Board tables baseball idea

Trustee election called

The Dimmitt School Board called a trustee election for April 1, renewed the contracts of nine administrators and teachers, and tabled discussion of a proposed high-school baseball program in a lengthy meeting Monday night.

THE BOARD heard four members of the baseball committee ask that consideration be given to adding baseball to the Interscholastic League sports program at Dimmitt High. The motion was tabled pending surveys of neighboring Class AA school districts.

The board approved the recommendations of the textbook committee on books for the coming school year, and okayed the purchase of a tractor and mower and the sowing of grass on the south side of the high school plant.

Other items approved by the trustees included the sale of an Addressograph to Girlstown, a requested tax refund, and the transfer of securities for the First State Bank.

The board refused to improve 16th Street to the South County Road at the present time. Trustees decided that if the county road is paved, the motion will be considered again.

A TRUSTEE election was called for April 1 with the filing deadline set for March 1. Gene King was elected absentee vote clerk with Mrs. Jo Hamilton as his assistant. Absentee votes

must be cast in the tax office. Mrs. Shirley Stephens was appointed election judge. The election will be held in the Junior High School building. Candidates can file for the trustee positions in the school tax office.

Contracts for Gene King, business manager, Kenneth Ringo and Ike Moore, counselors, Weldon Skinner, Elmer Berryhill, Mrs. Evie Froehner and Mrs. Dorothy Sheffy were extended one year. The contracts of Band Director Ralph Smith and Assistant Band Director Richard Bales were extended for two years.

Supt. Charlie White presented reports in nine different teaching areas and explained the comparison of second grade standardized test scores for the past three years.

THE BOARD halted the long meeting late Monday night without completing the agenda. A called meeting will be held Monday to complete the business.

Items to be considered then are contracts for the principals and coaches, Special Education State Plan A, grouping at the elementary level, bids on the high school courtyard, and the possibility of an industrial arts enrichment course.

THIS WILL probably be the final holiday reunion for the Ex-Students' Association, Nelson said. Further reunions will be combined with Dimmitt High School's Homecoming Week, starting next fall.

William Ernest Loudder, 84, a resident of the Sunnyside community 42 years, died at 4 a.m. Sunday in the Golden Spread Nursing home after a five-year illness.

FUNERAL services were conducted at 3 p.m. Tuesday in the Sunnyside Baptist Church. Officiating was Rev. Murle Rogers of Shamrock, former pastor of the Sunnyside church. He was assisted by Rev. Mack Turner, present pastor.

At Dimmitt Re-dy Mix, \$15 in change was taken from a soft-drink machine after burglars broke a glass in the south door of the building to gain entry.

DIMMITT Safety Lane lost \$5 in quarters from a change box. The burglars gained entry by breaking a restroom window.

At Bob's Farm Supply in Hart, Manager George Black reported that burglars knocked the glass out of a rear window and took \$13.50 from a cash drawer.

Officers said all the burglaries apparently occurred before the snowfall started at 1:30 a.m. When the break-ins were reported Friday morning, officers found only fresh snow under the broken windows of the buildings.

Youths enter 308 animals

Promises of ribbons, banners, trophies and prize money have enticed county FFA and 4-H members to enter 308 calves, lambs, and barrows in the 18th annual Castro County Junior Fat Stock and Project show this weekend.

ALL ENTRIES were submitted by 10 a.m. Tuesday morning to County Agent Charles Hottel, show secretary. Weighing in will begin at 1 p.m. today (Thursday) and all livestock must be in place by 5:30 p.m. in the county show barns in east Dimmitt.

Entry fees remain the same as last year—\$4 for calves and \$3 for barrows and lambs.

The Dimmitt Young Farmers sponsor the annual event. General superintendent is David Cole, and his assistant is David Springer.

LONG HOURS of work and training go on the line beginning at 8 a.m. Friday when sitting for condition, quality, grooming, age and training starts.

Lambs are scheduled to be judged at 1 p.m. Friday, with barrow judging following at 2 p.m. Judging of calves will begin at 9 Saturday morning.

