General trends of what farmers plan to do with the A or B plan cotton have yet to be set. They have until March 16th to let the ASC office know which way they want to go. After that date anyone who has not notified ASC will be assumed to have taken the A

As provided by legislation enacted last summer, the Choice A is the regular farm allotment, determined as in former years. Cotton produced in 1959 in compliance with the farm's Choice A allotment will be eligible for price support of 30.40 cents per pound, basis middling 7/8-inch cotton, gross weight, at average location. The farm's Choice B allotment is 40 percent larger than Choice A, and cotton produced in compliance with the B allotment will be eligible for support at 24.70

WASHINGTON, D.C., March-5 -(Spl) - Congressman Walter Rogers, Democratic representative from this area, today delivered a stinging attack on the current administration and on Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson in par-

Rep. Rogers, a frequent critic of agriculture department policies is upset over the recent announce ment of the Department setting the support price for 1959 grain sorghum crops at \$1.52 per hundred weight in addition to the difficulty he expressed in securing an appointment with the secretary

"Of all the injustices perpet rated on the farmer by the Sec retary of Agriculture this beats them all. He has not only set the support price on grain sorghums at a figure actually below the cost of production, but he has broken faith with the expressed intent of the law fixed by congress by showing favoritism to the corn they will certainly put on as much producers at the expense of the

"It was only after repeated requests from me and other members of Congress that Secretary Benson finally agreed to a meeting for discussion to be held on March 6 at 4 p.m. It is notable and typical of agricultural department policies that this meeting will be held at the convenience of the secretary rather than at the convenience of members of
