

Dimmitt Teacher to Take Course in Radiobiology

Inez Robinson, Dimmitt teacher, this summer becomes the only woman from nine states to qualify for study in a special course of the Institute of Radiobiology at the University of Wyoming in Laramie, Wyoming. She is also the only Texan at the Institute. It is sponsored by the National Science Foundation and the Atomic Energy Commission. Students in the program study the effects of radiation on plants and animals in living tissues and on the genetics of living organisms. About \$1,000 worth of equipment will be furnished to each of the schools from which teachers are selected, which, due to Mrs. Robinson's participation, will include Dimmitt High School. There are twenty such institutions in the United States, each with twenty teachers. Participants in the institute are in New Jersey, New Hampshire, Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Michigan and Wyoming. Out of 200 male and female applicants, Mrs. Robinson is the only woman to qualify.

County Wheat Harvest Starts

Castro County's wheat harvest got off to a spotty start this week, with combines nibbling mostly in wheat damaged in some degree by hail. Estimates vary, but conservative guesses are that Castro County wheat and cotton farmers lost about \$4 million during the hail several weeks ago which virtually shattered another bumper wheat crop. Ordinarily Castro County's 100,000 or so wheat acres can be expected to produce 2 1/2 million bushels. This year farmers will harvest about two thirds that amount as insurance adjusters are still in the fields looking at crops that range in damage from very little to 100 percent. Where hailfall was heaviest, only shredded stubble remains where once beautiful stands of wheat stood. Some farmers are plowing their wheat up without trying to cut it. Most heavily-hailed farmers are cutting, however, although it is tough and goes as to whether it will pay for the cutting in some instances. Apparently about one-third of the gross wheat crop was lost due to the two hails which ran in a trip from the southwest corner of the county. It was one of the worst hails in memory from a standpoint of area covered. The picture is not all gloomy for the county as a whole, however. In the north part of the county, wheat was virtually untouched, and in the south part there are fields, which, though hailed upon, still look like they will produce 25 or more bushels per acre. Market price for wheat is now \$1.75.

New Film Product Adds Speed to News Photos

The photo of Edwin Cartwright on this page was taken Thursday afternoon by a Castro County News staff member utilizing a brand-new development in polaroid photography. Received about the middle of the week by Ayers Studio, News photo development contractor, the new process adapts Polaroid Land Camera film to a standard 4x5 Speed Graphic camera. This permits the News staff to take a picture and in one minute have a glossy 4x5 print that compares favorably in quality with conventional film products. This is a combination of one of the world's best cameras and a process developed during the past few years for making direct prints. The 4x5 print system has been on the market less than 60 days and by utilizing it, the Castro County News can take a picture, run it through their engraving department and about an hour later have a zinc plate ready to print. This is the most flexible and rapid photo and engraving system employed by any weekly newspaper anywhere. The photos can be made virtually any size through enlargement or reduction of the 4x5 print by the photoengraving copying camera.

Her Rogers' WASHINGTON LETTER

W TIMES DO CHANGE: December 7, 1941, the Japanese in a sneak attack, all but the Hawaiian Islands. For 10 years thereafter this country had developed a bomb at a cost of 2 billion dollars and which was used at one on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

At the present time the wheat farmer of this nation participating in the program are allowed to plant only 41 million acres of wheat. The cut-back production would be supported at 90 percent parity, in order to prevent placing many wheat farmers in bankruptcy because of the drastic acreage allotment reduction.

The debate did bring out some interesting facts in connection with the scathing denunciation to which the American farmer has been subjected by the metropolitan press and many of the slick magazines in the last several years.

For instance, the people living in the cities have been led to believe that the American farmer was getting rich at the expense of the city dweller in prices that the city dweller was paying for bakery products. Here are the facts: Between 1948 and 1958 the cost of wheat and other ingredients in a loaf of bread declined 12 percent at the farm, while during the same period processing and marketing margins increased 35 percent.

This means that during the ten-year period the cost of a loaf of bread increased by the sum of five and four-tenths cents at 39 percent. The price of a bushel of wheat during that time declined by the sum of 26 cents or 13 percent.

The price of wheat in a one pound loaf of bread is only two and two-fifths cents, a loaf of bread that is now selling at more than twenty cents in many stores. This gives you actual information that definitely proves the conclusion that any rise in the price of loaf of bread bought by the housewife is not due to any money received by the farmer.

The propaganda that the wheat farm program was responsible for high prices of bakery products is a myth and should be abandoned by those discussing the subject. Although the bill which passed the House will cause some hardships among many of the wheat producers, it will be a long step toward solving the surplus problem. I sincerely hope that the President will permit political expediency to dictate a veto.