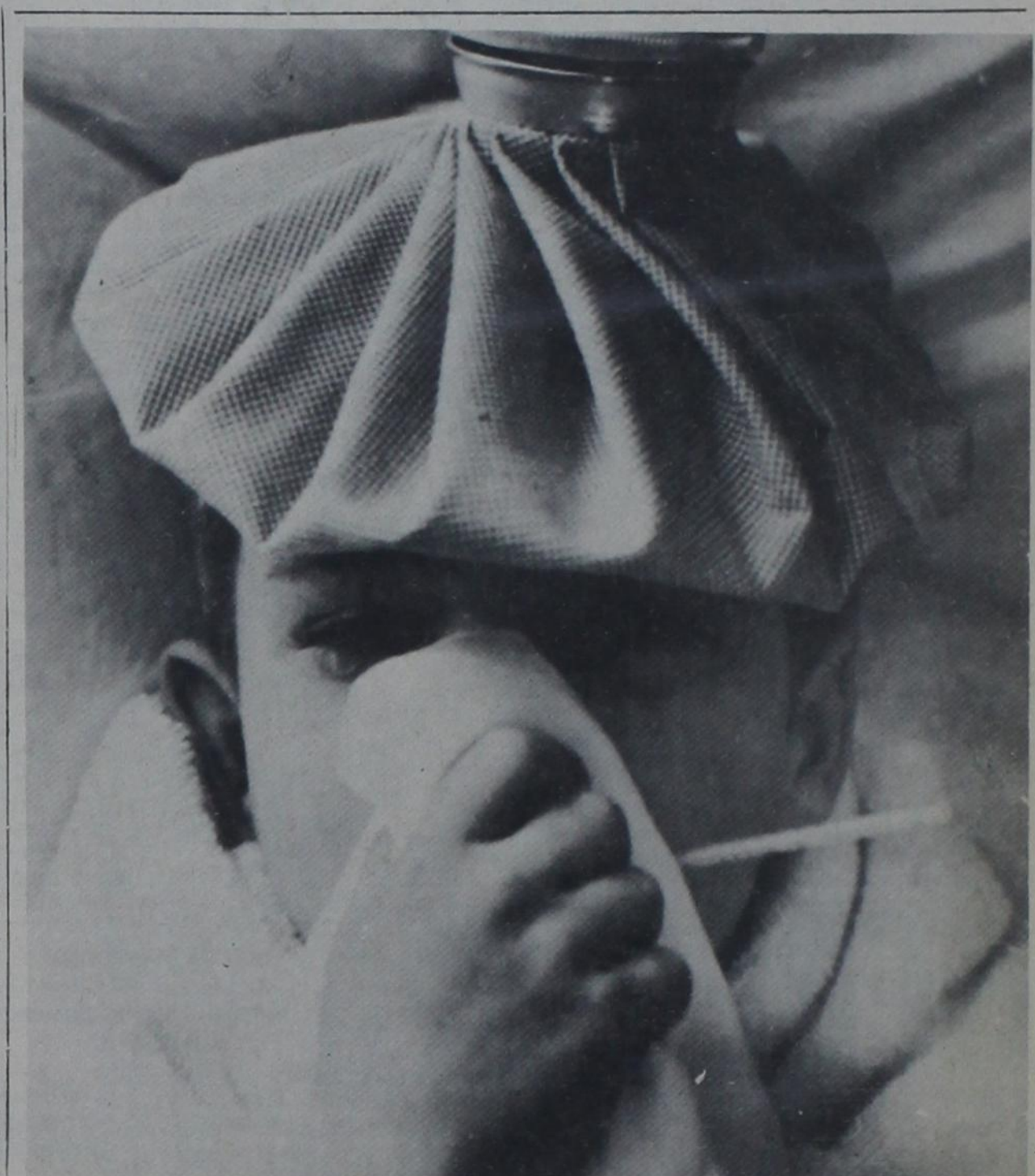
Hottel reported soon after the filing deadline Tuesday that approximately 36 calves, 104 lambs and 168 barrows will compete this weekend.

THE AUCTION sale will begin at 1 p.m. Saturday. Grand champion lambs, barrows and calves, then reserve champion lambs, barrows, and calves will go on the auction block first. Then the order will change to calves, barrows and lambs.

A floor price—the price guaranteed by a commercial buyer for all animals in the division—will be announced before the auctioneering begins. Auctioneers will be Dean Sanders and Jack Howell. The floor price will probably be the day's open market price.

Bidding on premiums will start at the floor price, and buyers will pay only the difference between the floor price and their winning bid. That difference will be the youth's premium for his animal.

SEVERAL organizations will be buying animals for Girlstown, in which case they will (See STOCK SHOW, Page 12)

Project show to be Saturday

4-H boys and girls will compete Saturday in food and clothing events at the annual County Project Show, set for 9:30 a.m. in the American Legion Hall.

EACH participant may enter one division under an age group. All food products will be made "from scratch" except in the angel food cake contest, where mixes will be allowed. An entry may be made ahead of time and frozen, or it may be a freshly prepared product. Registration for the project show will begin at 8:30 Saturday morning, with judging scheduled to begin at 9:30. Awards will be presented at 3 p.m., and products may be checked out then.

FIVE RIBBONS per division in each age group will be awarded. Rosettes will be given in each of the four classes for the highest total points.

Judges for the food show will be Mrs. Joyce Shipp, assistant home demonstration agent for Deaf Smith County, and Sue Shirley, senior 4-H'er from Hereford.

DIVISIONS are: Age 9 and 10: drop cookies, marshmallow dainties, fudge and muffins. Age 11: refrigerator cookies, rolled biscuits, muffins and any simple garment or several items not previously judged. Age 12: divinity, yeast rolls, bar cookies, angel food cake and any garment other than simple, not judged before. Age 13 and over: yeast bread, filled cookies, quick loaf bread, double crust fruit pie, and any garment other than simple, not judged before.

"THE CLUB has been organized for those who are willing to contribute to the sale but who can't make it to the sale to do their own bidding," said Jerry Cluck, president of the Dimmitt Young Farmers.

"The sale is the most important part of the show from our standpoint, because the kids have worked hard all year on their project animals and we want them to get a little better price than they could get somewhere else," Cluck added.

In the past, most Dimmitt backers have bid individually at the sale to give the county's youths a premium for their project animals. Hart has had a buyers' club for many years, and one was formed at Nazareth two years ago.

'Flu' seige tops out

The influenza seige appears to have reached its climax in Castro County according to the county medical officer, Dr. J. D. Blackburn.

"WE SUSPECT that most of the cases here have been one of the Asian varieties," Dr. Blackburn said. "However, definite tests from the state lab have not been received yet."

