

Basic Park Work Completed

Bob McLean, chairman of the city park committee, told the Dimmitt Lions Club Tuesday that the new park is ready to be equipped and that most of the basic work has been completed.

The new city park, located where the old grade school used to stand in South Dimmitt, has been leveled, the sprinkler system installed, fertilizer added, grass planted, and a maintenance building constructed. The trees will be planted this fall.

Main project facing Dimmitt citizens today is to begin adding

the equipment to make the park usable, Mr. McLean said. Tennis courts, playground equipment, benches, and other items to fill out the park will be the big job ahead, he predicted. It is expected this will be done by various civic groups in the city.

Mr. McLean gave a rundown of expenses on the park installation and indicated he felt, along with others working on the park installation, that Dimmitt was getting a bargain. This is chiefly due, he said, to a large amount of work done virtually at cost by

several Dimmitt firms.

Most expensive item on the list was the sprinkler system, installed by Dimmitt Ditching Service, which cost a relatively low \$5,400. The maintenance building, constructed by Dimmitt Lumber Company, cost \$3,150. Page Construction Company did the large amount of dirt moving at a cost of \$299.47.

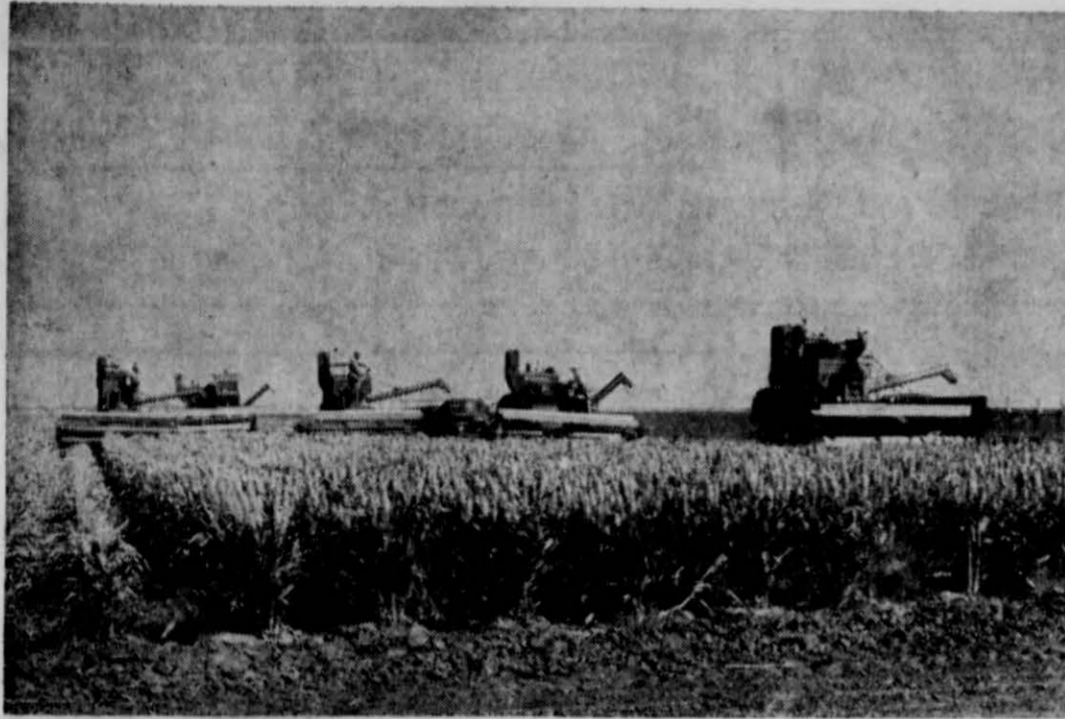
Other general expense was itemized as follows: real estate purchase from American Legion, \$300; plans and specifications, \$330; power lawnmower (passen-

per type), \$510; fertilizer, \$406; Bermuda and eye seed, \$116; trees and shrubbery (on order), \$1,900; insurance and bonding charges, \$292.50; and miscellaneous expenses, \$177.33.

The original amount available for the park fund was \$15,000 and \$2,177 remains as a balance. After this is gone, the park will be maintained by about \$400 each month paid from city water bills. About half of this figure will go toward retiring of bonds used to finance the park and the other half will go toward maintenance.

Mr. A. L. Glenn is caretaker of the park. It is believed by city officials the grass and grounds will be ready for use early next summer. It will be about three years before the trees mature well enough to serve their purposes. On order are 156 shade trees, 21 ornamental trees, 66 evergreens, 284 hedges, and 154 shrubs.

