

Police Seeking Driver Of Hit-Run Death Car

City and county police appealed Thursday morning to the driver of a maroon-colored automobile which struck down and killed Anna Ruth Snider, 4, on South Fort Worth Street about 7:25 p. m.

Wednesday to report to the police station immediately. Believing the occupants might not know the child was struck by the vehicle, the officers worked throughout the night Wednesday checking cars in the city in the hope that the accident vehicle might be located.

The child, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Morris J. V. Snider of 319 South Fort Worth Street, was killed almost instantly. The body was dragged about 30 feet, Chief of Police Jack Ellington said.

It was the city's second traffic fatality of the year. Domingo Regalado was fatally injured on February 17 when a truck backed over him. He died before reaching the hospital.

In addition to the parents, a brother, Dickey, 5, survives. Maternal grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Moore of Wichita Falls, and paternal grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Snider of Midland.

Funeral services tentatively are set for Friday afternoon at the Ellis Funeral Chapel. Services will be conducted by the Rev. Fred McPherson, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church.

Cars parked on streets and in open garages were inspected during the night Wednesday by the police, and vehicles being driven about the city were checked. It is believed that the car which struck the child will bear marks of the accident.

Senate Group Oks Loan Plan For Housing

New Long-Range Program Calls For 12,500,000 Homes

WASHINGTON (AP)—Long range housing legislation, aimed at a goal of 12,500,000 new homes in the next 10 years, was approved unanimously Thursday by the Senate Banking Committee.

It provides easier government loans and credits designed to encourage construction by private industry and calls for continued direct government aid for low rent housing.

The long range plan is independent of the emergency legislation to provide homes for veterans. Chairman Wagner (D-N. Y.) announced the committee, by a 7 to 4 vote, modified a provision demanded by the AFL and the CIO.

This was a clause requiring that "the wages or fees prevailing in the locality" must be paid on any construction done with the aid of government loans.

It was made inapplicable to individual FHA-financed homes, but was left in so far as public and large scale housing construction is concerned.

Winkler Wildcat Flows After Acid For 1,010 BOPD

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Mack Taylor, North-Central Winkler County wildcat, in southwest corner of section 7, block B-2, psi survey, about one-half mile east of production from the Ellenburger on east side of the Keystone field, and which missed pay in that formation, flowed at a daily rate of 1,010 barrels, after treating at 8,040-8,135 feet, with 4,000 gallons of acid. The producing formation is Devonian.

Kicked Off and Flows

When the load from the treatment was lifted the fluid started coming out of the hole and at the end of eight hours it had averaged 42.7 barrels of oil per hour, and was still flowing.

Wells on the southeast side of the Keystone field have shown for Devonian production—but none of them have attempted to complete from that formation—having been drilled on down and finished as Ellenburger producers.

Argo Oil Corporation No. 1 Roberts, Southeast Reeves County wildcat, in section 204, block H&GN survey, was reported in unofficial circles, to have taken a drillstem test to total depth at 10,124 feet in lime and shale.

Cored to 10,124 Feet

Recovery from that investigation had not been reported. Prior to the test operator cored to 10,124 feet. The recovery was mostly shale, with some thin streaks of lime carrying oil signs.

Phillips Petroleum Company, et al. No. 1 Eldson, Southwest Ector County Ellenburger discovery, in northeast quarter section 25, block B-15, psi survey, was to make more hole from 8,970 feet.

No Water in DST

A one hour and 30-minute drillstem test was taken at 8,945-70 feet. Gas came to surface in 23 minutes. Recovery was the 540-foot water blanket, 4,500 feet of oil and 60 feet of drilling mud. There was no water. The drill pipe headed oil several times while being pulled.

It is revealed, in unofficial circles, that in final recovery on the drillstem test at 8,920-45 feet, where the well flowed oil for a short time before the hole was closed, some water was found in the bottom of the drill pipe.

Most observers think that fluid was from the drilling mud. The drill pipe stood in the hole overnight, after the drillstem test had been taken.