Influenza has been moderately active here for the past two weeks, Blackburn said. At least one local death—that of an elderly patient—has been directly attributed to the virus infection.

Dr. Blackburn said symptoms are fever, extreme malaise or aching, chest pain and discomfort for the influenza virus, that bronchitis usually accompanies the influenza infection.

"THERE IS no specific treatment for the influenza virus but we are treating the secondary complications and relieving the symptoms," Dr. Blackburn said.

He estimated "an appreciable increase" in hospital patients recently due to the flu infections.

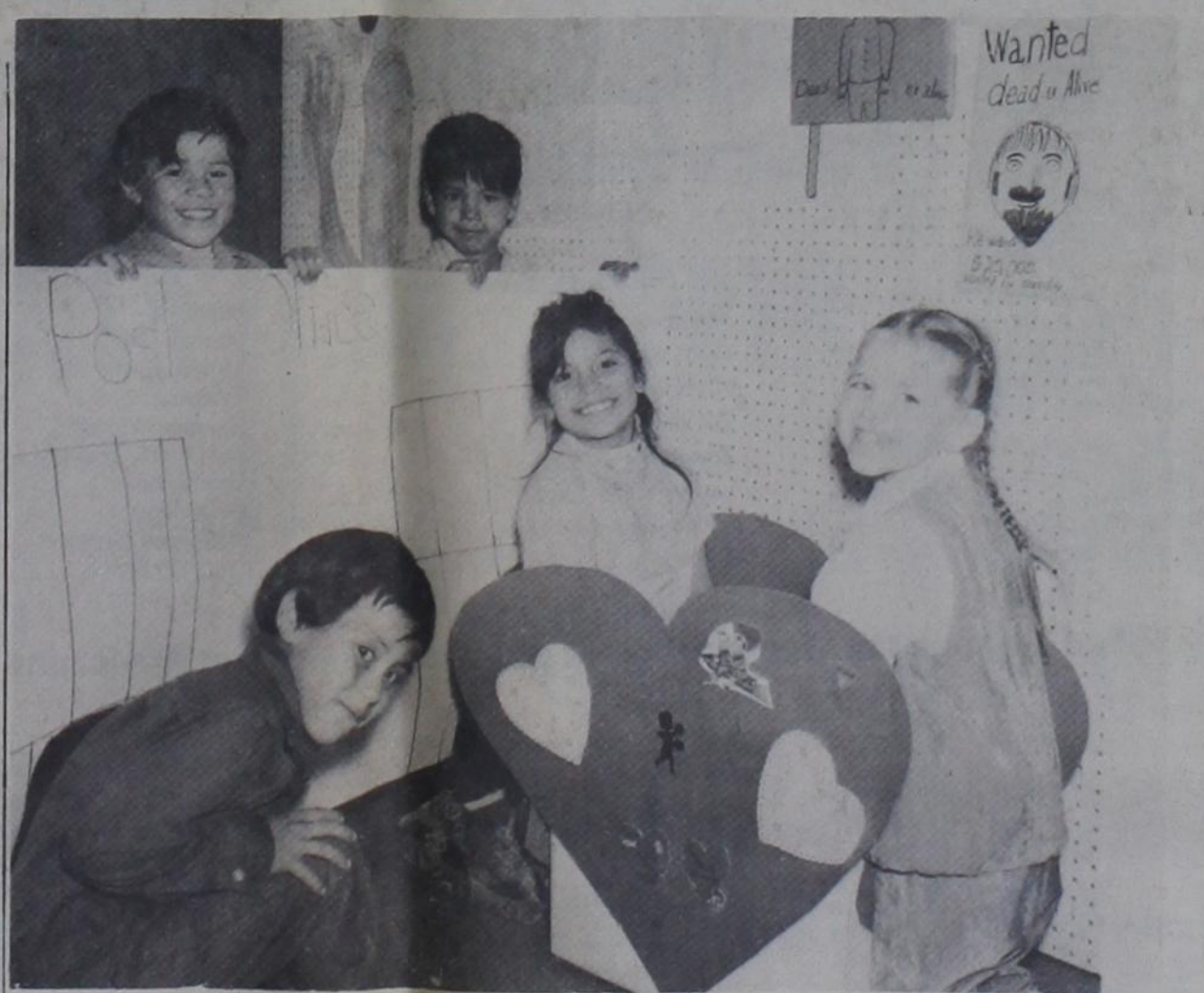

Dimmitt's Bobcats closed out their season in a big way Tuesday night, bombing the Abernathy Antelopes 88-63 before a large crowd at North Elementary gym.

WITH THE victory, Coach Kenneth Cleveland's Cats ended the year with a fine 25-6 record. Unfortunately, three of the six losses were in District 3-AA play, leaving the Bobcats in a second-place tie with Floydada, which finished with an identical 11-3 conference mark. The powerful Morton Indians will carry the 3-AA banner into the playoffs.

Danny Ebeling closed out a brilliant high school career by chalking up 32 points to lead the Cats to victory Tuesday night. Junior forward Kenny Ringo sank 24 points and senior guard Jerry Matthews checked out with 14.

The Antelopes carried the fight to the Bobcats in the first

period, 16-16. But the Cats built a 40-31 lead by halftime and broke the game open in the third with a big 28-point outburst to lead 68-46 going into the final frame.