On the park committee with Mr. McLean are B. M. Nelson and Dr. Charles Vandiver. The park was designed by Mark T. Miles of Amarillo.

While the Bobcats have dropped all three of their games so far this season, they have shown in-

On the other hand, the Antelopes have dropped only one game so far this year, and that to a tough Olton team by one point in a torrid last-minute push by Olton.

Neither Dimmitt nor Abernathy has played the same team, so there is no direct basis for comparison.

Joe Cowen to Attend First Meeting As New Demo Committee Member

Joe Cowen of Dimmitt will make his first trip to Austin next Thursday as a member of the newly reorganized State Democratic Executive Committee.

Each senatorial district in the state is permitted two persons—a man and a woman—in the committee. There are 31 of these districts in the state; Castro County is in District 30.

Mr. Cowen will be called on to help the other 61 members of the committee decide on whether governor-elect Price Daniel's Senate seat will be filled by appointment or by a "sudden death" election with plurality holder winning the seat.

Other business will be transacted by the committee, but this election issue will be top on the agenda.

Purpose of the State Democratic Executive Committee, according to Mr. Cowen, is to run the state Democratic Party for the next two years.

Mr. Cowen is well qualified for his post. He has been an active supporter and worker for the Democratic Party for many years. He was a delegate to both the May and September party conventions this year and was elected to the executive committee despite the fact that he was well known for his stand as a loyal Democrat and supporter of Ralph Yarborough in the governor's race just past.

Committeewoman from the 30th District is Mrs. Doris Harvis of Plainview.

To be elected to the State Executive Committee, a candidate's name is submitted after district caucus to the convention officers committee at the September convention. If candidates are certified and approved—and many loyal Democrats were not at this convention—their names are placed in nomination from the floor and voted upon.

Mr. Cowen has also participated in other party work. He was an alternate delegate to the National Democratic Convention, elected County Democratic Chairman, and was a delegate to both state conventions this year.

Frank Clement To Speak at Sudan Friday

Tennessee Governor Expected to Lambast Republican Party

Governor Frank Clement of Tennessee, keynote speaker at the Democratic Convention in Chicago, will speak in Sudan Friday beginning at 7:30 p.m., as a featured attraction of Sudan's annual Fall Festival, which each year builds its theme around international peace.

Governor Clement, in his keynote address last month, unleashed a vitriolic attack against the Republican administration that set the stage for one of the most enthusiastic Democratic conventions ever held.

Arrangements for the speaker were made by F. O. Masten, well-known Sudan farmer and personal friend of Governor Clement. Mr. Masten has invited all farmers and others of the area to bring 100 pounds of grain or anything else of value to be auctioned off beginning at 1 p.m. Friday. Proceeds of this auction will go to the Democratic national campaign fund.

Hundreds of sacks of grain and several bales of cotton have already been contributed to the Democratic National Campaign for auctioning.

Governor Clement has received an average of 500 invitations per day to speak all over the country since his dramatic keynote address.

THIS "GOLDEN SPREAD" . . .

We don't know who coined the phrase "The Golden Spread," in reference to the Panhandle area, but they came pretty close to hitting the mark. What probably started out as a Chamber of Commerce slogan actually did describe this area in relation to other major sections of Texas.

Castro County is secured comfortably in the center of a vast irrigation empire, stretching from near the Gulf on up to Canada—but only in this area does it seem to really pay off for Texas.

While there are only a few counties in the state without one form of irrigation or the other, almost all of them not located in this area depend primarily on rainfall for their crops.

We took a trip through the Gulf Coast area and West Texas several weeks ago and everywhere south of the Caprock the story was the same—no rain. Some places within 100 miles of the Gulf beaches were having drought and no crops. Cotton and feed crops were pathetic and scanty.

There is a vertical line drawn through the center of the United States called the "free line." It angles to the Southwest in Texas following the western edge of heavy timber growth. This line, in general, follows the 98th meridian and to the east heavy rainfall occurs and to the west conditions are generally semi-arid, unable to support the growth of trees.

Drought problems east of this free line are usually either non-existent or non-severe, while to the west good wet years are outnumbered by the dry.

For this reason "The Golden Spread" would be just another hackneyed phrase on the High Plains if it were not for irrigation. Already national business magazines are reporting a rush to the cities by farmers looking for a livelihood they could not gain on the farm.

There may well become a day when those conditions prevail here, if we ever lose our irrigation water we will return to depending on 15 inches of annual rainfall a year that very rarely comes abundantly enough at the right time.

We are in a fortunate position today and we are envied by South Texas farmers. How long we remain a "Golden Spread" depends on how we study the science of farming and how we conserve our natural resources.
