Miss Karen Bell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmo Bell of Dimmitt, was crowned queen of the Castro County Farm Bureau Friday night.

She was chosen over 13 other contestants, each of whom had been nominated by county communities, organizations, and sponsors. Miss Bell was sponsored by J. G. Davis, Jr., of Dimmitt.

The 17-year-old Dimmitt High School senior was crowned by Miss Myrna Thompson, 1956 Texas Farm Bureau Queen from Dimmitt. Hugo Beyer, president of the Castro County Farm Bureau, made the presentation.

Miss Bell is a member of the National Honor Society, scholastic honorary for high school students; plays bassoon in the Dimmitt Bobcat Band, and is a member of Future Homemakers of America. She was in the junior class play, "Papa Was a Preacher," during the 1955-56 school year.

"I am very proud to have the honor," she said. "I know many other girls deserve to have it, but I surely appreciate the opportunity. The Farm Bureau has been very helpful in supporting me since I won."

A large crowd attended the combination, queen contest-watermelon festival in the Dimmitt High School auditorium, said Mrs. Gene Ivey of the Castro County Farm Bureau office.

The new queen will compete September 13 with 40 other county winners in the district contest in Lubbock. The district contest is scheduled for 7:30 p. m. September 13 at O. R. Slaton Junior High School, 3000 Ave. Q. Lubbock.

Judges for the county contest were Mrs. J. P. Jones of Tulla, Mayor Keeling of Littlefield, and Mrs. Warren Anderson of Amarillo.

Miss Ann Gollehon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Noel Gollehon of Dimmitt, was named alternate in the contest.

Warren Anderson, farm editor of radio station KFDA and KFDA-TV in Amarillo, was master of ceremonies.

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First Cotton Bale Brought to Hart By O. C. Kittrell

Castro County's first bale of 1956 cotton was taken to the Hart Gin Wednesday night by O. C. Kittrell, who grew the cotton on Ray Riley's farm near Hart.

The bale arrived just after last week's News had been published. Agricultural advisors in Castro County have indicated that this bale will be the predecessor of as good a cotton harvest as the county has ever had.

Roland Shepard, owner of the Hart Gin and Shepard Gin at Hart, paid 50 cents a pound for the cotton. The bale was then brought to Dimmitt for the traditional premiums.

Five Dimmitt public service firms and organizations gave a total of \$50 on the bale.

Mr. Shepard reported that a contribution will be taken at Hart shortly.

Dimmitt Schools Enroll 1,109 for New Record



THEIR FIRST REGISTRATION leaves these first-graders just a bit bewildered. Many mothers and teachers were present, however, to help them with their enrollment problems. This procedure will become commonplace to the young scholars during the next twelve to twenty years.

Dimmitt schools registered a total of 1,109 students Monday and Tuesday, and late registrations are expected to bring the total to almost 1,300 by next mid-week.

Of these, 840 were elementary and grade school students, 236 were high school students, and 33 were colored students. The colored students meet in the portable grade school classrooms immediately west of the high school building.

The necessary hazards of school registration and a new building were encountered: more furniture has been ordered but has not arrived; schedule and classroom conflicts must be alleviated; and students' mistakes as to times and places must be corrected.

Space and facilities are not problems this year. Seven rooms in the new 26-room elementary school will not be used this year, four rooms in the north grade school are temporarily vacant, and an estimated 100 more students could be taken into the high school.

This is as it should be in a growing city like Dimmitt, Superintendent Vestal said. He estimated that about 300 more students could be accommodated before a new school building could be deemed necessary.

Mr. Vestal predicted the increase would not come in the high school, but that a steadily-mounting enrollment in the grade school could force junior high students into the DHS building making a new building necessary for high school students.

The senior class enrollment so far is 66. In the last school year, 48 were graduated. First grade enrollment is presently 148 as compared to last year's first-term enrollment of 141.

The number of students in all classes will rise and reach a peak in October, school officials said; this is due to the transient laborers' children. Last year the first grade reached a peak of 181, then dropped back to 140.

The new elementary school building was praised by all the teachers as a second-to-none school. Final work is being completed on the outside now while classes meet in fully-finished and fully-furnished rooms.

Classes begin at 8:45 a. m. Monday through Friday, and end at 3:45 p. m. Classes are in 55-minute periods, with five minutes between classes. Students have 45 minutes, from 12 to 12:45, for lunch. This makes the last period before lunch 15 minutes longer; this time may be used for called class meetings when class officers feel such a meeting is needed.

Totals for the Hart, Nazareth, and Dimmitt schools will not be complete until next week, but it has already become a definite possibility that this will be another record year in the county's steadily-rising enrollments.

Important Cotton Meeting Scheduled Monday Night

An important county-wide cotton growers' meeting has been scheduled for Monday night at 8 p. m. in the District Court Room.

The meeting will include two outstanding cotton authorities and a farmer-ginner panel.

Mair purpose of the meeting will be to discuss the objectives and activities of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., an organization devoted to improvement, research, marketing, and promotion of High Plains cotton.

George Pfeiffenberger of Lubbock, executive vice-president of PCG, will explain the past achievements of the organization.

Mr. Pfeiffenberger is recognized as one of the outstanding cotton fiber authorities in the nation, said Edd McLeroy, First State Bank farm representative.

"Every farmer in the county should attend this important meeting," Mr. McLeroy said.

A representative of the Lubbock Experiment Station will also be present to discuss the value of returning cotton burs to the soil, handling cotton before ginning to get the best grade and price, and other related topics. Mr. McLeroy said that this man's advice could mean an additional \$10 to \$20 per bale to local cotton growers.

