



Golden Text: Amos 5:15.

The prophets, whose messages are studied this quarter, were more than foretellers: they were also forthtellers, the great preachers of their time. With a sublime courage they told men things they did not wish to hear and stood firm for the right when all the world seemed to be going the other way.

Of no prophetic school. Amos. called of God, left his sheep and sycamore trees at Tekoa, near Jerusalem, to denounce the rulers and wealthy men of the Northern Kingdom who oppressed the poor and perverted justice "in the gate." His messages might now be valued only for historical study of a distant age if the evils he denounced had somehow happily passed away. 

Then someone discovered that other vegetables were equally healthful and spinach toppled from grace with great suddenness.



Now, it's back again. We have earned that cooked properly, sea-soned with imagination, spinach is vegetable of fine, zesty flavor. instance, take this supper spinach ring:

Spinach Ring filled with Creamed

Tuna Fish and Mushrooms 2 pounds fresh spinach % cup milk 2 eggs 1 teaspoon salt % teaspoon pepper

Cook the spinach about 8 minutes nd drain very well. (This should rield about 3 cups cooked spinach.) Chop the spinach slightly, add milk, eggs, salt and pepper. Turn into a buttered ring mold, set in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderately hot (375°) oven for 30-45 minutes or until firm. Unmold on a hot plate and fill center of ring with Creamed Tuna Fish and Mushrooms.

room soup % cup milk 1 can (7 oz.) tuna fish