TUESDAY night's game ended the schoolboy cage careers of 12 seniors—Ebeling, Matthews, Felton Isaacs, Charles McLean, David Nino, Bo Myers, Brent Miller, Ricky Battles, Gary Webb, Andy Mays, Larry Langford and Lee Summers.

"I was well pleased with the effort of our boys this year," Cleveland commented Wednesday. "I regret that we didn't win district, but I think our kids gave it all they had and played right up to the end like champions. I think they wanted to win as badly as any bunch I've ever had."

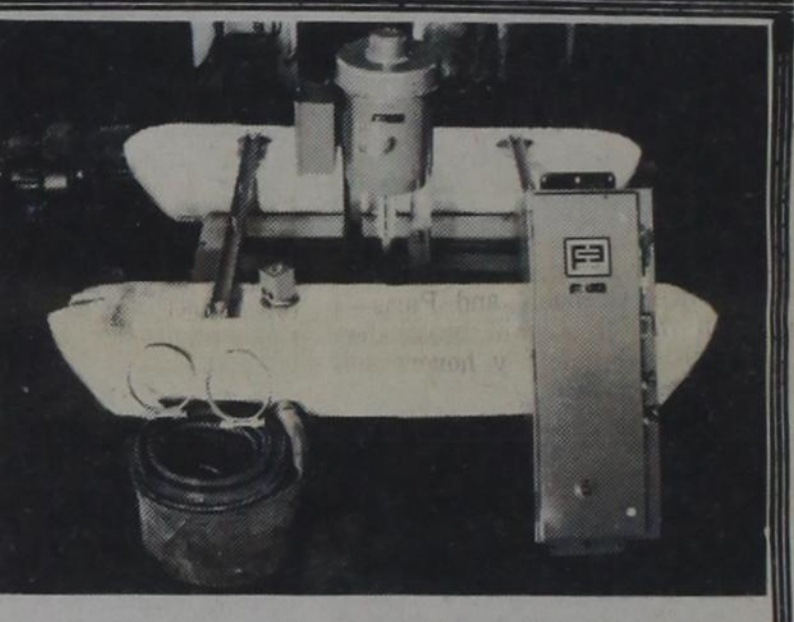

VEE shots for horses urged now

"Vaccinate now for VEE" is the theme of a new campaign urging vaccination of horses for the sleeping sickness disease, Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE), according to an announcement this week by the Texas Animal Health Commission and the USDA.

THE 1972 campaign calls for vaccination of all horses, mules, donkeys, etc., not vaccinated in 1971, in Texas, the Gulf Coast states and states adjoining Mexico. These states are designated "high risk" states by the USDA.

Dr. H. Q. Sibley, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, says there are four categories of horses that should be vaccinated now. They are: (1) unvaccinated horses that have recently moved into the area, (2) foals born since last year's vaccination drive, (3) foals vaccinated too young to develop lasting immunity (under six months old when vaccinated), and (4) horses that were overlooked and never vaccinated.

Plans for the vaccination campaign were presented at a meeting last Thursday of state and federal animal health officials in Austin. Speaker was Dr. R. E. Omohundro of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Service in Washington, D.C.

DR. OMOHUNDRO said scientists believe VEE will break out again even though the disease was confined to 25 Texas counties in 1971. The time to vaccinate is now, he said, before mosquitoes emerge in the warm months ahead.

With nearly 800 Texas veterinarians participating, about 575,000 horses (92 percent of the total population) were vaccinated in Texas last year.

Dr. E. S. Cox of Austin pointed out that Texas remains under federal quarantine for VEE. This means, he said, that horses must be vaccinated for VEE at least 14 days before being allowed to leave the state for other areas. Horses for interstate shipment must be accompanied by a vaccination certificate with individual animals identified by tag, tattoo or other means.

The current program calls for vaccination at horse owners' expense. Federal emergency funds were used for that purpose last year.

V.E.E. VACCINE will provide immunity for over one year and possibly longer. The commercial product now available can be administered to horses previously vaccinated with government-furnished vaccine. If it is uncertain that a horse has been vaccinated, it is better to vaccinate again, said Dr. Sibley.

It is highly fatal disease of horses. People may also become infected. VEE infection in man causes mild to severe flu-like symptoms with fever, headache, and nausea. Of 88 confirmed human cases in Texas last summer, none died.

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

Smith elected to state office by bandmasters

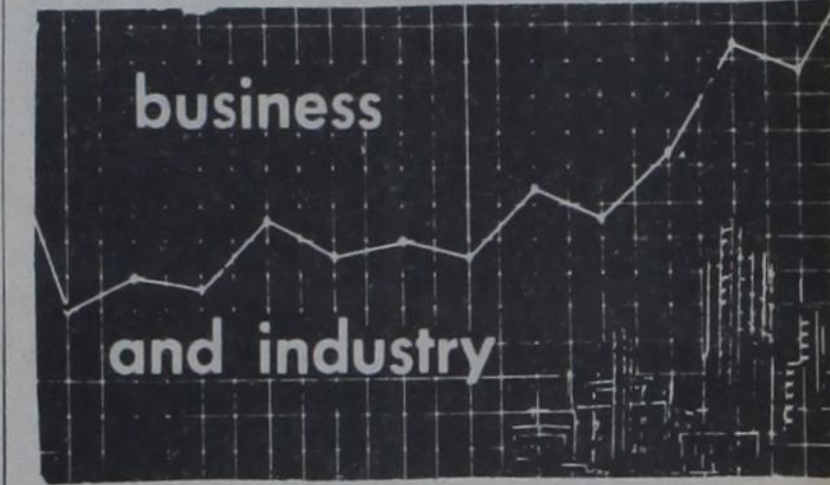

State show set for feeder pigs

The first Texas State Championship Feeder Pig Show will be held in Athens March 6. According to Sammy V. Gunter of Wills Point, chairman, the show is aimed at improving the quality of feeder pigs and the swine industry of Texas.

