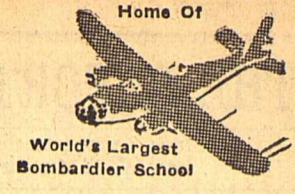

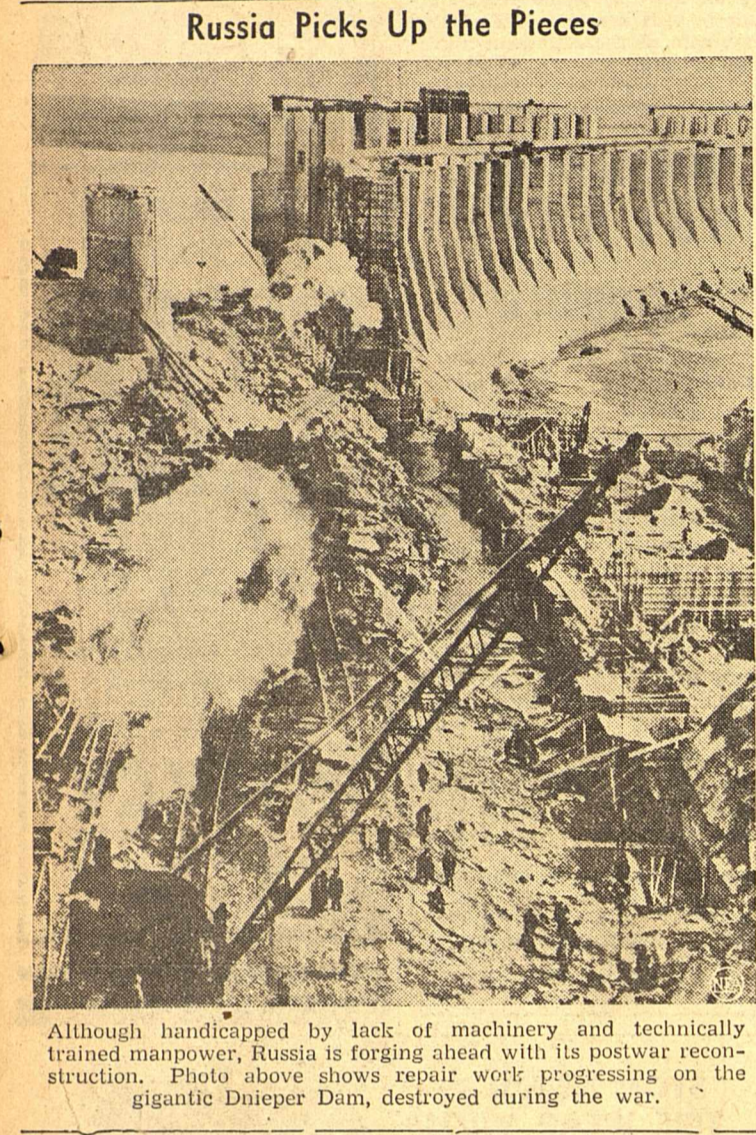

FINAL VOTE TO GENERAL ASSEMBLY — UNO Site Committee Approves New York-Connecticut District

LONDON—(P)—The United Nations General Assembly Headquarters Committee voted Monday night by 22 to 17 that the permanent home of the UNO should be located in the region of Westchester County, N. Y., and Fairfield County, Conn.

Subsidies May Be Made For Scarce Housing Materials

WASHINGTON—(P)—Despite the pleas of Housing Boss Wilson W. Wyatt, the homes-for-veterans bill will go to the House floor next week minus the price ceilings President Truman wants on old houses.

A fight on party lines is probable on that issue, but Wyatt last night got Republican and Democratic leaders to agree to another key portion of Truman's two-year program for 2,700,000 new homes.

This calls for \$600,000,000 worth of federal subsidies—Wyatt calls them "premium payments"—to stimulate the output of scarce building materials.

Wyatt contends the premium payments have two advantages over higher prices as a production spur: They do not bring about higher prices for finished houses, and they can be reduced or eliminated more easily when no longer needed.

Leaders of the House Banking Committee agreed to present this among other jointly-sponsored amendments. The leaders thus reversed the committee's decision of last week in approving a watered-down version of the measure introduced by Rep. Patman (D-Texas).

The agreement came out of a conference attended by Wyatt, Patman, Committee Chairman Spence (D-Ky) and Rep. Wolcott (Mich), the ranking committee Republican.

Old School Lot Sells For \$45,000

Sale by the Midland Independent School District of a block of business property on which stands the old North Ward Elementary School, built in 1893, to J. P. Carson, W. R. Upham and G. W. Brennenhan for \$45,000 was announced Tuesday.