Sabath Puffs Cigar, Says 80 Is Young

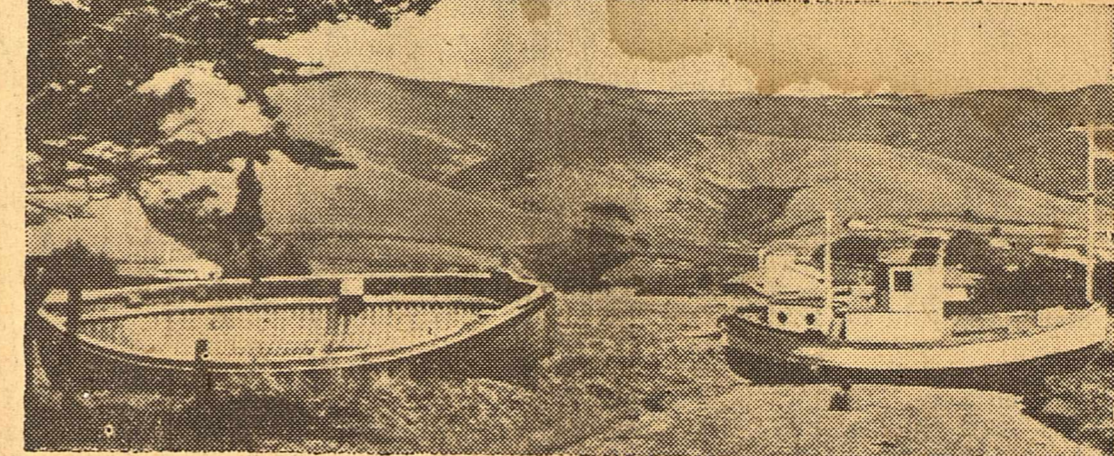

Typhoon Strikes Northern Luzon

MANILA (AP)—A Navy aerologist Thursday reported a typhoon is crossing Northern Luzon and said winds of "full hurricane force" prevail in the straits between Luzon and Formosa.

The storm was moving at nine knots to the northwest. The aerologist said it might be curving northward toward Formosa.

Manila Bay had 35-foot waves which caused a lumber-laden schooner to founder. There was no loss of life.

The Navy said there was no major damage to its installations in the Philippines.

The typhoon forced a U. S. Army tug onto a reef at the entrance to San Fernando Harbor, but all personnel were saved.

Col. William C. Foote, commander of Army Air Base M. on Lingayen Gulf, reported "some roofs were blown off our warehouses. Our shipping is riding out the storm in the harbor; one vessel is dragging anchor but we expect to get out of this without too much damage."

Toll Reaches 169

HONOLULU (AP)—Property damage wrought by the Pacific typhoon waves was estimated at \$10,000,000 in the Hawaiian Islands Thursday as businessmen and owners of tiny beach cottages and \$60,000 luxury homes counted their losses.

The death toll in the islands rose to 88 with the finding of five more bodies at Hilo, bringing that city's total to 58. Sixty-nine were missing; 59 of them from the island of Hawaii. In other areas of the Eastern Pacific, 12 persons drowned.

The 169 persons in all may have lost their lives.

The immense waves also hit Tahiti, the Aleutians, California and South America, but the greatest loss of life and property occurred in the Hawaiian Islands.

The search for the missing—including 25 school children—continued by sea and air. Supplies of food and clothing poured into the stricken seaport city of Hilo, partially wrecked as the full force of the tidal waves crashed through its funnel-like harbor.

Committee Drops OPA Decree For Low-Cost Clothes

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congressional battlers for keeping price controls alive shed some of their gloom Thursday as OPA came through the first House Banking Committee voting with fewer wounds than some had expected.

But the Administration has yet to weather a battle royal on the House floor, where opposition may be stronger than in the committee.

That group voted Wednesday to repeal OPA's program requiring manufacturers to make low cost clothing. It also approved a plan for the gradual lifting of price controls as supplies of scarce items come into balance with demand.

Thursday the committee, meeting behind closed doors, turned to amendments proposing to set up a formula for closing out subsidy programs. The Administration currently is asking Congress for \$2,051,000,000 to continue these price payments, particularly on food.

Their design is to keep retail prices down even as production costs rise.

Another Decision Looms

Another decision the committee still must make is whether to recommend the full year extension of OPA asked by the Administration or a nine-month lease on life as proposed by Rep. Wolcott (Mich.), senior Republican member.

Rep. Brown (D-Ga.) solved the biggest dilemma before the committee, when he came forward with his "decontrol" amendment. It takes away from OPA major authority to decide when to take price ceilings off individual items and puts this responsibility squarely in the lap of President Truman.

The committee adopted a second amendment by Rep. Brown which requires OPA, in determining ceiling prices on cotton and wool cloth, to take into account the actual price of the raw cotton or wool or the parity price, whichever is highest.

Faulty Navigation Caused Loss Of Five Navy Bombers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Faulty navigation and lack of fuel Thursday was believed responsible for the loss of five torpedo bombers and 14 occupants off Florida last December 5.

A Navy investigating board reached this conclusion Wednesday.

The board said the torpedo bomber flight leader, Lt. Charles C. Taylor of Corpus Christi, Texas, apparently believed his group

was either south of the Florida Peninsula or over the Gulf of Mexico, although he was "undoubtedly east of Florida" when he was overheard directing the flight by radio to fly east until land was sighted.

Keitel Says French Could Have Invaded Reich As Poles Fought

NUERNBERG (AP)—Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel testified before the international military tribunal Thursday that only 20 divisions, including reserves, guarded Western Germany during the Polish blitzkrieg and "a French attack would have met with no German defense."

"We, as soldiers, were very much surprised that nothing took place except skirmishes between the Maginot Line and the West Wall," he said.

Keitel, on the witness stand in his own defense, said both Allied and Axis secrets leaked out through the close connections of the Belgian and Italian royal houses.

This he said was a factor in Hitler's war planning.

"We received, for instance, a number of reports that Belgium was being subjected to strong pressure by France and Britain to relinquish neutrality x x x," Keitel said. "Hitler told us only a short time in advance of his final decision in the spring of 1940 to violate the Low Countries' neutrality because he feared the Allies would learn of it through the same royal relations."

