Every Woman Should Wear A Hat

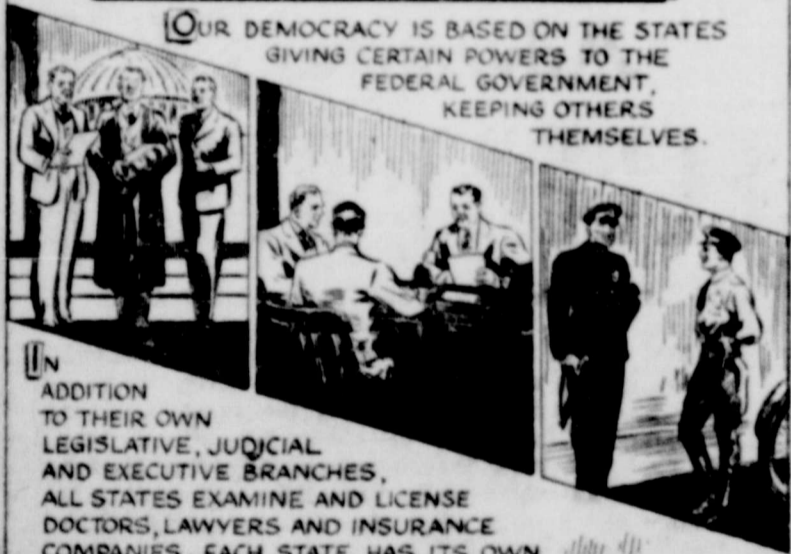

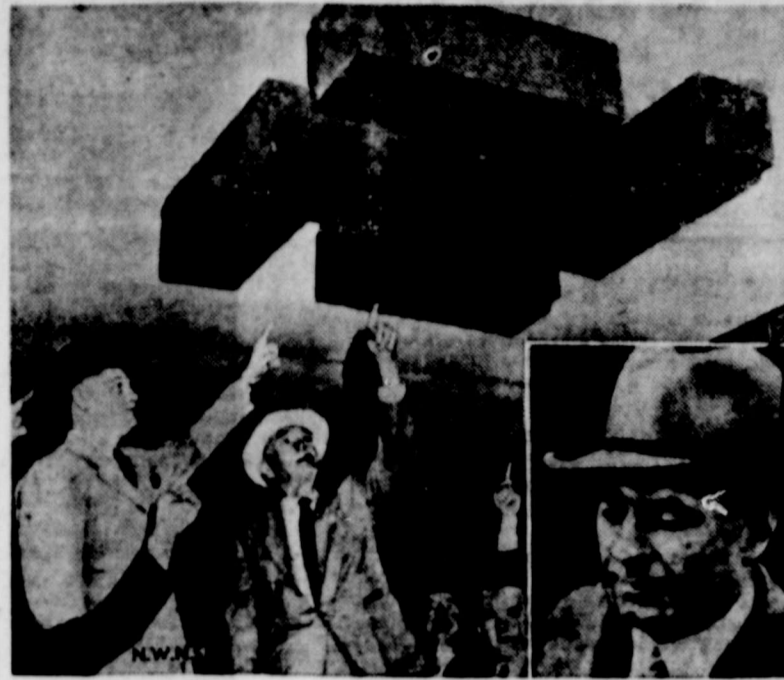

How to Reduce

From the hundreds of letters I receive every week, it is quite evident that more women are concerned about reducing large hips than about any other single figure fault. Even those who are otherwise quite thin may show a tendency to spread below the waistline. It is a common complaint and one that has many causes. Incorrect posture, a complete sedentary existence with little or no exercise, general fat accumulation, an habitual mincing walk with no action in hips or thighs; any or all of these will account for badly proportioned hips. The cure lies always in special exercises that bring movement to these inactive muscles. The ones given below do just that and have been most successful in many cases under my personal care.

Facing the wall at arm's length away, place both hands on the wall for support and squat down, trying to sit on your heels. Return to starting position. Repeat ten times.

Stand with your right side toward the wall, at arm's length, and place your right hand on the wall for support. Now describe a circle with your left leg, swinging it forward, outward, back, and around, ten times. Then reverse the movement, placing your left hand on the wall and circling your right leg ten times.

Stand erect and clasp your hands around your right knee, pulling the knee up as far as possible. Repeat ten times and then do the same exercise with the left knee ten times.

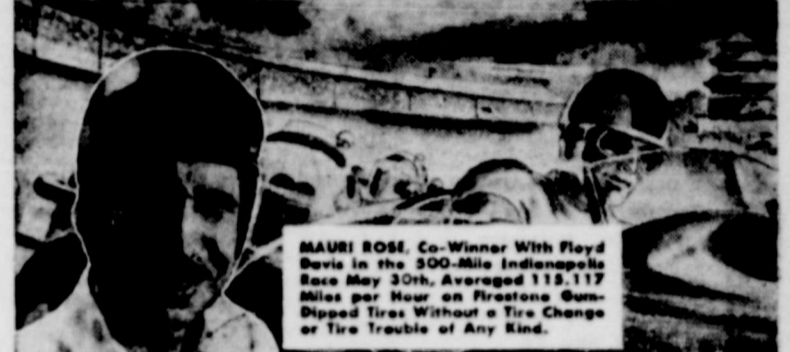
