School Enrollment Spirals To 1331

Final tabulating of records in Superintendent Paul Hilburn's office shows that the Dimmitt Independent School District has increased roughly by 100 students over last year with the total enrollment reaching 1,331 students.

The first three grades boasts the greatest number. The grade leads with a total of 196; second 150; third 145; fourth 139; fifth 113; sixth 113; seventh 111; eighth 88. In high school there are 66 freshmen, 79 sophomores; 83 juniors and 48 seniors.

Little League Ballpark Breaks Even In Finances

The Dimmitt Little League Ballpark expects to just about break even on its operations this year, according to the sponsoring group the Dimmitt Jaycees.

Total receipts for the summer's activities are \$960.76. Of this amount \$490.76 came from concession stand receipts and \$500.00 came from sign advertisement. Total disbursements were \$986.69. Of this amount \$23.50 was used in advertisement; electricity, \$139.73; dugouts, 49.42; concession stand \$281.59; fence, \$99.00; labor, \$6.00; equipment \$387.45. Actually the Ballpark is in the red at present by about \$25.93. However, there are few signs that have not been collected as yet, and it is expected that by the time these collections are in the Ballpark will be free of indebtedness but will have nothing in the treasury.

Bobcats Start Season Saturday At Perryton

The Dimmitt Bobcats, under the directions of Coaches J. D. Covington, Johnny Ethridge, and Bill Culpepper, will travel 185 miles to Perryton Saturday to take on the Rangers on their own field for the first game of the season.

Most of City To Close Monday For Labor Day

The majority of Dimmitt's stores and businesses will be closed on Labor Day Monday. The only ones expected by the Chamber of Commerce to remain open are some farm service businesses and several service stations. One grocery store will be open.

Labor Day is celebrated all over the United States and always comes on the first Monday in September. It denotes the cause of improved labor condition and was started by the Knights of Labor in 1882 under the leadership of P. J. Maguire of Camden, N. J. The special day observance was adopted by other organizations. Since 1887, when the first act making the day a legal holiday was passed in Colorado, Labor Day has been established in most of the states of the Union and in Canada. In Europe, since about 1890, May 1 has been observed as Labor Day.

Shotgun Blast Interrupts East Side Romance

L. B. Bibles, a 35-year-old Negro man who moved here recently from Amarillo, was shot in the right leg with a shotgun about 1 a.m. Sunday morning by his alleged girl friend, Esther Hawkins, about 23.

The altercation reportedly arose over possession of a record player. Bibles was shot in the right leg and another hit his car door. He reportedly ran to a nearby cafe and fell to the ground where he was picked up and taken to the hospital.

The incident occurred at the Elmo Williams residence where the Hawkins woman was staying with her sister, Mrs. Williams in southeast Dimmitt. According to City Marshal W. W. Jones, he and Dimmitt's other Marshal Jim Gillespie, had a hard time subduing the Hawkins woman who was very vehement. She was taken to the Sheriff's office and fined a total of \$375 for disturbing the peace, discharging a firearm in the city limits and resisting arrest. For his part in the affair, Bibles was fined \$125 for disturbing the peace. According to Jones, Bibles' injuries were not serious and he is currently working off his fine chopping weeds at the fair grounds. Although not seriously injured, Bibles' knife was shot out of his pants pocket.

Merchants, Farmers Urged To Plan For Fair Exhibits & Booth Space

Definite preparations for the fair are getting underway. Merchants exhibits were announced this week by A. V. Barnes who will be in charge of the merchants exhibits this year at the Fair. If any merchant would like to have booth space at the fair, they should contact Mr. Barnes and make their reservation. Booth space of the merchant's exhibits will be located in the west building. Mr. Barnes said any reasonable amount

of space will be given to the individual merchants, unless it becomes necessary to limit space due to lack of facilities. Doyle Underwood and Raybard Smith are in charge of Community and Individual Farm Products. Money prizes on Community Exhibits will be given, beginning with \$10.00 for first place; \$7.50 for second place; \$5.00 for third place; and \$3.00 for fourth place.

Entries in the Community and Individual Farm Products must comply with the following rules:

- (1) Exhibit must be in place by 6:00 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 17th, 1959.
- (2) Entries in this division must be in the Extension or Chamber of Commerce office by September 15th, 1959.
- (3) Exhibitors will be assigned space by the Superintendent.
- (4) Each exhibit must contain 15 different kinds of agricultural products which shall be scored for a total of 600 points.
- (5) Neatness, attractiveness and general arrangement of exhibits will be scored on the basis of 100 points. The total score is 700 points.
- (6) Appropriate banners will be given the first 7 places.
- (7) Individuals may show any of the classes which will be listed at a later date on individual Farm products. The first places will receive ribbons.
- (8) Champion Gardener—To be eligible for the champion gardener one must have at least 5 entries in the different vegetables classes.
- (9) Champion Farmer—To be eligible for the County Champion Farmer one must have at least 5 different entries in farm products.

Just before the fair there will be a special fair edition of the paper and the various divisions and sub-divisions of the Community and Individual Farm Products will be printed.