Still brusque in his second day on the stand, the gray-uniformed Wehrmacht leader said the Munich Pact in 1938 was an unexpected political development that "made us generals extraordinarily happy because we did not believe we were strong enough to pierce Czechoslovakia's frontier fortifications."

Didn't Mind Breaking Word

Their opinion of Hitler's shrewdness enhanced, the generals had no misgivings when Germany then moved to swallow up the Czechs regardless of Germany's pledged word, Keitel said.

When Hitler began threatening Poland, he continued, high army officers clung to the belief that the "Czech problem had been solved without firing a shot and perhaps other problems in the East could be solved that way."

Keitel declared he personally was misled into thinking the Soviet-German pact of August, 1939, made certain "Poland would not be recalcitrant in negotiations." He said, however, that he knew Heinrich Himmler had requested Polish uniforms to costume persons participating in faked border incidents.

After a whirlwind conquest in the East, Keitel went on, Hitler's first objective was to protect the Ruhr from French motorized forces reported massing on the Belgian frontier, but later this aim was enlarged to include a knockout blow against a center with a single thrust through the Low Countries.

Vardaman Sworn In As Board Member

WASHINGTON (AP)—James K. Vardaman, Jr., still wearing the uniform of a Naval commodore, was sworn in by Supreme Court Justice Stanley A. Reed Thursday for a 14-year term on the federal reserve board.

Vardaman declined comment on the 10-week Senate battle over his confirmation to the 15,000 a year post, but did remark to reporters, "I'm glad it's all over."

He said he would go through the Navy separation process immediately, asserting with a smile that "I think I have enough points."

He added good humoredly that he had "just one suit of civilian clothes," left over from 1939 when he went into the Navy.

FBI Arrests Guards Who Let Prisoners From Cells To Play Cards

WASHINGTON (AP)—A \$300 reward was offered Thursday for information leading to the capture of Earl McFarland, condemned rape-slayer and Guadalcanal veteran who escaped from the fourth-floor death row of the district jail Wednesday.

FBI and Northern Ohio police were reported seeking a man said to resemble McFarland who hitch-hiked a ride from Western New York to Cleveland late Wednesday.

Washington (AP)—Earl McFarland, condemned rape-slayer, Thursday pitted the cunning he learned on Guadalcanal against the combined efforts of police and FBI

manhunters.

The 24-year-old ex-Marine has been at large since dawn Wednesday when he and Joseph D. Medley staged a spectacular death house break after overcoming two guards.

The recapture of the 44-year-old Medley after a seven-hour manhunt evidently provided police with no clues on McFarland's plans for flight. Bloodhounds followed one trail to a railroad track, but police also were keeping a close watch on northbound automobile traffic through Maryland.

Two Inquires Set Up

The circumstances of the daring break, the latest in a series at the district prison, immediately set two investigations in motion, one by the Justice Department and another

by a special Congressional committee. Rep. Hebert (D-La.) of this group assailed "conditions in a jail where murderers can walk in and out with apparent abandon."

A revised story of the escape came out when jail officials disclosed that the two death row guards had released McFarland and Medley from their cells for a game of cards before the slayers overpowered them and stripped them of their uniforms. The guards were suspended, and later taken into custody by the FBI on charges of permitting prisoners to escape through negligence. They were released later under \$1,000 bail.

Previously one of the guards said Medley forced him at gun point to unlock his cell door.

McFarland was convicted of the Oct. 5, 1944, rape-slaying of an 18-year-old government girl, Dorothy Berrum. Originally sentenced to die last August 31, the ex-Marine's execution was stayed pending an appeal.

Medley was found guilty of killing Mrs. Nancy Boyer, redheaded Washington divorcee, after an all-night poker party in her fashionable apartment here on March 6, 1945. He also was under indictment in the slaying of another redheaded woman in New Orleans and Chicago police wanted to question him in connection with the death of a third redheaded woman. Medley's execution was set for April 30, but he too has appealed his conviction.

9 Nations Approve Action

NEW YORK (AP)—On a motion by U. S. Secretary Byrnes the Security Council Thursday shelved the Iranian case until May 6—but the decision came only after Australia's representative had blasted Soviet Ambassador Andrei Gromyko's walkout and accused the council of failing to do its duty.

Nine of the council's 11 members voted for the Byrnes resolution which is based on Russia's flat promise to the council Wednesday that her troops will be withdrawn from Iran by early May.

Voting for the Byrnes resolution were China, Netherlands, France, Mexico, Poland, Britain, Brazil, Egypt and the United States.

After Iranian Ambassador Hussein Ala had stated his government's acceptance of the deferment and Byrnes had thanked the council members for adopting his resolution the council adjourned at 12:46 p. m. EST until Tuesday at 3 p. m.

Gromyko's continued absence counted for one vote and the abstention of Australia's W. R. Hodgson from casting his ballot for the then.

