### Aims at 300 Miles



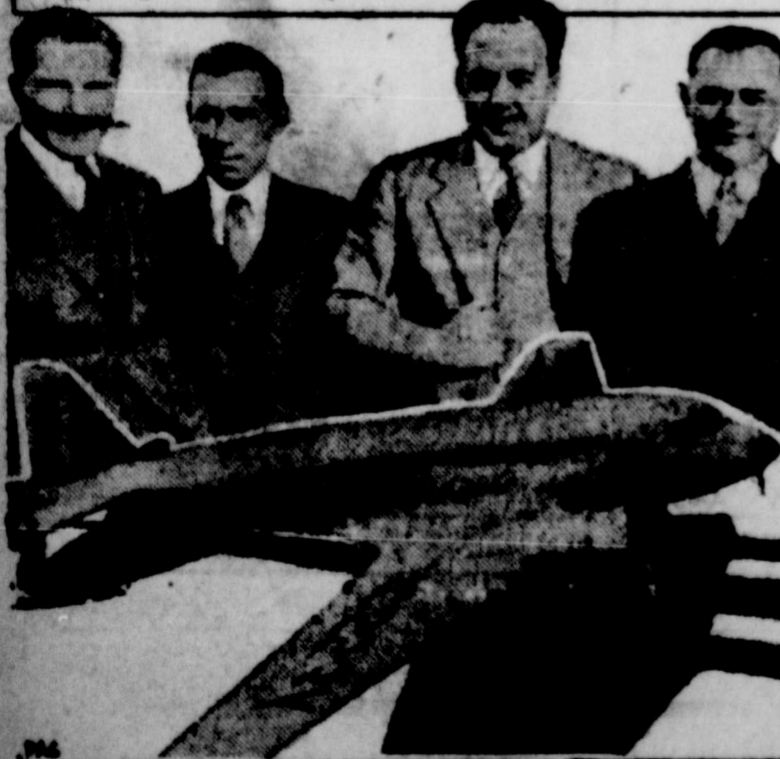
