### **OBJECTIVE TAKEN BY STORM**



Scene of many merry, bustling gatherings, the Fairy gymnasium shook from foundation to rafters Tuesday night as it was stormed by the Hico delegation. Defending it to the last, however, was a force of loyal Fairyites of like proportions, intent on preserving their property for which they spent their own good money, to the extent of some \$8,000, without even making application for Government aid.

Plans for building this structure, first of its size and kind in this section of the State, were worked out by a group of civic-minded citizens and school officials. The election to vote bonds was held Sept. 4, 1937, at which time it carried 42 to 2. By Oct. 12 of that year the bonds had been approved and sold. Contract was awarded to H. E. McCullough, Hico lumberman, on Oct. 14, which he completed and turned the building over to the school board on Jan. 18, 1938.

Dedication, ceremonies for the new gym were held on the evening of March 15, 1938, at which time Bert C. Patterson, county superintendent, and H. E. Robinson, deputy state superintendent, extended congratulations to Supt. Wm. Horsley of the Fairy Schools and to the patrons. J. M. Blacklock, president of the Fairy School Board, thanked the people of Fairy on behalf of fellow members of the board for their tooperation toward the advancement of the schools. J. C. Barrow of Hico, then county judge, also spoke.

A frame structure 108 feet long by 40 feet wide, the gymnasium provides for a basketball playing court 75 feet long and 40 feet wide with bleachers on each side, a stage and dressing rooms at one end and through April 6, according to Dr. two rooms in the basement under the stage. It boasts of a seating capacity of one thousand.

The Fairy district at time of construction was composed of five consolidated districts: Fairy, Falls Creek, Meridian Creek, Agee, and Long Point. The Fairy district is one of the wealthiest in this section of the state, and has been affiliated within the past few years. The school board at that time was composed of J. M. Blacklock, president; C. C. Parks, secretary; Walter Abel, C. M. Tinkle, Walter Whitson. signed to facilitate public health C. W. Russell, and J. T. Jackson.