Byrnes declared Russia's assurances should be accepted as satisfactory and that by deferring the case now the council could ask reports on it May 6—by which time the Russians should be out of Iran. Council President Quo Tai-chi of China said he hoped Iran and Russia would settle all their troubles and make further discussion unnecessary.

Aussie Adds Fireworks

But it was Hodgson, fiery, gray diplomat in the best Australian tradition of a minority protester, who added the final fireworks to the crisis-laden case.

He said Gromyko's walkout a week ago had "prejudiced the work, efficiency and authority of the council," that the decision to defer the case should not have been made until after full investigation, that Iran's complaints were being handled as a political incident rather than a whole vital situation.

In his broad accent of the man from "Down Under" he emphatically told his dignified colleagues "this case was a challenge to the Security Council and in our opinion the council did not meet it."

He leaned hunched over the council table as he spoke in sharp terse sentences and when the vote was taken he kept his hands firmly on the table.

Iran Accepts Proposal

Throughout the proceedings Iranian Ambassador Hussein Ala was at the council table and he expressed Iran's acceptance of the Byrnes-sponsored resolution.

County Demonstration Agent Recommends Use Of Invert Sugar Syrup

Mrs. Nettie B. Messick, county home demonstration agent, recommends the use of invert sugar syrup to make the limited amount of sugar allotted each person go farther.

She reported that this syrup goes one and three-fourths times as far as sugar and is good to use on cereals, beverages, fruits, in making ice cream and in canning.

This syrup may be made by adding one cup of water and one-fourth teaspoon tartaric acid to two cups of sugar. Simmer mixture slowly in a covered pan. "The syrup will sweeten as much food as three and one-half cups of sugar," Mrs. Messick said.

Approximately 25 persons have attended these nightly sessions.

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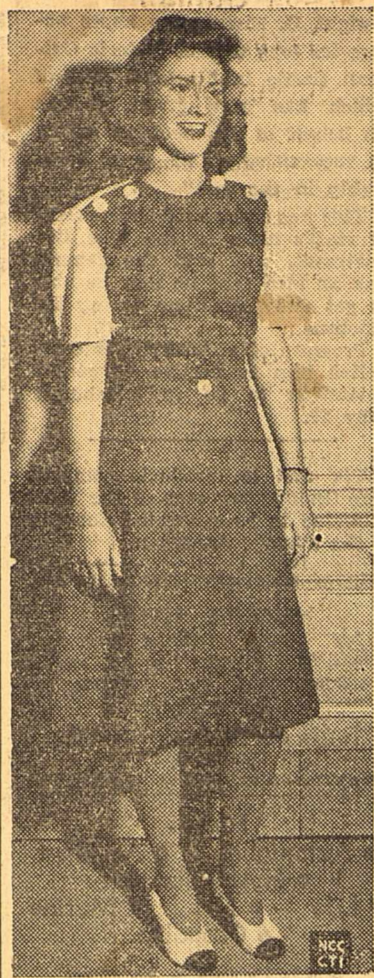
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GLAMOROUS GOWNS THROUGH BAG MAGIC

Marine Travels 2,000 Miles To Visit War Dog He Fought With

BUTTE, MONT. —(P)— Sandra and Robert Bishop were walking with their dog, Kapitlan, when suddenly the large Doberman pincher "froze" in his tracks and his ears snapped to attention as he peered intently at the stalwart form of an approaching Marine.

"Then, with a resounding 'Woof!' the dog bounded forward, covered a half-block in practically nothing-flat, reared on his hind legs, slapped two dirty paws against a natty uniform and snuggled with rumbling growls against the Marine.

"Good old Kappy, good old boy," said the misty-eyed Marine, stroking and scratching the animal's sleek head.

They Fought Together

That was a reunion of two close buddies, veterans of the war against the Japanese.

Marine Pfc. Roy E. Wilkinson traveled 2,000 miles from his home at Rutland, Vt., to Butte because he "just had to see how Kappy was getting along".

The reunion was almost exactly one year after the pair crawled ashore on bloody Iwo Jima. It came as a result of correspondence between Wilkinson and the Bishops. The Marine, home on re-enlistment furlough, had written to ask the Butte family if Kapitlan was "doing all right", and the family invited him to visit Butte.

Kapitlan Saved Lives

On Iwo Jima the two were sent forward to spot Japanese strongholds. They worked so well together that neither was wounded. The dog's keen senses resulted in detection and subsequent liquidation of Japanese in several caves, say official letters of commendation which credit him with "saving the lives of many Marines".

Kapitlan was promoted to corporal just before he was demobilized and returned to Butte early last February.

"He outranks me but he still obeys my orders," grinned the Marine, looking fondly at his tail-wagging friend.