SITE OF the show will be the sale facility of the Athens Feeder Pig Sale Association 3 miles north of the city on Highway 19.

The event is being sponsored by the Association and the Agricultural Committee of the

Athens Chamber of Commerce.

All Swine producers in Texas are eligible to enter pigs in the show. The deadline is March 1. Entry forms are available from most swine associations or the Texas State Championship Feeder Pig Show, PO Box 1418, Athens, 75751. There is no entry fee or admission charge.

AN ENTRY consists of a pen of eight pigs, farrowed by the exhibitor. The pigs must weigh an average of 40 to 70 pounds. A pen may consist of barrows, gilts, registered, crossbred or any combination thereof. All barrows must be completely healed. The exhibitor must furnish a health certificate before the pigs are unloaded.

The show will be made up of three classes, determined by the average weight of the pigs entered. Prize money plus ribbons will be awarded to the first seven places in each class. The first place in each class will receive \$35, then the money decreases to \$5 for seventh place. The grand champion pen will receive \$400 plus a trophy, with the reserve champion pen receiving \$200 plus a trophy.

Judges for the event will be Rolland Paul of Willow Springs, Mo.; Dr. T.D. Tanksley Jr. of Texas A&M University; and Bill Brown, manager, Extension Service, John Morrell Co., Memphis, Tenn.

FEEDER PIGS will be received at the show facilities March 5 from 1-5 p.m. or March 6 from 5-9 a.m. Exhibitors should bring their own troughs, water pans and other necessary supplies. The show officially starts at 10 a.m. March 6.

Following the show, all entries will be sold by auction beginning at 3 p.m. A five percent commission will be charged on all sales.

Numerous swine equipment manufacturers will display equipment throughout the day. A rodent and predatory animal control program will be presented at 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. A dutch treat barbecue pork lunch will be served at noon.

FOUR FEEDER pigs sale associations presently operate in East Texas. More than 62,000 head of feeder pigs have been sold through these associations for \$850,444.

"This is probably an increase in value of \$300,000 over what the pigs would have brought through normal channels," said Gayle Finch, Henderson County agricultural agent. "In the Athens sales alone, 23,405 head have been sold since September, 1969. If all these pigs had been No. 1's, the producers would have realized an additional \$64,000 from this sale."

Will state pay primary costs? Bullock forcing issue in Austin

AUSTIN—The complex question of financing May and June primary elections is heading for a final legal test.

COMPTROLLER Robert S. Calvert asked Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin for an official opinion on Secretary of State Bob Bullock's plan to pay for the party primaries with state funds.

Bullock forced the issue to a head last week by handing Comptroller Calvert \$73 worth of initial pre-primary bills and asking him to pay them.

Calvert balked and took the matter to Martin for advice. "I WILL NOT pay anything out of the treasury for this unless I have a written opinion from the attorney general or an order of the court," said Calvert. He added he does not think Martin will advise him to pay the bills submitted by Bullock.

"If the vouchers are, for some reason, not approved, I intend to place this question before the Texas Supreme Court at the earliest possible moment so that the entire matter of primary financing can be adequately, equitably and finally resolved," Bullock stated.

He moved with court authority to formulate rules for the primaries after a three-judge federal court Jan. 20 struck down the filing fee law relied on to finance the spring elections. Gov. Preston Smith proposes to transfer to him more than \$1 million for paying primary bills if the plan is finally cleared by legal authorities.

REP. RAYFORD PRICE of Palestine accused Smith and Bullock of pre-empting prerogatives of the legislature, and said the governor should call an immediate special session to give lawmakers another whack at resolving the problem. Reps. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty and Jim Nugent of Kerrville defended Smith and Bullock and charged Price was trying to further his House speakership campaign. Daniel and Nugent are also seeking the speakership.

PRIMARIES CROWDED
A total of 55 candidates for statewide office entered the Democratic primary before the Feb. 7 filing deadline. There are contests for every office on the statewide ballot except four judicial places.

Republicans fielded only 10



state office candidates—and seven of them are running for governor.

There are 10 Democratic candidates for governor, five for US senator, nine for lieutenant governor, three for attorney general, nine for comptroller, seven for treasurer, two for land commissioner, two for agriculture commissioner and four for railroad commissioner.

Republicans have only one candidate each for US senator (incumbent Sen. John Tower), treasurer and railroad commissioner.

Former Sen. Ralph W. Yarborough and Barefoot Sanders of Dallas are the leading Democratic candidates for senator. Gov. Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde and State Rep. Frances Farenthold of Corpus Christi will stir most of the action in the governor's race.

Three state senators and a newspaper executive are battling for a runoff spot for lieutenant governor.

Loan guarantees with interest subsidies totalling more than \$23.8 million have been approved by the Texas Board of Health for 14 Hill-Burton hospital construction projects. Another \$450,000 was set aside for the Ranger General Hospital pending completion of a feasibility study of its new building program.

