair whenever you sit and use a cushion to support the small of your back. Sleep on a fairly hard bed and use a relatively flat pillow or none at all. If you are overweight, try to lose weight. It strains your back to carry extra weight.

If you do get a backache, there are measures you can take to ease pain and speed healing. Take simple painkillers such as aspirin or aspirin substitutes as instructed on the package. Apply heat to the painful area to ease discomfort. Lie flat on your back for as long as you can on a bed with a fairly hard mattress. It may help to put a pillow under your knees.

## Dairy program reduces milk production

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has announced additional details of the Dairy Termination Program of the Food Security Act of 1985. The 18-month program is expected to reduce milk production by 12 billion pounds.

Block said dairy producers may submit bids from Feb. 10 through March 7 to enter into contracts to terminate milk production for five years. Those interested in participating in the program will submit a dollars-per-hundredweight-milk bid.

Producers will be asked to submit bids for one or more of the following "disposal" periods: April 1-Aug. 31; Sept. 1-Feb. 28, 1987; and March 1, 1987-Aug. 31, 1987. Disposal periods represent the times during which producers contract to dispose of their female dairy cattle through either slaughter or export.

Block said dairy cows and bred heifers sold by milk producers for slaughter must be slaughtered within 15 days from the date of sale, but not later than the final day of the contract disposal period.

Other dairy cattle such as unbred heifers and calves sold by milk producers for slaughter must be slaughtered within six months from the date of sale, but not later than the final day of contract

disposal period — except that for the initial disposal period, such slaughter must occur no later than Sept. 30, 1986.

Producers will be required to certify the following information on forms provided by their county ASCS office; head of cattle by type (cows, heifers and calves); date of sale, weight and price received; and date the cattle must be slaughtered. This certification must be signed by both the seller and the buyer.

As previously announced, the producer's base period will be the lesser of the milk marketings for the 12-month period beginning July 1984 or January 1985, Block said.

He also said there would be no upward adjustments to the base period marketings for any reason. Bids will be evaluated based on production during the base period and not on prospective production.

Block stressed that changes in the size and composition of a producer's dairy herd may result in a reduction in the contract base. For example, the preliminary base will be adjusted by reducing that base for any dairy cattle that were transferred off the unit for purposes other than slaughter or export on or after Jan. 1. In addition, other adjustments in the base may be made relating to the producer's herd size.

If a producer's bid is accepted, the producer may not do the following: engage in the production of milk for commercial use for five years; acquire or retain any interest in dairy cattle or the production of milk; acquire any milk production facility that becomes available because of the Dairy Termination Program, or make available any milk production facility to any person for the purpose of producing milk.

Successful bidders will be

given options for the timing of cash payments. Initial payments will be made shortly after all of the producers under contract have accurately certified that the dairy herd disposal is complete. Additional payments will be made based upon the individual producers' certification of compliance with the terms and conditions of the program. All of a contracting producer's dairy cattle will have to be banded in a manner to be announced.

## 1986 COTTON, FEED GRAIN AND WHEAT PROGRAMS

Sign-up will be March 3 through April 11, 1986.

Participating farms will be required an acreage reduction of 20% for feed grains, 25% for wheat and 25% for cotton. Included in these reductions is a 2 1/2% paid land diversion for wheat and feed grain producers.

Producers are eligible to earn deficiency payments on the acreage planted within the ex-

tent permitted. Producers who plant at least 50% of the permitted acreage to the program crop and plant the remaining permitted acreage to a non-program crop, other than soybeans or extra long staple cotton, will be eligible to receive deficiency payments on 92% of the permitted acreage.

Winter wheat producers who reduce the acreage planted to wheat on the farm for harvest so that it does not exceed 65% of the farm wheat base may be eligible to receive diversion payments on an acreage

equivalent to 10% of the wheat base.

Participating producers may request deficiency payments during sign-up. The advance deficiency payment is 40% of the projected deficiency payment rate. If advance deficiency payment is requested, a check for 75% of the total advance will be made with the remaining 25% being issued in commodity certificates.

## DAIRY TERMINATION PROGRAM

Dairy producers may submit bids through March 7, 1986, to enter into contract to terminate milk production for five years. Those interested in participating in the program will submit a dollar-per-hundredweight milk bid.

Contracting entities shall sign ASCS-304, Establishing Milk Marketings, by Feb. 28, 1986.

There will be three disposal periods: April 1 through Aug. 31, 1986; Sept. 1, 1986 through Feb. 28, 1987; and March 1,

1987 through Aug. 31, 1987. Disposal periods represent the times during which producers contract to dispose of their female dairy cattle through either slaughter or export.

Interested producers are asked to contact the Castro County ASCS Office for additional information.

## CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM

Interested producers may sign up March 3 through March 14 to volunteer highly erodible cropland for entry into the Conservation Reserve Program. Highly erodible land that enters the Conservation Reserve program will be ineligible for farming for 10 years and must be planted with permanent vegetative cover.

Program participants will receive annual rental payments, the amounts depending on the bids per acre and the number of acres under the 10-year contracts.

Technicians from the Soil Conservation Service will help interested producers to determine if their land is eligible.