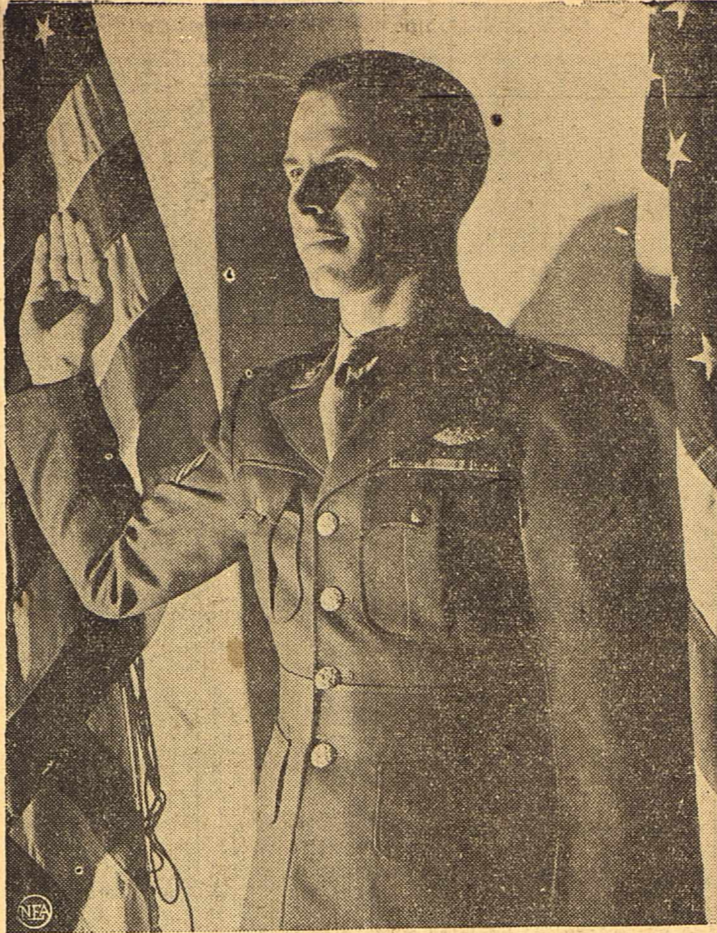
Marcum Is Discharged After Service In Army

Selfishness Rapped By Lester Grant In Rotary Club Address

Lester Grant told Rotarians at their meeting Thursday noon in the Scharbauer Hotel the world must be stabilized and quickly, after blasting at the wave of selfishness, greed and avarice which is sweeping the globe.

He said the human race should adopt the initials GAS for greed, avarice and selfishness unless it changes its ways, and that to reverse them means SAG, the sure result of such a program.

"Study world affairs and take an interest in them," he urged Rotarians. "Don't neglect the editorial pages of the newspapers. Our legislation is not based on merit; it is based on votes and blocs."

He predicted that selfishness will lead to slavery and power rule and asserted that barbarism survives under a government of power.

Predicts Big Boom

Grant predicted the greatest boom in the history of the United States during the next five years and listed "three favorable views."

The first he listed as education which he described as the ultimate answer but a futile hope now.

He listed second the United Nations Organization which he asserted has a charter of purposes and principles but lacks power to compel or even force treaties.

The third point, he emphasized, was time which he said "operates in your favor."

Generalissimo Stalin will die and a man less strong likely will succeed him, Grant asserted, bickering among other leaders will then weaken the power of the government.

Allies' War Secrets Gained By Nazis, Operating With Immunity In Sweden

(World copyright by NEA Service, Inc.)

STOCKHOLM — (NEA) — Vital war secrets of the United States, Great Britain, and other Allied countries rolled off like canned goods from a conveyor belt operated by a Nazi spy gang in Sweden during the war.

Detailed statistics on aircraft production and exact specifications of new weapons yet in the experimental stage alternated with reports on troop movements, shipping news, and long lists of commanding officers in forthcoming operations.

A daring and efficient spy headquarters, operating with impunity

in the capital of neutral Sweden, collected by radio and courier up-to-date information on all aspects of the Allied war effort and daily transmitted its haul to Berlin by code teleprinter.

These disclosures, which throw an entirely new light on the "secret war" against the United Nations, have been made to NEA Service by a man who knows what he is talking about — the chief code teleprinter employed by the Nazis until the end of the war, who shall be called X here.

Although X's loyalty was not questioned by his superiors, his work was of so confidential a nature that a special supervisor was assigned to him. Every afternoon at three o'clock a controller would appear at the code room to see that all copies of teleprinter messages received and dispatched during the day were properly destroyed.

But X, himself thoroughly trained in all the tricks of the profession, knew how to deal with the situation.

X Not Arrested
On May 8, within a few hours of the first news of Germany's unconditional surrender, the Swedish government broke off diplomatic relations with the Reich and seized the German official buildings and archives in the country. Seventy members of the legation personnel, including 20 notorious Gestapo agents, were interned, pending their deportation to occupied Germany, which was effected in August.

The provident Herr X was not among the arrested and expelled. In addition to recording for posterity the secrets of the Nazis' greatest espionage center, he had performed, in the final phase of the war, sundry services for the Allies, particularly for the Danish and Norwegian underground. Now, in reward, he was permitted to stay in Sweden until arrangements could be made for his departure for an overseas country.