COURTS SPEAK

Texas Supreme Court ordered a district court trial of an Andrews property owner's suit to force his local school board to tax bank stocks.

The High Court also held a 57-year-old woman who received a broken leg after being butted by a "petting zoo" goat cannot collect damages from Six Flags Over Texas.

The State Court of Criminal Appeals reversed convictions of three El Paso men for possessing obscene material (girlie magazines) for purpose of sale.

For the second time, the Court of Criminal Appeals reversed lower courts and ordered a new trial for a man arrested with a truck load (567 cases) of cigarettes which had no state tax stamps.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals ruled out a suit by parents of a blind boy who drowned at a school for the blind swimming pool against the institution.

DRAFT LOTTERY CUT-OFF IS 200

A temporary draft lottery cut-off number of 200 has been set for the 1972 first priority group.

Col. Melvin N. Glantz, state director of Selective Service, said the number is subject to downward revision as manpower needs change. Local boards were authorized to reclassify all draft registrants of the first priority group for 1972 with lottery numbers 201-361 in Class 1-H.

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OPINIONS

District clerks are required to report to vote registrars felony convictions where probated sentences are assessed as well as other convictions, the attorney general has held.

In other recent opinions, the attorney general concluded:

—Texas laws do not limit the number or amount of bail bonds a corporate surety may make.

—State employees must work a minimum 40 hour week, but can be assigned to 10 hours a day, four days a week.

—Law regulating sport of falconry applies to imported as well as native falcons.

P.W.C. HEAD REPLACED

Gov. Smith, in a surprise move, relieved Pearce Johnson of Austin of the Parks and Wildlife Commission chairmanship and appointed Jack Stones, Wells banker, to replace him.

At the same time, the governor designated Parks and Wildlife Department Executive Director James U. Cross to succeed Johnson as state-federal liaison in parks matters.

The action came soon after a federal circuit court of appeals threw out a lawsuit filed by Johnson to block purchase of Mustang Island property for a state park. However, Smith's office said the shuffle followed a policy of rotating chairmanships and had nothing to do with the prolonged Mustang Island wrangle.

ADDITIONAL spending of \$970,689 in federal funds has been approved for 13 parks. More than half will go for Hidalgo County parks improvement and expansion. Brenham, New Braunfels, Nacogdoches and Hallettsville will also get substantial shares.

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Cotton harvest reaches scrapping stages in area

The area cotton harvest reached the scrapping stage in most counties this week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA. Most of the remaining cotton to be harvested is in the Lamesa area.

SAMPLE receipts declined to 1,500 a day at the Lubbock office as the harvest neared completion.

Total samples classed through Friday, Feb. 11 were 1,105,000. This is about two-thirds of the estimated production expectations of last summer.

Quality of the cotton was lower as the harvest neared completion.

LOW Middling Spotted was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 28 percent

of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted made up 11 percent, Low Middling Light Spotted 20 percent and Strict Low Middling Spotted 11 percent. Seventy-six percent of the samples was reduced in grade because of bark.

Staples were predominantly 28 to 30. Sixteen percent had a staple length of 28, 42 percent stapled 29 and 27 percent was 30.

Only four percent of the cotton "miked" in the Lubbock office was in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9, three percent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 13 percent 3.0 through 3.2, 33 percent was 2.7 through 2.9, and 47 percent was 2.6 and below.

THE CONSUMER and Marketing Service of the USDA re-

ported a decline in trading on the Lubbock market as the harvest neared completion. Prices were \$5 per bale higher on the Lubbock market. Demand was strongest for cotton with micronaire of 3.0 and better and was fair for cotton with micronaire of 2.9 and lower. Most of the cotton offered on the Lubbock market was the lower micronaire cotton.

PRICES paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$40 to \$70 per ton, with most prices in the \$48 to \$54 range.

Corporate farms to get attention at FU convention

Influence of farm corporations on politics and the economy will get special attention at the national convention of the Farmers Union to be held in Houston Feb. 28 to March 2.

GOVERNORS of two states that have anti-corporation farming laws—Governors William Guy of North Dakota and David Hall of Oklahoma—will be members of a panel to discuss the subject. Also on the panel will be Arthur Brunwasser of San Francisco, an attorney in a historic lawsuit against large corporate farms, United States vs. Imperil Irrigation District.

A committee of Farmers union members will face the panel, asking questions and responding to panelists. Questions and comments may also come from the convention floor. Moderating the session will be Victor Ray, director of public affairs of the Farmers Union and author of "The Corporate Invasion of American Agriculture." The session will be held at 2:15 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 29, in the Rice Hotel.

Other panel discussions during the convention will be on taxes and meaningful participation of rural people in the democratic system. Governors of other midwestern states will participate on those panels. The television star, E. G. Marshall, will address the convention banquet on national health insurance.

THE national president of the Farmers Union, Tony Dechant, said that some 1,500 delegates and members from throughout the nation are expected at the Houston convention. The convention theme is "Farmers Can Decide the Next Election," Dechant noted.

"We are calling on governors of key states for a major role in our convention," Dechant said. "In our opinion, their vital role at the grassroots level—where most of the political action is—has been generally underestimated."

Lectures set on importance of agriculture

The Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board will sponsor a series of lectures this month by Arnold Paulson of Granite Falls, Minn., on "Agricultural Income—a Plan to Save Rural Communities."