Interested producers are urged to contact the Castro County ASCS or SCS for additional information.

## Grant applications being accepted

Delta Kappa Gamma is accepting applications for a recruitment grant to be given to a college student from Castro County who is majoring in education and who has been accepted by the education department of a college.

## Social Security ...in Castro County

Persons dealing with the Social Security Administration do not have to be represented by an attorney or anyone else; however, some people may feel more comfortable if they are represented.

The representative may be an attorney or any other qualified person and may be entitled to a fee even if the claim is denied; however, any fee charged must be approved by SSA. Even a contract between the claimant and his or her representative for payment of a specified fee is not binding.

Any fee due the representative is usually paid from money due the claimant when a claim is approved. If this amount is insufficient to cover the fee, the claimant is responsible for paying the balance.

Representatives use a special form to file for a fee. If he or she is an attorney and wishes to collect the fee from money due the claimant, the form must be filed within 60 days of the date of notification that the claim was approved. The claimant is sent a copy of the form and has an opportunity to challenge any of the representative's statements before a fee is set.

The claimant is notified by SSA of the amount of the fee due the representative. If either the claimant or the representative is dissatisfied with the amount set by SSA, he or she may request a review.

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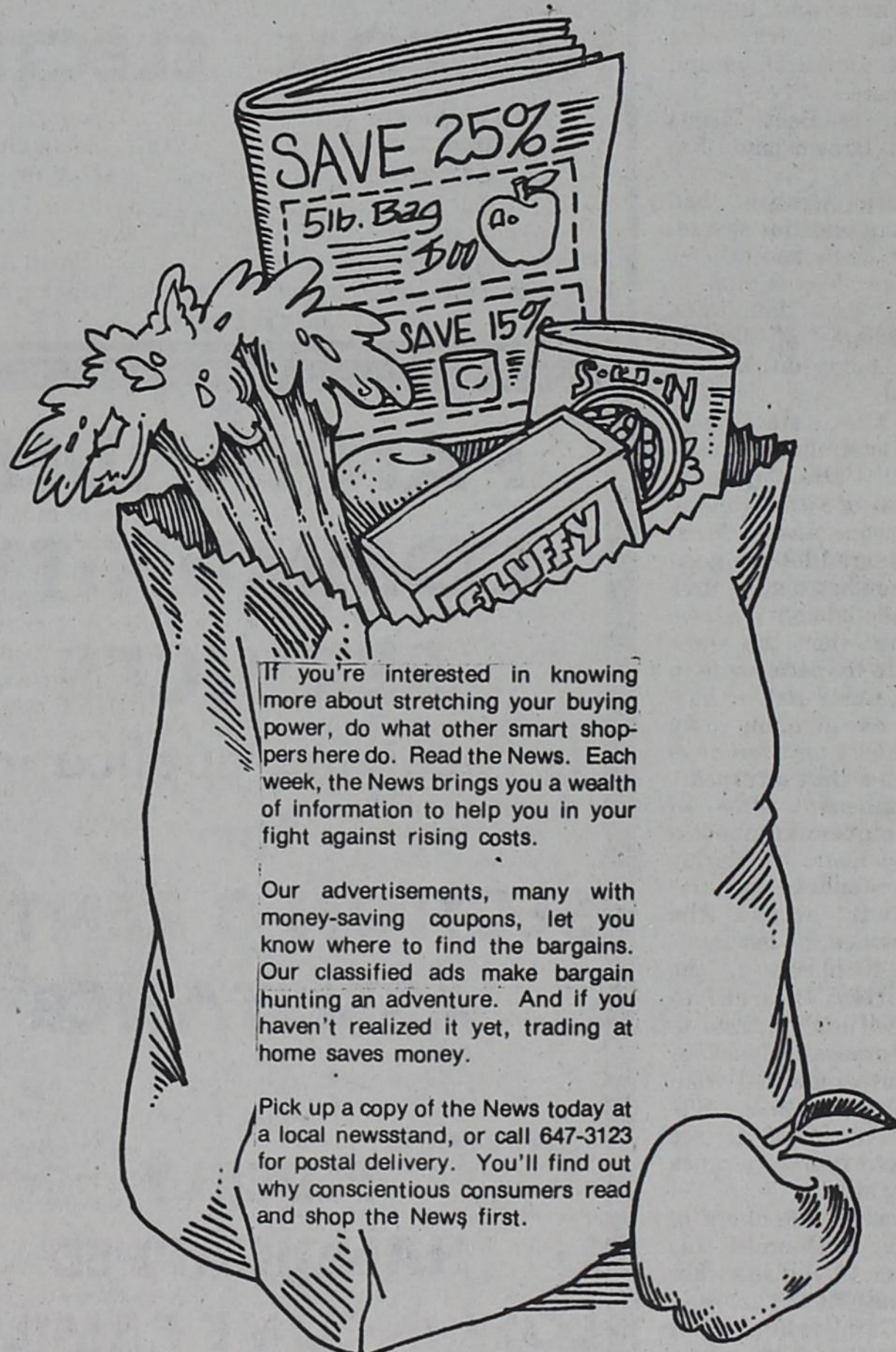