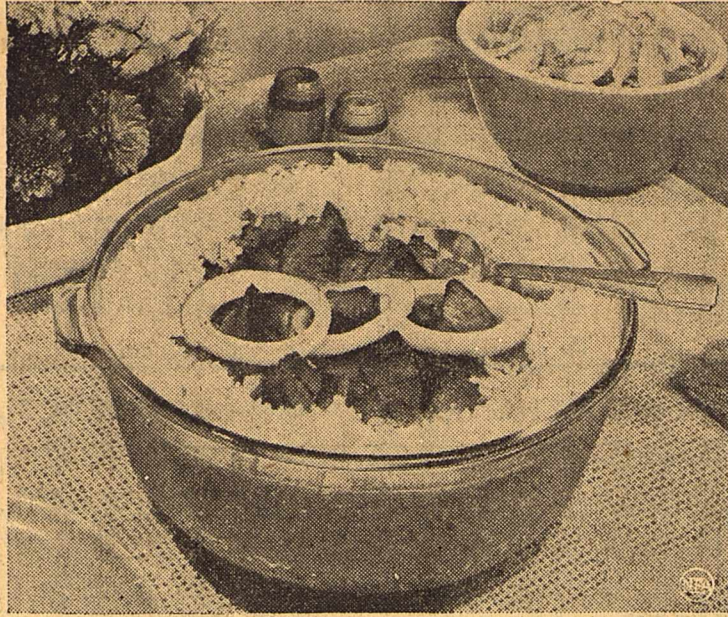
Before he left Sweden, in February of this year, Herr X handed his hoard of microfilms over to an NEA representative for publication in U. S. newspapers.

Although the material saved from destruction by the ingenious X covers only a comparatively short period (from mid-January to April 20, 1945), it comprises about a thousand original reports filed by Nazi agents all over the world. Received and relayed by code teleprinters, the messages are couched in a dry technical language, with a bit of slang, or a few profanities added here or there.

SEOUL — (AP) — Korea's monument to its famed Admiral Lee, who turned back an overwhelming Japanese naval force in 1597 by using an ironclad warship more than 260 years ahead of its advent in the west, is being erected. It had been taken down by the Japanese.

No Waste In Lamb Curry

The bad food situation overseas makes us Americans eager to cut out our habit of wasting food. What we don't waste can help feed starving women and children in Europe, help prevent the desperation in which wars are bred. Use every particle of food in the refrigerator. Throw away no bread, eat it and follow recipes so carefully that every speck is eaten with enjoyment. That's the positive national program which will deprive Americans of nothing and at the same time enable our government to keep up food shipments to desperate Europe.

Curry of Lamb With Rice (Serves 6-8)

Six tablespoons shortening (chicken fat, salad oil, etc.), 1/2 cup chopped onion, 1 1/2 cups chopped celery, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, 1/4 cup flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons curry powder, 1 cup boiling water, 4 cups cooked lamb, cut in small pieces, 2 1/2 cups lamb stock, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 4 cups hot cooked rice, 4 thick slices onion, parsley.

Melt the shortening and cook the chopped onions and chopped celery in the shortening until they are almost tender. Mix together the salt, pepper, flour and curry powder; add to the vegetables and shortening, stirring until all the ingredients are well blended.

Add the boiling water and stir constantly until a smooth paste is made. Add the cut-up lamb and lamb stock to the curried vegetables and stir constantly until the sauce is thickened. Add the lemon juice just before removing the curry of lamb from the heat. Arrange the hot cooked rice in the bottom and around the sides of a well-greased three-quart heat-resistant glass casserole. Pour the curry of lamb in the center of the rice in the casserole; arrange the slices of onion

on top of the meat and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 20 minutes. Garnish with parsley and serve at once.

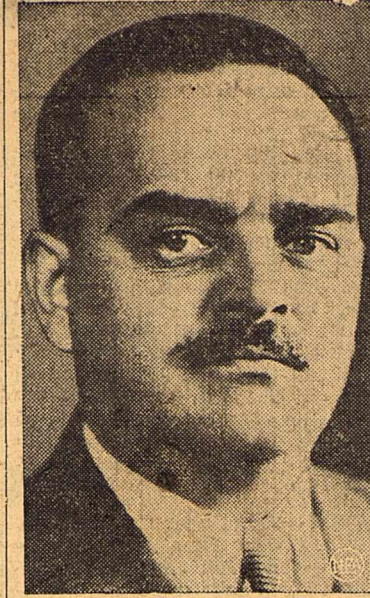
Naples Is Given Back To Italy By GI Exodus

NAPLES — (AP) — The Allies have given Naples back to the Italians. The mass exodus of nearly all military installations which began early in March has stripped this noisy, smelly port city of its military atmosphere.

Until recently Naples looked like a military encampment, with army trucks and jeeps forcing pedestrians to scurry for safety. Khaki-clad GIs and British Tommies once occupied all the choice spots in town.

The GI, who whistled at signorinas and shouted "mama mia", sold his PX cigarettes, bought cameos, and forced every one to speak his language, now has become a memory to the easy-going Neapolitans. An American uniform has become almost an oddity. The British also are pulling out. The Royal Navy has left historic Fort dell'Ovo after more than two years occupation, leaving only a small number of personnel on Santa Lucia Island.