A farmer-ginner panel is also scheduled. By this means, Mr. McLeroy said, farmers and ginner can air out their problems and make suggestions as to picking and ginning for more efficiency.

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., was organized in January, 1956, and has gained widespread popularity on the High Plains. The organization was set up to represent 23 Plains counties, with the goal being a strong cooperative marketing, promotion, and research program.

Elected officers of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., are W. O. Fortenberry of Lubbock, president; Wilmer Smith of Wilson, vice-president; and M. A. Elms of Littlefield, secretary-treasurer.

Bobcats Short on Experience As They Meet Rough Owls

The Dimmitt Bobcats will open their 1956 season Friday night at Silverton when they meet the strong Silverton Owls.

The Owls, traditional first game foes of the Bobcats, have all of their regulars back from last year, and Coach Grady Martin is utilizing the team's experience with a strong single-wing attack.

Although Dimmitt has not lost an opener to Silverton in seven years, Head Coach J. D. Covington said this might be Silverton's year to dominate.

"Silverton is strong; they have an offense which is very hard to play against, and they have experience," Coach Covington said.

Dimmitt's main drawback this year is depth, said backfield coach Johnny Ethridge. "So far we have only 19 boys to depend upon," he said.

But that lack of depth may be offset by the spirit and hustle of the team, the coaches indicated.

"I'm pleased with the morale of the team," Coach Covington said. "Dimmitt fans will see a hard-working team Friday night. I can't guarantee a victory, but I can guarantee that every boy on the field will be hustling."

The Bobcats will be using the Split T formation, a favorite offense in college and pro football circles. By using this offense, linemen will be set farther apart for better blocking angles and the backfield will be closer to the line for fast-opening plays.

This formation demands a lot of extra speed from the line, said line coach Alvis Fuquay, and that speed hasn't been achieved yet.

"However," he said, "the boys are working hard and if they keep it up they may do all right with the Split T."

Both teams will be running unfamiliar offenses. This is Silverton's first year on the single-wing attack.

Zay Gilbreath and Monty Boozer will be captain and co-captain of the Bobcats this year. Both are seniors.

Dimmitt's main advantage is conditioning, the coaches said. "The boys we're depending on in this game are in good shape, and we're light on injuries," said Coach Covington. Many boys couldn't begin workouts until school started Wednesday, but these boys are expected to be in good shape within the next week or two, the coaches said.

The Bobcats defeated a good Owl team last year, 18-0. This year that entire Owl team will be back with a different offensive attack and will be playing on their home field. The Bobcats will be outwighed in almost every position.

County Fair Exhibiting Space Short As Officials Prepare for Big Week

The 1956 Castro County Fair, scheduled for next week-end, is still in the planning stage and much remains to be done before opening time, Fair Association officials said this week.

The main problem is finding enough exhibit space, Glenn Youts, Castro County Chamber of Commerce secretary, said. The Fair Association used two of the government quonset buildings west of the Fair Grounds last year, but an elevator company rented those buildings from the government this year for much-needed storage space.

However, the elevator company manager said Wednesday that they could spare one of the buildings for use in the fair this year.

The fair's full program will not be complete until sometime next week, officials said.

Committee appointments have been completed, however. This releases those working on the various divisions of the Fair to complete all details necessary. Fair committee work and planning work by the Fair Association board of directors comprise most of the preliminaries to the Fair.

The Castro County Fair is comparatively late in beginning because of the growing season and possible conflicts with regional fairs. East Texas has the earliest county fairs in the state; Northwest Texas fairs are usually the latest.

The Castro County Fair first gained impetus in the early 1940's, during World War II. In 1951 the Castro County Fair Association was set up, making the fair a well-integrated organization.

Every type of agriculture and animal product in Castro County is expected to be exhibited at the Fair.

The Fair is made up of many divisions, both junior and senior. Additional information on these divisions and the Fair committees will be available next week.

Connie English Has Winning Time In Hart Irrigation Rodeo Saturday

This makes Mr. English the acknowledged world champion—it is the only tube-setting contest in the world.

In the junior division, Kenny Johnson won the championship. He is 14 years old.

Twenty-three adults and five juniors entered this year's rodeo, including one entrant from Olton and one from Hale Center.

The top ten adults were determined in a preliminary contest, then these competed for the top three places.

In third place behind English and Hawkins was Wayne Beavers. English had a time of 32.4 seconds on 25 tubes; Hawkins, 36.4; and Beavers, 42.2.

In the junior division Johnston had a time of 64.6, Johnny Kittrell was second with 70.7, and Mike Reed was third with 77.0.

Time penalties were given for stops (2 seconds) and bubbles (1 second). All of the top men got either a bubble or a stop as they raced the clock.

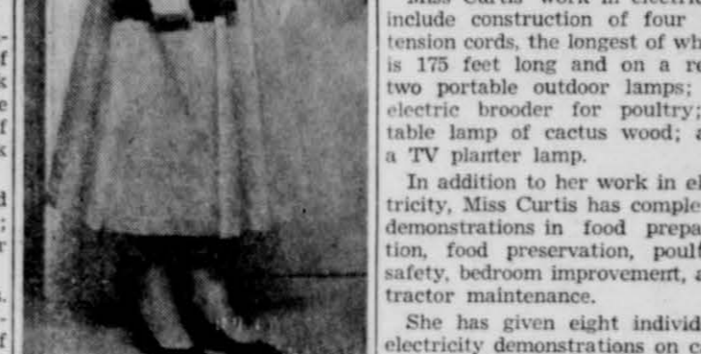
