MORE COTTON GOODS BUT LESS COTTON ACREAGE

College Station, January 23—Texas farmers are expected to take full advantage of the supplementary cotton program which will compensate cotton farmers for voluntary reduction of cotton acreage below the 1941 national acreage allotment by providing them with cotton stamps for the purchase of cotton goods.

Commenting on the supplementary program announced Monday in Washington by Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, George A. Slaughter, chairman of the state Triple-A committee pointed out that for the past several years Texas farmers have not planted up to the total allotment for the state.

The supplemental program is expected to bring about a reduction in 1941 cotton production of around 1,000,000 bales and at the same time help reduce further the government's holdings of the cotton surplus which now amount to nearly 12,000,000 bales. "Basic conservation and parity programs already in effect under the AAA will be in no way changed by the new voluntary program," Slaughter said.

Administering the program will be a responsibility of the Triple-A and the Surplus Marketing Administration will provide and redeem up to 25 million dollars worth of cotton stamps which farmers will receive for their voluntary reduction below their individual allotments. In cooperation, the Extension Service of A. and M. College will carry on an intensive educational program to help cotton producers obtain the greatest benefit from the provisions, according to H. H. Williamson, Extension Service director.

Farmers will receive stamps for planting less than their 1941 allotment or their 1940 measure acreage, whichever is lower, at the rate of 10 cents a pound times the normal yield of the underplanted acreage up to \$25 per family in the case of sharecroppers, tenants and owner-operators. The new program is to be accompanied by an intensive campaign to encourage improved living standards through more gardens and food and feed production for home consumption.

AWARDS FOR 1941 GOOD DRIVERS LEAGUE WINNERS

Dearborn, Mich.—With the nation's high schools preparing for second semester activities, the Ford Good Drivers League today announced details of its 1941 good driving contests, in which \$25,000 in scholarships will be awarded boys and girls of high school age throughout the country.

Started last year by Edsel Ford to promote improved driving and increase motorizing safety among youth, the Good Drivers League embarks on its second season with one major innovation that is expected to more than double the membership.

Where the nation-wide 1940 good driving contests of judges will rate the boys and girls on their driving ability in "on the spot" tests. The 40 boys and 40 girls chosen as state champions will be invited to compete in the national finals to be held in Dearborn, starting August 6th.

Each national finalist, accompanied by a sponsor, will make the trip to Dearborn as a guest of the Good Drivers League. In the finals, a series of comprehensive tests similar to those given last year at the finals on the New York World's Fair grounds will be used again.

Under the new rules set up by Mr. Ford as League president and his national advisory board, girls will compete in a separate division, while the boys also will have a section of their own. There will be no mixed contests.

As awards for the national winners, Mr. Ford revealed that 98 Good Drivers League scholarships would be presented as follows: with identical awards for both the boy and girl divisions: First prize, \$5,000 university scholarship; second prize, \$2,500 university scholarship; third, fourth and fifth prizes, each \$500 scholarship; and the next 44 winners, \$100 each.

The contests were open to boys and girls between 14 and 18. In order to qualify for membership in the Ford Good Drivers League, all entrants must be qualified and legally authorized to drive a car in the state in which they reside.

"The Good Drivers League objective this year is the same as last—to encourage better driving among youth," Mr. Ford announced. "The response to our 1940 contest was very gratifying and encouraged us to broaden the scope of the League's work this year. We feel that over the years the Ford Good Drivers League can and will make an increasingly important contribution to the cause of good driving and to increase safety on our streets and highways."

"It is hoped that this year's League activity will prove highly interesting to many civic organizations, safety clubs, public officials and schools whose help last year in furthering the work and objectives of the League is gratefully acknowledged.

Each state, according to Mr. Ford, will have its own elimination contest to select the boy and girl state champion driver, as well as a runner-up in each division. A separate elimination contest will be held this year in the District

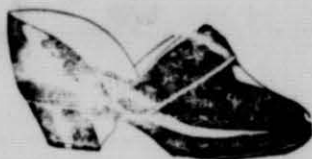

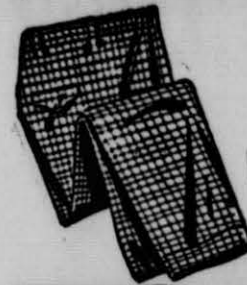