ASPCA Gets Its Man—And He Gets His Dog

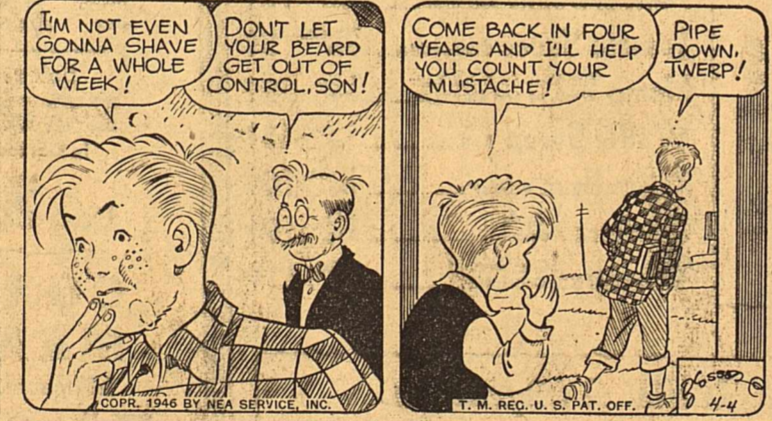
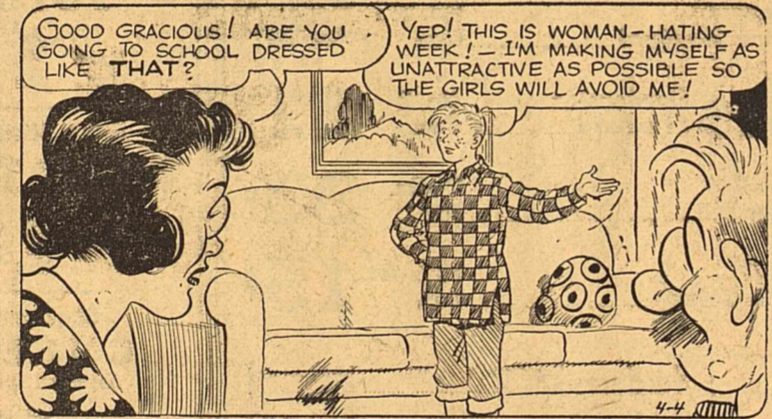

Eisenhower Starts Inquiry Of Officer Protection Charge

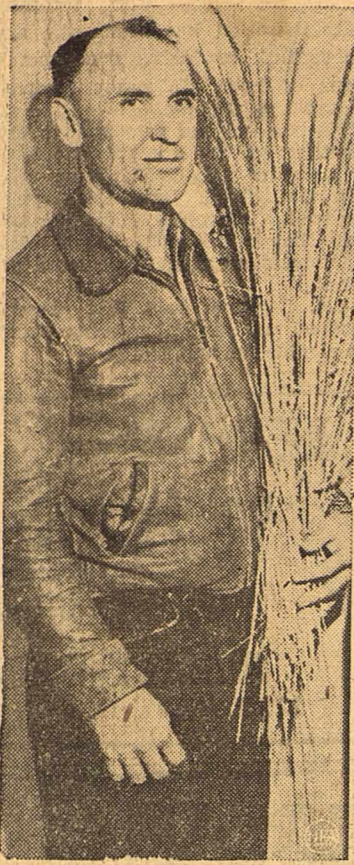
WASHINGTON —(AP)— Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower Wednesday ordered immediate investigation of charges attributed to a government prosecutor that efforts were being made to protect Army officers from prosecution in the Lichfield court-martial in England.

A War Department spokesman said the chief of staff ordered a prompt report from the headquarters of Gen. Joseph T. McNarney, commander of American occupation forces in Europe.

The spokesman said Eisenhower was confident McNarney already had started action to assure complete justice both to enlisted men and officers concerned.

Eisenhower acted on the basis of a London dispatch saying Capt. Earl J. Carroll, the prosecutor, had resigned and had accused the Army of mishandling the court-martial to protect top Army officials.