The block, fronting on West Illinois Street, is bordered by West Illinois, Loraine, Ohio and Big Spring Streets.

Purchasers announce the old school building will be razed and the block divided into business lots.

The building has been used as a Scout Hall in recent years.

Pittsburgh Power Company Employees Strike \$50,000 Is Reported

Mayor Declares Emergency As Stores Close

PITTSBURGH—(P)—A strike of power company employees started in this industrial center Tuesday, but electrical current was still flowing several hours later to thousands of homes and buildings in the strike area in which 1,500,000 persons reside.

Street railway service was halted shortly before the strike began, but a spokesman for the truck Duquesne Light Company said it was still supplying current on an emergency basis.

He expressed belief that, despite the strike, the company could continue to provide service to institutions and homes—but only if householders limited their consumption to vital needs.

Steel mills and fabricating plants in the great industrial area around Pittsburgh, which ordinarily consume great quantities of electricity, were already closed by the general steel strike. The spokesman said all other industrial users were "co-operating 100 per cent." In conservation of the available supply so householders and hospitals might have the entire supply of current available.

City officials had feared the power shutdown would quickly affect power supplies to most of the inhabitants in the district.

Meanwhile the city remained in a state of confusion and Mayor David L. Lawrence declared a state of emergency. Many residents curtailed their use of electricity.

Schools Are Closed
Public schools were closed under plans announced in advance that they would not open if the strike was called. Most of the district colleges were closed, including the University of Pittsburgh.

There still was the threat that the strike could spread to home users, of whom there are 330,000 in the district.

A walkout of 3,400 employees of the light company began at 4 a. m. Tuesday to enforce demands for a wage increase.

The strike quickly reflected in business life in Pittsburgh, "workshop of the world." Downtown department stores closed their doors "until further notice." Activities in large office buildings were reduced to a minimum.

Electioneering Against Lincoln Is His Regret
GLENDALE, CALIF.—(P)—Elias Brownfield, celebrating his 101st birthday Tuesday, opined that he had only one regret.

He electioneered against Abraham Lincoln back in Champaign, Ill., when Lincoln was running for President.

"He was a great man," Brownfield observed. "I guess I should have known better. But you know how it is. My father always voted for the Democrats, so I just inherited his sentiments."

Water To Be Shut Off At 9 A. M. Wednesday
City officials announced Tuesday that water will be shut off at 9 a. m. Wednesday in the section from Indiana Ave. south on Main Street, Loraine Street and Baird Street to Dakota Street and will be off most of the day.

The shut off is in connection with water improvements being made by the city.

War Department Defends Clark In Ordering Rapido Crossing
WASHINGTON—(P)—The War Department defended Tuesday the judgment of military leaders in executing the 36th (Texas) Division's costly Rapido River crossing attack in Italy.

The department's defense was made in a lengthy report submitted to the House Military Committee.

'Liberal' Leader



Rep. George E. Outland (D., Calif.), seeking a permanent "liberal bloc" in Congress to support "progressive legislation," is attempting to organize the 116 backers of the full employment bill. Aim of the bloc, which will act as a unit, will be "to foster everything dealing with the field of economic betterment," he said.

Barkley To Direct Drive For British Loan OK In Senate

WASHINGTON—(P)—Democratic Leader Barkley (Ky) will take personal command of the Administration's drive to win Senate approval of the proposed \$3,750,000,000 loan to Britain.

With opponents already lining up against the proposal, Barkley told a reporter hearings will begin before the Senate Banking Committee next week.

The loan authorization was among legislation discussed by leaders at a White House conference Monday. While Barkley would not comment directly, it was indicated that President Truman was told there is a difficult road ahead before the bill can clear both houses.

Republicans generally have been insisting that any credit granted the British must be on "a business basis."

To Study Loans To Allies
In this connection, Senator Moore (D-Ohio) told a reporter he favors extension of some immediate credit to England but wants the whole field of possible loans to war allies studied before any large scale commitments are made.

Some Democrats also have indicated they will be chary of approving a substantial loan to Britain until this country finds out exactly how much Russia, France and other countries want and need to put their economies on a sound basis.

Chairman George (D-Ga) of the Senate Finance Committee has called for such a survey.

Time For Action

(An Editorial)
The \$500,000 Midland Memorial Hospital campaign now underway is every citizen's business. It got off to a good start Monday with \$50,000 subscribed after 24 hours work. Campaigners are busy in every section of the city.

Midland is determined to write "success" after this drive—a campaign for Midland—at the earliest possible moment.

