"CHURCH HISTORY"

After the Western Empire was destroyed in 476, the emperor of Constantinople became the sole emperor of the world, and this new dignity naturally addeed some prestige to the patriarch of that city. But as the ruler of the world the emperor assumed, in imitation of Constantine, the title of Bishop of Bishops. A secular ruler had become the nominal head of the Church. Was there any power in all Christendom that could wrest this title from the emperor and assert the nherent right of the Church to govern her own affairs?

Only the Bishop of Rome dared to come forward with an open challenge, and through the great and long conflict that followed, the Roman bishop laid the basis for the world leadership of the Roman See.