Check your trees for bagworms now

This winter while trees are bare, homeowners should be on the alert for bagworms, advises Dr. Weldon Newton, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

ALTHOUGH bagworms are exposed when broad-leaved trees drop their leaves, they may be overlooked until a damaging infestation occurs. Complete defoliation can result next season when large numbers are present. In addition to broad-leaved trees, bagworms also feed on arborvitae, cypress and other evergreens.

Though fall webworms and tent caterpillars are often mistakenly called bagworms, they are really markedly different, points out Newton. Bagworms make individual cocoons from tightly woven silk. Leaves and twigs are attached to the outside of the 1½-to 2-inch long bag so that the bags look like dried leaves.

The larval and pupal stages last from early May to late July, during which time the insects stay in their bags. In the pupal stage in July and August the worms change to moths with only the male having wings. After mating, the female lays 150 to 300 eggs in the bag, then drops to the ground and dies.

THE BAGS will remain on trees all winter, explains the entomologist. Some will be empty with only the pupal skin of the male protruding from the bottom while others will have the skin full of eggs. In areas where the worms do not pupate until spring, a full grown worm will be found in the bag.

Newton recommends destroying any bags that may be found. Hand picking is very effective on small trees and those with only a few bags. Dazinon, carbaryl or trichlorfon can be sprayed in May or June on large trees with large numbers of bags in the upper branches, adds the entomologist.

With planning and management, your pasture will turn a profit

Profitable pastures don't "just happen," they have to be planned in advance.

"THE foundation for profitable pastures is adequate, good quality forage," contends Dr. Neal Pratt, Extension agronomist at Texas A&M University. "This requires certain management practices."

A major step in producing abundant, high quality forage is proper fertilization according to soil test recommendations. Adequate plant nutrients improve quality and yield and stretch rainfall.

"In most pasture areas of Texas, at least 60 to 80 pounds of nitrogen should be applied two or three times during the summer growing season," recommends Pratt. "Overall, the most important aspect of forage production

rapidly as plants being razed reach maturity, notes the agronomist. He suggests cross-fencing as an effective pasture management tool to improve production.

Chemical weed control is another important practice in many Texas pastures. Weed control on large acreages can boost grazing during the summer months.

"A major step to profitable forage production is the use of grass species and varieties adapted to the area," Pratt points out. "Plant breeders at Texas A&M are developing new species which provide higher quality forage and longer growing seasons than are now available."

FEB. 20-26 has been declared FTA Week by Gov. Preston Smith.