Every citizen will benefit from the hospital. Midland is growing and developing rapidly. Hospital facilities here long have been inadequate. There is no question as to the need. It is a community hospital—a non-profit, charitable institution. It will serve all.

Months of work were required for the planning of the hospital and organization of the campaign. Now it is up to Midlanders. From now on money talks.

If Midland is to have the hospital it needs, the money—\$500,000—must be subscribed without delay.

Committee Tells Congress Price Controls To Remain Long Time

WASHINGTON—(P)—The House Appropriations Committee told Congress Tuesday there will be long delays in lifting many of OPA's price controls.

It made public, in approving a deficiency appropriation bill for OPA, this revised summary and time-table submitted by OPA Boss Chester Bowles:

Rents—Instead of dropping controls in 60 areas by the first of this year as planned earlier, OPA moved out of only 30 small areas, meanwhile adding 17 to its original list.

Food—Suspension of controls on milk, cream, ice cream and manufactured dairy products not likely until the Spring of 1947; a few varieties of fish may be de-controlled by May, 1946; no suspension of controls on processed fruits and vegetables likely until after Jan. 1, 1947; controls on major meat items probably will be retained until July, 1947.

Controls on most of these items were scheduled to have been lifted around April 1, 1946.

Consumer goods—No suspension of textile or apparel items appears probable for the Spring of 1947. (Earlier, OPA had told the committee it hoped to give serious consideration to removal of these controls by April 1, 1946.)

Services—Removal of controls on laundering, dry cleaning and similar services, originally scheduled for late Spring of this year, now indefinitely postponed. Control of restaurants, expected to continue "at least until Autumn" instead of being removed early this year.

Industrial—No major de-controls in prospect during the present fiscal year in the field of construction and building materials; no removal of restrictions on automobiles and automotive parts in sight before July 1, 1947.

New York Is Silent, Quiet Metropolis, Its Citizens Bewildered
NEW YORK—(P)—This world's greatest metropolis was a silent, stricken city Tuesday.

Wartime restrictions at their worst never imposed such austerities as Mayor William O'Dwyer's fuel-saving proclamation closing all places except those most vitally concerned with public safety and health because of the tugboat strike.

The city's 8,000,000 inhabitants—many forbidden to work—still were a little stunned and bewildered.

They were told to stay off subways. They could not see a movie, go to other amusements centers, or even drink a friendly glass of beer in a bar.

The underground trembling of subways, the overhead roar of the El, the hoot, squeal and clatter of traffic were sharply reduced.

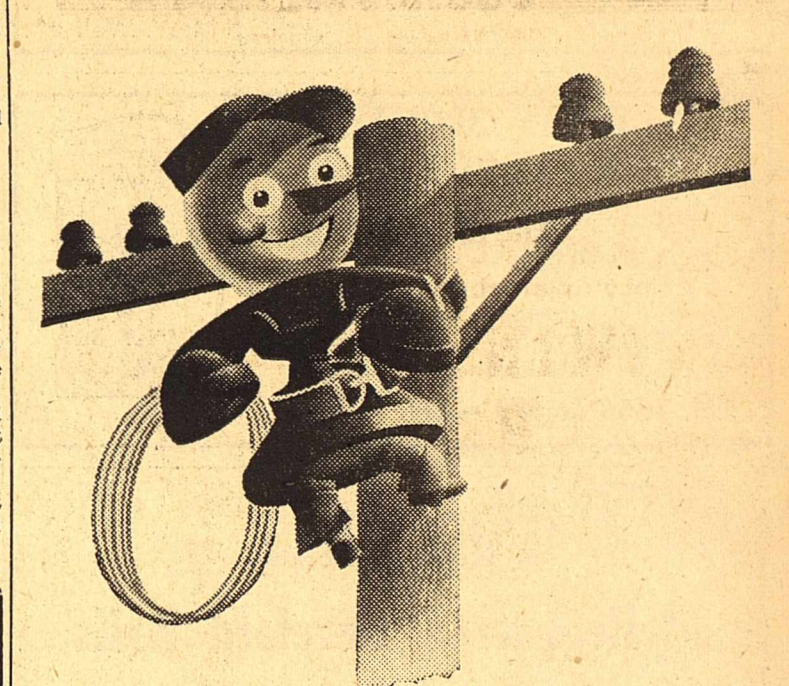

DALLAS—(AP)—While a prisoner at Stalag Luft III, Germany, July 1, 1942, Sgt. Jarvis Burbridge addressed a post card to "his worship the mayor" of Dallas. He said that his bomber had been shot down over Germany and asked the mayor's help in getting some Red Cross food parcels.
The card arrived at City Hall Monday and across its face was stamped "held by British censor, released January, 1943."