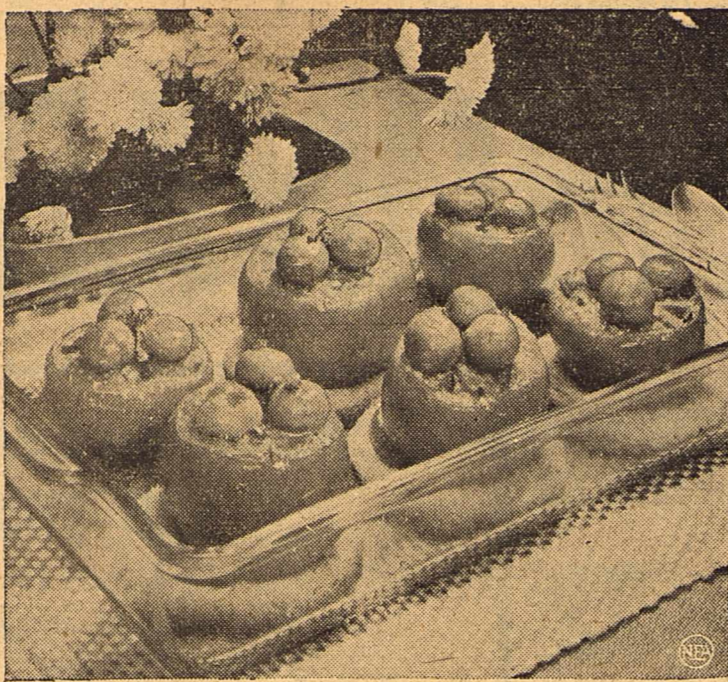
Gentleman Jim Rules Roost And Then Some

Mushrooms Aid Lenten Dish

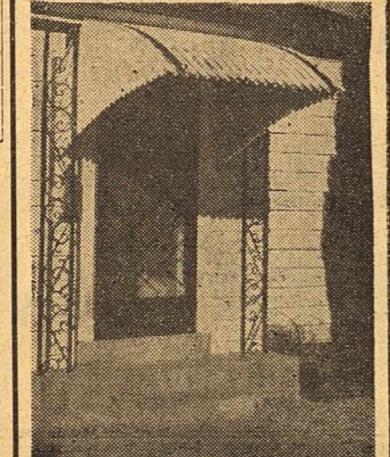


Baked tomatoes with mushrooms a meatless treat

By GAYNOR MADDOX NEA Staff Writer Meatless dishes for Lent will often surprise the family with their rich flavor and satisfying consistency. Try cottage cheese with baked potatoes. To the cheese, add a little minced onion or chopped chives, salt, pepper, cayenne and enough milk or cream to bring to a creamy consistency. Mix well. Put a large serving of this cold cheese on the dinner plate with the baked potato and vegetables. You'll be delighted with the result. Baked Tomatoes with Mushrooms (Serves 6) Six slices of bread, lightly toasted, 4 tablespoons of melted butter or fortified margarine, 6 whole firm tomatoes, 18 whole mushrooms, 1 small onion, finely chopped, 1/2

teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Cut the bread into large rounds and spread with half the melted butter or margarine; arrange in a well-greased two-quart heat resistant glass utility dish. Wash the whole tomatoes and slice off the stem ends. Place a tomato on each round of toast. Place 3 whole mushrooms on the top of each tomato. Put the chopped onion, one-half the chopped green pepper in remainder of melted butter or margarine, add salt and pepper and cook until onion and green pepper are tender, stirring occasionally. Pour the onion and green pepper mixture over the tomatoes and mushrooms. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 30 minutes. Garnish with the other half of the chopped green pepper, sprinkling it over the top. Another good meatless main dish consists of a baked potato scooped out, mashed and then stuffed in the shell. Make an indentation—place a raw egg in the pocket, sprinkle with salt, pepper and a little grated cheese. Return to hot oven until egg is set and cheese melted.

Cut Flowers Flown North In 12 Hours

WILMINGTON, N. C.—(AP)—Northern markets are currently receiving cut flowers from fields in North Carolina within 12 hours after being cut as tar heel bulb growers take advantage of postwar delivery freight by plane. Introduced by the North Carolina Bulb Growers Association, delivery of cut flowers by plane is now being operated on a semi-weekly basis. Florists in northern cities are accepting 378,200 cut flowers weekly by plane. According to Adrian Ludeke, president of the association, the flowers are cut in the morning, boxed 35 dozen to the container, and shipped in the afternoon. A plane-load consists of about 450 boxes or 5,000 pounds, he explained. Ten cities are covered on three schedules. One route calls for stops at Washington, New York, Boston and Philadelphia; route two Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Cincinnati and route three Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Chicago. Cost of freight per load runs from \$500 to \$700 Ludeke said. He declared the loss of flowers had been negligible as the planes are kept at proper temperature. Shipment values of the flowers by plane average about \$5,000 a load.

Poland Gets Back Captured Machinery

WARSAW —(AP)— Polish industries slowly are getting back machinery stripped from factories by the Nazis and carted off into Germany. Six hundred carloads have been returned to the "Pionki" factory near Radom, not far from Warsaw. Electrical and printing equipment has arrived from Oranienburg. Forty carloads of machinery for the Lodz and Czesochowa textile mills are being shipped from the British occupation zone in Germany.

South Africa Lets Army Boots Rot

JOHANNESBURG —(AP)— Because businessmen objected to their sale, 750,000 pairs of army boots are rotting at Roberts Heights. They are slightly used and it was planned to have them repaired by disabled ex-soldiers and placed on the market. Fears were expressed, however, as to the effect this would have on the civilian retail boot trade and the scheme was abandoned. Now nobody knows what to do with the boots.

Vet Administration Takes Over McCloskey

DALLAS —(AP)— The Veterans Administration has begun the arduous task of taking over operations of huge McCloskey General Hospital at Temple. VA has assigned personnel to key positions at the hospital, the first steps in a week-long change-over job. Col. T. G. Lanphier, deputy regional veterans administrator, said that between 300 and 400 VA staff members would be placed on jobs. Col. Lanphier said that general medical and surgical patients would be eligible for admittance.