ASC Lists Ways For Preserving Wheat History

Castro County farmers were notified this week about what steps must be taken to preserve their wheat acreage.

A charge has been made in the methods of determining wheat acreage history on farms which have been underseeded in the past. It will be in effect for the 1960 crop.

Farmers may fail to plant wheat for harvest in 1960 and still receive maximum history acreage credit for 1960 if (1) the actual planted acreage of wheat in either 1958 or 1959 was equal to 75 percent of the farm wheat allotment, or (2) the actual planted acreage of wheat in either 1958 or 1959, plus the acreage regarded as planted to wheat because of participation in the Soil Bank Act or the Great Plains program was equal to 75 percent of the farm wheat allotment.

Farms not meeting these requirements may still receive maximum wheat acreage history by (1) planting an acreage of wheat for 1960 equal to 75 percent of the farm wheat allotment, or (2) by having a planted wheat acreage for 1960, plus the acreage regarded as planted to wheat because of participation in the Soil Bank Act or the Great Plains program, equal to 75 percent of your farm wheat allotment.

In addition to the foregoing, if the ASC county committee determines that the farmer was prevented from seeding wheat for the 1960 crop because of unfavorable weather conditions, he can preserve his maximum 1960 wheat history acreage credit by notifying the county committee of this fact by December 1, 1959. This provision, however, does not apply if he elects to remove previously stored excess wheat by underplanting or underproduction of the 1960 crop.

Bennie Scott, Local High School Senior, Stricken With Polio

Bennie Scott, a seventeen year old Dimmitt High School senior and son of Mr. and Mrs. Jo Scott is in a Plainview Hospital undergoing treatment for polio.

The youth became ill last week but symptoms were not definite enough for attending physicians to pronounce his illness as polio until the week-end when he was removed to a Plainview hospital. A muscular paralysis is involved from his waste down but one of his physicians stated he is improving.

Dr. Harold Bischoff as the county health doctor, is urging everyone from small children through young adult years particularly, to take the Salk vaccine. He stated that a large number have already been in to take the shots. It is the recommendation of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Dr. Bischoff said, for those who have had three shots to take a fourth shot one year later. Those who have had no shots at all should begin right away.

1960 Motor Vehicle Inspection Stickers Now Available

The Texas Department of Public Safety has announced the new 1960 motor vehicle inspection stickers became available to Texas motorists Tuesday, September 1.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director, recommended that Texans have their vehicles inspected early in the new inspection period which extends from September 1 to April 15, 1960. Vehicles not displaying the new sticker after April 15 will be operating in violation of the law.

"In the vast majority of cases," Garrison said, "this program has become a very minor inconvenience and expense to the motor vehicle owner—provided he moves early to comply with the law."

"More than 4,500 authorized inspector stations over the State are capable of handling the inspection of Texas vehicles without delay if owners will not wait until just a few days before the deadline."

"With hazy summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked in preparation for the winter months."

Garrison called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 11 per cent to four per cent.

He said 43.4 per cent of the cars inspected during the last inspection period needed some adjustment or repair and that the average cost for inspection, including the \$1.00 fee, was only \$2.02 per car.

Band to Sell Holiday Fruit Cakes Again

Dimmitt High School band members will again sell their popular fruit cakes to finance their activities this year.

To cost \$3.85 per two-pound cake, they will be sold to finance new uniforms and any band trip that might come up during the year. A reduction in price of 55 cents each will be made for customers buying a dozen or more of the cakes.

Delivery will be shortly before Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Last year 270 pounds of the cakes were sold and the band made about \$960 on the project.

"We have found good acceptance by the public for the sale of these cakes," says Band Director Ralph Smith. "This is a good product and it is worth the money."

In commenting on this year's band, Smith said the prospects are good that this year will produce one of the school's "better bands." The Bobcat Band is looking good and sounding good, he said. Smith lost 22 members last year to graduation and brought in 33 or 34 new members. "We have high hopes for this year," he said.

The band does not know when, where or if they will make a long-distance band-trip this year.

Hopeful of Finding Pest-Control Chemicals Absorbed exuded by Roots
The USDA plant pathologist, extension plant pathologist.
Farmers have an important new weapon in their fight against pests if a chemical that will protect plants against diseases, insects or nematodes could be mobile within plants like those substances.
These three newly discovered substances—meta-chloro, meta-fluoro, and para-fluoro—are halogenated forms of alpha methoxyphenyl-isocyanate (MOPA), reported in 1955 by the USDA as a promising "systemic" with unusual ability to be moved or translocated throughout the plant. Like MOPA the three chemically-related forms can not only be translocated but can be exuded from plant roots in their original chemical form, Smith says.
Mandelic acid, another systemic form of MOPA, was found to have no growth-modifying effects. And although mandelic acid cannot be exuded from roots, this indicates

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—not to exceed 20.
WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—10.
NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are possessed—Possession limit—20, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be white-winged doves.



NO HUNTING permitted in game refuges and game reserves.

SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U.S. Highway 83, (former Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary."

SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having white-winged season, where shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 11, 12, & 15, only. White-winged doves, 12 noon to sunset.