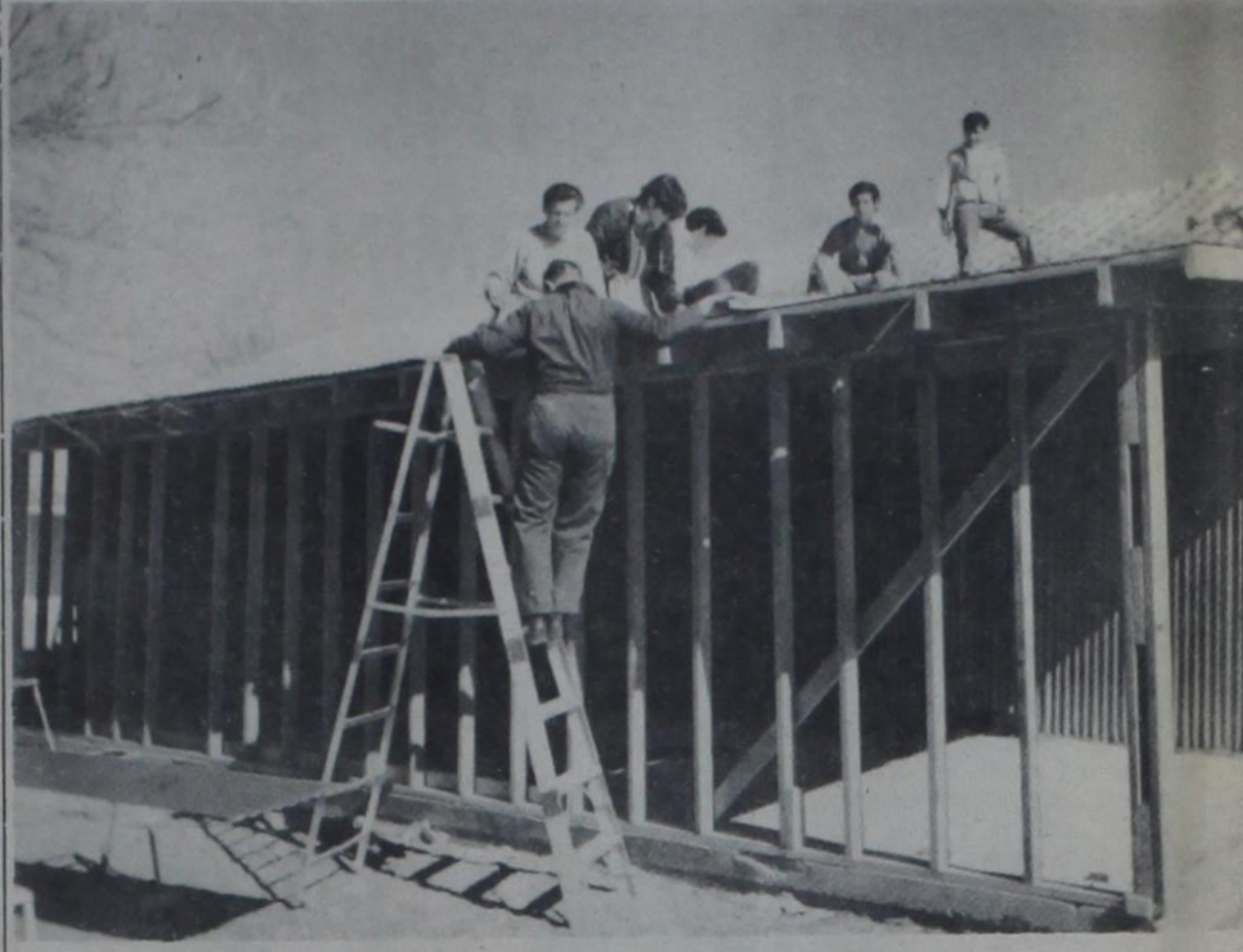

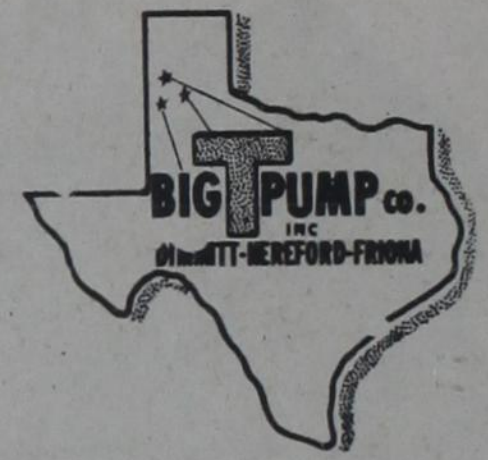

Anti-tax fight brewing in state

An anti-income tax group of prominent Texans Wednesday announced plans to push for state governmental economies to head off "substantial new taxes" this year.

Texas Association of Taxpayers, which helped defeat a corporate income tax in 1971 is seeking to expand its membership base of 5,500 before the 1972 special legislative session.

Oil allowable up 4.1 percent

The February oil allowable has been pushed up another 4.1 percent in answer to demands for more production.

Texas Railroad Commission set the allowable at 75.8 percent the following week after announcing it would be 71.7 percent.

Chairman Byron Tunnell said several Texas refineries insisted they could not get enough crude oil to meet demands for February if the allowable were set at the 71.7 percent factor. The allowable has been raised for three straight months, and the new, adjusted February mark is the highest since a 77.2 percent factor last May.

Tunnell said requests amount to a firm demand for an additional 76,000 barrels of crude oil a day for the month. The new allowable will permit an extra 75,717 barrels a day.

Texas crude stocks Jan. 21 came to 90,994,000 barrels, down 18.3 million from the same time in 1971.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo annually present scholarships to outstanding FFA and 4-H Club members in the amount of \$4,000 each. Fifty students are currently attending college on scholarships provided by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Twenty-four scholarships of \$1,000 each will be awarded to winners in each of 24 counties participating in the show's GO-TEXAN program.

The Research Program, established in 1970 by the show, is being carried on in 12 Texas agricultural colleges. Much of the work is done by students, thus providing jobs for those college students who need to work.

The knowledge shared through this \$200,000 Research Program directly benefits Texas agribusiness.

DATES for the 1972 Houston Show are Feb. 23 through March 5, with the first two days set aside solely for livestock judging and sales.

A spectacular rodeo is planned this year to celebrate the 40th anniversary of this great

event. Every day will bring different stars to the Astrodome. On Friday, Feb. 25, Roy Rogers and Dale Evans will star in matinee and evening shows. Charley Pride will come in on Sunday, Feb. 27, for the two scheduled times that day.

Monday, Feb. 28 through Friday, March 3, there will be evening performances only. Roger Miller will appear on Monday, Lynn Anderson and Jerry Reed are scheduled Tuesday,

Conservation

Underground irrigation system conserves water and cuts costs

Low commodity prices and high production cost make it extremely important for farmers to operate their business efficiently.

FARMING is not an exact science and production cannot be performed in an assembly line manner. Therefore it becomes a challenge for each producer to apply his skills and abilities toward efficient, low-cost production.

Since farm commodity prices are controlled largely by supply and demand and due to urgent harvest and disposal of seasonal and often perishable crops the farmer is often forced to sell his crop upon harvest with very little latitude for price negotiation.

The age-old plight of the farmer, then, is to find a way to produce more of his commodity at a lower cost.

ABUNDANT irrigation water, the most valuable natural resource of the Plains, is one place where production cost may still have room for trimming.

Water losses checked by private companies reveal that some soils may require as much as 250 GPM to overcome the losses in an open irrigation ditch one-fourth mile in length. This loss represents one-fourth of pump and engine wear, one-fourth of the fuel cost, and about 25 percent less water available for crop use.

Although there may often be considerable initial investment in installation of underground irrigation pipeline, it is very evident that such installations pay for themselves in relatively short periods of time.

AS A MEANS of conserving water, preventing erosion and the prevention or reduction of pollution of water or land, the federal government offers cost-share programs such as the Great Plains Conservation Program administered by the SCS and the Rural Environmental Assistance Program administered

ed by the ASCS.

Loans are also available for conservation work through the USDA's Farmers Home Administration.
